Dear Friend Lansbury,

We sorrow with you, and we rejoice with you - thanking God for the testimony of your loved one and yourself.

Since we heard of your wife's illness, my wife and I have been praying for her, and for you. Now she has rested, we shall think of you: not altogether lonely, but yet in circumstances which will seem curiously strange after all your happy years together. So let it be.

At times I like to think of Mrs. Lansbury as being your mate in many aspects as Catherine Booth was to our Founder. I see him now in Abney Park at the end of the Funeral Services. The "Daily Telegraph" sketch might have been written by me. It says in part -

"It was a most touching sight when the tall, upright General came forward in the gathering darkness to tell his comrades of the loss he, their Chief, had sustained. He spoke manfully, resolutely, and without the slightest trace of affectation. Not a suspicion of clap-trap marred the dignity of the address. He spoke as a soldier should who had disciplined his emotions, without effort, and straight from the heart. Few wives who have comforted their husbands for forty years have received such a glowing tribute of honest praise."
