

Dear Friend,

I have felt constrained to write and tell you how glad my brother, sisters and alf are at the stand The Herald is taking on the question of peace by negotiation instead of aiming at a military victory, and how we hope that Labour will indeed see its way to support or initiate efforts to stop the war, and to institute the methods of conciliation and common says so that lives need no longer be slaughtered, but a lasting peace be entered upon.

To me it seems a most terrible thing that we should be asked to risk starving our people for the sake of feeding the Italians so that the Italians may be indeuced to fight. It is beyond words to express what one feels when one contemplates the starving of women and children in one country to feed those of another that their men may be induced to go and fight, which with our modern methods is scarcely more than to go and be slaughtered. I hope therefore that at the Conference a strong resolution will be passed

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which will induce the Government to enter into negotiations, or an armistice allowing of the free discussion of terms of peace. Peace we cannot have too soon, but we will need time to get the terms of settlement clear, but surely there is not need for one more to be slaughtered as we are not out for dictating peace terms, especially when distation can never make a true and lasting settlement.
