Dear Mr Lansbury,

Sympathy, should it be? Yes: there must be a sense of loss when one with so many dear associations passes on. And so you have the sympathy of all of us who have learned to appreciate you and the lady who was always in the background. What an immense help Mrs Lansbury must have been to you, - your other self so to speak. We who have marvelled at your continued energy these last years have known that part of the reason at any rate was that restfulness at home, of which we got an occasional glimpse.

And yet, when I say sympathy, I feel there is something in your note that is far more applicable. In so many essential things you have the traditional Methodist note. "Rejoice for a brother deceased"we used to sing. And one does feel that in the passing on of a great soul there is reason for rejoicing. Our hope of immortality becomes a certainty in such experiences. Immortality may be a dogma of the Church but it is not dead dogma. It becomes a living experience at these times.
