

My dear mr. Sansbury

I hope you will remember me! I sit - physically on your side of the House on the Back Bench on top of the gangway, where I have ample room for my legs.

I hope when you get this you will be well on the way to complete recovery. I was so sorry to read in a local paper ( in Spanish) this morning a cable reporting your distressing accident and hasten to offer you my sincerest sympathies and trust that you will be back again in your old place long before I return.

I came out on behalf of some of those important interests, - which you are so anxious to nationalise! - to endeavour to restore economic relations which we have had for the last 50 years with Chile and whose particular industry - nitrates - has suffered in common with apparently every other commodity in the world. My job is one which would have been necessary even if you had already carried out your programme, so perhaps you also would have had to send me out on the work I am now on!

I find everything absorbingly interesting and the people of all classes friendly, definitely so towards England, in spite of the fact that considerably more money has been invested in Chile by the U.S.A. The Government, as you know, is to all intents and purposes like ours, a real National Government/ members of all Parties are

represented in the Cabinet.

On my first visit to the Lower House here I was interested to notice the only decoration consisted of a large-sized wonderful seascape by Summerscales, an English artist, who spent nearly all his life in Chile. It represents the victorious Chilean Armada returning to Valparaiso after having defeated the Spaniards in 1830 circa. In the van is the flag-ship of Lord Cochrene, R.N. (British), a Scotsman, who I think at one time ( I am not quite sure of this) was a member of the House of Commons. Anyhow, his activities went a long way towards procuring the Independence of Chile, the first President being one - General became o'Higgins,-Chilean born son of an Irish Labourer, who/max a Colonel in the Spanish Royalist Army,






