LETTER to the REGISTRAR GENERAL on the CAUSES of DEATH in
ENGLAND, by W. FARR, Esq., M.D., F.R.S.

YEAR 1873.

SIR,

THE year was less fatal than is usual. Taking population into account the seasons never since the year 1856 saw so few people die. Some of the most pernicious causes of death remained in abeyance, as I now proceed to show in a rapid survey of the facts recorded amply in the Tables.*

The total deaths were 492,520, of which the causes were specified sufficiently for classification in 485,735 instances. Of the cases unclassified 3346 were returned by the coroners and others as sudden or as from causes unascertained: of 3439 the causes were not specified.

I.—ZYMOTIC DISEASES.

The deaths from zymotic diseases were 89,286: making, after correction for unspecified cases, 38·50 per 10,000 of the population.† This is less by 12·36 than the average 50·86 of the twenty years 1850-69. Their mortality, somewhat above the mean in the two years 1870-1, fell in 1872, and again still more in the year 1873.

There are four orders in the zymotic class, and it is in the miasmatic order that the decline has been most sensible. Thus comparing the annual mortality per 10,000 of the twenty-years 1850-69 with that of 1873 the mortality by small-pox fell from 2·04 to 1·02; by measles from 4·37 to 3·19; scarlet fever and diphtheria from 10·46 to 6·76; croup from 2·54 to 1·85; whooping-cough from 5·21 to 4·14; fever in its three forms, in the first years undistinguished, fell from 9·18 to 5·85; dysentery from 0·76 to 0·31. Erysipelas and carbuncle declined. Ague and remittent fever, once so dangerous and causes of so much sickness in England, and still so fatal elsewhere, were fatal to very few lives in 1850-69, and to fewer still in 1873. Rheumatism is stationary. Neither influenza nor cholera was epidemic in 1873: the mortality per 10,000 these diseases occasioned was only 0·11 and 0·32: the actual deaths referred to influenza were 266, to cholera 749. In the years 1847-8-9 the deaths by influenza were 4881, 7963, and 1618; by cholera 788, 1908, and 53,273! By the progress of hygienic measures this country may hope to be spared, for the future, appalling visitations of cholera.

Enthetic diseases occur more frequently than they did some years ago. The deaths by syphilis were 1843: of that number 1470 were children under two years of age. 166 were males and 178 were females of 15

years of age and upwards. Gonorrhœa is rarely fatal directly, but it gives rise to stricture of the urethra, which was the cause of the death of 235 males. Both syphilis and gonorrhœa give rise to local and constitutional diseases of a specific character which is not always indicated in the returns. Hydrophobia assumes the epizootic type in the dog, and the deaths by it have varied in the six years 1868-73 remarkably: they were 7, 18, 32, 56, 39, and 28. To a considerable extent the fatality from this deplorable cause can be restrained by well considered police regulations, 16 who were bitten by mad dogs and died were males, 12 females. One was a boy a year old, and two were girls of the age of four years. Six were boys, two girls of 5-10; three were boys, one a girl, of the age 10-15. Of glanders caught from the horse three men died. That distressing disease is of rare occurrence as few people are exposed to the risk of contagion. In 1855 the deaths by glanders were *eleven*, in 1858 *one*.

The *Dietic* diseases are painful. One of the chief advantages of social organization is the security it affords workmen of all ages against death by starvation; a present and much more pressing danger in a country without Poor Laws than a foreign enemy. Dr. Chambers is probably right when he ascribes many of the atrocities of the first French Revolution and the madness of the Commune to the rage of hunger. The deaths directly referred to privation in England were 71. They are fewer than they were formerly. In 1847, when the potato failed, the deaths in England by privation were 219; what the deaths from this cause may become in a country without a Poor Law, under which the land affords no insurance against death by starvation, the dread famine in Ireland proves.

1162 deaths of infants are ascribed to the want of breast milk and the inanition of infancy.

Rickets is now rarely fatal; but 157 deaths, 155 in children under five years of age, are referred to this cause. Of bronchocele 22 females, and only six males died; all above 10 years of age.

The deaths by delirium tremens were 365, by less aggravated intemperance 412. 330 men, 35 women died of delirium tremens; 286 men, 126 women of intemperance, nearly all at ages above 25, as is the case in insanity. Purpura and scurvy were fatal to 484 persons.

The fatal *parasitic diseases* are due to aphtha, to hydatids, and to worms of various kinds.

II.—CONSTITUTIONAL DISEASES.

85,726 persons died of this class of causes; which, unlike the zymotic class, varies little from year to year. And in the aggregate, notwithstanding the increase of population, there is no sensible increase of the numbers since 1847.

There are two orders, the Diathetic and the Tubercular, the latter being the most fatal.

Gout, the first of the diathetic order of diseases, is growing more fatal: and is generally due to causes over which men have control. Dropsy is now known by practitioners to be often the result of organic diseases which are returned as the causes of death; hence the deaths ascribed to dropsy have declined, but the actual decline of the affection is only apparent. Cancer is the assigned cause of 10,455 deaths.

Scrofula is less fatal than it was ten years ago. Hydrocephalus and tabes mesenterica are nearly stationary. Consumption is returned as the cause of 51,355 deaths: 13,009 of them at the ages 25-35, or in the prime marriage-age of life. 25.6 is the mean age of first marriage for men, 24.2 the mean age of first marriage for women. The rate of mortality in the twenty years (1850-69) by consumption was 26.38, in the last year 22.14. The decline is sensible on such large numbers. This has to be considered in connection with the increase of bronchitis.

III.—LOCAL DISEASES.

Inflammations, hypertrophies, alterations of structure, and functional diseases are essentially diseases of some particular part or organ. At the same time they affect the whole economy more or less, and in so many cases cause death that the third is the most fatal of the five classes. 215,438 deaths are ascribed to local diseases. The mortality by these diseases was at the rate of 92.88 deaths to 10,000 living. Of 100 deaths 44 are by local diseases.

The diseases of the brain, spinal marrow, and nerves constitute the first order. This system is so highly developed in man that it distinguishes him from all inferior animals, and many of its disorders are fatal. 65,835 persons died of diseases of the brain and its appendages, implying a death-rate from this order of causes expressed by 28.38 deaths to 10,000 living. Of the deaths 25,646 are referred to convulsions in children under five years of age. The boys dying in convulsions were 14,448, the girls 11,198. Of the 35,978 dying at the age 5 and upwards 24,211 died of apoplexy and paralysis, the majority of them at advanced ages.

The mortality ascribed to apoplexy is as nearly as possible equal to the mortality by paralysis; the victims of the latter cause being the oldest; and both forms of disease are often concurrent, and are often associated with softening of the brain. The returns of convulsions are decreasing probably from more careful diagnoses; the mortality by cephalitis and insanity is increasing.

Insanity is often the result or the cause of fatal lesions of the brain, but the deaths, even in lunatic asylums, are generally ascribed to other diseases. In fact, as far as is known, a lunatic remains as subject to zymotic, constitutional, and various local diseases as sane people. Insanity is sometimes a consequence, sometimes a cause, of alcoholism.

To heart and arterial diseases 28,447 deaths were referred. The knowledge of these diseases, through modern discoveries, is increasing among medical practitioners, and to this may be referred at least partially the increase in the mortality referred to them from 7.52 in 1850-59 to 12.27.

The most fatal order of local diseases is that embracing diseases of the respiratory organs of which 85,626 persons died, including 51,425 who died of bronchitis and 22,904 who died of pneumonia. Bronchitis has rapidly and progressively increased in the returns; thus in the four quinquennials from 1850 to 1869 the annual deaths by this disease to 10,000 living were 10.16, 13.59, 16.58, 18.39. After the year 1869 there was a further increase, and the mortality in the year 1873 rose to 22.16. Pneumonia declined, but if to avoid confusions of diagnosis, both bronchitis and pneumonia are taken together, there was still an increase in the aggregate, for the annual mortality by both diseases was at the rate of 22.6 in 1850-54 and 32.0 in 1873.

22,314 persons died of diseases of the digestive organs, the mortality showing signs of decrease. Enteritis declined, liver diseases scarcely increased.

There is a general increase in the deaths by urinary diseases; of which 8526 persons died in the year.

Ovarian dropsy is less fatal than it was in former years; this is due to the introduction of one of the most brilliant of surgical operations.

The diseases of the organs of locomotion were fatal to 1973 persons; of the cutaneous integuments to 1439.

IV.—DEVELOPMENTAL DISEASES.

This is an extensive class, and it embraces four orders which must be distinguished. Under the first order 15,950 children died: 10,186 prematurely born; 1491 died of malformations, 4273 of teething.

Under the second order are arranged 2375 deaths in childbirth, exclusive of 1740 by puerperal fever. The deaths are shown for a series of years in Table 13, and are compared with the births of live-born children. It will be noticed with regret that the proportion of deaths of mothers to children implies a higher mortality than has occurred since the years 1864-5; 5 mothers died to 1000 children born alive.*

29,282 persons died of old age; 30,333 died of atrophy and debility, including 22,748 infants under one year of age.

V.—VIOLENT DEATHS.

The deaths of 17,246 persons were registered as caused by violence: in conformity generally with the finding of coroners' inquests, 15,106 of them by accidents, but many really from negligence; 407 by homicide; 1518 by suicide; 9 by execution.

Thus out of 10,000 people, the population of a small town, seven persons (7.44) were killed by obvious causes of various kinds.

Including infanticide, homicide, as defined at inquests, declined after 1865-69; but it increased from 387 in 1872 to 407 in 1873. The criminals convicted for murder were 18; for manslaughter 132.†

Executions have declined since the five years 1860-64 to 1873 from 8 to 4 in ten millions of population.

Suicide has been nearly stationary since the year 1860; the proportion of ascertained suicides to a population of 1,000,000 was 66.6 in 1860-4, 67.2 in the next five years; 70 in 1870, and 66 in each of the years 1871-2, and 65 in 1873.

What are called accidental deaths are often the result of negligence, wilfulness, or rashness. Thus of the 1543 suffocated, 1242 of them children under five years of age; 1145 of them babies in the first year of life, many might have been saved by obvious precautions. It is gratifying to notice a decline of the mortality by burns and scalds from 147 in 1860-4 to 98 in 1873. Further precautions in wearing unflammable dresses, providing escapes from conflagrations, will effect further reductions. The deaths by poisons show a decrease. They are chiefly from laudanum, solid opium, morphia, prussic acid, cyanide of potassium, strychnia, sulphuric acid, carbolic acid, salts of lead, arsenic, overdoses of medicine. Hydrate of chloral and chloroform are new medicines. Chloroform was the cause of 15 deaths; 10 of males, 5 of females.

Fatal doses of none of these poisons should be left about, or in the hands of patients. It is to be feared if this is not attended to, that they will kill more people than they cure. Poisons are not so often as they are believed to be, remedies. They are not all indispensable; and when administered in over-doses they may be fatal.

Registered deaths by drowning were 2695; this is exclusive of 3263 unregistered deaths at sea in the merchant service. Enough care is not yet bestowed on saving life from drowning. Happily the life-boat service is making some progress all round the coast, and by the Act of last session the lives of many seamen will be saved.

7221 deaths were ascribed to fractures and contusions, the direct effects of mechanical force variously applied. More of that force, as compared with the population, exists in England than in any other country; and this loss of life is one of its sad incidental effects. We have not kept pace with its development in guarding against its destructive effects. Let us hope that the multitude of these deaths, and of the innumerable injuries with which they are associated will lead to the discovery of remedies.

The same science that creates engines of death may bring to light means of control and safety.

The violent deaths are carefully classified and analysed in the Table.* It will be seen that 1290 deaths were connected with railways, 990 with mines.

The 1290 deaths include those of railway servants. And it is worthy of remark that the number is very nearly the same as the number of deaths by horse conveyances of one kind or other. The deaths on railways may be considered as deaths additional to those incurred in the old conveyances, including wagons, carts, &c. of the country.

To the deaths by lightning the attention of physicists is especially directed. Their distribution over the several districts is given, and in every case the sex, age, and occupation are distinguished. The deaths in each year since 1868 were 11, 7, 19, 28, 46, 21; thus the electrical action of the earth measured by deaths from lightning increased rapidly from 1869, when only 7 persons were killed, to 1872, when 46 were killed by lightning. In the first three years 37, in the last three years 95, were killed.†

The Royal College of Physicians was good enough to appoint a Committee to revise the nomenclature of diseases, and to draw up a report thereon, and I have endeavoured, as far as was practicable, to give the Causes of Death classified according to their nomenclature for the eight years 1866-73, for the sake of comparison in the Table 17.‡
