

In reply to your letter of 5th inst., with regard to the letter from the Glasgow University Socialist Club, these people approached Mr. Henderson John McKenzie, J.P., (Nat. Union of General Some Weeks ago, and he wrote asking my advice; and at that time I consulted Tom Johnston and one of the University Socialist councillors, and they were of opinion that Mr. Henderson should stand.

My own opinion was that there is very little Labour enthusiasm in the Universities here and they are not able to make too good a job of a fight like this, and I left it entirely to Mr. Henderson to

In the same way I have no desire to say to you not to stand, and they think it would help them if you did. However, the position is made a little more difficult for you since Mr. Henderson has already declined, in addition to which he consulted the National Executive, who agreed with him.

I am not sure, under these circumstances, whether you would desire to accept. Should you decide not to stand, I think you might refer them to Sir Stafford Cripps, which would provide him at the moment with an opportunity of testing out on the Scottish Universities the response to his remarks which enthuse the undergrads. of the English Universities. Universities here are definitely decidedly reactionary, 40 Wallace Street, Grangemouth. but it would be interesting to have someone test their vote at the present time, and it would be especially interesting to test the vote of Glasgow University, where they cannot scrape enough people together to form a decent-sized University Labour Group.







My dear Mr. Dansbury,

I am delighted to learn from your letter that you are making progress. In your case the old saying that those "the gods love die young" has been refuted. You are very fortunate indeed that after so grave an accident at your age progress has been sustained.

I do not know what the Labour party is doing to combat and to meet the threat of Fascism in England. Neither do I know what the Labour party is doing to give expression to a policy that will redeem the people from suffering and want, and what is worse than all, uncertainty.

The growth of socialism on the main-land of Europe, and even in this little island, has brought about retribution in the shape of capitalistic activity, because I can only look upon fascism as a capitalistic, political force, set up by the concern of capitalistic interests for their property fights. It seems to me that the more outspoken and thrustful is the development of socialism, the more fiercely will the established system fight, and that fighting, as we have seen in Garmany and in Italy, will not confine itself to mere exchange of words.

On the other hand it might be agreed that by the setting up of public utility companies such as those that control the London docks, the London transport, Metropolitan Water Board, and the Electricity Board, a relief from suffering and want will be brought about.

I consider that these public utility boards should cover the whole of Great Britain, and gradually, other public utility companies should be organised to include public wants and requirements, such as housing, a prime necessity, and banking.

Secondary and # higher education, at the present day the doors of the great schools are shut to the children of the poor, and only a poor child possessed of exceptional intellectual quality can obtain admittance, should also be included, and then, last and perhaps the biggest of all, the press, that false friend that, to the destruction of many a well born thought and effort, sways the people in the direction of the banking account of its wealthy proprietors.

I am suggesting the active development of the public utility company, because I do not think, remembering events as and from the general

strike that the public ownership of wealth will be accepted in England for a long time yet.

I believe that such a system should be reached by an intermediate stage, and that stage is the public utility company.

As I understand it, the public utility company does not make any profit other than that necessary to pay its overhead and establishment charges. The public, therefore, benefits in precisely the same way as it benefits as a result of the operations of the post office, telephone and telegraph systems.

The public utility company idea could be extended so as to include housing, a matter of outstanding and fundamental importance, banking, education, from the elementary schools to the university. In its slow, ordered, development, the public utility company can take over the feeding and clothing of the nation, and last, but not least, the public press.

I am sure of this, that if the labour party continues to press along a path of pure socialism, it will be met with such overwhelming obstacles as will in the end destroy it, as it has destroyed socialism in Germany and in Italy.

It is just because I would welcome socialism that I would deplore the possibility of its overwhelming defeat, and would advocate a gaining of its objective through the intermediate stage of the public utility company.

As soon as you are well enough, I should welcome an opportunity of meeting Sir Stafford Cripps, and I should also like to have a chat with you one day.
