

Good will and good fellowship, and thought for others peep out at me from the four comers of the very charming letter I have just received from There is just one little note of resentment when you deplore the need for lying in one position, but you can console yourself with the thought that every minute of this enforced stagnation brings you nearer to complete recovery. I wish, so far as my personal health is concerned, I could say the same. I have had a dreadful heart attack, and it seems to me instead of getting better I am moving in the opposite direction. You dwell a little too much upon our association in many good things. in good deeds. in the helping of others. and you think it strange that I should be so closely, intimately and gladly connected with one who is bravely fighting under the banner of socialism. 

THE CHURCH SCHOOL aims to help lay the proper foundation on which to build the superstructure of Christian character.

It seeks to do this through its carefully selected curriculum and thoroughly graded courses showing the background of religion as given in the Bible, set forth in the teachings and portrayed by the example of Jesus, and illustrated by the lives of great souls of all time.

Supplementing the work of the Church School and coordinating with its program, are the boys' and girls' clubs of the weekdays, and

The Boys Clubs are the Friendly Indians, the Pioneers, and the Indeed, our homes will get more than a just share of Comrades carrying out the Christian Citizenship Program, of the Y. M. C. A., meeting weekly.

> The girls have the Girl Reserves Clubs in conjunction with the Y. W. C. A., meeting weekly.

> The Young Peoples Societies are the Friendship Circle and the Six-Fifteen Club, meeting on Sunday evenings.

THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY. A large group of women who are making a great contribution through their social contacts, through their public weekly and monthly meetings and programs, and their organization for service. Their work is educational, humanitarian, charitable, missionary—the outreach to the ends of the earth.

THE BUSINESS WOMEN'S CLUB. This group consists of women actively engaged in the business and commercial life of the community, who see the modern world from the business standpoint. Through this Club they find opportunity for social contacts under Christian auspices, and are also enabled to hear speakers on topics of special interest to them, book reviews, lectures, travelogues, and other themes of like nature which would be denied them but for this

KAPPA SIGMA ALPHA. This is a group of college and business young people, combining youthful enthusiasm, broad Christian experiences and seeking together to solve their common problems. sympathy and an earnest purpose to interpret Christianity in terms of everyday living.

Their sessions are held every Sunday morning in the Woman's Club House, under the linest leadership.

WORLD FRIENDSHIP. A committee seeking to push back horizons, and enlarge human sympathies. Students of world peace, and international relations bring their messages to large groups many times a year. The issues discussed and the problems presented for solution are the most vital with which Christianity is faced, and we believe a definite contribution is made to the desired end.

THE BROTHERHOOD. An organization of the men of the congregation for the purpose of acquaintance, fellowship, civic betterment and social service.

Their interests and activities center in the boy life not only of our own congregation but of the under-privileged boys on the outside.

Civic matters also bulk large in their programs and plans.

THE MINISTRY OF MUSIC. A rich expression of religious devotion, by a group of Christian-minded singers, under fine leadership, with the cooperation of the Music Committee.

In the choir is gathered a group who find a real joy in their ministry of song, who add greatly to the service of worship and the inspiration of the worshippers.

Through sacred music, through the great hymns, anthems, and oratorios of the church, the highest aspirations of the human spirit

THE MOTHERS' CLUB. A group of mothers sharing their The social forces in modern life influencing the lives of children receive the earnest attention of the mothers in the meetings held at the homes of the members.

Outstanding books and current events are subjects of discussion. Distinguished speakers, expert in their various lines are heard on child nurture, training, nutrition, recreation, education and every phase of child life.

In addition to the meetings, the Club is rendering a definite service to the church in sponsoring the Church Nursery during the hour of Sunday morning worship.

THE FORUM. A cross-roads of world opinion and progress, viewed in the light of Christian belief.

This group of men seeks to interpret the trend of events and present-day problems through free discussion, critical analysis, and the application of Christian principles to current life. The ideal that the Forum has set for itself is very high and deserves the wholehearted support of a great group of men.



"Hark how all the welkin rings" was Charles Wesley's first line in his well-known Christmas hymn, "Hark the herald angels sing." In this hymn, written in 1743, the word "welkin," Anglo-Saxon in origin, means "upper air" and was so used by King Alfred, Chaucer, Shakespeare, Edmund Spenser and others. This word was altered in Wesley's life-time by another hand, but it might have been allowed to stand as he wrote it. Both the original line and its revised version state that which is believed as a fact by Christian folk, and with reason. Whatever broadcasting has done it has made us familiar with the fact that "a very lovely song" sung in one place can be transmitted to all parts of the world.

It is noteworthy that Canterbury has become in recent years from time to time a centre from which Christian messages are broadcast for all who care to listen, for instance the New Year greeting by the Archbishop of Canterbury. In the same way H.M. The King's message from Sandringham last Christmas was broadcast "to all, to each" over the wide world and eagerly listened to in all parts of the British Empire. It is remarkable that Canterbury, notably by three buildings, has proclaimed its own triple message for centuries.

First, the message of the CHURCH OF ST. MARTIN'S, on a green hill outside the city walls. That tiny church stands, as a church there had stood for long before the coming of St. Augustine, on its deep-laid Anglo-Saxon foundations. There the earliest missionaries had planted the seed of the Gospel and by hallowing that ground as a place for worship have revealed the principle that from small beginnings can grow far-flung and abiding results.

Secondly, the message of the CATHEDRAL itself, which also stands on an Anglo-Saxon foundation. Let us gratefully acknowledge how much the Cathedral also owes to the Christ-like zeal of the Italian mission sent by that great-hearted Pope, Gregory II. in 597. The message of the Cathedral to-day surely is that continuity with its past can be maintained by creed, sacraments, and ministry in a Church, reformed, indeed thank God, but never uprooted and started again.

Thirdly, the message of ST. AUGUSTINE'S MISSIONARY COLLEGE. Founded as a monastery immediately after his arrival by the Italian first Archbishop of Canterbury, it fell on evil days after the dissolution of the monasteries in 1558, but it rose again as a religious house in 1848, fifteen years after the Oxford Movement began. Its resurrection from the ashes of neglect reveals how indestructible is religion, how adaptable its institutions and also how, if rooted in the past, it can so re-act to the present as to be ready to obey the calls of the unknown future. To-day it is in full use as a Missionary College, training and sending out men, after their ordination, all over the world.

This triple message of Canterbury is, if one may use the phrase, continually being "broadcast" by those three buildings ever before the eyes of those of us who live here; and appeals no less to the eyes, as we rejoice to know, of the ever-increasing number of "pilgrims" who come here from the British Commonwealth of Nations year by year.

Mindful of Bacon's words, "When a traveller returneth Home let him not leave the Countries where he has travelled altogether behind him; but maintain a correspondence by letters with those of his acquaintance which are most worth," we count it a privilege to wish God's benison once again to our friends overseas as well as at home, both for Christmas and for the New Year. We take this opportunity, however, of saying, especially to friends made on two journeys round the world (1919-1920, and 1922-1923), as well as in the Near East (1925-1926), that, whatever further length of service may be God's will for us, we cannot at our age expect time or strength to continue sending out so many hundreds of letters.

The words of our friend, the late Bishop Phillips Brooks of Boston, U.S.A. sum up our deepest hopes for all to whom we write:

> "O holy Child of Bethlehem, Descend on us, we pray; Cast out our sin, and enter in, Be born in us to-day. We hear the Christmas angels The great glad tidings tell: O come to us, abide with us,

The tower of St. Martin's Church is a small white spot in the trees beyond, and to the North East of the Cathedral.






