The Secretary moved the adoption of the Annual Report submitted by the Executive Committee.

In discussion of the Report, the Revd S. D. Hadley recommended that the Society should try to organize more drawing room meetings and to attack the upper middle class by lectures at fashionable centres such as Prince's Hall.

Further suggestion was made by Newell, Clark, and Shaw, the latter advocating more open air lectures.

Graham Waller drew attention to the small popularity of the meetings of the Political Committee. Mr Cotton raised a question with regard to the work of the Committee, how far it should further promote legislation in the direction of Socialism. S. Newell advocated this ^{pol. Comm.} policy, but recommended that the Society as a whole should not pledge itself to any definite political scheme.



The Webb also called attention to the average amount of the subscription made by members to the Society's fund.


The Report of the Executive Committee and the Treasurer's Report on the finance, audited by Messrs. Hills and Carr were accepted by the Society.

The meeting closed at 10.45 p.m.


