

I enclose one of my articles which I prepared for the "Daily Herald." I hope you will like it.



IRON RAILINGS

THE LONDON SOUARES

Sir,—I was much interested in Mr. Lewin's letter in your issue of the 27th inst., and strongly support his view as regards the abolition of railings wherever practicable. If this reform be necessary due to shortage of iron it will be one of the few good things as the result of war.

I do not remember during a long life having ever seen a human being in Berkeley Square with its splendid plane trees, planted, I believe, by a Lord Crawford in bygone days, neither when the square consisted of private houses, nor since the square has become largely occupied by commercial enterprises. I have often felt indignant when the well-to-do in the great squares have left their houses in August for Scotland, the country, or abroad, to see the small, humble children on holiday playing in the surrounding hard, wood-paved streets. I even go so far as to say that I should like to see the park railings disappear, with the exception of those round Hyde Park and Kensington Gardens which saved us during the great strike as regards the milk supply.

Mr. Lansbury, when First Commissioner of Works, took away the railings round Primrose Hill, greatly improving the appearance of that area, and I have never heard of any police regret for that reform. During my 23 years of office at H.M. Office of Works I never heard of a flower being picked in the Royal Parks, although Hyde Park is open till midnight. If the squares were opened to the public their proper upkeep should be the duty of

the local authority.
