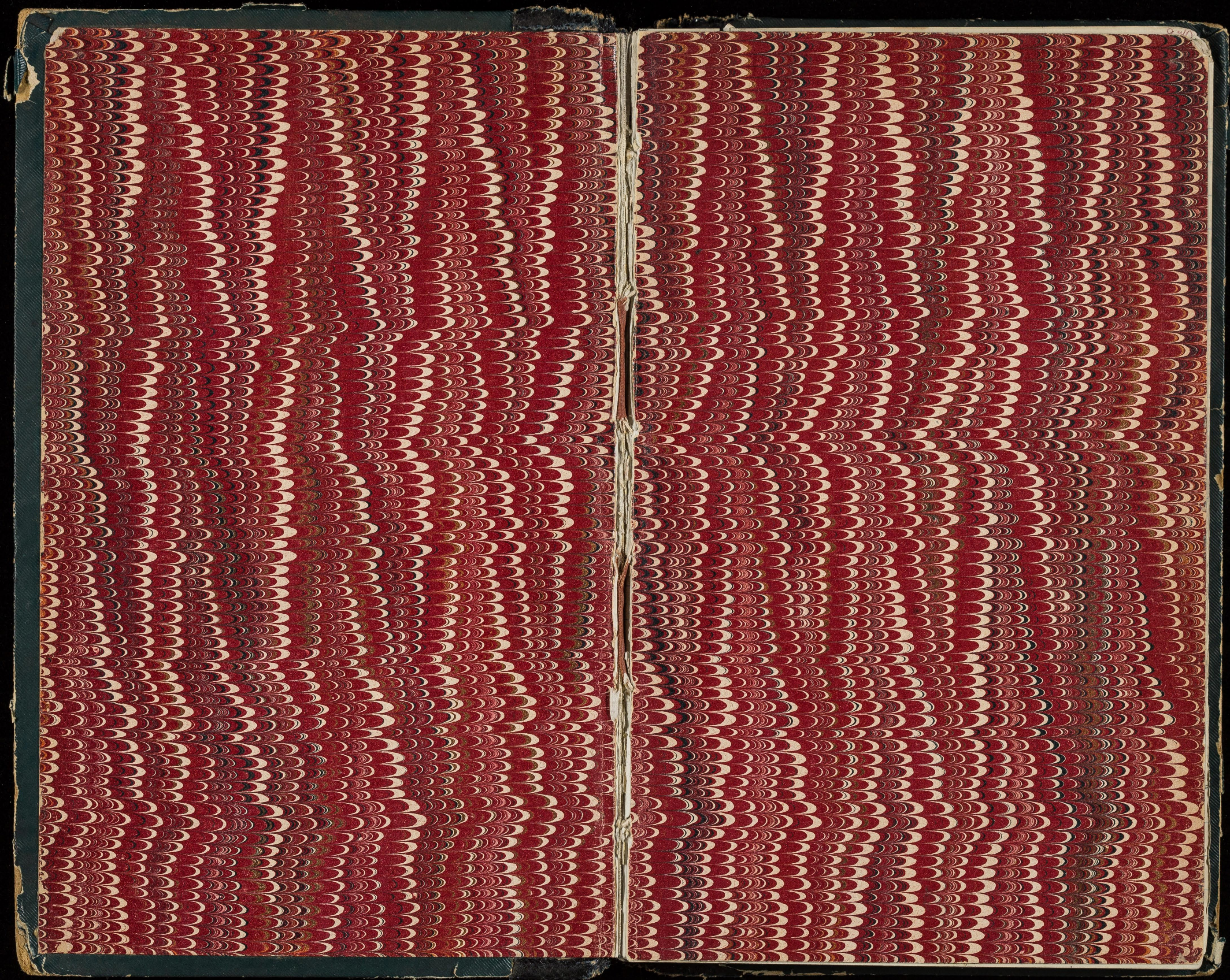

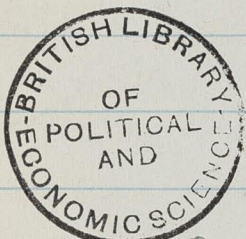

General Notes. This family had lived at 77 Gell St, 5 years, when the wife applied on March 18/85 saying that her husband had erysipelas. Dr Harvey had attended him but she wanted to get him away as Dr H. said it was catching. Sent to S.H. Next application is in Feb^r 1888 when the man says he has not worked for 4 months - cannot get work - Used to be a sailor but had not gone to sea for 20 years. Wife did charing but not enough to support them. He had applied to C.O.S. but withdrew his application. Sent to C.O.S. again with a letter. He does not go however but makes another application in June. Told to attend Board. In Aug^t, he is ill & has medicines & a week later he is admitted to S.A. The wife earns £1.13.4 a month, clearing at Alderley Wharf & out of that pays 4/- per week for help & finds soap & blacklead. In Sept, he is discharged from S.A. & is admitted to B.W.H. a few days after.

His son W^m allowed him a room & gave W^m all his furniture when his wife died. He will not assist ~~the~~ him now. Landlady says man was sober and industrious & had been a good father to the sons.

In Oct '88, the man comes & says he was living in Kn. S.O. Y. & went into the workhouse there three weeks before. He asked to come out for an holiday on the previous saturday & they gave him his discharge & told him to apply at Limehouse. He is admitted to 12 W.A. his sons wife saying that W^m will not keep him

He had fallen down the stairs leading to the yard & hurt his face & back. Wanted doctor to attend him. Man said he should like to go in & was sent to B.W.A.

R.O. adds a note that this man and his wife (Catherine b 1838) were well-known to him previous to 1870. They were constant applicants for out relief which they generally got through the Vice-Chairman. They were thorough imposters and great drinkers. Prior to 1869, this man & his wife when refused relief used fearful language to the Guardians - the woman threw an infant she was carrying on the floor & said she would leave it as a present to the Guardians.

Next application is on Sept 18. 88, when the wife applies, saying that her husband has had a fall & injured his knee and is very ill. Sent to S.A. He was discharged on Oct 4. 1888. Her wife is ill & has medical attendance on Oct 2/88.

He comes out in June '85 & gets employment as potman at the Blue Anchor, White Horse St. This lasts until Nov 13th when he re-enters B.W.H.

Man bears a good character ^{for sobriety & honesty.} C.O.S. allowed him 2/6 per week. His next application is in Feb^r 1880. His wife is dead. He has supported himself with the assistance of his sons. He asks for medicines. His room is clean & comfortable. In June 1880, he applies again - he has stayed four months with his daughter Martha. He cannot work & asks to be admitted. A Mr Cox says that man was very drunken & treated his wife badly. Admitted to B.W.H. he remains until August when he goes to stay with his daughter Martha. He remains with her until Nov 1882, when he enters B.W.H. from his other daughter's house 17 North St. ^{He comes out once after in June 85 &}

visited on 3rd & found the man had come home. He was
admitted to S.A. on May 24/78 & he died there on June 17/78.
The girl was taken to the Schools on May 15/78 & remained
until June 26/78 when the mother had her out so
that she might mind the baby while she went
out charing. The man has a bad character - a great
drinker - Landlady could not get her rent.

Son John Thos Smith ✓ b 1853. Painter, Single.

This man applied on Oct 24/78, saying that he
had not been able to work for 7 weeks through
bad feet. Asked to go to S.A. He applied again
on March 23/80. He then said he had not
had a constant job for 2 years. Had only
had odd jobs & now could not do them
through a bad foot. Was referred to Poplar
as he was living in that district. He is described
as a "lazy loafer". Killed in May. 1886.

Man is admitted because he is in ~~such~~ a "miserable condition through want of attendance." Woman is noisy and

drunken. Woman applies for out relief on Feb 20/76 but is reported to be worthy of no assistance other than W.H. She ^{came out of} ~~went into~~ P.W.H. in April/76 & was re-admitted on May 2nd 1877.

Both appear to have been chargeable since either in the W.H. or S.A.

This woman applied in Feb 84 saying that her husband had left her 9 or 10 times since they had been married. Had now gone away & had only given her 8p in five weeks. An order was given for P.W.H. The man to be prosecuted.

In May 84, Mrs Shepherd comes for a medical order for James Holland. his wife did not go into W.H. He had been home 2 months but had not worked for 3 weeks. R.O. visited - home was clean but wife slovenly. man appeared to have a severe cold. Sent to S.A. He came out on May 31st & was admitted to B.W.H. on June 10th whence he was transferred to the S.A. suffering from syphilis. On July 8/84, Mrs Shepherd asked for her daughter's admission as her husband had left her. She was ill (syphilis) thro' husband. He got

his pension (had been a soldier) £2-11- - & had not been seen since. Woman was admitted to S.A. Two days after Mrs Shepherd was found in the waiting room after the Guardians had met. She said she had come to ask the Guardians to take the children. Being told she was too late & to keep the children a few day to see if the man came back she became very abusive. Eventually she went away. Next morning she went to the magistrate who sent a policeman to see R.O. He was told the facts & soon after the woman came. Being told that the magistrate had been told the facts, she began using foul language & R.O. left her in the waiting room. Presently R.O. told her that he would give an order for the children when she put the youngest child on the ground & said R.O. might give them in charge & commenced to walk away. R.O. ran & told gatekeeper to close the gates - she then sprang at R.O & caught him by the throat saying she would choke him. R.O. freed him from her & got out of her way. She then threw the youngest child on the stones of the courtyard more than once & it was thought better to let her go without the children for fear she should do them an injury. On July 31/84, Mrs Holland, have left the S.A. is admitted to P.W.H. with the two children. In Sept/84, the man is still away & the mother has medicines for one of

the children. In Feb '85, the woman (Holland) comes & tells R.O. that her husband is in prison. He had 21 days for assaulting her. He had left her for 8 mths. She found him playing cards in a beerhouse in East-field St.

This husband's brother Wm Holland also had relief in 1886 [I.] on the birth of one of his children, his wife Charlotte née Singleton b 1854 being admitted to S.A. Her mother Catherine Singleton ^{b 1823} was a pauper in the Stepney Union in 1879 & was known to R.O. as a drunken dissipated woman; indeed all her relations belong to the semi-pauper class & have had relief at some time altho' not in the year under review.

General Notes Rich^d Shepherd, who is living with his daughter Ellen Smiles, applies on March 19. 1886 & ~~he~~ is admitted to B.W.H. He had worked for W. Spence, Dry Dock for 20 years - he could not get work ~~and~~ & his daughter could not keep him. Had not heard of his sons for several years.

He soon comes out but goes back to B.W.H. in Oct/81. He apparently wants to go into the S.A. In April '82, the man comes & says ^{that his wife} has had a fit & is unconscious at home. He had not worked for 4 weeks. Visited & found woman in an apparently dying condition. Doctor she died 5 days after. Man goes to live at a Lodging House afterwards (37 Stepney Causeway) & has medical attendance & is sent to B.W.H. in Dec 18/82. In Jan '85, he is again sent to B.W.H. He had been shamming sick to get into the S.A. In July 1886, he is staying at 8 London St & is admitted to B.W.H. - Cannot work owing to sickness

His knees are weak; he falls down & cuts himself (his face is cut & bruised.) His landlady thinks he drinks more than he ought. He owes 9/- rent weeks rent. He was sent to P.W.A. In July 1886, he is out for 2 days & stays at C.H. 42 West India Road. Has not been out since.

General Notes. The man applied for medicines for his wife on Nov 6th 1879. He could not get her medicines or necessaries. R.O. visited at 1 Lockside (Rent 3/- £3 or £4 owing) rather unexpectedly and the people hurried the food they were cooking out of the room before R.O. reached, but they could not remove the savour of the cooking meat from the room. Medical attendance is continued until January '80, when she is sent to S.A. She came out in Feb^{ry} & had medicines immediately. She was not very comfortable there. There are several other applications for medicines during 1880 & 1881. The man's work is irregular. Towards the end of 1881, the man gets a better job for in March '82, he had paid off his back rent. The C.O.S. assist him a little now. He had only done 5 days work in the five weeks throughout this year & 1883, medicines are given but the woman will not go into S.A. when they have the money they live well but it appears to be at intervals. In Feb '83, the man is ill & has medicines. In April '83, the woman is admitted to the S.A.

Wife had supported them by canvas work, but it was slack then. Used to earn 8/- per week but only 4/6 per week then. In Dec '84, the man is ill again & is sent to S.A. They then lived at 2 St Ann's St. (Rent 1/9). He was discharged from the S.A. on Feb 4 in a very unfit state & was obliged to keep his bed & have medicines for a month. Next application is for the man's admission to the W.H. in Oct '86. Mrs Regan, his landlady, would look after his wife. Neighbours say they are very sober & industrious. Four months after, the old woman has to apply & she is sent to join her husband at B.W.H. Since that time the woman has been out 3 times & the man once.
