



I have just been re-reading my article of this week and I feel that I owe you a debt of thanks. (Don't think this is writ sarcastic, because it isn't; I suppose I ought to be anmoyed about your excisions, but I am not.) What strikes me about the article is its restraint, as compared with what I might have written on the same subject a couple of years ago. The style is better; the spirit is better.

The old Adam dies hard, I know, but it looks as though the milk of human kindness has taken the place of vitricl and this I owe to you. That's why I feel impelled to write you this note. We shall never take exactly the same view of a firs, perhapd, but I think you ought to know - you who think that I'm quite an irresponsible person! - that this restraint, this by no means thorougo inoculation of Christian charity, is due to yourself. You are somewhat disturbing with your simplicity. You make me doubt not only the cleverness of other "clever" people but even my own cleverness. I can't quit'e understand it - I don't suppode I shall understand it this side of the grave - but I felt that I ought to tell you.

Forgive my wasting your time like this but K feel heaps better for it!

Dear George,

My mind keeps reverting to our little talk the other day when I handed back to you the letter you gave me to read.

I am afraidyou think me a cantankerous 'cuss' who dealt in wholesale demunciations, and who was not constructively helpful. I think my real failing is that, after all these years of trying and hoping, I am impatient of anything that does not at once crystalize into action.

I repeat to myself almost daily that we must live our ideals, or live them as nearly as all the surrounding restrictions of our present system will allow.

When I stop to think, I know - and you know - that we can really expect very little from our Cabinet Ministers and M. P.'s. They - poor devils - at any rate, many of them, go to the House expecting to be able to do something to better the lives of the masses, and find, when they get there, that they are up against the same barriers that encircle the poor workers: and most of them settle down at playing the tune their paymasters - land monopoly and special privilege - call !

The people or class one must"get at", reform or build up a new conscience in, and wake up to real consciousness of the terrible injustice in the world, is the class that lives a life of luxury, comfort and leisure through being able to live on the life-blood of the workers. I judge that many of our administrators would gladly welcome a change that would make their job a real and possible one; and honest, instead of dishonest. At present, they are given, or take, jobs that God Almighty himself could not "make good" at without the restrictive barriers being first broken down.

Individuals can do very little, if anything, in face of the out-ofsight, but ever-present power of the parasitic class that dominates the world. The terrible thing is that the parasitic class does not call itself parasitic: does not realise the awful injustice where perpetuates.

I take it that it is our job to make that class feel that they are only entitled to what they earn by their own effort of brain or muscle. We must capture that class - both of land and special privilege - to our faith !

I have of late been thinking very much about our English agricultur-

agricultural question, and this war has forced upon me more than ever the fact that agriculture and all the fresh, clean, healthy life that agriculture should stand for is more vital to this and all nations than the nations seem to recognise.

Joe, you and I have had some experience in attempting to improve the conditions of country life and work. Our attempts have been more or less failures because of the necessarily incomplete surrounding conditions; in other words, they have been restricted, and did not contain what one might call a full unit of country life. I have thought for some time that, to get a really complete and successful agricultural experiment, it would be necessary to have, say, from 3,000 to 5,000 acres of land on which is already established one or more villages with a good railway service. With such a laboratory unselfishly handled, and with proper organization, we ought to be able to make conditions of life in the country such as would tend to call labour to the land, instead of sending it flying to the towns !

Sir Horace Plunkett, I think, sees many possibilities in this di-Only by such an experiment would it be possible to get the rection. maximum benefits of work and social intercourse.

From what I have said above, you may think that I am going back on the case for the taxation of land values. I don't think I am. It is the realization of alt these things, and of the need for us all working a in any direction where we see the light that will, in my opinion, make the principle of the taxation of land values easier of fulfilment. As you will remember. Henry George said - "It has the qualities of a true reform, for it will make all other reforms easier". I say, and conversely, all attempts at other reforms make the taxation of land values easier of realization.


