Millicent Fawcett Hall.

Tuesday, February 1st, 1938.

CHAIRMAN: MRS. OLIVER STRACHEY.

PROCEEDINGS.

This meeting was called by the Executive Committee to consider the following RESOLUTION:

That in view of the importance to the women's movement of securing the permanent establishment of a centre of authentic information on matters relating to women's work and opportunities, this Special General Meeting of members of the London and National Society for Women's Service resolve that the objects of the Society will best be promoted by concentrating effort during the ensuing year on placing the Women's Service Library upon a secure basis, and desire the Executive Committee to direct their endeavours towards raising a fund for the endowment of the Library.

The resolution was moved by Miss Ethel Watts, Chairman of the Executive Committee, and seconded by Miss K. I. Hancock, Chairman of the Junior Council Executive Committee.

Discussion followed, in which the following members took part:—Mrs. George Burton, Miss Clough, Miss Douglas, Miss Fawcett, The Hon. Mrs. Spencer Graves, Miss Hilton, Mrs. Knollys, Miss Lister, Mrs. O'Malley, Miss Rimmer, Lady Sprigge, Miss Ward.

The discussion closed with a speech from the Chairman and the resolution was then put to the meeting and carried with one abstention.

A collection was taken for the expenses of the meeting.

ANNUAL MEETING.

CHAIRMAN: MISS ETHEL WATTS.

PROCEEDINGS.

I. Appointment of Returning Officer and Teller.

It was moved by Mrs. Arnold Glover, seconded by Mrs. Daniels, and carried:

That Miss Walker and Miss Samuel be appointed Returning Officer and Teller.

- II. THE CHAIRMAN read apologies for absence.
- III. ANNUAL REPORT.

The Annual Report was read by the Secretary.

It was moved by Mrs. Knollys, seconded by Miss Carroll, and carried:

That the Report be adopted and printed.

IV. ANNUAL STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS.

The Financial Statement (circulated in the Hall) was introduced by speeches from the Chairman and the Hon. Treasurer. It was moved by Mrs. Wise, seconded by Miss Selby, and carried:

That the Financial Statement be adopted and printed.

V. ALTERATION OF RULES.

It was moved on behalf of the Executive Committee of the Junior Council by Miss Hancock, seconded by Miss Gatey and supported on behalf of the Executive Committee by Miss Clough:

That Members of the Junior Council who resign after not less than one year's membership on the ground that they are no longer able to take an active part in the work of the Council shall be eligible for election to Associate Membership at a subscription of 5s. per

annum. Such members shall be notified of the Annual Meeting and have the right to attend the meeting and to vote; they shall also be entitled to receive a copy of the Annual Report, but not of any other notices or invitations. And that the Society's rules be amended accordingly.

After discussion this was carried nem con.

VI. A COLLECTION was made for the funds of the Society.

VII. RESOLUTIONS:

I. SOCIETY'S POLICY IN THE EVENT OF WAR.

It was moved on behalf of the Executive Committee by Miss Clough, seconded by Miss Carroll:

That it be an instruction from the Annual Meeting of the London and National Society for Women's Service, that in the event of the recurrence of a national emergency such as has recently been experienced, the Executive Committee without losing sight of the objects of the Society should take such steps as are practicable to assist in sustaining the vital forces of the nation.

After discussion this was carried nem con.

2. NATIONAL SERVICE.

By permission of the meeting two resolutions standing in the name of the Executive Committee on the Agenda circulated to members, were moved by Mrs. OLIVER STRACHEY, seconded by Miss Halpin, in an amended form as follows:

(a) That the London and National Society for Women's Service, considering that the success of any scheme of national service must to a great extent depend on the use made of the reserve powers of women and that the organisation of women presents problems peculiar to their sex, emphasises the need of taking women into consultation in the framing of any such schemes and of allotting to women a due share in their administration. Further it welcomes the general lines of the Government scheme and the steps already taken to secure the co-operation of women's societies in the working out of portions of it, and desires the Executive Committee to promote the participation of women in all forms of national service established on a democratic basis.

Amendments proposed by MISS SELBY and seconded by MISS APPLEBY were accepted and the resolution was carried nem con as follows:

That the London and National Society for Women's Service, considering that the success of any scheme of national service must to a great extent depend on the use made of the reserve powers of women and that the organisation of women presents special problems, emphasises the need to taking women into consultation in the framing of any such schemes and of allotting to women a due share in their administration. Further it welcomes the steps already taken to secure the co-operation of women's societies in the Government scheme of National Service and desires the Executive Committee to promote the participation of suitably qualified women in all forms of national service established on a democratic basis.

(b) That the London and National Society for Women's Service in annual meeting assembled, resolves in the interests of men and women workers alike, that if women should be called upon to undertake paid work for the purposes of national service, their readiness to respond should not be exploited by payment at rates below the normal rates for the work carried out, and that the employed persons should be given equal opportunities and receive equal treatment in the exercise of their individual capacities without regard to sex or marriage.

This was carried nem con.

VIII. APPOINTMENT OF AUDITOR.

It was moved by Miss E. Douglas, seconded by Miss Hancock and carried:

That Miss Clugston be re-appointed Auditor for the ensuing year.

ANNUAL REPORT 1938.

The year's work which is to-night reviewed ended on September 30th, 1938. On that day the Prime Minister returned from Munich bearing with him the agreement which put an end alike to a period of critical anxiety reaching far beyond the shores of our country, and to the solidarity of British resolve which the crisis had evoked. Members will expect no comment from the Executive Committee on the problems of foreign policy which have arisen; each individual must adjust for himself the balance in which the wickedness of war is weighed against other wickedness, and they will look to other corporations than ours for the experience which will help them in their judgment. The Society is not qualified to do so, but we yet may feel that our work, in its limited scope, has a value which extends beyond it in producing habits of thought which will support us in our wider public duties. The effort to secure justice and free opportunity for women must surely incline us to seek justice and freedom everywhere; the combat against prejudice and intolerance has not, we believe, led us ourselves to become blind partisans, but rather to recognise those enemies the more quickly, to endeavour to envisage facts in the light of reason, and however strong our convictions, to be above any desire to impose them upon others by force. If this has been the effect upon our minds of years of work for a just but unpopular cause, the women's movement will play its part in maintaining democracy and in preserving our country from such tragedies as we see outside it.

The events which culminated in the crisis at the end of September, though they themselves lie outside the Society's province, have brought with them a problem in which we have a direct concern. The part to be taken by women in the organisation of the nation to meet the dangers which threaten is very definitely our concern—the Committee saw with surprise how very little it appeared, through those months of tension, to concern others. Appeals for the help of women as volunteers to carry out work of different kinds were indeed many, but a desire to make use of their experience, otherwise than for the recruitment of labour, was conspicuous by its absence. The appointment of the Committee on Evacuation, consisting entirely of men Members of Parliament,

was a flagrant instance of the extreme to which this shortness of sight could be carried. It was ignored that the majority of the citizens of this country are women, that it is they who are the experts in matters connected with the welfare of the family and that, to say the least of it, they were entitled to have some voice in decisions affecting pre-eminently the direction of their own lives. The same absence of consideration was shown alike in the utterances of statesmen and the columns of the newspapers, on the subject of the marshalling of the nation's resources in the event of war; no indication appeared that it was anywhere realised that the nation's reserve of strength lies in its women, that in the event of war it must fall on the women to keep the machinery running at home, and that the successful organisation of woman-power (involving as it must an extensive use of the services of married women) was an intricate task which would need to be carefully planned out beforehand.

The Executive Committee were surprised to see so little use made of the experience gained in the last war; to see the same mistakes repeated and the same wastage of good will for lack of direction. Their thoughts have been much engaged upon this matter and more would have been said of the steps taken had it not been for the change in the whole situation brought about by the appointment of Sir John Anderson as Lord Privy Seal, with the allotted duty of organising the nation for civil defence, and effectively using its resources for voluntary service. This event falls outside the chronicle of the present year. The first announcement of his proposals is too recent to have been assimilated, and little more can be said than that the Committee look forward with hope to a more statesmanlike handling of the problem. It may be added, however, that already in those parts of the work that have been allocated to the Ministry of Health a new spirit has become evident in the wish to take advantage of the special knowledge that the women's organisations can provide and not merely of the energies of their individual members. So far as the central authority can control the matter, they will be consulted in the working out of detailed plans, and this will be effected through the agency of the Women's Voluntary Services for A.R.P. That body was summoned into existence by the Home Secretary at the end of May for purposes of recruitment, but has thus now obtained a greatly widened scope. Its Advisory Council includes representatives of a large number of societies—our own among them—and its original function was to supply assistance to the local authorities in work of many kinds connected with A.R.P. In the face of innumerable difficulties (not least being the fact that many of the local authorities had no wish to be so assisted) it succeeded in the short time that intervened before the crisis, in setting up a skeleton organisation over the country, through which it rendered invaluable service

Reading, a warm tribute is due for the energy and imagination with which she is conducting this enterprise. It was a true pleasure to the Committee to enrol the Chairman of Women's Voluntary Services as a member of the Society in September and there is a special pleasure also in knowing that the Civil Servant selected to act as secretary to that body is Miss Mary Smieton, one of those who entered the administrative class through the first examination that was open to women, and one of the founder members of our own Junior Council.

Before turning from the subject of war's alarms it may be mentioned, for the information of members, that arrangements have been made by the Trustees for the rapid conversion of the restaurant, with its adjacent cloak rooms, into a gas proof refuge for all who work in the buildings. Three members of the staff were trained air wardens and such provisions as were possible were made against sudden emergencies, including preparations for the removal to the cellars of the choicest of the books.

Library Endowment.

While events of such gravity as those we have experienced in the past six months have preoccupied the thoughts of all, business of every sort has been conducted under difficulties and it has been impossible to make much headway with plans for the Library Endowment. The special general meeting on February 1st desired the Executive Committee to direct their main energies towards raising a fund for that end, but little more has been found possible of achievement beyond exploration of the ground and preparation for action at a suitable moment. In these preliminary steps they have had much help and encouragement, notably from those who have given their distinguished names as patrons of the appeal: Mr. W. L. Bradbury, who has accepted the office of Honorary Treasurer, Mrs. F. Cavendish Bentinck, Mrs. Arnold Glover, Dr. L. P. Jacks, LL.D., D.Litt., Professor Caroline Spurgeon, D.Litt., Doc. Univ. Paris, Litt.D., Miss Rose Macaulay, Dr. J. J. Mallon, LL.D., Dr. Albert Mansbridge, C.H., and Mrs. Virginia Woolf. It will be seen that in the printed accounts in your hands the Library Endowment Fund appears on both the receipts and the expenditure sides. The figure under expenditure represents all that has been spent (practically all of it on salary and printing), but the figure under receipts does not represent all that has come in. because in the course of the year a separate account was opened at the bank by Mr. Bradbury, the Hon. Treasurer of the fund, into which subsequent donations have been paid. These have amounted to about £60 and nothing has been drawn from the sum. So far there is little to show for a considerable expenditure of time on the part of the Society's officials and a certain amount of upheaval in office arrangements as regards space and allocation of duties, but the spade work that has been done will, it is hoped, bring its return in due season and results must be looked for later on.

In view of the fact that members of the Society from year to year bear the burden of the library and that their full support is needed for the political work, it is the Committee's intention to endeavour to raise the greater part of the required sum from outside the membership, but this is not to say that the help of members is not needed. The help of all members and friends is indeed urgently needed in the collection of this fund. The Committee most earnestly calls upon all to take part in making known the value and the needs of the Library to possible patrons—to those whose past work for the woman's movement will interest them in the preservation of its records for the sake of its future, and to those who on more general lines are concerned in promoting the spread of knowledge in the duties of citizenship. A booklet is now available which will be gladly supplied to those who will send it on to friends with an appropriate inscription on a page provided for the purpose, and those who are unable themselves to approach persons they believe might be interested are asked to send names and addresses to the office. Lastly, the Committee relies upon all to join in giving publicity to this effort by talking about the Library in companies where it is unknown, and if they are not already possessed of information which will enable them to do so effectively to apply for it to the librarian and give a few minutes of study to the subject.

Library.

While schemes for the future thus centre round it, the library itself carries on its busy day-to-day life. Activities of all sorts have this year been very brisk, and but for a lull in the period of the crisis the numbers of books taken out by members would have made a record. Through the agency of the National Central Library 128 of our books have made their way outside our own sphere; mostly these are asked for by public libraries in different parts of the country but in one case the book borrowed was for Buda Pest. Reciprocally this service is less freely made use of and it sometimes seems that members are not fully aware of the ease with which they can obtain books that are outside the library's own scope; the practice is, however, increasing and eighty books were this year borrowed through the Central Library. Visitors have been many; some settle down to carry out a work of research, some come to look up a reference, some to obtain advice on their reading, some to make definite inquiries and some merely to have a look at the institution and its contents. The visitors

in all categories have included many foreigners and among them it is a pleasure to instance Miss Hope Allen, the authority on medieval female piety, who found in the collection left by Miss Eckenstein, material of value in her own highly specialised work and forthwith joined the Society and carried off her treasures to be studied. The information that has been asked for and provided covers the usual range, from questions bordering on the imbecile to those which call for serious work from the librarian on matters of importance. Perhaps the most romantic was a request by telephone from a stranger, who explained that she had come up for the day from the North in order to find out the date of the death of her aunt; it was wanted for legal purposes, and she had made various inquiries without success. Could we perhaps give it her? She supposed from the telephone directory we might do so, and her aunt had been a missionary in India and had died there. By a strange and fortunate chance the information existed in the library, and by what was not a chance the fact had lodged in the brain of Miss Douie, with the result that the date was immediately supplied and the inquirer caught her train home relieved, though apparently hardly surprised. Again this year there has been an amazingly rich harvest of gifts. In addition to the books, ancient and modern, which come so frequently from the generosity of Mrs. Cavendish Bentinck that expressions of thanks have become almost absurd from their inadequacy, a multitude of highly valued gifts have been received. Among these must be mentioned a wonderful collection of books, papers and autographs connected with the Suffrage movement from Mrs. How Martyn, large and valuable consignments (mostly of official publications) from Miss Rathbone and Mrs. Tate, a collection from Miss Tancred, books from Dame Ethel Smyth (including a delightfully inscribed copy of "Impressions that Remained," which is now out of print), and a special kind of recurring present devised by Virginia Woolf, who has cheered the hearts of the Library Committee by giving, after their monthly meetings, volumes they have been reluctantly obliged to deny themselves on the ground that the less alluring necessaries of life must be provided before luxuries. There remains one important event to be recorded here—the adoption of the name of Millicent Fawcett Library. This decision was taken at the suggestion of the Appeal Committee, supported by the Library Committee, and the Executive felt no doubt that it would be approved by the Society.

National Insurance.

The General Meeting of February 1st desired the Executive Committee to concentrate their efforts on obtaining an endowment for the Library, in the belief that in so doing they would best

forward the future of the woman's movement, but it was accepted in the discussion that if any serious occasion should require the defence of the Society's principles the needs of the present must not be sacrificed for the sake of the future. At that time there appeared no likelihood of such an occasion arising, but the unexpected happened and a fortnight had not elapsed before the question of Spinsters' Pensions was raised in the House of Commons and shown to present a serious danger. The proposal of the Spinsters' Association that the pensions age should be lowered to 55 for unmarried women alone among insured persons, was discussed, it will be remembered, at last year's Annual Meeting, when a resolution in strong opposition was passed practically with unanimity. The House of Commons took a different view of it. A wave of enthusiasm for the Spinster swept through the House. We heard from all sides her praises sung. we heard of her courage, her sacrifices for dependents, her solitude in old age; we heard that she was the backbone of the nation and that the nation, to show their gratitude, must give the aged creature of fifty-five, with her trembling fingers and her grey wisps of hair, to save her from the anguish of wage earning and the uncertainty of unemployment benefit, a pension of Ios. a week-a smaller sum than she would obtain from either the one or the other. The labour men forgot their trade union principles and forgot that the women of their party had condemned the proposal at their last annual conference. Champions of equal rights for women forgot their life-long principles and spoke in favour of dealing with the economic sufferings of women by a method which could only place them at still greater disadvantage in the labour market. The voice of reason was unheard. Col. Clifton Brown, who had volunteered to put forward the Society's case was unable to say more than one inaudible sentence before the closure was put and a motion carried by consent which called for a committee to be appointed to inquire into the justice and practicability of the scheme. The appointment of this Committee of Inquiry was announced in April; its Chairman is Mr. Le Quesne, K.C., and there are three other men members and two women—Dame Gwendoline Trubshaw and Miss Strudwick. Its terms of reference were laid down as follows:-

To examine and report on the complaints which are made as to the position of unmarried women under the Contributory Pensions Acts, and on the practical questions which would arise if the age at which Old Age Pensions under those Acts are payable to unmarried women were lowered.

These terms gave an unexpected opportunity of re-opening the question of the unequal income limit in the Voluntary Contributors' Pensions Act of last year, and the Executive appointed a Sub-Committee to prepare a comprehensive memorandum of evidence that should set forth the Society's view of the grievances

under the Pensions Acts and argue that to write down women as too old to work after fifty-five would be no solution but on the contrary an added grievance; it was decided also that, although the grievances under Health and Unemployment Insurance do not come actually within the terms of reference, these should be touched on also, on the ground that a general feeling that women are unjustly treated throughout National Insurance gives additional force to the complaints under each of the separate schemes. The memorandum is divided into two sections dealing respectively with Spinsters' Pensions and the Income Limit; it sets out the Society's case in full, and printed copies, as produced by the Stationery Office, can be obtained from the Society for a shilling. Miss Watts and the Secretary gave oral evidence before the Committee on June 30th and advantage was taken later of the Chairman's permission to send in a supplementary memorandum after the evidence of the Government departments had been heard. Official evidence was given by the Treasury, the Government Actuary's department, the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Labour and produced fresh information and statistics of great interest. On the subject of the Income Limits, the Ministry of Health submitted a familiar quotation from a speech by Sir Kingsley Wood, supported by the new suggestion, that supposing the benefit offered to a man had been only a pension for himself there was nothing to show that his income limit would then have been fixed at £400 a year. It was a severe disappointment that in the oral examination of the Ministry's representatives there was no indication that this grievance had arrested the attention of the Committee. It was completely passed over. No question on the subject was put by any member, although after the Society had sent in their statement of the case, fourteen women's organisations wrote in support to the Committee, and it might therefore have been thought to be worth some investigation. It was galling to see such an opportunity for a devastating crossexamination lost for ever.

The evidence of the Spinsters' Association seemed to show that this demand had arisen from the desperate conditions of the depressed textile industry. A terrible picture was given of the distress among the women, and it was painful for the Society's representatives, after hearing such accounts of the lives of the other witnesses, to appear in their eyes as heartlessly wishing to deprive them of help while claiming it for those with over £200 a year. It was nevertheless clear that the under-employment from which they are suffering, the system by which full hours of attendance on piece work produce a half or a third of the normal output could not rightly be relieved from an old-age pensions fund; it was clear, too, that the position must be the same for the men as for the women in the industry; they too, though employed on full time, are earning insufficient to support life for themselves and their

families, and are unable to claim the unemployment benefits which

would bring them in more to live upon.

The Committee of Inquiry are at present engaged on their report. It will be hard to produce one that will satisfy alike the principles of economics, the claims of compassion and the Lords of

the Treasury.

The Executive Committee wish here to make good an omission in last year's account of the passage of the Pensions Bill. It was Miss Rathbone who first called public attention to the differential income limit and banded the women M.P.'s together against it. After starting the agitation she became immersed in other matters and her leading part at the outset was temporarily overlooked in the excitement of later developments, but the Committee would

not have it overlooked in the annals of the Society.

National Insurance is, of course, closely bound up with Equal Pay, and it is cheering to record that the Trades Union Council, at their Annual Conference in June, included, in suggestions sent forward to the Statutory Committee on Unemployment Insurance. a recommendation that men and women should pay equal contributions and receive equal benefits. This whole subject presents a maze of complication and Mrs. Champneys has given much help by the researches she has made with a view to clarifying the position of women. It appears to be a general opinion that the time is due for an overhaul of the National schemes and various proposals have been published for their reform, but in none is the position of the insured woman regarded as the Society regards it.

Civil Service.

The advance that has been made in the position of women in the Civil Service since 1919 was reviewed in last year's report. The place taken by this subject in the Society's annals must become less prominent as progress continues and the ground of controversy narrows. We look forward to the time when the only questions remaining at issue will be such matters of internal adjustment as come within the domain of the Civil Service organisations themselves, but that time is not yet, for there are still questions of policy to be dealt with upon which the pressure of outside opinion is required. The questions of equal pay and of service overseas are of this nature and we have now to record another instance. The published regulations for the Administrative Examination this year revealed for the first time that women were to be excluded from administrative posts in the India Office. The India Act itself makes provision for the inclusion of women in the Indian Civil Service; commissions of inquiry, secretaries of state, and indeed it may be said all responsible persons who care for the success of the democratic system in India have emphasised the imperative need

of including women to the fullest extent in every aspect of selfgovernment in that country. Indian women themselves have dramatically responded to the call; they have recorded their votes, they have been elected to Councils and legislative assemblies, one among them holds office as a Cabinet Minister. And yet, here at home, as though in open disparagement of all this, the India Office was to exclude them from its own administrative service. It was a glaring anomaly and a dangerous one, and the Society took immediate action. Representations of a forcible character reached the Secretary of State, and, after a period of consideration which for a Government Department may perhaps be a record of speed, the regulation was withdrawn. In and after 1939 women will be eligible for administrative posts in the India Office. They are still debarred from the Colonial and Dominions Offices, but much has been done

about this and more may be heard of it later.

The progress reported last year in the recruitment of women through the Civil Service examinations continues. As their number in the higher grades increases the loss to the service from their dismissal on marriage becomes increasingly evident, and a highly satisfactory precedent has been established this year by the retention after her marriage of Miss Jennings, who still remains a principal in the Ministry of Labour as Mrs. Reisner. Another notable advance made this year is the abolition of the special woman's post of Director of Women's Establishments at the Treasury, and its replacement by the appointment of a woman Assistant Secretary—Miss Myra Curtis—who, while she is specially charged with the direction of women's establishments, takes her place in the hierarchy of the office with the normal duties attached to her high grade. This change took place on the retirement of Miss Hilda Martindale from the service, on which occasion the Council of Women Civil Servants gave a party in her honour at Lancaster House, which was thronged with heads of departments and other high officials and at which a presentation was made by the Duke of Kent. Miss Martindale, in her "History of Women in State Service," the first fruits of her leisure, does honour to the early pioneers among those women—here was a scene which would indeed have caused them to rub their eyes and believe they were dreaming.

Obituary.

It is well that there is sometimes pleasure to be found in retrospection, for it must often be clouded with sorrow. The woman's movement has this year lost in Miss Margaret Ashton one of the outstanding champions of her generation and a power in the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies. So recently as to come beyond the rightful limit of the report the movement has also lost, and the Society has lost as a member, Dr. Jane Walker, who was of the true pioneering brand—a pioneer both professionally and politically and a close friend of Dame Millicent Fawcett. It is hard to realise that her beautiful voice will not again be heard in defence of the causes she upheld with such conviction.

The death of Mr. A. J. Clements must not go unrecorded, who was well known outside the Society for his devoted service in bringing music to the hearing of the people, but within the Society was known during the suffrage period for his steady help in time of trouble. His interest in the Society was maintained throughout its changes and he had been a member for thirty years when he died.

The names of two of a later generation remain to be mentioned with sorrow. Miss Phyllis Corns, who as a voluntary worker gave invaluable and unremitting daily service as Head of the Society's Munition Department during the war, and helped us also many times in recent years, though her energies were devoted mainly to her work as Treasurer of the National Union of Societies for Equal Citizenship and as a Councillor for her home district. Mrs. Austin also first came to the Society during the war; she worked in the London Branch of the Scottish Women's Hospitals and later as Head of the Employment Department; her close friendship with the office was never broken and its tragic ending by a motor accident was deeply felt.

League of Nations and Status of Women.

There remains still a brief mention to be made of events in which the Society has had a share, though not a controlling one.

Members will wish to hear something more of the League of Nations Committee of Inquiry into the Status of Women, on which Miss Wall spoke at last year's Annual Meeting. The Committee was appointed at the beginning of the year and its composition was wholly satisfactory to the International women's organisations, including as it did four women and three men, all highly qualified for their task by their legal attainments and enlightened outlook. They elected as their Chairman the representative of Great Britain, Professor Gutteridge, who consented to speak and to answer questions at a meeting on May 14th, when without departing from the attitude appropriate to his position he convinced a highly critical audience that they could safely leave the interests of women in his hands, for his opinions on the subject of their status were based obviously on the single consideration of justice. This meeting resulted from the initiative of Mrs. Corbett Ashby in forming an ad hoc Committee of Women's Organisations to arouse interest throughout the country in the League of Nations Committee of Inquiry.

Nationality of Married Women.

The Society has for many years co-operated as a member of the Committee on the Nationality of Married Women, in the endeavour to secure the passage of a Bill to restore to married women the rights in nationality of which they were only within the last century deprived. Owing to changes in other legislation, it has been necessary this year to re-draft the time-honoured Bill, and in its new form it was introduced by Lord Alness in the House of Lords in July. The Government opposed it on the ground that some of the Dominions were not in agreement, and it was then withdrawn. The Committee now, however, see in the international situation strong reason for making another immediate push, and a public meeting on the subject will be held in this Hall on December 16th which it is hoped will be supported by members.

International Council of Women.

The Jubilee meeting of the International Council of Women was held in July in Edinburgh; it was a gathering of exceptional interest at which the Society was represented by its Secretary, who acted as a Substitute Delegate for the British National Council and as their representative on the Suffrage Committee.

Women's Employment Federation.

The Society's constant co-operation with the Women's Employment Federation will be taken for granted. It is a pleasure to record the steady progress and expansion of the Federation which continues year by year to increase its membership, its volume of work, its new activities, and its influence. There is one form of co-operation between us which is very close—and that is in the administration of the loan fund, for the purposes of which the Federation carries out the preliminary interviewing and sifting of candidates, and after their appointment by the Society keeps in touch with them. The Federation has also established a Joint Committee on which six Societies having loan funds (of which our own is one) combine to use them for the best advantage. A broadcast appeal for these funds was made in March by Mr. Desmond MacCarthy, from which the Women's Service Fund benefited by over f.100. It was quickly put to use and in course of time will come back to be used again, and attention may perhaps here be drawn to the fact that the printed statement of the Loan Fund account does not present a very illuminating picture, because the balance shown is rarely a free balance, but is for the greater part already engaged for somebody's benefit and only awaiting the day of payment. The young people who set out to train are beneficiaries, did they but know it, in a double sense—for they benefit not only from the Society's loan but from the Society's past efforts to open a way for them.

Junior Council.

Retrospection is the essence of an annual report, but it must not too often be allowed to go too far back. Such retrospective thoughts are a characteristic of their elders that constitutes one of the trials of the young though they can well afford to regard it with friendly compassion. They will some day contract the habit themselves, and the time will come when the present members of the Society's Junior Council will feel glad that they too, in the days of their strength, gave something of it towards helping those who come after them. The Junior Council has this year stood by as never before to keep the objects of the Society to the front at a time when some of its energies have been deflected to the endowment fund. The Executive Committee has turned to them for help many times and the help has always been forthcoming. A full account of their work is given in their own Annual Report and, if it is not more fully entered into here, it is from no lack of appreciation, for the Executive Committee has no greater satisfaction than its confidence in the Junior Council—its belief that the Society's double entity is now little more than a matter of machinery and that it becomes as the years go by more and more of a homogeneous whole.

NOTES ON THE SOCIETY'S ACCOUNTS.

The Receipts and Expenditure Account for the year ended 30th September, 1938, shows an adverse balance of £294 3s. Id., although the balance of Miss Fellow's legacy of £184 3s. 7d. has been included with the receipts. There is a general fall in receipts from almost all sources. The slight decrease in Senior Subscriptions causes anxiety because it is continuous. The loss of membership by death of some of the older members of the Society who made themselves responsible for annual subscriptions higher than the average, can only be counteracted by a vigilant search for new members. The Christmas Fair receipts were £41 lower than in the previous year; but the decrease of £50 in rent received is an apparent rather than a real loss, due to a change in due date of payment.

The expenses of the Society, on the other hand, are £58 less than in the previous year. This is due to the Equal Pay Campaign which took place in 1936-7 and increased items in that year, such as Printing, Stationery, Postage and Telephone. The figures show that the greatest economy is practised in regard to expenditure, and, as noted last year, the Society are paying no rent for their accommodation, which is given to them by the Trustees of the Women's Service Trust. The item of Dividends, amounting to £77, is new, and is the interest on the investments made by the Society as the result of legacies received during 1936-7. The Account shows that the receipts from normal sources covered the expenditure of the Society and Junior Council in that year, but were not sufficient to cover the subsidy to the Library, amounting to £468 16s. 10d.

It has been the aim of the Society during the past year to launch an Appeal Fund to obtain a capital sum with which to endow the Library, in order to make it self-supporting. With this in view, it was decided to use £500 of the Society's Investments for Appeal expenses. The Library Account shows that £107 IIS. IId. (of which £22 198. od. was covered by Donations) has already been

expended for this purpose.

The Balance Sheet is self-explanatory. The investments at the 30th September, 1938, were identical with the investments at the 30th September, 1937, but the Cash at Bank showed an overdraft of £116 3s. 6d., against a Credit amount at the end of the previous year of £193 19s. 10d. Since the date of the accounts it has been found necessary to realise the sum of £150 invested with the Abbey Road Building Society, in order to meet the current expenses of the Society and to pursue the work for the Library Endowment Fund Appeal.

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RULES.

- I. Title.—The title of the Society shall be "The London and National Society for Women's Service."
- II. Object.—The object of the Society shall be to obtain equal liberties and opportunities for men and women.
- III. Methods.—To concentrate on obtaining economic equality for women with men by:
 - I. The enrolment of members.
 - 2. Propaganda.
 - 3. Political work.
 - 4. Collection and distribution through Women's Service Library of information useful to women as citizens, particularly with regard to their legal and economic position in this and other countries.
 - 5. Such practical steps as may from time to time seem advisable.
- IV. Constitution.—The governing body of the Society shall be the general meeting of members which will elect annually, by ballot, an Executive Committee to conduct the current business of the Society.
 - V. Membership.—The Society shall consist of
- I. All persons who became members of the Society or of the Society's Junior Council before January 1st, 1935, and who continue to pay their subscription in each year before the date of the Annual Meeting.
- 2. All other persons who have signified their approval of the Society's objects and
 - (a) Have paid a subscription of not less than fi in each year before the Annual Meeting.
 - (b) Being members of the Society's Junior Council have paid a subscription of not less than 10/- in each year before the Annual Meeting for five years and thereafter have paid a subscription of not less than £1 in each year.
 - (c) Being residents outside Gt. Britain for more than six months of the year have paid a subscription of not less than 5/- in each year before the Annual Meeting.

All persons who

(a) Were House Members before January 1st, 1935, and continue to pay their annual subscriptions at their agreed rate, or

- (b) Become members on or after January 1st, 1935, are entitled to make use of the Library, Reading Room, Restaurant and other accommodation and facilities of the Members' Centre.
- 3. All persons who, after not less than one year's membership of the Junior Council, have resigned upon the ground of inability to participate in the active work of the Council, and whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee of the Junior Council as Associate Members, and who continue to pay a subscription of not less than five shillings in each year before the date of the Annual Meeting.

Associate Membership shall only entitle the member to attend and vote at the Annual Meeting and to receive a copy of the Annual Report.

- VI. Officers.—The Officers of the Society shall be a President, Treasurer, Chairman of Committee and the Secretary.
- VII. Executive Committee.—(1) The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, the Treasurer, and of thirteen other members.
- (2) At its first meeting after election the Executive Committee shall elect the Chairman for the year.
- (3) It shall from time to time make its own By-laws, and shall have power to fill by co-option any vacancies which may occur during its term of office.
 - (4) It shall appoint the paid officers of the Society.
- (5) It shall have power to appoint Special Committees to help in carrying out special parts of the work.
- VIII. Nominations.—(I) Any member may be proposed for election or re-election as Honorary Officer or Member of the Committee on the nomination of two members of the Society to whom the candidate is personally known.
- (2) Nominations with the consent, in writing, of the candidate nominated shall reach the Secretary at least twenty-one days before the Annual Meeting.
- IX. Junior Council.—The Junior Council of the London and National Society tor Women's Service shall consist of members of the Society who have been accepted as members of the Junior Council by its own Executive Committee. The Junior Council shall subscribe to the aim of the Society for equality of citizenship and shall work specially for equal economic opportunity and freedom for women in pursuit of their work, but there shall be otherwise no obligation upon it as a body to work for any one of the activities of the Society.

- X. General Meeting.—(I) An Annual General Meeting of the Society, of which not less than twenty-eight days' preliminary notice shall be given to each member, shall be held as soon as convenient after September 30th in each year.
 - (a) To receive the Report and Financial Statement which shall be duly audited.
 - (b) To elect the President and Treasurer of the Society and the Executive Committee.
 - (c) To appoint the Returning Officer and Tellers for the ballot vote.
 - (d) To consider resolutions which, with the names of proposers and seconders, shall reach the Secretary in writing, at least twenty-one days before the Annual Meeting and shall have been published at least fourteen clear days before that date.

No resolution passed at an Annual Meeting shall be rescinded before the next Annual Meeting except by a two-thirds majority of a General Meeting.

- (2) Special General Meetings of the Society may be called at any time by the Executive Committee, and shall be called by the Secretary within twenty-eight days on the requisition of not less than one hundred members of the Society of not less than one year's standing. A Special General Meeting shall discuss only such matters as are mentioned in the notice calling such a meeting, and not less than fourteen days' notice shall be given of a General Meeting to all members.
- XI. Alterations of Rules.—The Rules shall not be altered except at a General Meeting of Members of the Society. The nature of proposed alterations must be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen days' notice given to all members.
