The question whether women who possess property and pay rates as independent occupiers should have the power of voting in Parliamentary Elections as they already have in Town and County Council, School Board and Poor Law Guardian Elections has long been a question of very serious import.

It affects women of all classes, though felt less perhaps by those whose social position gives them influence independently of the power of voting. Nevertheless all must feel the injustice of refusing a voice to women when every man has a voice who has a separate tenement of any kind.

It is an injustice, and an injustice which has become greater with every lowering of the Franchise

Those who seek votes for women, seek a lateral extension of already existing Franchises, not a further lowering of the qualification.

We believe the question to be of importance for the well-being of Society in general, therefore we urge all women who would uphold constitutional principles to consider the subject in all its bearings and to promote its discussion at the meetings of any political associations with which they may be connected
