You are indeed a grand, gallant fighter for
for a better world, judging from the many more
organizations you belong to than I. More power to you!

I have already made up two parcels
from you but have to wait until I feel a bit more
like facing a trip to the P.O., before sending them.
One parcel contains all sorts of leaflets, from
Elisabeth Freeman's parcel which she left with me

to dispose of. There is a speech "The Faith that is
in Us" by Mrs. P. D. ^{Pethick Lawrence} after we had borne her in
triumph from Hyde Park down Oxford St to
the Aldwych Theatre. It was also the first time

the Actresses' Franchise League had their Banner
out, and I was one of its bearers. Also that week
I was playing the Chelsea Palace, with Harry

Sander tapping the bill, but you'll well
find more details on that in a rough copy
of my manuscript, which I think I'll send you
when I get around to it. There are some things

"too far gone" but you may like to look them
over and throw them out. The other parcel
is a roll of pages from the "Standard", containing
letters and arguments, you can
over

you can pick some funny incidents from it.

I hope the cheap paper won't fall all to pieces when
you open it. I'm afraid I have nothing before
1900, I didn't join until 1908. Until then it was
sent to me. Tomorrow I'll go over some more
things and see what I can find of you. In the mean-
while, you may like to look over some of
Edith's letters, which I enclose. Please return
them at your leisure and I'll send you the
follow-ups. I have not a large enough
envelope to send them all now. They have
all been read by other friends of Edith's here.
I am hoping that when the war is over, Edith will
visit "us" on her way home. Her house ~~was~~
was burned soon after she left for New Zealand.
I hope the women will come so "all out" that
they can never put them back in their ~~old~~
proper place ^{again}, but stay on an absolute
equality with man in everything.

Many thanks for the stamps. I shall use the Susan
B. Anthony's on mail to Edith.
