2. To consider recommendations on legislation from the other committees of the N.C.W., and to make recommendations to the Executive.

3. To carry out the decisions of the Executive on the amendment of proposed, and the promotion of new, legislation, particularly in connection with the various parliamentary stages of Bills, where such decisions have not been referred to some other committee for execution.

4. To co-operate closely in all cases with any other committee concerned in the legislation under discussion.

38th ANNUAL REPORT.

In spite of the difficulties of the past year for all Societies working on a voluntary basis, interest in the work of the N.C.W. has been well maintained, as is shown by the average attendance of 69 at the 10 meetings of the Executive Committee.

In March a special session was devoted to the consideration of proposals made in a **letter from the Norfolk and Norwich Branch** suggesting various alterations in the Constitution, these suggestions having been circulated to the Branches and Affiliated Societies in WOMEN IN COUNCIL. On the majority of the questions raised, after careful consideration it was thought desirable to adhere to the present procedure, but the following recommendations will be submitted to you by the Executive Committee:—(a) That the election of the Executive Committee should no longer be conducted on the system of proportional representation: (b) That the resolutions selected by postal vote should be limited to ten instead of twelve as at present, while the Scottish Standing Committee recommends that they should, as formerly, be selected by the Executive Committee and (c) That a two-thirds majority be not required to pass an amendment, but only when having been passed the amendment becomes the substantive resolution. The Executive further recommends that before it meets the Hon. Officers should (as has been done this year) be called together to consider the main points on the Agenda.

It is with much regret that your Committee has to record the following losses which it has sustained; the death of **Miss G. M. Wise**, Chairman of the Norfolk and Norwich Branch, following so soon after all her splendid work in connection with local arrangements for the Conference; of **Miss Rosa Hovey** of the Colwyn Bay Branch, one of the few representatives of Wales on the Committee; and lastly of **Mrs. Melville** of Edinburgh, whose self-sacrificing work for so many years as Hon. Secretary and then as Convener of the Scottish Standing Committee is well known to most of you and will be very hard to replace.

To begin with the various **Bills before Parliament** during the past year in which the N.C.W. has been specially interested, the reports presented by Mrs. A. F. W. Johnson, Hon. Parliamentary Secretary, have been most helpful in keeping members in touch with these. The pros and cons of the **Gift Coupon Trading Bill** have been carefully considered, the Government Committee having decided not to recommend any restrictive legislation. With regard to the **Humane Slaughter of Animals Bill** your

Committee has forwarded its congratulations to Colonel Moore on this Bill having at last been passed into law, though it regrets that the humane slaughter of sheep is not compulsory. It has also forwarded to the I.C.W. a resolution approving of the decision of the League of Nations to convene an international conference on traffic in live animals and another dealing with the dangers of waste oil and the pollution of the seas for birds and fishes, both resolutions having been passed for immediate action at the meeting in Stockholm in June. **The Juries Bill**, originally drafted by Sir John Withers for the N.C.W. with a view to securing the presence of more women on juries, was introduced by Mr. Holford Knight and passed its first reading on 20th June, and at his request a deputation was afterwards sympathetically received by the Lord Chancellor. The **Hotels and Restaurants Bill** received the special attention of the Temperance Committee, which was of opinion that on certain important points it evaded the recommendations made by the Royal Commission on Licensing. The Commission had unanimously recommended 10 o'clock as the uniform closing hour, and your Executive urged that all its recommendations should be incorporated in the Bill. With regard to the **Metropolitan Police Act, 1933**, our Women Police Committee has welcomed the assurance of the Home Office that the Act does not discriminate between men and women police. A deputation of men members of Parliament, headed by Sir Arthur Steel-Maitland and Mr. Godfrey Nicholson, was received by the Home Secretary and the Secretary for Scotland on 15th December, 1932, when the Home Secretary promised to look into the question of a Training Centre for Women Police in the provinces. A Training Centre for Scotland has recently been established in Glasgow. A new leaflet has been issued on "The Need for Women Police."

In connection with the **Children and Young Persons Act**, the remaining clauses of which come into force on 1st November, Dr. A. H. Norris of the Children's Branch of the Home Office, gave an informative address to the Public Service Committee on "The Home Office School of the Future," while Miss Wall of the Home Office explained to our Moral Welfare and Public Health Committees how they might help in giving effect to this important Act. The Sections dealing with children in moral danger have also received special consideration.

The Public Service and Magistrates Committee also enjoyed an address from Mr. Alexander Maxwell, Under Secretary for the Home Department and former Chairman of the Prison Commissioners, on "Prisons and Prisoners," when the desirability of women governors for women's prisons and of women on the Prison

Commission and also as prison inspectors was urged by your Committee; while Miss Ruth Darwin, Commissioner of the Board of Control, described the strides made in mental hospitals in America in connection with occupational therapy.

In connection with the **Cinema**, a small Joint Committee, composed of representatives of the Mothers' Union, Women's Institutes, Public Morality Council and N.C.W. has been active in spreading information throughout the country and under its auspices a number of one day Cinema Study Schools have been arranged in leading provincial centres and conducted by the Hon. Eleanor Plumer, Organiser of the Public Morality Council. In many places rota committees for cinema visiting have also been actively at work. On 29th May a crowded meeting was held at the Caxton Hall, Westminster, with Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon in the Chair, when Sir Cecil Levita, Chairman of the Film Censorship Consultative Committee, and the Rt. Hon. Edward Shortt, President of the Board of Film Censors, were the chief speakers. Reprints of their speeches have been prepared in leaflet form. The new model conditions issued by the Home Office were welcomed by the Committee, which is endeavouring to secure their adoption throughout the country, and a useful leaflet on the subject of "Children and 'A' Films" has been written by Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon.

The **report of the Select Committee on Shop Assistants**, presented on 31st October, 1932, has been carefully considered by our Industrial Committee, which has urged the introduction of legislation to give effect to its unanimous recommendation that the hours of employment of young persons under 18 years of age should be limited to 48 per week, and welfare work among shop assistants has been discussed, following an informative address by Mr. G. S. Conway. The report of the **Royal Commission on Unemployment** has been carefully considered at two meetings, the Majority Report having been spoken to by Mr. R. C. Davison and the Minority Report by Mrs. Rackham, J.P. a member of the Commission. Among other subjects considered was "The Economic Situation in Russia at the end of the First Five Years Plan" on which Mr. Maurice Dobb, lecturer in Economics, Cambridge, spoke.

Public attention has this year been called to the useful work done by the Household Service Committee through a successful **Exhibition of Household Equipment**. This was held by kind permission at the Institute of Hygiene on 20th and 21st July, and was accompanied by demonstrations of various kinds, while short addresses were given by experts. Mrs. Ward, M.P., opened the

exhibition on the first day and Sir Francis Goodenough, C.B.E., on the second day. Miss Willans acted as Vice-Chairman of the Exhibition Committee and Miss Boulton as its Hon. Secretary, and the Executive congratulated all concerned on the carrying out of such a successful exhibition. The League has co-operated with the Ministry of Labour in arranging for the placing and welfare of some of the girls trained for domestic service by its central committee and useful work is being done by the Research Sub-Committee of the League, with Mrs. Wood as its Hon. Secretary, a grant of £50 per annum for two years having been given to it by the Joseph Rowntree Village Trust.

As regards **International Work** the meetings of the Committees of the International Council of Women in **Stockholm** from 28th June to 6th July were attended by our President, Lady Trustram Eve, our Acting Vice-President, Miss Cecile Matheson, Mrs. George Cadbury, and Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, all of whom also hold office in the I.C.W., by an official representative on each of the I.C.W. Standing Committees, and by a large number of British Triennial Contributors. Some resolutions were passed for immediate action while others were approved for consideration at the full I.C.W. Conference, which will be held in Paris in June, 1934.

To the **Chicago Exhibition**, which was held in July, our Arts and Letters Committee forwarded an interesting collection of signed copies of books by modern women writers. The Arts Committee enjoyed an interesting address on "The Drama of the Future" from Mr. Edward Percy, who drew startling pictures of television as its new medium. The resignation of Mrs. Muir, its Hon. Secretary, owing to ill health, has been received with very great regret.

The British Colonies Committee heard from Mrs. Walker of South Australia how the dangers of pioneering have been mitigated by the aerial medical service, since the first flying doctor in the world started work in **Queensland** in 1928. The report of the formation, by Mrs. Eden, of a **Council of Women in Nyassaland**, with Lady Young, wife of the Governor, as its President, was received with much interest. On the **Lytton Report** an informative address was given by Mr. Gerald Bailey of the National Peace Council, while fresh light was thrown on "**Italy's International Outlook**" by Miss Currey of the League of Nations Union. As regards the enfranchisement of **Indian Women**, Lady Stewart and Miss Green have during the past year represented the N.C.W. on the British Committee for Indian Women's Franchise, presided over by Miss Eleanor Rathbone, M.P.

Most of the **Branches of the N.C.W.** record a year of useful work and interesting reports have been received of their various

activities, especially in helping the unemployed. The N.C.W. was represented by its General Secretary at meetings called by the National Council of Social Service to consider how to stimulate the work of existing local organisations in helping unemployed women, the Council having been prepared to make grants in aid of suitable local schemes.

We are glad to be able to report that the Ealing Women Citizens Association has now become a Branch of the N.C.W., while new Branches have been formed at Whitley Bay, Folkestone and Chesterfield.

The number of **Societies Affiliated** to the Council is now 138, the following having been added during the present year:—

The Girls' Life Brigade,
The National Institute of Industrial Psychology;
The National Smoke Abatement Society.
The Pedestrians' Association;
The Public Morality Council;
The Evening Branch of the Richmond Women Citizens Association;
and The University of London Animal Welfare Society;

I am sorry to have to end with a **personal note**. Needless to say I count it a very great privilege to have been allowed now to work for the Council for just thirty years, but as I have recently reached the usual retiring age—sixty—I have reluctantly handed in my resignation to the Executive. At the request of the Committee I have agreed to its consideration being deferred until the newly elected Executive meets in November, but I should like to take this opportunity of thanking the officers of the Branches and Affiliated Societies who have made my work so delightful. The N.C.W. has brought so many and such varied interests into my life that I shall always think of it with the deepest gratitude and affection.

As regards **the Office**, I have never had a more efficient staff than at present. Miss Weyman's excellent and reliable work is already well-known to many of you but unfortunately she is only able to give half-time. Miss Murray and Miss Swan, newly appointed this year, have both shown a remarkably quick grasp of and keen interest in the many-sided activities of the Council and proved themselves very good workers.

Under the able editorship of Miss Clara Smith, **WOMEN IN COUNCIL**, our official organ has kept members in touch with the Council's numerous activities, and the delightful series of reminiscences which have appeared in it this year have recalled

to many of us the aims and ideals of its founders, when "the National Union of Women Workers" as it was then called first saw the light in 1895 under the Presidency of Mrs. Creighton—aims and ideals of which we hope never to lose sight.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME AND PREAMBLE.

1. This Council shall be called "The National Council of Women of Great Britain."
2. This Council is established in the interests of no one particular social, political or religious organisation. It has no power over the organisations which enter into affiliation with it.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS.

1. To promote sympathy of thought and purpose among the women of Great Britain.
2. To promote the social, civil, moral and religious welfare of the community.
3. To co-ordinate, both nationally and locally, organisations in harmony with these purposes.
4. To promote such conditions of life as will assure to every child an opportunity for full and free development.
5. To work for the removal of all disabilities of women, whether legal, economic or social.
6. To collect and re-distribute information of service to the community.
7. To form a link with the National Councils of Women in other countries through the International Council of Women.

ARTICLE III.

METHODS OF WORK.

The methods of work shall include:—

1. Forming Branches. (See Article IV.).
2. Affiliating all organisations whose work is in harmony with the objects of the National Council. (See Article IV.).
3. Forming standing Sectional Committees, and Special Committees as may be required. (See Articles XVII and XVIII.).
4. Convening conferences and meetings and conducting enquiries.
5. Submitting to the Government and to Parliament recommendations for the amendment of the law and its administration.
6. Representing the need for national and local reforms to the proper authorities.

ARTICLE IV.

MEMBERSHIP.

The members shall be women who are:—

- (1) Members of the Branches.
- (2) Members of the Affiliated Societies.
- (3) Associate Members of the National Council.

(1) BRANCHES.

(a) The Branches consist of affiliated local societies and organisations and of individual members. They promote the work and objects of the National Council as local circumstances enable them to do.

(b) Branches shall pay an annual subscription to Headquarters of £5, and 25 per cent. of their ordinary membership subscriptions. The £5 shall not be compulsory until the third year after the formation of the Branch and the Central Executive Committee shall have power to remit the payment of £5 should the circumstances of a Branch require special consideration at any time.

Those Branches of the National Council of Women which have not paid their annual fee of £5 for two years shall have their representation on the Representative Council reduced, and notice of this shall be given at the close of the first year.

(2) AFFILIATED SOCIETIES.

Affiliated Societies are societies nationally organised or of national importance which are affiliated directly to the National Council. They shall subscribe at least £1 is. annually to the central funds, and not less than 5/- for each representative to which they are entitled on the Representative Council.

(3) ASSOCIATE MEMBERS.

The Associate Members of the National Council are women who subscribe not less than 5/- annually to the Central Funds.

ARTICLE V.

THE FINANCIAL YEAR.

The Financial Year of the National Council of Women shall date from 1st September to 31st August.

ARTICLE VI.

THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. The Governing Body of the National Council of Women shall be called the Representative Council.
2. The Representative Council shall consist of:—
 - (a) The Honorary Officers.
 - (b) The Executive Committee. (Article XII., 3).
 - (c) Representatives of the Branches. (Article XII., 1).
 - (d) Representatives of the Affiliated Societies. (Article XII., 2).
 - (e) Representatives of the Sectional Committees. (Article XII., 4).

ARTICLE VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The Executive Committee shall carry out the policy and transact the business of the Council.
2. The Executive Committee shall consist of:—
 - (a) The President, Past Presidents (*see* Article X.), and Honorary Officers.
 - (b) Twenty-four members nominated by members of the Representative Council and elected by ballot by a postal vote, the result to be announced at the annual meeting; of these twenty-four at least four shall be resident in Scotland and two in Wales. These members shall remain in office for two years; twelve shall retire annually, but be eligible for re-election, provided that they shall have attended at least two meetings in each year.
 - (c) One member elected by each Branch having a direct membership of 100 and over, and one member elected by each Regional Committee of the Branches.
A proxy may be elected by the Branch, to hold office for the same period as the elected representative, with power to attend and vote on receiving notification from the representative of her unavoidable absence.
 - (d) Sixteen members nominated by the Affiliated Societies, and elected by ballot by the Affiliated Societies, by a postal vote, the result to be announced at the Annual Meeting. Members remain in office for one year and are eligible for re-election, provided they have attended at least two meetings in the year.
 - (e) The Conveners, and the Hon. Secretaries who have held office for not less than one year, of the Sectional and Special Committees, *ex-officio*.

(f) Two members co-opted to represent the local Committee of the place where the Annual Council Meeting is to be held.

(g) Women Members of Parliament who, during their tenure of office, may be elected as Honorary Members of Executive, with power to vote.

3. The new Executive Committee shall come into office at the conclusion of the session of the Council at which it is elected.

ARTICLE VIII.

SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Sectional Committees shall be set up to further special branches of work, either by the Executive Committee, or at the request of six affiliated Societies if this be agreed to by the Executive Committee. They shall hold office for one year until their re-appointment by the new Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IX.

HONORARY OFFICERS.

1. The Honorary Officers of the National Council shall be a President, an Acting Vice-President, a Treasurer, and a Parliamentary Secretary; they shall be elected by postal ballot by the Representative Council, and shall retire annually but be eligible for re-election.
2. The President, Acting Vice-President, Hon. Treasurer, and Hon. Parliamentary Secretary, shall be *ex-officio* members of all Sectional and other Committees.
3. The President shall preside over the meetings of the Representative Council and the Executive Committee. Should she be unable to attend, the Acting Vice-President shall take her place.
4. The Acting Vice-President shall act on behalf of the President whenever necessary.
5. The Hon. Treasurer, in co-operation with the Finance Committee, shall organise the collection and supervise the expenditure of the funds, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.
6. The Hon. Parliamentary Secretary, in co-operation with the Legislation Committee, shall conduct the parliamentary business. She shall not act in a similar capacity for any other organisation.

ARTICLE X.

VICE-PRESIDENTS

Past Presidents shall be Vice-Presidents, and shall serve as *ex-officio* members of the Executive Committee, provided they shall have attended at least two meetings during the year preceding their term of office.

The founders of the National Union of Women Workers, the President and ex-Presidents of the International Council of Women, and any other women elected by the Representative Council, shall be honorary Vice-Presidents. These Vice-Presidents must be members of the National Council of Women at the time of their appointment.

ARTICLE XI.

MEETINGS.

(1) THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

- (a) The Representative Council shall hold an Annual Meeting to receive reports, transact business, and elect the Executive Committee, at a time and place to be arranged by the Executive Committee.
- (b) A Special Meeting of the Representative Council may be

summoned by the Executive Committee, and shall be summoned by the President on the requisition of eight Branches and eight Affiliated Societies.

(c) One-third of the members of the Representative Council shall form a quorum.

(2) THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

(a) The Executive Committee shall meet monthly, except in August and December. Additional meetings may be summoned by the President.

(b) Twenty-one shall form a quorum.

(3) SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

(a) The Sectional Committees shall meet at least four times a year, before the meetings of the Executive Committee.

(b) Each Committee shall fix its own quorum, which shall be not less than seven.

ARTICLE XII.

BASIS OF REPRESENTATION UPON THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. Branches shall be represented in the proportion of one representative for every five of their local affiliated Societies, and of one representative for the first twenty-five and one representative for every succeeding fifty of their subscribing members.

2. Affiliated Societies shall be represented in proportion to their national importance and membership. Each Affiliated Society is entitled to one representative on the Representative Council, but this number may be increased at the discretion of the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the Representative Council. No Society shall have more than ten representatives.

3. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex-officio* members of the Representative Council.

4. Sectional and Special Committees shall each be represented by two of their members, who shall be subscribing members of the National Council.

The period for which representatives are appointed shall be from one Annual Council Meeting to the next. In the event of any of the representatives resigning during the year, the societies may appoint others in their place, but no representatives can be accepted unless their appointment is notified to the Secretary of the Council not less than a fortnight before the meeting of the Representative Council.

ARTICLE XIII.

RESOLUTIONS.

1. Resolutions for the Representative Council shall be sent to the Secretary at a date to be fixed by the Executive Committee. A Branch or Society shall not send in more than one resolution.

2. The Executive Committee shall have power to place resolutions upon the agenda in addition to the ten selected.

3. Each Branch, each Affiliated Society, the Executive, and the Sectional Committees shall select from the resolutions circulated the ten they prefer, and shall notify the ten resolutions thus chosen to the General Secretary of the N.C.W.

The ten resolutions receiving the highest total number of votes from Branches, Societies and Committees shall be printed on the Preliminary Agenda Paper.

4. Each Member of the Representative Council, Secretary of a Branch, Affiliated Society or Sectional Committee shall receive, not less than five

weeks before a meeting of the Representative Council, a copy of the Preliminary Agenda, provided that in the case of Special Meetings the Executive Committee, if there is urgency, may reduce the notice to not less than ten days.

5. A Branch or Affiliated Society desiring to place in its name on the final Council Agenda any amendment to the resolutions, shall send a copy of such amendment to the Secretary in time to be received by her not less than four weeks before the Council Meeting. All such amendments shall be placed on the Council's Agenda. The Executive Committee shall have power to place amendments on the Council's agenda.

6. The Final Agenda shall be circulated to each member of the Representative Council, Secretary of a Branch or Affiliated Society, not less than fourteen days before the meeting of the Representative Council.

7. Urgency business must be sanctioned by the Executive Committee and must have the support of two-thirds of the members present at the Committee Meeting and voting. "Urgency" is interpreted as implying some important matter which has arisen since the date by which resolutions for the Council's agenda had to be received at the office, and which could not therefore have been dealt with in the ordinary way.

8. No matter shall be discussed at any meeting of the Representative Council which has not been included upon the agenda, unless specially sanctioned as urgency business.

9. A resolution to be carried by the Representative Council, must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.

10. Resolutions passed by the Representative Council shall decide the policy of the Council until reversed or modified at a further meeting of the Council. Any members of Council shall have the right to require that the voting strength for and against be appended to the resolutions for all purposes of publication and use, e.g., in the public press and in communications to public departments and authorities.

11. Branches and Affiliated Societies shall not be considered responsible for the opinions of the Representative Council as expressed by resolution, unless and until they have themselves affirmed the resolution passed by the Council at a meeting. When resolutions passed by the Representative Council are published, a statement of the non-participation of any Society may be inserted.

ARTICLE XIV.

NOMINATIONS.

1. Members of the Representative Council have the right to nominate candidates for election to the Executive Committee. Nomination papers, giving the attendances of the Executive Committee members, during the past year, shall be sent to the Secretaries of Branches, Affiliated Societies and Sectional Committees, and to the Members of the Executive Committee at least two months before the Annual Meeting, and shall be returned to the Secretary within five weeks of their receipt. The consent of those nominated shall be first obtained by the nominator, and no one shall be eligible who has not been a subscribing member of the National Council of Women for at least one year.

2. The Secretary shall forward to each member of the Representative Council and to each Secretary of a Branch, Affiliated Society, or Sectional Committee for their information, one month prior to the Annual Meeting, a complete list of the names and addresses of all nominees for election to the Executive Committee, with the names of three nominators in the case of new nominees.

3. The election shall be by ballot by a postal vote the result to be announced at the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE XV.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. The meetings of the Representative Council shall open each day with silent prayer.
2. The Representative Council shall not transact business unless one-third of the members of the Representative Council are present.
3. Members of the Representative Council and Secretaries of Branches, Affiliated Societies and Sectional Committees shall receive notices, agenda and all papers relating to the business of the Representative Council.
4. Meetings of the Representative Council shall be open to the press unless the Council shall otherwise resolve. Copies of the resolutions carried at meetings of the Representative Council shall be sent to the press at the earliest possible moment after their receipt by the authorities to whom they are ordered to be sent.
5. Members desiring to speak shall send up their names, speak from the platform, and address the Chair. Short questions may be asked or points of order raised from the body of the meeting.
6. The ruling of the Chair, on a point of order, on the advisability of a personal explanation, or on the time limit, shall be final and shall not be open to discussion.
7. Amendments to resolutions may be moved at the meeting, provided that they do not determine questions outside the subject matter of the resolutions and that they arise out of the discussions at the Council and could not therefore have been previously circulated to the Branches, as specified in Sections 4, 5, and 7 of Article XIII.
 8. An amendment may be moved:—
 - (1) To leave out words.
 - (2) To leave out words and substitute or add others.
 - (3) To insert or add words.
9. Every amendment shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chair.
10. No member shall, without permission from the Chair, address the Council more than once on any resolution or amendment; the mover of an original motion may, however, reply, but she shall confine herself to answering the previous speakers and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. After the reply, the question shall be put forthwith. The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment which, having been carried, has become the substantive resolution.
11. Any member desiring that discussion of a subject shall cease shall move: 'That the question be now put.' This shall be seconded without discussion and put to the meeting by the Chairman. If carried, the resolution under discussion will then immediately be put to the meeting.
12. Any member, whether she has spoken on the matter or not, may rise to a point of order, to ask a question, or in explanation; such explanation shall be confined to some material part of her former speech, which may have been misunderstood. A member so rising shall be entitled to be heard forthwith.
13. Any member of the Representative Council shall have power to move at the Council Meeting that the order of the resolutions be altered.
14. A resolution or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the seconder and of the meeting, which shall be signified without debate; and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal unless such permission shall have been refused.

15. A member who has formally seconded an amendment can speak to it at a later stage.

16. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of, but any speaker to the amendment may give notice of a further amendment which she will move when the other shall have been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall become the substantive resolution, upon which any further amendment shall be moved.

17. A resolution to be carried by the Representative Council must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.

18. The vote shall in the first place be taken by a show of voting cards or by members standing. A minority may demand a count and tellers shall be appointed at the meeting for the purpose.

ARTICLE XVI.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The meetings of the Executive Committee shall open with silent prayer.
2. The Chairman shall not vote as a member of the Executive Committee but shall have a casting vote.
3. Minutes of the proceedings of every meeting shall be taken by the Secretary.
4. Members when speaking shall address the Chair.
5. The ruling of the Chair on a point of order, or on the advisability of a personal explanation, shall be final.
6. A resolution or amendment moved at the meeting shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chair.
7. A resolution or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the seconder and of the meeting, which shall be signified without debate; and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.
8. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of, but any speaker to the amendment may give notice of a further amendment which she will move when the other has been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall become the substantive resolution, upon which any further amendment shall be moved.
9. A member wishing to have a subject placed upon the agenda must give at least 18 days' notice to the Secretary.
10. The Executive Committee shall arrange for meetings of the Representative Council. The Committee may arrange for submitting to the Council any urgency business or resolution, provided that two-thirds of the members of the Executive Committee present and voting support the motion that such business or resolution is urgent.
11. Notices of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be forwarded to the Hon. Secretaries of the Sectional and other Committees. Those Hon. Secretaries who have held office for one year rank as full Members of Executive, while those who have held office for less than one year have the right to attend the meetings and to speak, but not to vote.
12. A resolution agreed to by the Executive Committee shall not be rescinded or altered by them, unless some member of the Executive Committee shall have given notice to the Secretary 18 days before the meeting of the Executive Committee of a motion to rescind or alter such resolution, which notice shall be forthwith entered on the agenda by the Secretary.

13. In taking public action with regard to subjects upon which the Representative Council has not defined its policy and upon which opinion is strongly divided, the Executive Committee shall only take action if notice of the proposal has been placed upon the agenda, which shall be circulated a fortnight before the meeting, and if such action has been approved by two-thirds of the members present and voting. Provided that in dealing with resolutions which Sectional Committees desire to bring before the Executive Committee, notice of the subjects of the proposed resolutions shall, if possible, be given in a supplementary agenda to be issued to members with the ordinary agenda. Copies in type, giving the actual wording of the proposed resolutions, shall also be given to each member of the Executive Committee at the meeting.

14. A resolution for the suspension of the Standing Orders shall require a two-thirds majority of those present and voting.

15. These Standing Orders can only be amended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a meeting of the Executive Committee, if notice of such amendment has appeared on the circulated agenda.

16. The Executive may make bye-laws for its own guidance.

ARTICLE XVII.

CONSTITUTION OF SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Sectional Committees shall be set up to further special branches of work, either at the decision of the Executive Committee or when requested by six Affiliated Societies and agreed to by the Executive Committee. They shall hold office for one year until their reappointment by the new Executive Committee.

In the formation of a new Sectional Committee the Executive Committee shall appoint its provisional convener.

1. **Constitution.** Each Sectional Committee shall consist of:—

(a) One representative from each nationally organised society affiliated or not affiliated to the National Council of Women, which by reason of its objects is concerned with the subject with which the Sectional Committee deals. The Executive Committee shall be arbiter as to which societies are eligible for this representation and shall decide the degree of representation, having regard to the national importance of the societies concerned.

(b) One representative from each Branch and Regional Committee of the National Council of Women.

(c) One representative from each of such Sectional Committees as desire representation.

(d) The honorary officers of the National Council of Women, in addition to the Convener of the Sectional Committee.

(e) Not more than eight members co-opted by the Committee, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

NOTE.—*The Public Service and Magistrates Sectional Committee* shall in addition consist of women engaged in public work elected by the Committee.

The *International Sectional Committee* shall in addition consist of the representatives of the British National Council upon the Standing Committees of the International Council of Women.

2. **Public Action.** A Sectional Committee may take public action in its own name if it has obtained the consent of the Executive Committee. In cases of urgency, where the Sectional Committee has the support of two-thirds of the members present and voting upon a motion of which notice has been given, it may take public action if it has obtained the consent of the President.

ARTICLE XVIII.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Special Committees shall be set up by the Executive Committee as required.

ARTICLE XIX.

The Executive Committee is empowered to give indemnity to any member or members in respect of any act done or liability assumed on behalf of the National Council of Women of Great Britain.

ARTICLE XX.

ALTERATION OF THE CONSTITUTION.

This constitution shall only be altered at the Annual Meeting of the Representative Council by an amendment to be carried by two-thirds of the members present and voting. Notice of any proposed alteration shall be sent in writing to the Executive Committee at such date previous to the Council Meeting as may be determined by the Executive Committee, and shall be printed and circulated to the members of the Representative Council.

STANDING ORDERS

FOR SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Reappointment of Sectional Committees.—The members of each Sectional Committee shall be eligible for reappointment by the new Executive Committee. Nominations for each Committee must be sent to its Hon. Secretary.

The Hon. Secretary of the Committee shall forward to the Secretary of the N.C.W. a complete list of the names and addresses of the members standing for re-election and of the new nominees for submission to the new Executive Committee at its first Meeting.

Election of Officers.—Each Sectional Committee shall elect its Convener from among its own members; she shall act as Chairman and shall represent the Committee on the Executive.

A Convener who has not attended at least two meetings during the year shall be disqualified for nomination for the ensuing year.

Nominations for the Convener, whose consent to stand must first have been obtained by the nominator, shall be sent to the Hon. Secretary of the Committee not less than fourteen days before the Meeting of the Committee which immediately precedes the 21st May, or the posting of the nomination papers for the election of the Executive Committee. The Hon. Secretary shall place the names of the nominees upon the agenda paper, which shall be sent out to the members of the Committee. In the event of there being more than one nominee, the election shall be by ballot.

Each Sectional Committee shall at the same meeting appoint its own Hon. Secretary and other officers, who shall be subscribers to the funds of the N.C.W.

Each Sectional Committee may, at the discretion of the Convener, invite the attendance of experts on any given subject, and of visitors.

Meeting.—Each Sectional Committee shall, if possible, meet four times a year. The Hon. Secretary shall give at least seven days' notice of the Meetings, specifying the business to be transacted thereat.

The Convener and Hon. Secretary of each Sectional Committee shall have power, when necessary, to summon an Urgency Meeting. They shall state the business for which such a meeting is called, and no other business shall be considered at that meeting except by leave of the Committee given by a two-thirds majority.

Procedure.—Each Sectional Committee shall determine its method of procedure and fix its own quorum, which shall not be less than seven.

The Hon. Secretary of each Sectional Committee shall keep the minutes of the meetings.

A Sectional Committee desiring to form a special sub-committee shall obtain the consent of the Executive Committee.

Reports.—Each Sectional Committee shall present a Report of its proceedings to the Executive Committee. A copy of this Report shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the N.C.W. and filed at the office.

Each Sectional Committee shall present an Annual Report to the National Council of Women before the Annual Meeting. A copy of this report shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the N.C.W. for publication. The reception of such report shall not pledge the National Council to support any policy which may be advocated therein.

Connection with Branches.—A Sectional Committee shall not ask any Branch to take action in regard to any legislative measure without the consent of the Executive Committee.

In communicating with Branches, the Committee shall clearly state that such communication is sent by the Sectional Committee, and not by the Executive Committee.

Representation of Sectional Committees.—Each Sectional Committee shall appoint two representatives, who are subscribers to the Central Fund, to serve upon the Representative Council of Women.

The Convener of each Sectional Committee and the Hon. Secretary, after having served for one year, are *ex-officio* Members of the Executive Committee.

Ex-officio Members shall not stand for election to the Executive Committee.

Each Sectional Committee shall appoint a representative to serve upon the Finance Committee of the N.C.W.

Finance.—The ordinary expenses of each Sectional Committee, i.e., postage, stationery, and any necessary printing, shall be defrayed out of the funds of the National Council of Women—£5 being the maximum sum per annum which can be expended. The Hon. Secretary of the Committee shall forward her statement of accounts to the Office quarterly.

BRANCHES, THEIR POWERS AND DUTIES.

1. Branches are composed of representatives of local Societies and organisations, the work of which is in harmony with the objects of the Council, and of individual subscribing members. They carry out the work of the Council in their own locality. Each Branch elects its own President, Secretary and other officers.

2. Branches formulate their own rules, but must be prepared to assist the work and objects of the N.C.W. as local circumstances enable them to do.

3. Branches shall pay an annual subscription to the Central Fund of £5 and 25 per cent. of their ordinary membership subscriptions collected from individuals and societies.

4. Branches of 100 members and upwards, among whom shall be representatives of the various activities and organisations in the locality, shall have the right to elect their President, Secretary, or other member of their Committee, to serve on the Executive Committee of the N.C.W.

A proxy may be elected by the Branch, to hold office for the same period as the elected representative, with power to attend the Executive Committee and vote on receiving notification from the representative of her unavoidable absence.

5. Branches shall have the right to appoint a representative to serve on each Sectional Committee, such appointment to be made in the month of November. In the event of the representative being unable to attend, a proxy may be appointed to attend in her place.

6. Branches shall be represented upon the Representative Council in the proportion of one for every five of their local Societies, and one for the first twenty-five and one for every succeeding fifty of their subscribing members. Should a member elected to serve on the Council resign during the year another may be elected in her place, but no representative shall

be accepted unless her appointment has been notified to the Secretary of the National Council at least a fortnight before the Council Meeting.

7. A Branch may send in to the Executive Committee one resolution for the Representative Council. Such resolution shall be circulated to the Branches, Societies and Committees and the ten resolutions receiving the highest number of votes shall be placed on the agenda.

8. Branches shall not be considered responsible for the opinion of the Council as expressed by resolutions, unless and until they have themselves affirmed the resolution passed by the Council at a meeting of the Branch.

9. A Branch shall not approach a Government Department on any controversial matter upon which the Representative Council has not defined its policy, without first obtaining the consent of the Executive Committee.

10. Branches shall be notified through their Secretaries of all Meetings of the Representative Council.

11. Branches shall send short reports of their work for insertion in "Women in Council" from time to time, and their annual report to the General Secretary of the N.C.W. when issued.

N.B.—Members wishing to form a Branch are asked to communicate in the first instance with the General Secretary of the N.C.W.

REGIONAL COMMITTEES OF THE BRANCHES (formerly "Standing Committees.")

Objects.—To promote solidarity by keeping Branches in close touch with each other and with the work at Headquarters.

To survey areas, and endeavour to form and strengthen the Branches, and thus to further the work of the National Council of Women.

Constitution of Regional Committees.—Each Regional Committee shall consist of three voting members to represent each Branch in its area, one of whom shall be an Hon. Officer of the Branch.

Proxies, with power to vote, shall be appointed, who shall attend in the event of the unavoidable absence of any of the representatives.

The representatives shall hold office for one year and shall be eligible for re-election by their respective Branches.

Members of the Headquarters Executive, elected at the Annual Meeting of the Council, who live in the area of a Regional Committee, shall be *ex-officio* members of that Committee.

Each Regional Committee shall at its Annual Meeting elect a Convener and an Hon. Secretary. These officers shall be appointed in addition to the Branch Representatives.

Each Regional Committee shall have the right to elect a member to represent it on the Headquarters Executive Committee. Such representative shall hold office for one year, but be eligible for re-election.

The Hon. Secretary for Regional Committees shall be *ex-officio* a member of all Regional Committees.

No Branch shall be closed down before it has communicated with its Regional Committee, which shall notify Headquarters.

Meetings of Regional Committees.—Each Regional Committee shall hold at least two meetings during the year.

Special Meetings of the Regional Committee may be called by the Convener or at the request of two of the Branches forming the Committee.

The Minutes of each Regional Committee shall be circulated to its Branches, a copy being also sent to the Hon. Secretary for Regional Committees.

Finance.—Each Branch shall pay to the Regional Committee a sum to be decided upon by that Committee, to defray the expenses of printing, postage, etc.

Connection with Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional Committee.—The President acts as Convener of this Committee, with the help of the Acting Vice-President.

The Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional Committee shall act as liaison committee for the Regional Committees.

The Convener and Hon Secretary of each Regional Committee, or their duly appointed proxies, shall serve on the Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional Committee.

The Hon. Secretary for Regional Committees shall be *ex-officio* a member of the Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional Committee, with power to vote.

AFFILIATED SOCIETIES, THEIR RELATION TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

1. Affiliated Societies are entitled to appoint one representative on the Representative Council, but this representation may be increased to a number not exceeding ten at the discretion of the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the Representative Council.

Should a member elected to serve on the Council resign during the year another may be elected in her place, but no representative shall be accepted unless her appointment has been notified to the Secretary of the National Council at least a fortnight before the Council Meeting.

An Affiliated Society has the right to appoint a representative to serve on the Sectional Committee dealing with its special work.

In the event of the representative being unable to attend a proxy may be appointed to attend in her place.

2. Affiliated Societies shall pay an annual subscription to the Central Funds of not less than £1 is. Should they be entitled to elect more than four Members of Council, an additional sum of 5s. is due on behalf of each additional member. Any Society which has not paid its subscription before the Annual Meeting of the National Council shall, after due notice, cease to be affiliated.

3. An Affiliated Society may send to the Executive Committee one resolution for the Representative Council. Such resolution shall be circulated to the Branches, Societies and Committees, and the ten resolutions receiving the highest number of votes shall be placed on the agenda.

4. Affiliated Societies incur no responsibility on account of any action taken either by the National Council of Women or by any other Affiliated Society, unless they have affirmed a resolution passed by the Council at a Meeting of the Society.

5. Affiliated Societies shall each receive through their Hon. Secretaries notice of all Meetings of the Representative Council and a free copy of the Handbook and of "Women in Council."

6. Affiliated Societies shall be entitled to display and sell their literature on one of the bookstalls at the Annual Meeting.

N.B.—Societies desiring to affiliate shall make application to the Executive Committee on a form to be obtained from the General Secretary.

RESOLUTIONS

PASSED BY

THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN

IN 1932 AND 1933.

NORWICH, OCTOBER, 1932.

The Disarmament Conference.

"That whilst expressing its appreciation of the efforts made by the British Government towards the limitation of armaments and in the cause of peace, the National Council of Women profoundly regrets that the resolution summarising the measure of agreement reached in the first period of the Disarmament Conference and adopted by it on July 22nd, does not envisage adequate decisions on major issues and does not provide for that large and immediate reduction in world armaments which was foreshadowed in President Hoover's proposals and which represents the insistent demand of the peoples of the world.

It believes that the continued failure to fulfil the pledges given to the nations disarmed under the Peace Treaties of 1919 is creating a situation of grave menace, both to peace and to economic recovery, and strongly urges the British Government to accept substantially the United States' proposal and to announce its support for (a) the general abolition of the weapons forbidden to four countries under the Peace Treaties (military aircraft, submarines, warships above certain tonnages, tanks and heavy guns, preparation for chemical war); (b) comprehensive limitation and reduction of other armaments and expenditure thereon; and (c) the suppression of the private manufacture of arms."

Nationality of Married Women.

"That the National Council of Women welcomes the statement made on behalf of the British Government at the 1931 Assembly of the League of Nations that it is the policy of the British Government 'that all disabilities of married women in matters of nationality should be removed and that, in so far as nationality is concerned, a married woman should be in the same position as a man—married or unmarried, or any single woman.'"

The National Council of Women therefore urges the Government to introduce and pass into law the Nationality of Married Women Bill, which gives effect to this policy, and further to propose to the other British Dominions that they should agree to a similar policy.

The N.C.W. desires to express its appreciation of the fact that it was the British Government which made the proposal adopted by the 1931 Assembly of the League of Nations, whereby the reconsideration of the Hague Nationality Convention appears on the Agenda of the 1932 Assembly, and to urge the Government to take such action at this Assembly as will ensure that the question of the nationality of married women shall be reopened."

1. Sexual Offences Against Young Children.

"The National Council of Women of Great Britain records its concern at the large number of cases of indecent assaults, indecent exposure, and similar offences against young children, and expresses the strongest disapproval of a system which results in men, convicted of such unnatural and indefensible offences, being dealt with in a haphazard fashion by the infliction of fines or short sentences of imprisonment.

"The Council is of the opinion that such sexual offences present a special problem, necessitating special legislation with a view to their suppression.

"Many offences of this nature are due to some mental or physical abnormality on the part of the offender; the Council therefore calls upon the Government to carry through all its stages a Bill providing that, in all cases where children under thirteen are concerned, the offender should be remanded after conviction and before sentence, for examination by a medical practitioner of special experience in mental diseases and abnormality. Subject to such report, the Court should have power to order detention in a suitable institution, followed by remedial mental or medical treatment.

"The Council further asks that such legislation shall also provide, by amendments to the appropriate Acts, that in cases where the offender has three or more convictions for gross indecency, indecent exposure or indecent assault, he shall be deemed to be a 'persistent offender' and shall be committed to be detained in a suitable institution 'during his Majesty's pleasure'."

2. Criminal Law Amendment Acts.

"That the National Council of Women welcomes the action taken by His Majesty's Government in introducing legislation to give effect to the recommendations of the Departmental Committee on Offences against Young Persons regarding the protection of the victims of such offences. It urges, however, that legislation should be brought forward without delay to deal with the amendment of the Criminal Law, which is long overdue."

3. Housing.

"That the National Council of Women should urge Local Authorities and Public Utility Societies to build simpler dwellings, of more varied types, which could be let at lower rents than those now generally prevailing for new dwellings."

4. Distressed State of Agriculture.

"That this Meeting, feeling acutely that the present distressed state of agriculture is a factor of vital importance against the economic recovery of the whole country, urges that steps should be taken by the National Council of Women to enlist the interest of townswomen in favour of our own farm and garden produce and so to ensure closer co-operation between consumer and producer: it further considers that a more complete system of marking imported food stuffs is essential.

5. Women Police.

"That the National Council of Women welcomes the encouragement given to the movement for Women Police by the issue of Statutory Regulations and the promotion of a woman officer to the rank of Superintendent in the Metropolitan Police Force. It further urges the Secretaries of State for England and Scotland to negotiate with one of the larger provincial forces in both England and Scotland for the establishment in that force of a Training Department for Women Police, under a woman supervisor, in order that Chief Constables may be assured that the women they select will receive such training as will enable them to undertake the highly skilled work, in connection with offences committed against and by women and children, for which police-women are specially needed."

6. Prison Reform.

The National Council of Women urges upon H.M. Government the importance of a re-organisation of the prison system, including a reduction in the number of hours spent in the cells and the introduction of a new system of release on parole; the Council welcomes the appointment of the Committee to enquire into Prison Labour and urges the Branches and Affiliated Societies to give all possible assistance to that Committee of Enquiry.

7. Remand Homes as Observation Centres.

"The National Council of Women advocates that Remand Homes should be equipped and staffed as Observation Centres and urges that in connection both with Juvenile Courts and Remand Homes arrangements be made for the physical and psychological treatment of young offenders, such arrangements to include full use of all the facilities afforded by clinics, education and health authorities and the voluntary organisations providing such services."

8. Mechanical Haulage in Pits.

"The National Council of Women deplores the fact that 44,500 horses and ponies are still employed in our mines and strongly supports their claim to better working conditions. It learns with great interest and pleasure that over 500 mines have dispensed entirely with horse and pony haulage in favour of mechanical methods of haulage and conveyance underground. It urges the Government to take steps to ensure the gradual introduction of mechanical haulage and conveyance to take the place of horses and ponies in all mines, as has been done successfully in Scotland and in the Lancashire coalfields."

9. Biological Teaching in Schools.

"The National Council of Women in Conference assembled concurs in the view expressed by the Prime Minister that 'there appear to be good reasons for drawing public attention at once to the recommendations of the Committee' on the Education of Biologists. The National Council of Women especially supports the view that 'an adequate standard of intellectual equipment will not be obtained until biology is definitely recognised in the schools as a cultural subject' and that 'biology should be brought to the notice of every boy and none should leave school without some knowledge of it'."

"The National Council of Women further draws the attention of all concerned with education to the undoubted fact that a knowledge of the life sciences is as important for girls as for boys, and strongly urges upon teachers that biology should be included as a cultural subject in all schools."

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTIONS.

1. Article XIII. Resolutions.

"That, in view of the fact that the resolutions for the Annual Council Meeting are now chosen by ballot, it be no longer necessary to obtain the support of two Branches and of two Affiliated Societies."

2. Article XIV. Nominations.

Line 5: That at the end of this line the words "at least" be inserted to ensure that Nomination papers shall be sent out *at least* two months before the Annual Meetings, and so to bring the constitution into line with the present practice."

Line 7: That this read: "Nomination papers . . . shall be returned to the Secretary within *five* weeks of their receipt" instead of "within *three* weeks."

TORQUAY, OCTOBER, 1933.

Disarmament Conference. (*Urgency Resolution*).

"This meeting of the National Council of Women expresses its earnest desire for the successful issue of the World Disarmament Conference and the conclusion of a Convention, recognising equality of status and embodying at least the following points:—

- (1) An immediate beginning in reduction of armaments.
- (2) The abolition within a specified period of 'aggressive' weapons, including the air weapon.

- (3) Limitation of expenditure.
 (4) A permanent organisation to exercise a strict supervision of existing armaments, including their manufacture and sale, and to prevent re-armament by any State."

1. Suppression of Traffic in Women.

"The National Council of Women, being of opinion that Traffic in Women and Children is always and in all circumstances a profoundly immoral and anti-social act, and that it should be punished even if the victims are over age and consenting parties, welcomes any progress which can be made towards removing the existing age limit of protection (21 years) from the existing International Conventions against the Traffic.

It therefore calls upon His Majesty's Government to support the Draft Protocol drawn up by the Advisory Committee of the League of Nations against Traffic in Women and Children at its last Session, which removes the age limit from the Conventions in all cases where the traffic is of an international character."

"It notes that the Protocol is limited to traffic from one 'to another country,' and urges His Majesty's Government to make a statement in supporting the Protocol to the effect that those words are interpreted as meaning that 'traffickers will be punished also in cases where the victims are to be transferred from a mother country to her colonies, protectorates, mandates and, in so far as possible, all other territories under her suzerainty or sovereignty.'"

Agreed Urgency Resolution.

"In view of the fact that the British Government signed at noon on October 11th the Convention on Traffic in Women of Full Age (thereby supplementing previous Conventions for Minors) all adherents thereto declaring International Traffic in Women of whatever age illegal, this Conference asks the British Government and the League of Nations to pursue their work of securing the elimination of licensed houses and the suppression of all Traffic in Women.

The N.C.W. desires to record its opinion that all Traffic in Women, both National and International, is at all times and in all circumstances profoundly immoral and anti-social."

2. Cinema Films.

"That the National Council of Women deplors the tendency in certain cinema films shown during the past year to present incidents depicting brutality and violence, in which the subjects apparently include cruelties inflicted upon human beings, or wild animals, or both.

They believe that the cumulative effect of such films continuously shown throughout the country is not only offensive to public feeling but must be harmful to the moral sense of the public, and particularly to those of impressionable mind.

They therefore urgently appeal to the British Board of Film Censors to exercise more stringently their powers of censorship in this direction."

3. Women Probation Officers.

"The National Council of Women urges the appointment of additional full-time Women Probation Officers, qualified for this work through an approved course of training."

4. Juvenile Instruction Centres.

"That the Government be asked to introduce urgent measures to place an obligation on all young persons, from 14 to 18 years, not otherwise under instruction and on the Register for Employment, to attend, during periods of unemployment, some form of education, such as Juvenile Instruction Centres, the obligation to be generally similar to that laid on young persons between 16 and 18 who are in receipt of benefit under the Unemployment Insurance Acts."

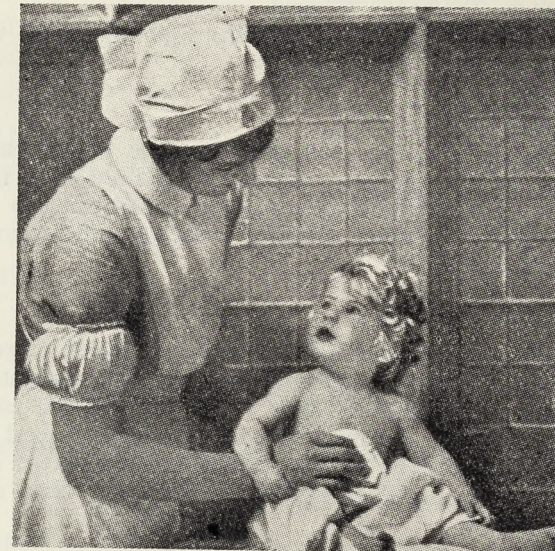

5. Juries Amendment Bill.

"That the Government be urged to give facilities for the Juries Amendment Bill promoted by the N.C.W. and introduced into the House of Commons by Mr. Holford Knight and given a first reading on June 20th, 1933, or for a Bill on similar lines; the objects being primarily (1) the inclusion of a larger number of women in Jury Lists by means of a modification of the qualifications and (2) increased facilities for special exemption in hard cases for both men and women."

6. Remand Homes.

"The National Council of Women is of opinion that existing remand accommodation is inadequate, generally speaking, to meet the fresh needs which must arise under the Children and Young Persons Act, 1933. It considers that it would be unsatisfactory and extravagant for the majority of local authorities to attempt to provide suitable Homes for all purposes within their own areas.

The Council asks, therefore, that the Secretary of State should make use of his powers forthwith to review, through his Inspectors, all existing remand accommodation, and that all possible encouragement should be given to certain selected local authorities in County Boroughs to provide properly staffed and equipped Homes to meet the needs of a group of Juvenile Courts, and

That the Secretary of State for Scotland be asked to take similar and suitable action for Scotland."

7. Training of Nurses.

"That this Council is of opinion that in order to increase the number of suitable candidates for the nursing profession it should be made possible for pupils to take part of the preliminary State examination before leaving a secondary school, thus stimulating their interest and relieving the pressure of the first year in hospital."

8. Early Treatment Clinics.

"That the National Council of Women wishes to urge the importance of establishing Early Treatment Clinics for cases of nervous breakdown and incipient mental disorder, with a view to improving the mental health and stability of the community. Such clinics to be established either in connection with a general hospital or as part of the co-ordinated health scheme of the local authority, having due regard to the help that may be given by general practitioners."

9. Right of Married Women to Paid Work.

"That the National Council of Women has been watching with increasing anxiety the attack on the Married Woman's right to work, which may also be termed the right of the working and professional woman to marry, and records its opinion that regulations having the effect of dismissing women on marriage are unjust, uneconomic and contrary to the public interest."

10. Regulation of Office Conditions.

"That the National Council of Women of Great Britain urges upon His Majesty's Government that legislation be introduced for the regulation of office conditions in the matters of sanitary accommodation, cleanliness, light and ventilation."

11. Working Hours of Shop Assistants.

"That this Council desires to support the unanimous recommendation of the Select Committee on Shop Assistants that the normal working hours of young persons employed in shops shall not exceed 48 a week.

Further it desires to support the Select Committee's recommendation that a statutory working week shall be instituted for all shop assistants, and

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urges that the term 'Shop Assistant' should be defined as in the recommendation of the Select Committee and that H.M. Government should introduce legislation to give effect to these recommendations."

12. Certification of Pregnant Mentally Defective Women.

"That in view of the fact that there is great difficulty in finding accommodation in certified institutions for pregnant mentally defective women, which leads to a refusal or neglect to certify this very important class of defectives, the National Council of Women asks the Board of Control to urge Local Authorities to make the necessary provision for such women in their areas without delay.

The Council further urges its Branches to institute an enquiry in their districts as to how far the certification or non-certification of these women is affected by lack of accommodation, and whether closer co-operation between the Mental Deficiency Committees and the Public Assistance Committees, together with a more systematic ascertainment, would remedy this difficulty."

13. Maternal Mortality.

"The National Council of Women considers that all possible action should be taken throughout the country to reduce further the rate of maternal mortality and to lessen the ratio of maternal morbidity. It urges all Branches and Affiliated Societies to persuade expectant mothers to avail themselves of the facilities for ante-natal treatment, and, later, of post-natal medical advice, where provided by their Local Authorities or otherwise, and to report to the Ministry of Health and to the local Authority where facilities for either ante-natal or post-natal care are not available in their areas.

And this Council further requests His Majesty's Government to have the rate of maternal mortality in each locality printed in the Quarterly Return of the Registrar General."

14. Women Housing Estate Managers.

"That the National Council of Women of Great Britain recommend their local Branches to urge the extended use of Women Housing Estate Managers by all authorities dealing with the housing of the working classes."

15. Indian Women's Franchise.

"That the National Council of Women in Annual Council assembled, believing with the Simon Commission that India cannot reach the position to which it aspires in the world until its women play their due part as educated citizens, and having noted with satisfaction that His Majesty's Government has repeatedly expressed its sense of the importance of securing a substantial measure of enfranchisement for Indian women, calls on the Government and on Parliament to grant to Indian women a measure of voting strength at the very least equal to that recommended by the Indian Franchise Committee, namely, a ratio of one woman voter to four-and-a-half men voters."

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTIONS.

1. Article VII. Election by Proportional Representation.

"To amend Clause 2 (b) and (d) by the omission of the words 'on the system of proportional representation' with regard to the election of the Executive Committee."

2. Article XIII. Resolutions.

"To amend Clause 3 by inserting 10, instead of 12, with reference to the number of resolutions selected by postal vote."

Note.—This would leave the Executive Committee free to place resolutions on the Agenda as at present, and it has been agreed that the words "in addition to the 10 selected" shall be added to Article XIII, 2, in order to make this point quite clear.

ABOLISH THE SLUMS

Well-constructed dwellings, fitted with the cleanly labour-saving appliances produced by the gas industry, make for healthy, happy homes under smoke-free skies.

Gas is being used for cooking, heating, water heating and home laundry, in public and private housing schemes all over the country. In Birmingham every one of 40,000 houses built by the Corporation since the war is piped for four gas appliances. In Liverpool 99 per cent.—in Glasgow 96 per cent.—of the houses built under municipal schemes are using gas for cooking, heating and home laundry.

Gas is helping to relieve the crushing burden of housework under which too many of those with small incomes struggle in vain.

3. Article XIII. Amendments to Resolutions.

"To omit from Clause 9 the ruling that a two-thirds majority of those present and voting is required to carry an amendment."

4. Standing Orders for British Representatives on I.C.W. (see Handbook, 1933, p. 116).

"(1) To amend line 2 to read—"These shall be nominated and elected by ballot *by a postal vote*, the result to be announced at the Annual Meeting of the National Council of Women of Great Britain preceding the *Triennial Meeting of the International Council of Women.*"

ORIGIN OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

Like many organisations which fulfil a need, the National Council has sprung from small beginnings. In 1876 Miss Ellice Hopkins, during her strenuous efforts to educate public opinion on questions of morals, began, for the purposes of preventive and rescue work, to found Ladies' Associations for the Care of Friendless Girls. In 1889 a Conference of the Yorkshire Associations was held at Barnsley—the idea having been possibly taken from a very successful Conference, presided over by Lady Aberdeen the year before at Aberdeen. This Conference was arranged by Miss Gray and Miss Janes, until 1914 the organizing Secretary, to whose untiring work and self-devotion the National Council owes in great part its existence. Some Birmingham ladies who were present at Barnsley, among whom were Mrs. Phillp, Mrs. Hallows and Miss E. H. Cadbury, warmly took up the idea of such a meeting, and in 1890 the Birmingham Union of Women Workers, with Miss Stacey as its Secretary, held a well attended and most interesting Conference, when papers on various subjects connected with work amongst women and girls were read.

Meetings of the same sort followed in Liverpool, under Mrs. Alfred Booth, and in Bristol, Glasgow, and Leeds, under the Presidency of Adeline, Duchess of Bedford, which were arranged by the local Unions of Women Workers. At some of these Conferences schemes for a more organised and formal body were suggested, notably by Miss Hubbard whose staunch support did much for the Conferences, and at the Nottingham Conference, held in October, 1895, the National Union of Women Workers (now known as the National Council of Women) was formally constituted, with Mrs. Creighton as its first President.

Miss Norah Green was appointed in January, 1904, and held office as General Secretary until her retirement in January, 1934.

A NATIONAL WORK.

The CHALFONT COLONY for EPILEPTICS

(Established by the National Society for Epileptics).

Patron—HIS MAJESTY THE KING.

Many thousands of families which might otherwise be happy and prosperous are reduced to the extremity of misery and despair by the presence of an epileptic in their midst.

In the battle of life these families are placed at a hopeless disadvantage; for, even though the epileptic be a capable and industrious worker, the liability to fits prevents him (or her) from retaining any ordinary employment; and at the same time demands the constant care and attention of some capable relative, who, but for this absorbing duty, might be a breadwinner.

In a poor household, destitute of proper safeguards and appliances, the life of an epileptic is full of dangers and the strain upon all to whom he is dear is terrible and overpowering. He lives in a state of enforced idleness, which leads to mental and moral deterioration and to the serious aggravation of the disease.

At the Chalfont Colony, epileptic children are cared for and educated; while the adults are enabled, under proper supervision, to follow the avocations of ordinary life, and to engage in industries of various kinds, and in healthy sports and recreations. The aim is to cure them, if possible, of their malady; and, when this is not possible, to enable them, in spite of their infirmity, to lead a useful and happy life.

Beautifully situated on the Chiltern Hills, on an estate of 357 acres, the Colony at present comprises nearly twenty Homes, accommodating 510 patients; but so great is the demand for admission that this accommodation is utterly inadequate to meet it, and FUNDS ARE URGENTLY NEEDED for the building of ADDITIONAL HOMES.

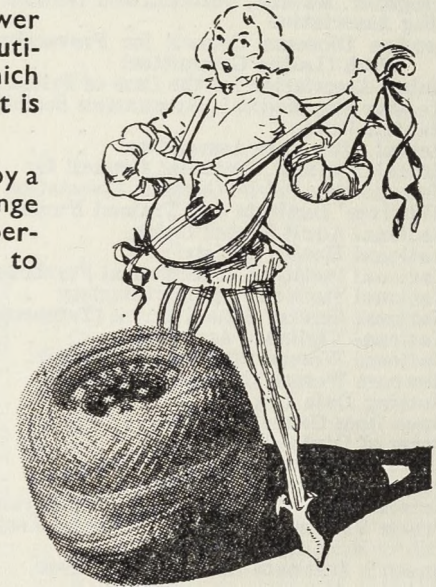

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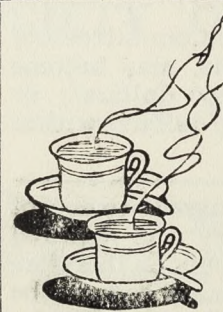


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ARTICLE II.—*General Policy.*

1. This International Council of Women is organised in the interests of no one particular propaganda, and excludes from its programme political and religious questions of a controversial nature affecting the inter-relationship of two or more countries.

2. This International Council of Women has no power over its members beyond that of suggestion and sympathy; therefore no National Council of Women voting to become a member of the International Council shall render itself liable to be interfered with in respect to its complete organic unity, independence, or method of work, or shall be committed to any principle or method of any other Council, or to any utterance or act of this International Council, beyond compliance with the terms of this Constitution, and harmonious action therewith. National Councils are at liberty to make any communication as individual Councils one to another, but propaganda to be officially circulated amongst the affiliated National Councils in the name of the International Council shall not deal with the subjects referred to in Paragraph 1.

ARTICLE IV.—*Members.*

1. Any National Council of Women formed of National Societies, of Local Councils, and Unions of representative Societies and Institutions, provided that their Constitution be in harmony with the basis of the Constitution of the International Council, may become a member of the International Council, with the approval of the Executive Committee, and by the payment of 20 dollars (£4) every year. National Councils whose annual fee has not been paid, shall thereby forfeit their right to vote at meetings of the Council and Executive Committee.*

3. Any person, whose name is accepted by the Executive Committee and approved by the Council of her own nation, where one exists, may become a life patron of this Council, upon the payment of £40 (200 dollars); or may become a triennial contributor on the payment of £3 (15 dollars) within the triennial period.

* At the Council Meeting at Washington in 1925 it was agreed to accept the Finance Committee's estimate of £2,000 as the necessary sum required for the working of the Headquarters Office. The National Councils therefore agreed to allow themselves to be assessed in accordance with a scheme to be drawn up by the Finance Committee. This scheme was accepted by the Council at Vienna in 1930. Newly formed National Councils shall, however, be only expected to pay an affiliation fee of £4 or 20 dollars a year for the first triennial period after their affiliation.

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- (2) the propaganda of sound principles and methods of estate administration, particularly those established by O. Hill;
- (3) co-operation with other Societies concerned with the improvement of Housing.

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5. Any person approved by the Council of her own nation, where one exists, may become an Annual Subscriber to this Council on the payment of £1 or upwards.

6. All ordinary members of affiliated National Councils are also members of the International Council of Women, and shall be entitled to be present at the meetings of the International Council, but may not take part in the proceedings without special invitation from the Chair, nor have they a vote.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE COUNCIL. I. MEETINGS.

9. Secretaries of affiliated National Councils are required to send an extract of the minute of Committee or Council appointing the delegates and their alternates (in the event of the inability of the delegates to attend) to the Headquarters Office a full month before the Triennial Council Meeting, supplying the names and addresses of the ladies appointed; also to provide each delegate or alternate with credentials.

10. The responsibility for the appointments and instruction of delegates rests solely with the bodies appointing, and delegates are required to act in strict accordance with the instructions of the affiliated National Councils which they represent, and on points which may incidentally arise, as far as they can judge, in accordance with the spirit of that organisation, and not as individuals.

Affiliated National Councils shall be free to give liberty to their delegates to vote according to their own convictions on any matter on which the National Councils consider they have not sufficient information, and where they feel that discussion might materially alter the point of view.

IV. STANDING ORDERS FOR THE INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEES.

1. The ordinary members of the Standing Committees shall be delegates appointed by the National Councils, each Council has the right to appoint a member to serve on each Standing Committee. These members shall be appointed at the beginning of each electoral period.

4. The Convener of a Standing Committee shall not be eligible to serve on that particular Committee as the member representing her own National Council.

V. STANDING ORDERS FOR INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL PUBLICATIONS.

1. All information regarding the business programme of the International Council, its Executive, its Committees, its Triennial, or other Meetings, shall first appear in official form (in the "Transactions," the "Annual Report," or in official or printed communications from the President's Office) before it is incorporated in the printed matter of any individual National Council.

2. The Secretary of each affiliated National Council shall furnish the Headquarters Office of the International Council with an account, not previously published elsewhere, of the work carried on by the National Council of Women of her country during the foregoing year, such account not to exceed 1,500 words in length, to be written in any of the three official languages—French, German, or English—and to be in the hands of the Headquarters Office not later than April 30th in each year. All these National Council Reports shall be published together in the Annual Report of the International Council of Women.



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STANDING ORDERS FOR BRITISH REPRESENTATIVES ON THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

ON THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN:—

(1) The N.C.W. is represented on the International Council of Women by 10 delegates (including its President) and 10 proxies. These shall be nominated and elected by ballot by a postal vote, the result to be announced at the Annual Meeting of the National Council of Women of Great Britain preceding the Triennial Meeting of the I.C.W. It shall be open to all members of Council to enter nominations for the 10 delegates and 10 proxies to serve on the International Council of Women. If a delegate after appointment be unavoidably prevented from serving, or resign office, the proxy with the highest number of votes shall be invited to replace her; in all cases proxies shall be called upon in order of their recorded votes. The term of office of the delegates is for 3 years. The term of office of proxies lasts during the time occupied by the Special Meeting which they are appointed to attend. Instructions as to future duties shall be made clear to delegates and proxies on their appointment.

(2) The delegates from the National Council shall give a united vote, and the National Council, whenever possible, shall previously instruct its delegates as to the lines on which they shall vote.

(3) The resolutions and amendments proposed by the National Council for the meeting of the I.C.W. shall be presented to and separately considered by the Executive Committee, and after approval sent to the Secretary of the I.C.W. to be placed upon its agenda.

(4) In the case of unforeseen questions arising at the I.C.W. Council Meetings, the N.C.W. President or her proxy shall call together the delegates of Great Britain in Council, and shall decide with them on the casting of their vote.

ON THE INTERNATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:—

(5) The N.C.W. is represented on the Executive Committee of the International Council of Women by its President.

ON THE INTERNATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES:—

(6) The N.C.W. is represented on each Standing Committee of the I.C.W. by one Representative, appointed by the Executive Committee of the N.C.W. by nomination and ballot.

(7) The Reports prepared by the Representatives for presentation to their several I.C.W. Standing Committees shall consist of statements of fact, not of expressions of personal opinion: they shall be as brief as is possible consistently with lucidity.

The Reports for the meetings of the I.C.W. shall be presented to, and individually considered by, the Executive Committee of the N.C.W.; if necessary a special session shall be called for the purpose, and after approval the reports shall be sent to the Conveners of the I.C.W. Standing Committees.

(8) The Nominations of General Officers and Conveners of Standing Committees of the I.C.W. shall be considered by the Executive Committee as a separate item of business and shall be freely open to discussion or, if necessary to a vote.
