JUNIOR COUNCIL

ANNUAL REPORT, 1937.

The Junior Council, like Princess Elizabeth, attains its eleventh birthday this year! and we who have watched its development since the early days look forward to the continued growth and expansion of this offspring of a Society which has existed to promote the economic freedom of

women for the past sixty years.

Although the Committee is glad to announce the election of over a hundred new members in the course of the year, members are urged to redouble their efforts to stimulate interest in the Society whenever possible and to persuade their friends to join. Among professions represented for the first time this year, we have a teacher of Dalcroze Eurythmics, a beauty specialist, an electro-therapist, a composer, and a dealer in old prints.

Monthly Parties.

The Groups have co-operated on several occasions in the arrangement of functions, notably on April 2nd, 1936 when Elizabeth Sprigge, of the Arts & Letters Group, gave an enchanting talk on "Children's Reading down the Ages" with Noel Streatfeild, the well-known author, in the chair. Further literary parties were held in the autumn. Mr. Walter de la Mare came on October 1st to talk on "Lewis Carroll and Nonsense." He compared the children's books of our own age with those written for Victorian children, rather to the discredit of the former. He pointed out that the stern, forbidding, repressive Victorians were the originators of nonsense rhymes and writings and produced two masters of the art, Edward Lear and Lewis Carroll. On October 14th Dorothy Sayers, creator of Lord Peter Wimsey, filled the Hall to overflowing with an enthusiastic audience when she took for her speech the provocative title "Are women human?" She discussed very amusingly the controversial question of women working after marriage and being accused of taking men's jobs; she pointed out that much of the work formerly undertaken by women in their homes, such as spinning, weaving, dyeing, baking and preserving, is now done in factories under the direction of men. Later in the month, Marcel Boulestin discoursed on "French versus

English food." He accused the English of lack of interest in their food, denounced many of the recipes in daily use and pointed out that in France one never saw advertisements for indigestion remedies!

At the first party in the New Year a travel film talk was given by Mr. John Walker, lecturer in the Editorial Dept. of Thomas Cook & Son. His fascinating description and delightful pictures of summer holidays in Switzerland and winter in the Black Forest wafted his audience for a brief spell away from the gloom of a London winter.

On March 16th, in collaboration with the Science Group we were to have had the pleasure of welcoming Dorothy Spicer and Pauline Gower, the well-known young airwomen, as our guests. At the last moment they were both victims of the prevailing influenza epidemic, but our Chairman, Lawrence Wingfield, Clerk to the Guild of Air Pilots, nobly stepped into the breach and gave an interesting survey of the development of civil aviation, whilst Miss Frank, who turned out to be Mrs. Wingfield in private life, took his place in the Chair.

Aperitif Parties.

As part of the Membership Campaign last summer, Sydney Carroll came to tell up about the Open-Air Theatre in Regent's Park, and later in the year, Ivor Brown, author and dramatic critic, discussed "Dramatic criticism—its cause and cure"; his speech giving rise to much heated argument.

On February 15th, Mrs. Ilse Kroemer gave a lecture demonstration on "Rhythmic Exercises." A class of her students showed how these rhythmic movements could ensure the proper use of the body in walking, standing and sitting and also demonstrated remedial exercises suitable for business people. Mrs. Kroemer holds regular classes for our members in the Hall every Monday evening at 6.15.

Bridge Circle.

The Bridge Circle meets every Tuesday evening in the Members' Room and welcomes new players, even if not very experienced. Once more with the help of the members of the Circle, Miss Douglas organised a Bridge Party, which brought in a record contribution of £10 to the Mart of London River.

Bierhalle Tanzkonzert.

A very successful evening of dance and song, organised on original lines by Miss M. L. G. Bagnall raised a further sum of £20, also a record, for the Mart.

Chamber Music Concert.

In response to a request from a number of members, the experiment of holding a concert was made in January last, and from the artistic point of view was an overwhelming success. We were exceedingly fortunate in being able to secure as our artistes the Brosa String Quartet and Tapia-Caballero, the Chilean pianist. But unless every seat in the Hall is sold it is not possible to cover the expenses and on this occasion, good as the programme was, the Hall was not full and if more concerts are to be organised, as so many members would like, a certain number of guarantors will have to be found.

Walkers' Club.

The most important activity this year was again the Whitsun ramble, following the Ridgeway bordering the Druid Avebury and "Wayland Smith's Cave." The Club has continued to arrange Sunday walks, exploring the Sussex Weald and Southdown Ridge, and also the Roman surroundings of St. Alban's City. In October, a particularly attractive walk was planned amidst the rock scenery of North Sussex and the autumn glory in beautiful Buckhurst Park and Ashdown Forest, which gave special opportunities for bird-watching. One leader made a successful experiment by arranging for her party to join a Ramblers' Excursion train, thus enabling them to go further afield. New members may like to know that these walks take place once a month, on Sundays, that the average distance covered is ten to fifteen miles and the leaders endeavour to keep the expenses below 5/-.

Marsham Street Players.

The Marsham Street Players finished last season with a Cocktail Party in May, to which they invited all the men who had played for them during the year. It should be mentioned that men are not full members of the Marsham Street Players but are invited to take part by the Players.

On the 21st November the Players produced "Viceroy Sarah" by Norman Ginsbury. It was the first time this play had been done by amateurs and was a very great success. It was a big undertaking, both financially and artistically, and involved a tremendous amount of work for all concerned. Mr. Arthur Ewart produced it and did wonders with the grouping on the small stage. On February 19th the Players entered a one-act play "Mystery Cottage" by Bernard Merivale, in the British Drama League Community Theatre Festival, at the Arts Theatre. This was produced by Miss Mary Lane, one of the members. They

did not do so well as last year and dropped several points, chiefly on the choice of play. On April 27th, the Players presented a three-act play "Sixteen" by Aimée and Philip

Stuart, produced by Mr. Ewart.

The Players have again been able to let their scenery to several dramatic societies using the Millicent Fawcett Hall. This is a great help towards such expenses as producers' and authors' fees, and they hope to augment and improve the scenery, lighting, and properties. With such a small subscription (5/- from acting members a year) it can be seen that it is important to have some additional means of adding to their funds.

The Players would welcome a more lively interest by the senior members of the Society and the Junior Council and would remind them that in these days of celluloid drama, the amateur movement deserves active support. The Players are continually endeavouring to raise the standard of their productions and to make their efforts successful they must have sympathetic co-operation between audience and players.

Arts & Letters Group.

In May a visit was made to Major Benton Fletcher's historic house and collection of early keyboard instruments at 48, Devonshire Street, Holborn. Major Fletcher described the development of keyboard music in England, and through illustrations played by Mrs. Richardson, the audience had an opportunity of hearing the harpsichord and spinet and appreciating the character of the music written for them. The summer activities ended with an evening excursion, in July, to the gardens of Cliveden House, near Maidenhead. The Junior Council is greatly indebted to Lady Astor for her kindness in allowing the party a private view of these beautiful grounds.

In the autumn efforts were concentrated on a series of parties organised for the Junior Council membership campaign and it was not until December that the first group meeting was held. We were fortunate enough to secure Adeline Genée, the world-famous ballerina, to speak on "Ballet in England"; the audience was fascinated by Madame Genée's account of her own career in England and of the rise of the school of ballet here since the war, and it is hoped that this meeting will have helped to spread a knowledge of the splendid work of the Royal Academy of Dancing of which she is the President.

On Thursday, January 21st, Miss Constance Prescott, B.A., M.B.E., gave a delightful lecture on "Cretan Art" and her audience was charmed and amused by the drawings with

which she illustrated her entertaining talk; several of the masterpieces were carried away as souvenirs. The year closes with preparations for a talk on "Fashion Secrets" by one of the leading exponents of fashion in this country, Mr. Victor Stiebel. The Committee would welcome the views of members on subjects for future parties. It is a very large group with more varied interests than others, and suggestions would be a great help in representing these different interests in the fixture list. In the autumn elections the Committee welcomed several new members, and the warm thanks of the Group are due to Miss Edna Mosely, A.R.I.B.A. who succeeded Miss Blackman as Chairman and to Miss S. N. Brown, B.A., the Hon. Secretary.

Law Group.

The Law Group held a party on June 10th, 1936 when the Trial of Mary Blandy for the murder of her father in 1752 was read from a contemporaneous report out of the Library, forming part of the Cavendish Bentinck gift to the Society, and also from an Irish pirated edition, including extracts from Miss Blandy's own account of the trial and a contemporary report of the events which followed her sentence and her execution. Miss Stoney, chairman of the Group, read extracts from the reports, and Miss Amphlett, the Secretary, explained the changes in procedure which distinguished this trial from a present-day trial on a capital charge. Miss M. H. Pearson, who is an Analytical Chemist, discussed the procedure on the post mortem and scientific evidence given at the trial and compared the tests made with those now available in cases of arsenical poisoning. In the autumn Miss Stoney very kindly undertook to recount the life, crimes, and repentance of Marie-Madeleine d'Aubray, Marquise de Brinvilliers. The history of this infamous criminal was contained in a prologue read in English and followed by a dramatic representation. This imaginary background was utilised for the purposes of bringing to the audience, under an interesting and decorative guise, contemporaneous records extracted from a vast number of authorities. The script was written in French and enacted in the same language and in the costume of the period by Miss Stoney, Mrs. Burton, Miss H. Bachrach, Miss Dora Chamberlain, and Miss Charlotte Bankes. The company was ably assisted by Mrs. Henderson who fulfilled the duties of stage manager, Mrs. Herbert, who acted as assistant producer, and were much indebted to Commissionaire Chilcott for his help with the lighting and musical effects. The Law Group takes the opportunity of expressing their thanks to their Chairman for writing the script and undertaking the production and also to congratulate her on an artistic work of very considerable merit. The Group Committee would also like to thank members of the cast for the time and work they devoted to the production.

Political Group.

In April of last year, a very successful party was given by the Group. Miss Marjorie Graves, who had just returned from Italy, accepted an invitation to be present, and spoke to the members present on foreign affairs, a subject upon which she is an acknowledged authority. The subject chosen for the May meeting was "Parliamentary procedure and custom" and the Group were exceedingly fortunate in securing Captain Sir William Brass, M.P. who explained the many intricacies of our parliamentary system. Sir William again very kindly visited the Group in July and gave a delightful film lecture on "Egypt and the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan." At another meeting in July, Mrs. Grant, lecturer in Spanish at Birmingham University, spoke on "The background and significance of the Spanish conflict." The speaker, who has lived in Spain for several years, gave her audience a vivid insight into the Spanish trouble, and into the social and political incidents which led up to the conflict. Mr. T. S. R. Boase, Fellow of Hertford College, Oxford, accepted an invitation to speak at the December meeting. He chose as his subject "The Political Significance of Christendom in the Modern State." His lecture was extraordinarily interesting and was greatly appreciated. In January this year, Mr. R. B. Martin, who has spent much time in the Near East, took as his subject, "The Problems in the Near East, with special reference to Palestine." The lecture was very much enjoyed by an audience reduced in numbers by the influenza epidemic. Miss Amicia Carroll, who has acted as Chairman throughout the year, has taken infinite trouble to secure speakers, and both she and Miss D. G. Sara, the Hon. Secretary, are to be congratulated on the result of their hard work.

Science Group.

On a Saturday afternoon in May, Mr. C. E. C. Fischer, of the Indian Forest Service, conducted a party of members round Kew Gardens and showed them plants of particular interest in the houses. The party then visited the Imperial Bureau of Mycology where they were entertained to tea by the Curator and staff, one or two of whom were members of the Junior Council. Later in the summer, it was decided

to repeat the previous year's successful visit to Whipsnade. Members were transported by car and a picnic lunch was taken. Special permission was secured for a visit to the Bird Sanctuary, where many beautiful birds of other lands could be observed. In October the Group arranged a meeting at which Dr. Earle spoke on "Some Aspects of Mental Deficiency," and explained the work of the L.C.C. in connection with the care of mental deficients and of backward children, with special reference to the work of the Caterham Mental Hospital. In March the Group, in addition to collaborating with the Executive in arranging a party on "Civil Aviation," had a meeting on another aspect of air activities, "Air Raid Precautions." The meeting was addressed by Wing-Commander Steele-Perkins, who gave a most interesting account of the precautions to be taken against air raids and also explained how each one could do their part in protecting the civilian population in case of raids. The last meeting of the year was on the work of the Lister Institute, when Miss Edgar explained the work done by the Institute in research for the prevention of disease and on nutrition, with special reference to vitamins; the subject was one which is of interest to every one and Miss Edgar succeeded in making it clear to those who were ignorant of that particular aspect of science. We have to thank Miss Theodora Alcock for her able chairmanship during the past year and Miss Gatey, B.Sc., for acting as Hon. Secretary.

Concluding Remarks.

The political work of the Society is so fully set out in the Annual Report presented last November that we do not feel any elaboration is needed here but we should like to put on record that members of the Junior Council Executive Committee and representatives of the Groups have attended meetings of the Public Work Committee regularly and have testified to the great interest felt by them in hearing of the many-sided political problems dealt with by this Committee. During the year the Executive Committees of the Society and the Junior Council have met jointly on several occasions and much discussion has taken place in regard to the internal organisation of the Society, with a view to clarifying the present function of the Junior Council and determining a direction for its future policy.

I should like to close with thanks to our Chairman and Hon. Treasurer for giving up so much of their valuable time to the Junior Council during the past year and to all those honorary officials and members who have helped to make our functions so successful.

JUNIOR COUNCIL ANNUAL MEETING MEMBERS' ROOM, 29th APRIL, 1937, at 8.15 p.m.

Chairman: Irene Shewell Cooper.

I. Appointment of Returning Officer and Tellers.

Moved from the Chair and passed that Miss C. G. Gatey should act as Returning Officer and Mrs. Burton and Miss Hilton should act as Tellers.

II. Appointment of Auditors.

Moved Miss G. Petersen, seconded Miss S. N. Brown and passed that E. Watts & Co. be appointed Hon. Auditors for the ensuing year.

III. Annual Report.

The Annual Report was then read by the Hon. Secretary, Miss K. M. Halpin. Moved Miss K. I. Hancock, seconded Mrs. George Burton and passed "that the Report be adopted, printed and circulated." Miss Hancock also moved a vote of thanks to Miss Halpin for all her work as Hon. Secretary. Carried unanimously.

Miss Strachey asked leave to congratulate the Junior Council on the excellent record of the year's activities, and said she felt specially that it should make very interesting reading for new members.

IV. Treasurer's Report.

The statement of accounts was read by the Hon. Treasurer, Miss M. H. Pearson. Moved Miss G. Petersen, seconded Miss C. G. Gatey that the financial statement be adopted. Carried unanimously.

Miss Pearson informed the meeting that the financial position gives rise to much anxiety and that it is proposed to issue a special appeal for a donation of 5/- by each member, which will free the Junior Council from this burden for three years, if everyone contributes.

V. Resolution. Widows', Orphans' and Old Age Contributory Pensions (Voluntary Contributions) Bill, 1937.

"That the Junior Council of the London & National Society for Women's Service protests against the differential income limit for men (£400) and women (£250) eligible for insurance under this Bill, and calls on the Government to maintain the principle of equality."

In moving this Resolution on behalf of the Executive Committee, Miss Douglas pointed out that this Bill is magnificent in many ways; it will be of great benefit to the "black-coated workers" and will enable numbers of women earning small incomes to put by for their old age. It is, therefore, a matter for great regret that this generous gesture on the part of the Government should be marred by an extraordinary injustice to another section of women, who have just as great a need for benefit as men. By the differentiation in income limit, an enormous section of women will be debarred from taking up these pensions although many of them have exactly the same responsibilities as the men who will benefit. The Resolution was seconded by Miss Hancock and carried unanimously.

VI. Resolution. Factories' Bill.

"That the Junior Council of the London & National Society for Women's Service deplores the continued classification of women with young persons, and special regulations in the Bill with regard to overtime and other matters, as applied to women and not to men."

Mrs. Woodhouse moved this Resolution on behalf of the Executive Committee and put before the meeting the great disadvantage that women in industry labour under if they continue to be classified with young persons and are not given the same advantages as adult men. It would be in the interest of the men as well as women if there were legislation for reasonable hours and reasonable overtime, and there would be no need for special restrictive regulations for women, with the resultant depressing effect on their wages. Mrs. Woodhouse enumerated the clauses in the Bill restrictive to women and it was found that the Government had no grounds in these instances to differentiate between men and women. Miss Lister begged leave to second the Resolution. Before it was put to the vote Miss Hancock

moved an amendment to the effect that the words "Deplores the continued classification of women with young persons" be deleted and that the Resolution would be more effective if it read as follows: "That the Junior Council deplores the special regulations in the Bill with regard to overtime and other matters as applied to women and not to men." The amendment was seconded by Mrs. Burton, put to the vote and carried nem. con., thereby eliminating the original Resolution.

VII. Discussion on proposed formation of students' group.

Miss Halpin, in opening the discussion, said it was hoped by this measure to attract to the Junior Council more young members than are joining at present; for those who belonged to the Junior Council at its inception eleven years ago are no longer very "junior." It had been suggested that there should be an age limit of twenty-five and a subscription of

10/-; no suitable name had been discovered.

Considerable discussion then followed. Miss Fenwick pointed out that London University students are not necessarily very young and also they do not have enough spare time to become interested in such a Society. Miss Petersen suggested that an attempt should be made to draw in, not only students, but articled clerks and girls who were apprenticed to various professions. A general feeling was expressed by the meeting that the younger generation, such as this group was intended for, were not really interested in the work of the Society, but Miss Lister gave instances to the contrary among young friends whom she had brought to parties, such as a part-time student at the Chelsea Polytechnic, a probationer nurse, and a girl apprenticed to a firm at 10/- a week. Miss Strachey said that they had experienced the same difficulties and doubts when recruiting originally for the Junior Council, but that it only meant tapping the right sources. Finally, it was proposed Miss Petersen, seconded Miss Hancock and carried nem. con. "That a group for students should be formed, with a title to be decided later.'

VIII. Election of Executive Committee.

Miss Halpin and Miss Pearson were re-elected as Hon. Secretary and Hon. Treasurer respectively. Seventeen nominations were received for membership to the Executive Committee, a ballot was held and thirteen members were subsequently elected. The result of the Ballot was announced at the end of the meeting.

CONSTITUTION.

I. Title.

The title of the Council shall be "the Junior Council of the London and National Society for Women's Service."

II. Status.

The Junior Council is an organisation working independently within the London and National Society for Women's Service, whose General Meeting governs the policy of the whole Society. There is no obligation upon the Junior Council as a body to work for any one of the activities of the Society.

III. Object.

The Junior Council supports the aim of the London and National Society for Women's Service for equality of citizenship between men and women, and works specially for equal economic opportunities and freedom for women in the pursuit of their work.

IV. Methods.

- 1. The Council holds regular meetings of a social character, with speakers on topics of common interest and collects information on Trainings and Openings for women.
- 2. The Council enables professional and business women to meet each other, and links up students with women already practising or in business.
- 3. The Council provides opportunities for the development of new enterprise.

V. Governing Body.

The governing body of the Junior Council shall be the general meeting of members, which will elect annually by ballot an Executive Committee, an Hon. Secretary, and an Hon. Treasurer to conduct the current business of the Council.

VI. Membership.

1. Subject as hereinafter mentioned:—
The Junior Council shall consist of (a) men and women who have or have had a professional or business qualification; and (b) of students: (i) who

- support its aims; (ii) whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee; and (iii) who have paid the current annual subscription.
- 2. The minimum annual subscription shall be 10/- for all members for five years from the date of joining the Junior Council and shall then be raised to £1. This shall apply only to those members who join on or after 1st January, 1935. Members shall have the right to use the Library, restaurant, and other facilities provided by the Society.
- 3. The Executive Committee shall have the right to terminate any membership without assigning a reason.
- 4. Membership of the Junior Council carries with it membership of the Society.

VII. Officers.

The Officers of the Council shall be the Chairman, the Hon. Secretary, and the Hon. Treasurer.

VIII. Executive Committee.

- 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Junior Council, and not less than nine and not more than twelve other members to be elected by ballor at the Annual Meeting, and shall have power to co-opt not more than five additional members. A member who has served for five consecutive years shall not be eligible for re-election to the Committee until after the lapse of one year. Officers shall be eligible to serve for five years, as such, regardless of previous service as a private member of Committee.
- 2. At the first meeting after election, it shall elect the Chairman for the ensuing year.
- 3. It may from time to time make Bye-laws, and shall have power to fill by co-option any vacancies which may occur during its term of office.
- 4. It shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees for special purposes.
- 5. The Minutes of the Executive Committee of the Junior Council shall be open to the Executive Committee of the Society.

IX. Nominations.

- 1. Any member may be proposed for election or reelection as Honorary Officer or Member of the Committee on the nomination of two members of the Council to whom the candidate is personally known.
- 2. Nominations, with the consent in writing of the candidate nominated, shall reach the Secretary at least fourteen clear days before the Annual Meeting.

X. Meetings.

- 1. An Annual General Meeting of the Council, of which not less than twenty-eight clear days' preliminary notice shall be given to each member, shall be held as soon as convenient after April 1st in each year.
- 2. Special General Meetings of the Council (a) may be called at any time by the Executive Committee either of the Junior Council or of the Society, and (b) shall be called by the Secretary within twenty-eight clear days on the requisition of not less than one-tenth of the members of the Council, of not less than three calendar months' standing. A Special General Meeting shall discuss only such matters as are mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice shall be given of General Meetings to all members.
- 3. Joint meetings of the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society shall be held at the request of either Committee.

XI Resolutions.

Proposed Resolutions to be discussed at the Annual General Meeting with names of proposers and seconders shall reach the Secretary in writing at least fourteen clear days before the meeting, and shall have been published at least seven clear days before that date. Resolutions shall be passed by a majority vote except as hereinafter provided.

XII. Alteration of Constitution.

The Constitution shall not be altered except by resolution passed at a General Meeting of the Council by two-thirds of the members present and voting, provided always that no rule of the Junior Council shall be at variance with the Constitution of the Society as a whole. The nature of the proposed alteration must be stated in the notices calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice given to all members.

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


