Dear Alice Park.

The two parcels went on their way on Tuesday and another will follow as soon as I have sorted all the "bits" out. There will be one "antique," a Women's Rights Meeting in London in 1879, (when I was one year old) it was sent me by a young friend about 10 or 11 years old, Margaret Cross, sister Lydia Cross, whom you will meet in my story, as a farewell gift on my trip to the U.S.A. in 1915. She "colored" it in "the suffrage colors she loved." Then there's Emily Garrison's Funeral. I was under indictment at the time for the Houst Park fire. Then there are a few pages from The Listener, which Elisabeth Green sent me. She was a fine organizer and speaker, came over here in the 20's. She asks "where was I?" I was working with the actresses to the Hyde Park of which you will find details in my story. I wonder if you met Charlie (Charlotte) Marsh when she was with a charity organization in Los Angeles in the 20's. There are quite a few pictures of the raid on Buckingham Palace, all of which ^{will} help ^{to} make a nice Album.

If Mrs Gatty is still out there she will be able
to tell you "who's who".

I came across the enclosed of Mrs
Muller, Frank Morgan's mother in law. Among the
photos when they come, you will find her in a
group of the N.W.P. conference in Washington
in 1921. I was there busy with B.C. so missed
getting into the picture. I used to spend my summer
vacation with her at the "Castle" Grand Canyon.
I am putting in a couple of B.C. cartoons which appeared
while I was in London 1930-31. They may amuse you.
There will ^{be} other adds and ends, just for yourself.

How do you like Edith H.M. in the July Equal Rights?
I am going to send you the copy of the script of my
story, which I sent to Vienna, where one of a group
of ardent feminists translated it into German, and
rewrote it into "fine flowing German", as another
told me. Before they could get it published, Hitler
upset everything and scattered the women.
This copy is very rough and I have only one properly
typed one. Can't think of a title, unless it be
"Resurrection". I must write another chapter on my
W.P.A. speech correction job.

Excuse my finishing on a piece of scrap,
am running short, and this is the last envelope
until I can get to the store, weather and

pain permitting.

I have "dug up" the statue
and given notices on the Unweaving. They were
in another trunk, I am in the crowd
somewhere, near the board speaker.

It's all in the fight, all Suffrage history.

And now, my dear, I must close and get

LEADING EDUCATORS ENDORSE
SCHOOLS' SUPPORT OF RED CROSS
\$50,000,000 WAR FUND CAMPAIGN

Washington, D.C., December 27 -- The Nation's school children are actively sharing in the national war effort through the American Junior Red Cross, James T. Nicholson, national director, reported today in listing ways in which more than 13,000,000 Junior Red Cross members are helping.

Simultaneously Mr. Nicholson announced that leading educators throughout the country have endorsed Junior Red Cross participation in the Red Cross War Fund Campaign to raise a minimum of \$50,000,000.

John W. Studebaker, U.S. Commissioner of Education, led off their endorsements, declaring:

"The American Junior Red Cross makes available to the boys and girls in the schools of the United States a unique opportunity to render valuable service to the Nation in time of crisis. By participating in the War Fund Campaign of the American Red Cross they will help to expand those educationally sound programs of the Junior Red Cross through which they may contribute to the health and safety, the strength and unity of their Nation in this time of war."

Mr. Nicholson said, "Junior Red Cross members throughout the Nation are cooperating with school authorities and Red Cross Disaster Preparedness Committees in planning for the safety and welfare of school children and adults in event of aerial attack. They are assembling recreational equipment for the entertainment of children sheltering from air raids. They are surveying available supplies of food, clothing, shelter, cots, cooking utensils and medical supplies for use in emergency."

Pointing out that Junior members already serve in Red Cross canteens, he said that 11th and 12th graders who hold Red Cross First Aid certificates are forming

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
