I have not examined the applications for my Wisting subscription from the Women: I read G's L. for the reason that I felt the conduct of the Society towards me last year was marked with less than common politeness or business methods. Three times, twice by letters & once by word of mouth to Miss Kellogg I asked for particulars of the case given in your 1900 Report, but received in reply to what was then to me an important question not only my right to vote as a Parochial Elector <sup>at large</sup> in my Parish but also my right to sit as a Poor Law Guardian was then in jeopardy & I was anxious for every scrap of information. Neither from the time when I wrote the paper for your L. to be read in Paris, have I ever heard whether ~~the~~ any thing was done with the paper or not.

Besides which other people <sup>my earnest interest</sup> whom I highly respect - have not received support <sup>from your Society</sup> but been <sup>thoroughly</sup> scrubbed. I am one of the last to take ~~off~~ embrace ~~the~~ public work - but the time has come for me to no longer keep silence - as it
