letter this morning. I shall
 not have time to write much
 as it has been a bustling day.
 Philippa and Miss Wisden have
 just left by the 1.37 train and
 Mrs. Brock leaves tomorrow.
 Yesterday afternoon, whilst
 the guests were out for a walk,
 Mr and Mrs Kuntze called.
 They are leaving tomorrow,
 so I have asked them to dine
 to tea and supper today.
 He is very nice and pleasant
 though without the aroma of
 something indefinable, to
 which we have become ac-
 customed. Mrs K. struck me
 as being narrow, though
 better bred. I should not

have known him again.

I had put down the G. W. dividend, with the Britton Perry amounting together to £10.3. altogether to you, as well as the S. E. as I thought we might as well start with the dividend from the pure leaf year. That would leave me owing you £1.18.3, instead of your owing me £3.3.3. I think I have not paid anything on your account except 1/2 for some black calico at Foundrons, which was bought and not paid for the day before you left. Then there will be leaf of Douglass £1.7 which will make £2.11.9 due to you. I think, when we clear out here in December, I had better leave the Land surveying sheets with your things in the

best room. I will have all your things that are in the house stored up there and the door locked and the key left with Mr Dawson. Those that are in the loft can be left there, and the key with Mr Dawson. I do not think it would be any use your being here at the time of the removal, as all is to be cleared away. I have not seen Mrs Pears again to say anything about the house. I will call towards the end of the week, and bring the subject up. I should be truly glad if she would decide to take it.
