# UNION OF JEWISH WOMEN

## REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30th NOVEMBER, 1937.

The following Report presents a brief outline of the activities of the Union during the past year.

Representation on other organisations brings the Union into contact with the activities of other women's societies working for humanitarian ideals. An attempt is made to keep members informed of what is being done and to foster their interest in national, social and communal affairs by holding meetings at intervals, at which experts are invited to speak on their own subjects.

Co-operation with Jewish and non-Jewish bodies interested in the welfare of girls and women is another means by which the Union is constantly gaining knowledge of the work of other organisations with similar aims and can communicate or adapt such information to the needs of its applicants. It is the special task of the Union to transfer knowledge and experience from the general to the particular.

How much the welfare side of the work has increased may be gauged to some extent by the increased expenditure on relief and loans, although this is not of itself sufficient proof as the work entailed cannot be set out in a bald financial statement. Much of this side of the work is of necessity confidential and it is this knowledge that encourages those who most need help to bring their troubles for sympathetic consideration at the offices of the Union.

**The President** The Committee and members are deeply grateful to Lady Samuel for consenting to serve a further term of two years as President. They feel that Lady Samuel's personality and her great knowledge of affairs are an invaluable asset to the Union.

In common with the whole Jewish community, the Executive Committee were delighted to learn that Sir Herbert Samuel had been created a Viscount, a signal honour awarded in recognition of a life of outstanding public work.

**Mrs. Leopold de Rothschild, C.B.E.** In the passing away of Mrs. Leopold de Rothschild, C.B.E., who had been a Vice-President since its foundation, the Union has lost a friend whose unflinching and practical interest in the work was greatly appreciated.

## In Memoriam

Since this Report went to press, the Union of Jewish Women mourns the passing away of Kate Halford, the Union's first Secretary and, during the intervening thirty-five years, a wise and loyal friend to the Committee and to the members of the Union, whose interest never flagged to the last and whose wide experience and wise councils were always at their service. To many who came to seek help and advice the Union was represented in the personality of Kate Halford and, as correspondent for the Union, her name is known abroad and overseas wherever a group of Jewish women is banded together to form a Union. To all who have known her the news of her death will come as a personal loss and many will join in the sorrow of her colleagues, to whom the thought of Kate Halford and of her services to the Union and to the women of the Jewish Community in England will remain a treasured memory.

**Constitution** The Constitution drawn up at the inception of the Union in 1902, although since amended, has long been ripe for alteration and modification. During the year, a Sub-Committee, appointed by the Executive Committee, revised the Constitution and in this revised form it was approved and passed by the Annual General Meeting on 4th March, 1937, two amendments to the draft which had been circulated being moved and carried.

The chief change made was the abolition of the Council representative of Affiliated Societies. It had been found in practice that certain formal business brought forward at Council Meetings could well be transacted by the Executive Committee, thus avoiding the duplication of Meetings. In consequence of this action, the Affiliation Fee from Affiliated Societies was cancelled, but the Affiliated Societies retain the right to nominate a representative member who shall be or become a subscribing member of the Union.

**Representation on Other Organisations** The Committee wish to express their appreciation of the valuable and devoted service given for twelve years by Mrs. Eichholz as their representative on the Board of Deputies. They are happy to know that, at the special request of the Board, Lady Spielman has consented to continue to represent the Union.

The Committee are glad to report that their representative, Mrs. Alexander Cohen, has been elected as a member of the Executive Committee of the National Council of Women, London Branch, for 1938.

**Meetings** The Annual General Meeting was held on 4th March, 1937, at 14, Holland Park Road, by kind invitation of Mrs. Robert Solomon. After the President had given a brief survey of the work of the past year, the new Constitution was formally adopted. Dame Maria Ogilvie Gordon, D.B.E., LL.D., J.P., followed with a most instructive account of the influence of the cinema, stressing especially that the urgent question of the future was the provision of suitable films for children and advocating more support for British films.

Lady Spielman kindly lent 29, Cambridge Square, on 3rd May, 1937, for a meeting held specially to welcome overseas visitors in London for the Coronation. After the formal

election of Lady Spielman and Mrs. Alan Mocatta to represent the Union on the Board of Deputies, a vigorous address on Jewish Women in Public Life was given by Miss Nettie Adler, C.B.E., J.P., and many questions were put by visitors present.

A second meeting for visitors from the Dominions and Overseas was held in the Rose Hertz Hall on 1st June, 1937, when the late Mr. B. A. Fersht delighted his hearers with a fascinating talk on the treasures of the Jewish Museum, which was afterwards visited under his guidance.

Mr. Frank Renton and Dr. James Parkes spoke on the Jewish Defence Campaign at a meeting held in the Rose Hertz Hall on 18th November, 1937. Mr. Renton gave an account of the steps being taken to combat anti-Semitism, mentioning that amongst other activities over nine hundred open air meetings had been addressed by specially trained voluntary speakers during the last eighteen months. Dr. Parkes spoke of the responsibility resting on Christians for present conditions and told of the efforts being made to create a closer understanding between Jews and Christians.

**Social Gathering** The Hon. Mrs. Franklin generously gave an evening At Home for friends and workers of the Union at 50, Porchester Terrace, on 6th July, 1937. Mrs. Hoster kindly arranged a delightful musical programme, consisting of songs by Mr. Henri Mondy and chamber music by the Nelson Trio. These informal gatherings afford members of the Committee an opportunity of friendly meeting with those who come to the Union for advice or help and enable them to keep in personal contact with those assisted through loans both during and after training.

**Overseas Visitors** The Committee are glad to have had more opportunities than usual, owing to the Coronation, of welcoming overseas visitors to London and to learn of their interests and activities in South Africa, Australia, New Zealand and the United States of America.

**Jewish Women's Luncheon Club.** A Luncheon Club was formed in the autumn under the auspices of the B'nai B'rith, First Women's Lodge of England, the Union of Jewish Women, the Federation of Women Zionists of Great Britain and Ireland and the Women's International Zionist Organisation (Wizo). The object of the Club is to provide a platform for

the discussion of matters of Jewish and general interest and to afford an opportunity for the expression of different points of view. The first Luncheon took place at the Anglo-Palestinian Club on the 25th November, when the Chief Rabbi spoke on "Women and Religion" and about one hundred and twenty members and guests attended. Membership of the Club costs 2/6d. and the luncheons cost 2/6d. per per head.

**Loan Funds** These Funds consist of:

THE UNION OF JEWISH WOMEN'S LOAN FUND  
and THE LOUISA, LADY GOLDSMID FUND.

The Funds are available for loans to enable educated Jewish women and girls to train for professional and other careers. Loans are granted to cover fees, maintenance and expenses incidental to training.

The amount paid during the year in respect of new loans was £361 14s. 2d. and in respect of additional loans £108 13s. 0d., whilst instalments on loans previously promised to five trainees came to £108 3s. 4d., making a total of



£578 10s. 6d. from both Funds. This necessitated the sale of investments to the amount of £200, thus carrying out the policy of the Committee to utilize the Funds to the utmost extent possible.

There are at present thirty-nine loans outstanding, amounting to £1,711 1s. 9d.

Repayments during the year amounted to £248 3s. 6d. Eight loans have been cleared from the books, six being paid off in full and, in respect of the other two cases, £50 has been written off as bad debts in spite of a partial recovery from the guarantors in one instance.

8. Loan of £45 0s. 0d. granted 1935 for Librarianship Diploma.

During the year only three students have finished training, all of whom have found posts although one, a teacher, has had temporarily to take other work than that for which she was trained.

The Committee keep in touch with girls during and after training so that, when necessary, they can give advice or help in obtaining work.

The Committee would like to emphasise again the importance of applications for loans being made some time before the applicants desire to start their training, to ensure, as far as possible, that they are really fitted for the career chosen, that the most suitable course of training is selected and that, when qualified, openings for work will be available.

The Committee are glad to welcome Mrs. Oliver Sebag-Montefiore as a colleague.

**Mrs. Hoster's Scholarship** The Committee wish to thank Mrs. Hoster for her generosity in again awarding a Scholarship for free training at her Secretarial Training College to a student recommended by the Union. Several candidates applied and a student is now in training. The Cambridge graduate to whom the Scholarship was awarded last year has secured a good post and is making full use of her training.

This Scholarship is open to Jewish girls with special qualifications; it does not carry a grant for maintenance but it covers all the College fees and books required. Applications are considered by the Committee until the end of May; the training starts the last week of August and finishes the following April.

**Necessitous Ladies' and Hahn Bequest Fund** The object of this Fund, as its title denotes, is to help gentlewomen in distress. These can be divided into two categories: the elderly and old who, through no fault of their own, have fallen on bad times and will never again be able to maintain themselves, and the middle-aged who are temporarily in need owing to ill-health or unemployment.

The first and by far the larger class have never had to support themselves until they are too old to start or are beyond work. For such as these an income from charitable sources must be found. Assistance in kind, clothing, coal tickets and Passover groceries help to eke out their very slender resources.

The second class usually come in search of work and then it is often found that they have used up all their small savings and have only enough to last perhaps another week. They are almost always reluctant to accept help although it is obvious that many of them have even been going short of food for some time. Sufficient nourishment to build up strength, possibly a holiday and certainly presentable attire are necessary before they can apply for work with any likelihood of success.

The financial position of the Fund has been somewhat improved this year owing to the handing over of the remaining assets of the Union of Jewish Women's Homes Association Ltd. on the winding-up of the Association. These assets consisted of two holdings in the United Women's Homes Association Ltd.: £560 1s. 0d. Debentures bearing interest

at 3½ per cent. and 531 Shares paying no dividend at present, together with a sum of £70. The increase in the annual income however will be under £20.

Amongst the donations received this year, special gratitude is due to the anonymous donor of £103 7s. 6d.; this generous gift partly accounts for the larger balance in the Fund this year.

**Gifts** The Committee wish to record their thanks for gifts in kind from the following sources: The Society for Distributing Bread, Meat and Coal; the Passover Relief Fund of the Jewish Soup Kitchen; the Jewish Ladies' Clothing Association; and Queen Mary's London Needlework Guild. They also wish to express their gratitude to many individual friends for gifts of clothing. There is always a long waiting list for winter coats and warm dresses.

**Helen Lucas Bequest** During the past year, forty-eight ladies have received benefits under the Helen Lucas Bequest, thirty-three having obtained grants for a holiday and fifteen for varied periods of convalescence.

It requires but little imagination to realise that the much needed holiday or a period of rest under fresh surroundings is unobtainable for the poor gentlewoman, whose means are pitifully small.

A feature of the Bequest is that all arrangements for the holiday or convalescent period are left to the initiative of the individual applicant, which enables her to enjoy this benefit at a time and under conditions acceptable to herself.

The usual grant covers the cost of a fortnight's holiday but, in cases of convalescence, amounts are fixed according to circumstances and the recommendation of the doctor.

Applications for grants are considered by a small body of Trustees and are treated confidentially, so that ladies who are reluctant to apply for the ordinary forms of assistance do not hesitate to seek the benefits of the Bequest.

**Employment Bureau** The number of older women applying for work has not decreased; many of these are domesticated and capable but have no special qualifications. A number of vacancies of a domestic nature are notified but these usually involve a certain amount of heavier work, which such women are not fitted to undertake, and suitable openings for them are very difficult to find.

The girls and younger women generally apply because

they have a definite preference for work in one of the communal organisations or because they do not wish to work on the Sabbath. Openings in communal organisations have been filled, but ordinary business posts where work on Saturday is not required are scarce.

The Committee would be grateful if employers would advise them of any openings for older women or of any positions in which work on the Sabbath is not necessary.

**Enquiries** The Union receives a large and increasing number of enquiries on many and varied subjects, not only from individuals at home and abroad but also from communal organisations. It forms a link between Jewesses all over Great Britain and in the Dominions. The services of the Union are available to all seeking information and advice.

**Finance** The Committee are greatly concerned about the financial position. In spite of the strictest economy in the office, the expenditure every year exceeds the income by a considerable sum. In order to raise funds, some function may have to be given but this could be obviated if every member would make an effort to introduce new members. In this way, not only would the finances be put on a stable basis but the work strengthened and extended.

# Union of Jewish Women.

## CONSTITUTION.

---

- I. 1. This Society shall be called "The Union of Jewish Women" hereinafter referred to as "the Union."
2. The Union is established in the interests of the Jewish women and children of the British Empire.

## OBJECTS.

- II. The objects of the Union are:—
- (1) To act as a central organisation for practical co-operation between Jewish women with a view to promoting their social, educational, spiritual and moral welfare and to facilitate the co-ordination of societies and other organisations operating on their behalf.
  - (2) To form a link with similar societies and other organisations of women.
  - (3) To advise girls and women regarding their vocational training and to make loans for this purpose.
  - (4) To provide a bureau of information.
  - (5) To invest and administer funds and special trusts entrusted to the Union for the promotion of any of the above objects.

### MEMBERSHIP.

- III. The Union shall consist of members who shall pay a minimum annual subscription of 5s. and of Affiliated Societies who shall have the right to seek assistance and advice from the Union. Each Affiliated Society shall have the right to nominate a representative who shall be or become a subscribing member of the Union.

### ADMINISTRATION.

- IV. The Union shall be governed and managed by an Executive Committee and its Honorary Officers.

### THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

- V. The Executive Committee shall be elected by the members present at the Annual General Meetings of the Union. The Executive Committee shall consist of not more than twenty members and the Honorary Officers and shall have the power to fill vacancies by co-option until the next Annual General Meeting. If more persons be nominated than there are vacancies the election shall be by ballot. At every Annual General Meeting one-third of the Executive Committee or if their number is not a multiple of three then the number nearest to but not exceeding one-third (consisting of those who have been longest in office since their last election) shall retire but shall be eligible for re-election. As between members of the Committee of equal seniority the members to retire shall in the absence of agreement be elected from among them by ballot. A candidate for election who has not previously been a member of the Executive Committee shall be nominated in writing by two members of the Executive Committee, or by two members of the Union or one member of the Executive Committee and one member of the Union, and such nomination shall be sent to the Secretary not less than ten days before the Annual General Meeting at which the election of such candidate is to be proposed.

- VI. The Executive Committee may from time to time elect a Chairman. The Executive Committee shall meet at intervals and five members shall form a quorum. The Executive Committee shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees and Special Committees and the Honorary Officers of such Committees shall become members of the Executive Committee.

- VII. The Executive Committee shall have power to appoint a Secretary and any other officers of the Union and generally to exercise the powers of the Union and manage and conduct its affairs so far as not otherwise provided for by the Constitution.

### HONORARY OFFICERS.

- VIII. The Honorary Officers shall consist of a President and Treasurer who shall hold office for two years and shall be eligible for re-election. If deemed advisable, the Executive Committee may appoint an Honorary Secretary who shall be an Honorary Officer. A candidate for election as an Honorary Officer who has not previously acted as an Honorary Officer shall be nominated in writing by two members of the Executive Committee and such nomination shall be lodged with the Secretary not less than ten days before the Annual General Meeting at which her election is to be proposed. If more than one person be nominated the election shall be by ballot. The Executive Committee shall have power to fill up any casual vacancy in the body of Honorary Officers until the next Annual General Meeting. Honorary Officers shall be ex-officio members of all Sub-Committees and Special Committees. Honorary Officers shall be entitled to attend and vote at all General Meetings.

### VICE -PRESIDENTS.

- IX. The Executive Committee shall have power to elect Vice-Presidents, who shall be entitled to attend and vote at all General Meetings.

## MEETINGS.

X. (1) A General Meeting of the Union shall be held once in every year and shall be convened on not less than fourteen days' notice. The ordinary business to be transacted at such meetings shall be to receive and consider the Accounts, the Annual Report of the Executive Committee and the Reports of any Committee or Sub-Committee appointed to report to the Annual General Meeting, and to elect officers as hereinbefore provided. All other business shall be deemed to be special business the general nature of which shall be stated on the agenda accompanying the notice convening the meeting.

(2) A member or Affiliated Society can bring forward special business and shall give notice thereof in writing to the Secretary ten days before the date of the meeting, otherwise no special business shall be considered at the Annual General Meeting unless it be deemed a matter of urgency by the members present at such meeting.

XI. The Executive Committee may, when it thinks fit, convene a special meeting of the members of any section thereof, or a General Meeting, or a Conference. Not less than ten days' notice shall be given of any such meeting or conference.

## FINANCIAL YEAR.

XII. The financial year of the Union shall be from the 1st December to the 30th November.

## ALTERATION OF CONSTITUTION.

XIII. This Constitution shall not be altered or amended except by a resolution passed at an Annual General Meeting at which at least thirty members are present in person.
