My dear M.C

You, we received this afternoon. Glad to hear you are better. I have just finished a long letter to Lougman respecting my book and have only a little scrap of time for you, but a little is better than nothing. Mamma & Eliza are out to tea at Mr Greens. Cab home not before $\frac{1}{2}$ past 10 — I am glad to say I am improving though slowly. Rather feeble in the mornings, but do not exert myself

much in the schoolroom,
allowing all things to take a
quiet easy course — All my
Board's bills are fully made out
so far as they can be at this period
and all the headings for the day books
All the Account Books are bound
and many finished — No drawing
to trouble me and all the cards
mounted and cut ready for the
inscriptions, so you see I am
not behind for the last time
I think there will be no painting
in the house except the kitchen
wall, which I hope are already
done. — I have a door for Eliza's
room which I shall pain long
before it goes. My present deter-

mination is to go to Nottingham
for 5 days before the furniture arrives
and complete all the alterations
Mamma & Eliza will remain in York
most likely at Mrs Actons, after
the furniture is put in the Van
and arrive at the cottage on the
day it comes. — Mr Stephens
has engaged a servant for us
for the first of Jan^y 68 — I leave
most of the teaching to Mr Barker
who does exceedingly well and
employ my time in making ar-
rangements for the sale, turning
old boards, rubbish and selecting
what I intend to carry away
Your Royal Ship I shall pack up
with my globe which I shall
warehouse until I have a

place for it - I think it will
be desirable if convenient to
Mr & Mrs Binney for you to
remain where you are until
we get to our new abode. I
do not think Thomey would be
objectionable for a week or two
You might at least name your
invitation there to Mrs Binney
Mamma or Eliza will write
more fully in a few days
about domestic matters

Elizabeth is going to Mrs. Greens
Margaret has gone out this evening
after a place so we have only Tom
our new boy and a large colony of
mice to think about
