As the Annual Meeting of the Council was held in Aberdeen in June, instead of in October as usual, it was not possible for the report for 1930-31 to be presented then: it was accordingly submitted for approval to the Executive Committee.

During the past year the Executive Committee has held ten meetings, with an average attendance of 62 members. The death of Lady Frances Balfour in March has deprived the Committee not only of a former President in 1922 and 1923, but also of one who for very many years has been a familiar and much-loved figure at its meetings: Miss Agnes Hitchcock, who died at her old home in Paignton, was for many years Convener of the Education Committee, while through the death of Dr. Ethel Bentham, M.P. the Committee has lost one of its Honorary Members.

Among the many members of the N.C.W. who have been recipients of distinctions in 1931, mention can here be made only of those who are members of the Executive, namely, the Marchioness of Aberdeen and Temair, who has had the Distinguished Order of Dame Grand Cross of the British Empire conferred upon her: Dr. Jane Walker, who has been made a Companion of Honour: Miss S. E. S. Mair, who has been made a Dame Commander of the British Empire, and Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, the first woman to be made a Member of Honour of the Geological Society of Vienna, news of whose serious illness was received at the last meeting with deep regret.

We are able to record a decided advance in connection with the movement for Women Police, due to the formation of a group of interested Members of Parliament in the House, with Miss Picton-Turbervill as Chairman. This group was formed at a meeting on March 11th, with about 50 Members present. A deputation of Members of Parliament with Miss Tancred as technical adviser waited on the Home Secretary, and on 21st May Miss Picton-Turbervill received a letter from Mr. Clynes, as follows:—

"..... The two questions which you and your colleagues stressed were the appointment of a woman to the Police Council, and the drafting of Regulations so that they may be submitted to the Council under Section 4 of the Police Act, 1919. You will be glad to know that I find myself able to meet you on both these questions.

I have come to the conclusion—and I am sure you will agree—that no better choice could be found for the Council than Miss Peto, and as Lord Byng has consented to her serving, she will be summoned to a meeting which I hope to arrange before very long. I am also arranging for draft regulations to be prepared so that they may be considered by the Council on the same occasion."

The Police Council, promised in the Home Secretary's letter, was held on 14th July, and we now await the Regulations.

On 20th July Miss Picton Turbervill raised the question of women police in the House, on the Appropriation Bill, but on the 28th the Police Council met to consider a reduction in police expenditure. Thus, while two matters for which the N.C.W. has been working for the past eight years have been conceded a woman on the Police Council and the drafting of statutory regulations for women police—the need for women to be on the authorised strength, both in the interests of economy and of security of tenure is greater than ever. Various leaflets on the subject of the need for more women police have been published, and Miss Tancred's tour through Ireland, when she spoke on women police in many of the larger towns, aroused much interest.

The Cinema Sectional Committee, under the Convenership of Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, has undertaken through a special subcommittee, an enquiry into Film Censorship, this question having been referred back to them by the Council at Portsmouth. A questionnaire was sent out to all the licensing authorities, and later in co-operation with the Public Morality Council, these authorities were again circularised and urged to adopt the Model Rules issued by the Home Office, which so far have been adopted by some of them only. The general conclusion reached in the report of the enquiry is that the present voluntary system of film censorship is on the whole preferable to a national board of film censors with statutory powers, but that, in order to secure closer contact between the Board of Film Censors and the public, a Consultative Committee might usefully be established. The Committee is of opinion that it is not only essential to protect children from unwholesome films, but also young people in their impressionable years, and it therefore urges the showing of films with sound dramatic and artistic qualities, which will provide for the whole population a clean cinema. The report of this enquiry may be had from the office, price 3d.

It is interesting to note that the conclusions of the Cinema Committee have since been endorsed by the late Home Secretary, who set up a Consultative Committee to confer with the British Board of Film Censors, though it will probably not function at present. Another sub-committee was formed in connection with the Lancet Commission on Nursing, which was endeavouring to ascertain the reasons for +he inadequate supply of trained nurses.

In the memorandum which this Committee submitted to the Commission, they dealt from the point of view of the general lay public with deterrents to recruitment, professional drawbacks and suggested remedies, and in acknowledging its receipt, the Secretary to the Commission wrote appreciatively of the value of such a Memorandum. Evidence was also given before the Commission in support of the memorandum by Mrs. Keynes, Lady Nunburnholme, and others.

The Household Service League, which has now a membership of 215, held a well attended meeting in Murray House on 24th November, 1930, when Lady Cynthia Colville and Miss Violet Markham were among the speakers. This Committee forwarded answers to the questionnaire on domestic service issued by the Labour Party, and has itself drawn up a scheme of training for housewives which is arousing considerable interest. Its leaflet on Law and Custom regulating Domestic Service has now been issued in a revised and enlarged edition.

The Parliamentary Committee has watched with interest the progress of the numerous **Bills before Parliament**, including the Wills and Intestacies Bill introduced by Miss Rathbone. The underlying principle of this Bill was approved by the N.C.W., and though it failed to reach the Statute Book, it has secured from the Joint Select Committee an acknowledgment of the need for legislation on the subject.

The Sentence of Death (Expectant Mothers) Bill, introduced by Miss Picton-Turbervill, was finally adopted as a Government measure, as urged by the N.C.W., and passed: the Nationality of Married Women Bill (which the Pass the Bill Committee formerly a Committee of the N.C.W.—exists to support) was left by Dr. Ethel Bentham's sudden death without a promoter. Progress has, however, been made internationally in this connection, since before submitting a report on the question to the Assembly of the League of Nations, the Secretary General has been in consultation with nine of the Women's International Societies, including the International Council of Women. This is the first time that Women's International Organisations have been officially asked to report, and it is therefore a great step in advance.

At the meeting held in September, in view of the National Crisis, the following resolution was passed:—

That in this time of National Crisis, the National Council of Women urges its members to be prepared to render volun-

tary service, to supplement the Social Services in cases where the latter are in danger of suffering from reduced grants or where fresh needs arise; and further, when compelled to reduce personal expenditure, to consider ways and means of so doing that will affect the employment of others as little as possible.

The Committee for Arts and Letters has had a series of interesting talks on period costumes, when Elizabethan, Georgian and early Victorian costumes have been exhibited on living models. These proved so interesting that it has been arranged to afford an opportunity for them to be seen by a larger audience in November, when Lady Emmott has kindly offered to lend her drawing room for the purpose.

The Moral Welfare Committee, under the Convenership of Marjorie Lady Nunburnholme, has had under discussion the guestion of the repatriation of prostitutes, but while desirous that the 1904 International Agreement for the Suppression of Traffic in Women should be made fully effective, it was not prepared to support the proposals for their compulsory repatriation. Very informative addresses have been given to this Committee by Dr. Hadfield on the Criminal in the Making, and Dr. Hamblin Smith on the Treatment of Offenders from the Prison Medical Officers' point of view.

Among the matters considered by the Public Service and Magistrates Committee (which during the past year has added 17 members to its roll, and now numbers 417) is the need for more women to serve on juries. A sub-committee has been appointed to consider the best methods of securing additional women on the Jury Register, and may possibly draft a Bill, with which Sir John Withers, M.P., has kindly promised his assistance. A useful leaflet on the need for more women Jurors has been published. Points in connection with the Adminis tration of Public Assistance have also been considered, with a view to possible action at a later date. These include various difficulties experienced in the working of the new Committees: the non-representation of villages where the area has been enlarged, the dual control of staffs in institutes, and the fact that co-option to the Committee is optional. An enquiry has been made into the openings for women in the Colonial Civil Service, in which connection an interesting fact has emerged. In the reply received from-Lord-Passfield, it is stated that in 1929 only 16 posts were filled by competitive examination, as compared with 550 appointments made by the Secretary of State and 647 by the Crown Agents. The new arrangement whereby the Women Citizens Associa -

tions now rank as a Section of the N.C.W. has worked smoothly, alternate meetings of the Committee and of the full Section having been held monthly under the chairmanship of Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon. An organiser appointed by the Committee has spent a month in helpful visits to the various local Associations.

The Committee for the Humane Treatment of Animals has watched with interest the various Parliamentary measures affecting the welfare of animals, and through the Branches has been able to induce many Members of Parliament to support the Bill for Humane Slaughter. It might have been hoped that through pressure of public opinion, the Government had been induced to adopt this Bill and pass it into law in the autumn.

The Temperance Committee has had printed in leaflet form a most informative address given by Mrs. Lloyd on Home Made Wines, which has commanded a wide sale. In addition permission has recently been given for it to be re-printed in three magazines. At the request of the Committee a protest against the introduction of the sale of intoxicants into the Royal Parks was sent to the Government.

On the recommendation of the Industrial Committee, the Executive welcomed the proposal to set up a Trade Board for the Catering Trade, and urged the payment of the same minimum rates under the same conditions to adult male and female workers.

On the question of Maternal Mortality, after two joint meetings of the Public Health and Insurance Committees, the Executive Committee decided to urge the universities and boards of examiners to consider the recommendations made in the interim report for the training of doctors in obstetrics, and to ask the Central Midwives Board whether immediate steps could not be taken to carry out the recommendations with regard to the midwife and her training. The Executive Committee further urged the Board to spread more knowledge among women of the facilities for maternity services available in their districts.

At the meetings of the British Colonies Committee, many interesting addresses have been given, including those by Lady Clementi on Social Work in Malaya, Lady Allardyce on Life in Newfoundland, Mrs. Bentwich on Work in Palestine, and a summary by Mrs. Patrick Ness, the Convener, of reports received on social and medical work for women in Nigeria. The Committee is glad to be kept in touch with the East Africa Women's League through the appointment of Lady Eleanor Cole as its representative.

The urgent problem of Disarmament has been the subject of three addresses to joint meetings of the Peace and International Committees, and an urgency resolution on the subject was carried at the Council meeting.

Many of the above addresses, together with others given to our Public Health Committee by Mr. Bishop Harman on the Causes of Blindness in Children and by Dr. Bernard Schlesinger on Rheumatism in Children, and to our International and Peace Committee by Sir Albion Banerji on the Round Table Conference and the Future of India, etc., etc., have appeared in WOMEN IN COUNCIL, our official organ, and make it exceedingly good value for the small sum of 2/6d. per annum. It is therefore a disappointment to have to report that, in spite of this fact, the orders which we have received show a slight decrease on last year. Miss Clara Smith continues to edit the paper, which has been brought out in a rather larger size and with a more attractive cover.

The International Council of Women is now established in its new offices, and cordially invites members to visit them at 49, rue St. Georges, Paris. A sub-committee to consider the revision of the I.C.W. Constitution has been appointed to which we have submitted various suggestion. During the past year we have added seven triennial contributors to the I.C.W. to our list.

The Regional Committees of the Branches (formerly Standing Committees) have been re-grouped and the rules drafted last year at Portsmouth have been approved by the Executive Committee. Lady Clarendon's keen interest in the work of the Regional Committees is gratefully remembered, and she has been elected an Hon. Vice-President, while the N.C.W. of S. Africa were among the first to welcome her and Lord Clarendon on their arrival at the Cape. Lady Nunburnholme, and Mrs. Nowell Watkins as Hon. Secretary, have given active help in getting the Regional Committees established on a firm footing, and Mrs. Nowell Watkins has represented them on the Executive.

We are glad to report some increase on last year both in Branch membership and in the number of Societies affiliated to the Branches. It is hoped that the concession, whereby in the case of a newly formed Branch the f_5 fee to Headquarters will not become payable until the third year of its existence, may simplify the financial problem for the new Branches which it is believed will result from regional activity. Several are in contemplation, and as a beginning a new Branch has already been formed in Scarborough, and a sub-Branch at Huntingdon, while the Branch in Newcastle and District has been re-established. Other Branches are showing increased interest and vitality, and the outlook for the future is full of encouragement.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME AND PREAMBLE.

I. This Council shall be called "The National Council of Women of Great Britain."

2. This Council is established in the interests of no one particular social, political or religious organisation. It has no power over the organisations which enter into affiliation with it.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS.

1. To promote sympathy of thought and purpose among the women of Great Britain.

2. To promote the social, civil, moral and religious welfare of the community.

3. To co-ordinate, both nationally and locally, organisations in harmony with these purposes.

4. To promote such conditions of life as will assure to every child an opportunity for full and free development.

5. To work for the removal of all disabilities of women, whether legal, economic or social.

6. To collect and re-distribute information of service to the community.

7. To form a link with the National Councils of Women in other countries through the International Council of Women.

ARTICLE III.

METHODS OF WORK.

The methods of work shall include:---

I. Forming Branches. (See Article IV.).

2. Affiliating all organisations whose work is in harmony with the objects of the National Council. (See Article IV).

3. Forming standing Sectional Committees, and Special Committees as may be required. (See Articles XVII and XVIII.).

4. Convening conferences and meetings and conducting enquiries.

5. Submitting to the Government and to Parliament recommendations for the amendment of the law and its administration.

6. Representing the need for national and local reforms to the proper authorities.

ARTICLE IV.

MEMBERSHIP.

The members shall be women who are:----

- (1) Members of the Branches.
- (2) Members of the Affiliated Societies.
- (3) Associate Members of the National Council.

(I) BRANCHES.

(a) The Branches consist of affiliated local societies and organisations and of individual members. They promote the work and objects of the National Council as local circumstances enable them to do.

(b) Branches shall pay an annual subscription to Headquarters of ± 5 and 25 per cent. of their ordinary membership subscriptions. The ± 5 shall not be compulsory until the third year after the formation of the Branch and the Central Executive Committee shall have power to remit the payment of ± 5 should the circumstances of a Branch require special consideration at any time.

Those Branches of the National Council of Women which have not paid their annual fee of f_5 for two years shall have their representation on the Representative Council reduced, and notice of this shall be given at the close of the first year.

(2) AFFILIATED SOCIETIES.

Affiliated Societies are societies nationally organised or of national importance which are affiliated directly to the National Council. They shall subscribe at least f_{I} is annually to the central funds, and not less than 5/- for each representative to which they are entitled on the Representative to which they are entitled on the Representative Council.

(3) ASSOCIATE MEMBERS.

The Associate Members of the National Council are women who subscribe not less than 5/- annually to the Central Funds.

ARTICLE V.

THE FINANCIAL YEAR.

The Financial year of the National Council of Women shall date from 1st September to 31st August.

ARTICLE VI.

THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. The Governing Body of the National Council of Women shall be called the Representative Council.

2. The Representative Council shall consist of:-

(a) The Honorary Officers.

(b) The Executive Committee. (Article XII., 3).

(c) Representatives of the Branches. (Article XII., I).

(d) Representatives of the Affiliated Societies. (Article XII., 2).

(e) Representatives of the Sectional Committees. (Article XII., 4).

ARTICLE VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

I. The Executive Committee shall carry out the policy and transact the business of the Council.

2. The Executive Committee shall consist of:-

(a) The President, Past Presidents (see Article X.), and Honorary Officers.

(b) Twenty-four members nominated by members of the Representative Council and elected by ballot by a postal vote, on the system of proportional representation, the result to be announced at the annual meeting; of these twenty-four at least four shall be resident in Scotland and two in Wales. These members shall remain in office for two years; twelve shall retire annually, but be eligible for re-election, provided that they shall have attended at least two meetings in each year.

(c) One member elected by each Branch having a direct membership of 100 and over, and one member elected by each Regional Committee of the Branches.

A proxy may be elected by the Branch, to hold office for the same period as the elected representative, with power to attend and vote on receiving notification from the representative of her unavoidable absence.

(d) Sixteen members nominated by the Affiliated Societies, and elected by ballot by the Affiliated Societies, by a postal vote, on the system of proportional representation, the result to be announced at the Annual Meeting. Members remain in office for one year and are eligible for re-election, provided they have attended at least two meetings in the year.

(e) The Conveners, and the Hon. Secretaries who have held office for not less than one year, of the Sectional and Special Committees, *ex-officio*.

(f) Two members co-opted to represent the local Committee of the place where the Annual Council Meeting is to be held.

(g) Women members of Parliament who, during their tenure of office, may be elected as Honorary Members of Executive, with power to vote.

3. The new Executive Committee shall come into office at the conclusion of the session of the Council at which it is elected.

ARTICLE VIII.

SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Sectional Committees shall be set up to further special branches of work, either by the Executive Committee, or at the request of six affiliated Societies if this be agreed to by the Executive Committee. They shall hold office for one year until their re-appointment by the new Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IX.

HONORARY OFFICERS.

I. The Honorary Officers of the National Council shall be a President an Acting Vice-President, a Treasurer, and a Parliamentary Secretary; they shall be elected by ballot by the Representative Council, and shall retire annually but be eligible for re-election.

2. The President, Acting Vice-President, Hon. Treasurer, and Hon. Parliamentary Secretary, shall be *ex-officio* members of all Sectional and other Committees.

3. The President shall preside over the meetings of the Representative Council and the Executive Committee. Should she be unable to attend, the Acting Vice-President shall take her place.

4. The Acting Vice-President shall act on behalf of the President whenever necessary.

5. The Hon. Treasurer, in co-operation with the Finance Committee, shall organise the collection and supervise the expenditure of the funds, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

6. The Hon. Parliamentary Secretary, in co-operation with the Legislation Committee, shall conduct the parliamentary business. She shall not act in a similar capacity for any other organisation.

ARTICLE X.

VICE-PRESIDENTS.

Past Presidents shall be Vice-Presidents, and shall serve as *ex-officio* members of the Executive Committee, provided they shall have attended at least two meetings during the year preceding their term of office.

The founders of the National Union of Women Workers, the President and ex-Presidents of the International Council of Women, and any other women elected by the Representative Council, shall be honorary Vice-Presidents. These Vice-Presidents must be members of the National Council of Women at the time of their appointment.

ARTICLE XI.

MEETINGS.

(I) THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

(a) The Representative Council shall hold an Annual Meeting to receive reports, transact business, and elect the Executive Committee at a time and place to be arranged by the Executive Committee.

(b) A Special Meeting of the Representative Council may be sum-

moned by the Executive Committee, and shall be summoned by the President on the requisition of eight Branches and eight Affiliated Societies. (c) One-third of the members of the Representative Council shall form

a quorum.

(2) THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

(a) The Executive Committee shall meet monthly except in August and December. Additional meetings may be summoned by the President.(b) Twenty-one shall form a quorum.

(3) SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

(a) The Sectional Committees shall meet at least four times a year, before the meetings of the Executive Committee.

(b) Each Committee shall fix its own quorum, which shall be not less than seven.

ARTICLE XII.

BASIS OF REPRESENTATION UPON THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. Branches shall be represented in the proportion of one representative for every five of their local affiliated Societies, and of one representative for the first twenty-five and one representative for every succeeding fifty of their subscribing members.

2. Affiliated Societies shall be represented in proportion to their national importance and membership. Each Affiliated Society is entitled to one representative on the Representative Council, but this number may be increased at the discretion of the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the Representative Council. No Society shall have more than ten representatives.

3. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex-officio* members of the Representative Council.

4. Sectional and Special Committees shall each be represented by two of their members, who shall be subscribing members of the National Council.

The period for which representatives are appointed shall be from one Annual Council Meeting to the next. In the event of any of the representatives resigning during the year, the societies may appoint others in their place, but no representatives can be accepted unless their appointment is notified to the Secretary of the Council not less than a fortnight before the meeting of the Representative Council.

ARTICLE XIII.

RESOLUTIONS.

1. Resolutions for the Representative Council shall be sent to the Secretary at a date to be fixed by the Executive Committee. A Branch or Society shall not send in more than one resolution. In order to be circulated a resolution must have obtained the support of two Branches and of two Affiliated Societies.

2. The Executive Committee shall have power to place resolutions upon the agenda.

3. Each Branch, each Affiliated Society, the Executive, and the Sectional Committees shall select from the resolutions circulated the twelve they prefer, and shall notify the twelve resolutions thus chosen to the General Secretary of the N.C.W.

The twelve resolutions receiving the highest total number of votes from Branches, Societies and Committees shall be printed on the Preliminary Agenda Paper.

4. Each Member of the Representative Council, Secretary of a Branch,

Affiliated Society or Sectional Committee shall receive, not less than five weeks before a meeting of the Representative Council, a copy of the Preliminary Agenda, provided that in the case of Special Meetings the Executive Committee, if there is urgency, may reduce the notice to not less than ten days.

5. A Branch or Affiliated Society desiring to place in its name on the final Council Agenda any amendment to the resolutions, shall send a copy of such amendment to the Secretary in time to be received by her not less than four weeks before the Council Meeting. All such amendments shall be placed on the Council's Agenda. The Executive Committee shall have power to place amendments on the Council's agenda.

6. The Final Agenda shall be circulated to each member of the Representative Council, Secretary of a Branch or Affiliated Society, not less than fourteen days before the meeting of the Representative Council.

7. Urgency business must be sanctioned by the Executive Committee and must have the support of two-thirds of the members present at the Committee Meeting and voting. "Urgency" is interpreted as implying some important matter which has arisen since the date by which resolutions for the Council's agenda had to be received at the office, and which could not therefore have been dealt with in the ordinary way.

8. No matter shall be discussed at any meeting of the Representative Council which has not been included upon the agenda, unless specially sanctioned as urgency business.

9. A resolution or any amendment to a resolution, to be carried by the Representative Council, must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.

10. Resolutions passed by the Representative Council shall decide the policy of the Council until reversed or modified at a further meeting of the Council. Any members of Council shall have the right to require that the voting strength for and against be appended to the resolutions for all purposes of publication and use, e.g., in the public press and in communications to public departments and authorities.

11. Branches and Affiliated Societies shall not be considered responsible for the opinions of the Representative Council as expressed by resolutions, unless and until they have themselves affirmed the resolution passed by the Council at a meeting. When resolutions passed by the Representative Council are published, a statement of the non-participation of any Society may be inserted.

ARTICLE XIV.

NOMINATIONS.

I. Members of the Representative Council have the right to nominate candidates for election to the Executive Committee. Nomination forms, giving the attendances of the Executive Committee members, during the past year, shall be sent to the Secretaries of Branches, Affiliated Societies and Sectional Committees, and to the Members of the Executive Committee two months before the Annual Meeting, and shall be returned to the Secretary within three weeks of their receipt. The consent of those nominated shall be first obtained by the nominator, and no one shall be eligible who has not been a subscribing member of the National Council of Women for at least one year.

2. The Secretary shall forward to each member of the Representative Council and to each Secretary of a Branch, Affiliated Society, or Sectional Committee for their information, one month prior to the Annual Meeting, a complete list of the names and addresses of all nominees for election to the Executive Committee, with the names of three nominators in the case of new nominees.

3. The election shall be by ballot by a postal vote on the system of Proportional Representation, the result to be announced at the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE XV.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. The meetings of the Representative Council shall open each day with silent prayer.

2. The Representative Council shall not transact business unless onethird of the members of the Representative Council are present.

3. Members of the Representative Council and Secretaries of Branches, Affiliated Societies and Sectional Committees shall receive notices, agenda and all papers relating to the business of the Representative Council.

4. Meetings of the Representative Council shall be open to the press unless the Council shall otherwise resolve. Copies of the resolutions carried at meetings of the Representative Council shall be sent to the press at the earliest possible moment after their receipt by the authorities to whom they are ordered to be sent.

5. Members desiring to speak shall send up their names, speak from the platform, and address the Chair. Short questions may be asked or points of order raised from the body of the meeting.

6. The ruling of the Chair, on a point of order, on the advisability of a personal explanation, or on the time limit, shall be final and shall not be open to discussion.

7. Amendments to resolutions may be moved at the meeting, provided that they do not determine questions outside the subject matter of the resolutions and that they arise out of the discussions at the Council and could not therefore have been previously circulated to the Branches, as specified in Sections 4, 5, and 7 of Article XIII.

8. An amendment may be moved :---

(I) To leave out words.

(2) To leave out words and substitute or add others.

(3) To insert or add words.

9. Every amendment shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chair.

10. No member shall, without permission from the Chair, address the Council more than once on any resolution or amendment; the mover of an original motion may, however, reply, but she shall confine herself to answering the previous speakers and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. After the reply, the question shall be put forthwith. The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment which, having been carried, has become the substantive resolution.

11. Any member desiring that discussion of a subject shall cease shall move: 'That the question be now put.' This shall be seconded without discussion and put to the meeting by the Chairman. If carried the resolution under discussion will then immediately be put to the meeting.

12. Any member, whether she has spoken on the matter or not, may rise to a point of order, to ask a question, or in explanation; such explanation shall be confined to some material part of her former speech, which may have been misunderstood. A member so rising shall be entitled to be heard forthwith.

13. Any member of the Representative Council shall have power to move at the Council Meeting that the order of the resolutions be altered.

14. A resolution or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the seconder and of the meeting, which shall be signified without debate; and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal unless such permission shall have been refused. 15. A member who has formally seconded an amendment can speak to it at a later stage.

16. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of, but any speaker to the amendment may give notice of a further amendment which she will move when the other shall have been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall become the substantive resolution, upon which any further amendment shall be moved.

17. A resolution or any amendment to a resolution to be carried by the Representative Council must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.

18. The vote shall in the first place be taken by a show of voting cards or by members standing. A minority may demand a count and tellers shall be appointed at the meeting for the purpose.

ARTICLE XVI.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The meetings of the Executive Committee shall open with silent prayer.

2. The Chairman shall not vote as a member of the Executive Committee but shall have a casting vote.

3. Minutes of the proceedings of every meeting shall be taken by the Secretary.

4. Members when speaking shall address the Chair.

5. The ruling of the Chair on a point of order, or on the advisability of a personal explanation, shall be final.

6. A resolution or amendment moved at the meeting shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chair.

7. A resolution or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the seconder and of the meeting, which shall be signified without debate; and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.

8. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of, but any speaker to the amendment may give notice of a further amendment which she will move when the other has been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall become the substantive resolution, upon which any further amendment shall be moved.

9. A member wishing to have a subject placed upon the agenda must give at least 18 days' notice to the Secretary.

10. The Executive Committee shall arrange for meetings of the Representative Council. The Committee may arrange for submitting to the Council any urgency business or resolution, provided that two-thirds of the members of the Executive Committee present and voting support the motion that such business or resolution is urgent.

11. Notices of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be forwarded to the Hon. Secretaries of the Sectional and other Committees, who have the right to attend the meetings and to speak, but not to vote.

12. A resolution agreed to by the Executive Committee shall not be rescinded or altered by them, unless some member of the Executive Committee shall have given notice to the Secretary 18 days before the meeting of the Executive Committee of a motion to rescind or alter such resolution, which notice shall be forthwith entered on the agenda by the Secretary.

13. In taking public action with regard to subjects upon which the Representative Council has not defined its policy and upon which opinion

is strongly divided, the Executive Committee shall only take action if notice of the proposal has been placed upon the agenda, which shall be circulated a fortnight before the meeting, and if such action has been approved by two-thirds of the members present and voting. Provided that in dealing with resolutions which Sectional Committees desire to bring before the Executive Committee, notice of the subjects of the proposed resolutions shall, if possible, be given in a supplementary agenda to be issued to members with the ordinary agenda. Copies in type, giving the actual wording of the proposed resolutions shall also be given to each member of the Executive Committee at the meeting.

14. A resolution for the suspension of the Standing Orders shall require a two-thirds majority of those present and voting.

15. These Standing Orders can only be amended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a meeting of the Executive Committee, if notice of such amendment has appeared on the circulated agenda.

16. The Executive may make bye-laws for its own guidance.

ARTICLE XVII.

CONSTITUTION OF SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Sectional Committees shall be set up to further special branches of work, either at the decision of the Executive Committee or when requested by six Affiliated Societies and agreed to by the Executive Committee. They shall hold office for one year until their reappointment by the new Executive Committee.

In the formation of a new Sectional Committee the Executive Committee shall appoint its provisional convener.

1. Constitution. Each Sectional Committee shall consist of :-

(a) One representative from each nationally organised society affiliated or not affiliated to the National Council of Women, which by reason of its objects is concerned with the subject with which the Sectional Committee deals. The Executive Committee shall be arbiter as to which societies are eligible for this representation and shall decide the degree of representation, having regard to the national importance of the societies concerned.

(b) One representative from each Branch and Standing Committee of the National Council of Women.

(c) One representative from each of such Sectional Committees as desire representation.

(d) The honorary officers of the National Council of Women, in addition to the Convener of the Sectional Committee.

(e) Not more than eight members co-opted by the Committee, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

NOTE.-The Public Service and Magistrates Sectional Committee shall in addition consist of women engaged in public work elected by the Committee.

The International Sectional Committee shall in addition consist of the representatives of the British National Council upon the Standing Committees of the International Council of Women.

2. Public Action. A Sectional Committee may take public action in its own name if it has obtained the consent of the Executive Committee. In cases of urgency, where the Sectional Committee has the support of twothirds of the members present and voting upon a motion of which notice has been given, it may take public action if it has obtained the consent of the President.

ARTICLE XVIII.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Special Committees shall be set up by the Executive Committee as required.

ARTICLE XIX.

The Executive Committee is empowered to give indemnity to any member or members in respect of any act done or liability assumed on behalf of the National Council of Women of Great Britam.

ARTICLE XX.

ALTERATION OF THE CONSTITUTION.

This constitution shall only be altered at the Annual Meeting of the Representative Council by an amendment to be carried by two-thirds of the members present and voting. Notice of any proposed alteration shall be sent in writing to the Executive Committee at such date previous to the Council Meeting as may be determined by the Executive Committee, and shall be printed and circulated to the members of the Representative Council.

STANDING ORDERS

FOR SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Reappointment of Sectional Committees .-- The members of each Sectional Committee shall be eligible for reappointment by the new Executive Committee. Nominations for each Committee must be sent to its Hon. Secretary.

The Hon. Secretary of the Committee shall forward to the Secretary of the N.C.W. a complete list of the names and addresses of the members standing for re-election and of the new nominees for submission to the new Executive Committee at its first Meeting.

Election of Officers .- Each Sectional Committee shall elect its Convener from among its own members; she shall act as Chairman and shall represent the Committee on the Executive.

A Convener who has not attended at least two meetings during the year shall be disqualified for nomination for the ensuing year.

Nominations for the Convener, whose consent to stand must first have been obtained by the nominator, shall be sent to the Hon. Secretary of the Committee not less than fourteen days before the Meeting of the Committee which immediately precedes the 21st May, or the posting of the nomination papers for the election of the Executive Committee. The Hon. Secretary shall place the names of the nominees upon the agenda paper, which shall be sent out to the members of the Committee. In the event of there being more than one nominee, the election shall be by ballot.

Each Sectional Committee shall at the same meeting appoint its own Hon. Secretary and other officers, who shall be subscribers to the funds of the N.C.W.

Each Sectional Committee may, at the discretion of the Convener, invite the attendance of experts on any given subject, and of visitors.

Meeting .- Each Sectional Committee shall, if possible, meet four times a year. The Hon. Secretary shall give at least seven days' notice of the Meetings, specifying the business to be transacted thereat.

The Convener and Hon. Secretary of each Sectional Committee shall have power, when necessary, to summon an Urgency Meeting. They shall state the business for which such a meeting is called, and no other business shall be considered at that meeting except by leave of the Committee given by a two-thirds majority.

Procedure.-Each Sectional Committee shall determine its method of procedure and fix its own quorum, which shall not be less than seven.

The Hon. Secretary of each Sectional Committee shall keep the minutes of the meetings.

A Sectional Committee desiring to form a special sub-committee shall obtain the consent of the Executive Committee.

Reports .- Each Sectional Committee shall present a Report of its proceedings to the Executive Committee. A copy of this Report shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the N.C.W. and filed at the office.

Each Sectional Committee shall present an Annual Report to the National Council of Women before the Annual Meeting. A copy of this report shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the N.C.W. for publication. The reception of such report shall not pledge the National Council to support any policy which may be advocated therein.

Connection with Branches .- A Sectional Committee shall not ask any Branch to take action in regard to any legislative measure without the consent of the Executive Committee.

In communicating with Branches, the Committee shall clearly state that such communication is sent by the Sectional Committee, and not by the Executive Committee.

Representation of Sectional Committees .- Each Sectional Committee shall appoint two representatives, who are subscribers to the Central Fund, to serve upon the Representative Council of Women.

The Convener of each Sectional Committee and the Hon. Secretary, after having served for one year, are ex-officio Members of the Executive Committee.

Ex-officio Members shall not stand for election to the Executive Committee.

Each Sectional Committee shall appoint a representative to serve upon the Finance Committee of the N.C.W.

Finance.-The ordinary expenses of each Sectional Committee, i.e., postage, stationery, and any necessary printing, shall be defrayed out of the funds of the National Council of Women— ± 5 being the maximum sum per annum which can be expended. The Hon. Secretary of the Committee shall forward her statement of accounts to the Office quarterly.

BRANCHES, THEIR POWERS AND DUTIES.

I. Branches are composed of representatives of local Societies and organisations, the work of which is in harmony with the objects of the Council, and of individual subscribing members. They carry out the work of the Council in their own locality. Each Branch elects its own President. Secretary and other officers.

2. Branches formulate their own rules, but must be prepared to assist the work and objects of the N.C.W. as local circumstances enable them to do.

3. Branches shall pay an annual subscription to the Central Fund of £5 and 25 per cent. of their ordinary membership subscriptions collected from individuals and societies.

4. Branches of 100 members and upwards, among whom shall be representatives of the various activities and organisations in the locality. shall have the right to elect their President, Secretary, or other member of their Committee, to serve on the Executive Committee of the N.C.W.

A proxy may be elected by the Branch, to hold office for the same period as the elected representative, with power to attend the Executive Committee and vote on receiving notification from the representative of her unavoidable absence.

5. Branches shall have the right to appoint a representative to serve on each Sectional Committee, such appointment to be made in the month of November. In the event of the representative being unable to attend, a proxy may be appointed to attend in her place.

6. Branches shall be represented upon the Representative Council in the proportion of one for every five of their local Societies, and one for the first twenty-five and one for every succeeding fifty of their subscribing members. Should a member elected to serve on the Council resign during the year another may be elected in her place, but no representative shall be accepted unless her appointment has been notified to the Secretary of the National Council at least a fortnight before the Council Meeting.

7. A Branch may send in to the Executive Committee one resolution for the Representative Council. Such resolution must be supported by one other Branch and by two Affiliated Societies, and shall be circulated to the Branches, Societies and Committees and the twelve resolutions receiving the highest number of votes shall be placed on the agenda.

8. Branches shall not be considered responsible for the opinion of the Council as expressed by resolutions, unless and until they have themselve. affirmed the resolution passed by the Council at a meeting of the Branchs

9. A Branch shall not approach a Government Department on any controversial matter upon which the Representative Council has not defined its policy, without first obtaining the consent of the Executive Committee.

10. Branches shall be notified through their Secretaries of all Meetings of the Representative Council.

II. Branches shall send short reports of their work for insertion in the "N.C.W. News" from time to time, and their annual report to the General Secretary of the N.C.W. when issued.

N.B.—Members wishing to form a Branch are asked to communicate in the first instance with the General Secretary of the N.C.W.

REGIONAL COMMITTEES OF THE BRANCHES

(formerly "Standing Committees.")

Objects.-To promote solidarity by keeping Branches in close touch with each other and with the work at Headquarters.

To survey areas, and endeavour to form and strengthen the Branches, and thus to further the work of the National Council of Women.

Constitution of Regional Committees.—Each Regional Committee shall consist of three voting members, one of whom shall be an Hon. Officer of the Branch, to represent each Branch in the area.

Proxies, with power to vote, shall be appointed, who shall attend in the event of the unavoidable absence of any of the representatives.

The representatives shall hold office for one year and shall be eligible for re-election by their respective Branches.

Members of the Headquarters Executive, elected at the Annual Meeting of the Council, who live in the area of a Regional Committee, shall be ex-officio members of that Committee.

Each Regional Committee shall at its Annual Meeting elect a Convener and an Hon. Secretary. These officers shall be appointed in addition to the Branch Representatives.

Each Regional Committee shall have the right to elect a member to represent it on the Headquarters Executive Committee. Such representative shall hold office for one year, but be eligible for re-election.

The Hon. Secretary for Regional Committees shall be ex-officio a member of all Regional Committees.

No Branch shall be closed down before it has communicated with its Regional Committee, which shall notify Headquarters.

Meetings of Regional Committees .- Each Regional Committee shall hold at least two meetings during the year. Special Meetings of the Regional Committee may be called by the

Convener or at the request of two of the Branches forming the Committee.

The Minutes of each Regional Committee shall be circulated to its Branches, a copy being also sent to the Hon. Secretary for Regional Committees.

Finance.-Each Branch shall pay to the Regional Committee a sum to be decided upon by that Committee, to defray the expenses of printing, postage, etc.

Connection with Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional

Committee.—The President acts as Convener of this Committee, with the help of the Acting Vice-President.

The Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional Committee shall act as liaison committee for the Regional Committees.

The Convener and Hon Secretary of each Regional Committee, or their duly appointed proxies, shall serve on the Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional Committee.

The Hon. Secretary for Regional Committees shall be *ex-officio* a member of the Regional and Branch Representatives Sectional Committee, with power to vote.

AFFILIATED SOCIETIES, THEIR RELATION TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

I. Affiliated Societies are entitled to appoint one representative on the Representative Council, but this representation may be increased to a number not exceeding ten at the discretion of the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the Representative Council.

Should a member elected to serve on the Council resign during the year another may be elected in her place, but no representative shall be accepted unless her appointment has been notified to the Secretary of the National Council at least a fortnight before the Council Meeting.

An Affiliated Society has the right to appoint a representative to serve on the Sectional Committee dealing with its special work.

In the event of the representative being unable to attend a proxy may be appointed to attend in her place.

2. Affiliated Societies shall pay an annual subscription to the Central Funds of not less than f_{I} is. Should they be entitled to elect more than four Members of Council, an additional sum of 5s. is due on behalf of each additional member. Any Society which has not paid its subscription before the Annual Meeting of the National Council shall, after due notice, cease to be affiliated.

3. An Affiliated Society may send to the Executive Committee one resolution for the Representative Council. Such resolution must be supported by one other Affiliated Society, and by two Branches of the N.C.W., and shall be circulated to the Branches, Societies and Committees, and the twelve resolutions receiving the highest number of votes shall be placed on the agenda.

4. Affiliated Societies incur no responsibility on account of any action taken either by the National Council of Women or by any other Affiliated Society, unless they have affirmed a resolution passed by the Council at a Meeting of the Society.

5. Affiliated Societies shall each receive through their Hon. Secretaries notice of all Meetings of the Representative Council and a free copy of the Handbook and of the "N.C.W. News."

6. Affiliated Societies shall be entitled to display and sell their literature on one of the bookstalls at the Annual Meeting.

N.B.—Societies desiring to affiliate shall make application to the Executive Committee on a form to be obtained from the General Secretary.

RESOLUTIONS

PASSED BY

THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN

IN 1930 AND 1931.

PORTSMOUTH, OCTOBER, 1930.

Nationality of Married Women.

"That the National Council of Women urge the Prime Minister to provide facilities at the earliest possible date in the next parliamentary session for legislation on the Nationality of Married Women, which shall embody the principles contained in Captain Cazalet's Bill."

Maternal Mortality and Morbidity.

"That the National Council of Women welcome the Interim Report of the Departmental Committee on Maternal Mortality and Morbidity, with its message of hope as to the possibility of a general reduction of mortality and morbidity. At the same time it recognises the complexity of the problems involved and the fact that the enquiry is not yet complete.

Further, that the National Council of Women urge Local Authorities to put into force the powers they already possess with regard to the provision of maternity services."

Disarmament Conference.

"That the National Council of Women urge His Majesty's Government to make every effort to secure the completion of the work of the Preparatory Disarmament Commission at its forthcoming Meeting in November, so as to enable the proposed World Disarmament Conference to be held at the earliest practicable moment."

Humane Slaughter.

"That the National Council of Women urge the Government without delay to introduce a Bill, making humane killing compulsory for all animals in licensed or unlicensed places."

1. Sexual Offences against Children.

"That the National Council of Women deplore the delay in the introduction of legislation on the lines of the recommendations contained in the Reports of the Departmental Committees on Offences against Young Persons and on the Treatment of Young Offenders respectively, and urge H.M. Government to introduce such legislation at the earliest possible date."

2. Film Censorship. (referred back).

3. Powers of Ministers.

"That the National Council of Women view with apprehension the increasing tendency to hand over to Ministers of Departments powers to frame regulations which have the force of statutes and to make decisions against which there is no appeal to the jurisdiction of the Courts.

The Council calls attention to the fact that these powers have been used to differentiate between the rights of men as a class and women as a class, and records the opinion that such delegation of powers by Parliament is dangerous to the liberty of the subject and contrary to the fundamental principles of the British Constitution."

4. Solicitation Laws.

- (a) To repeal the existing legislation relating to solicitation between the sexes.
- (b) To substitute a single enactment of general application making it an offence for any person, whether man or woman, to annoy or molest with persistence by offensive words or behaviour any other person in any street or public place.

Further, this Council views with apprehension the perfunctory and unsatisfactory evidence upon which women are frequently convicted of solicitation at present, and calls upon the Government to introduce safeguards to prevent this in any new legislation on the subject."

5. Woman Inspector of Constabulary.

"That in view of the growing demand for policewomen, the National Council of Women urge the Home Secretary to appoint a Woman Inspector of Constabulary at the Home Office, one of whose functions shall be to advise Chief Constables in England and Wales, and in Scotland, on all matters affecting the appointment, selection, training and duties of provincial policewomen.

6. Prison System for Women.

"That in the opinion of the National Council of Women the time is now ripe for a revision of the system of imprisonment for women, and for the establishment of experimental institutions conducted on the lines of cottage homes, with facilities for domestic and other training and for out-door work."

7. Social Work for Seamen in Ports.

"That in view of the high death and damage rate among seafarers and the resulting serious reactions on the health and welfare of women and children, and the large number of British men and boys involved, the National Council of Women recommend its Branches and the Overseas Councils of Women and Correspondents to give all possible support to the endeavour to procure for the seafarers of all nations better social, medical and recreational facilities in all the leading ports of the world."

8. Status and Conditions of Women of non-European Races in British Territories.

"This Annual Meeting of the National Council of Women views with concern the widespread existence of cruel and degrading conditions of slavery among women of non-European races in British territories to men of their own tribes. It calls upon the Secretary of State for the Colonies to use his authority and influence to secure the adoption by the Colonial authorities of immediate and energetic remedial and educative measures.

It further urges the Secretary of State for the Colonies to appoint a suitably qualified woman as an official in a responsible position at the Colonial Office, to advise on questions particularly affecting women and children in the Colonies, Protectorates and Mandated Territories."

9. Native Races and the Liquor Traffic.

"The National Council of Women views with concern the unsatisfactory legislation with regard to the liquor traffic in Africa and other native territories. It is convinced that this traffic is contrary to the cultivation of satisfactory relations with the rulers and peoples and is opposed to good government. The Council re-affirms its conviction that the governing principle underlying our dealings with the native races should be that of 'Trusteeship.' It therefore calls upon His Majesty's Government to take, on is own initiative, steps for the abolition of the liquor traffic in the various native territories under its control.''

10. Conditions of Employment of Women in the Civil Service.

"That the National Council of Women re-affirm its conviction that the national administration will gain in efficiency and increased public confidence by the full and equal inclusion of women throughout the Civil Service, and therefore call upon the Government to provide without delay for :—

- I The abolition of segregated women's branches and the employment of men and women civil servants on equal terms throughout all Departments.
- 2. The abolition of the marriage bar.
- 3 The eligibility of women to posts overseas.
- 4 The adoption of the principle of equal pay for men and women civil servants of the same grades and seniority."

II. Care of the Mentally Defective.

"That the National Council of Women is of opinion that further definite practical means should be taken to prevent the propagation of the mentally defective, and in order that the most appropriate legislation to secure this end can be passed, the Council urges the Government to appoint a Royal Commission to enquire into the causation of Mental Deficiency, and into all means of prevention, including sterilisation and the prevention of marriage."

12. Provision for the Unfit.

"That in order to check the increasing numbers of the unfit, Branches shall bring pressure to bear upon their local authorities to take active steps in their areas:—

- 1 To ascertain the number of mentally defective persons and provide for them as enacted by the Mental Deficiency Act of 1913.
- 2 To provide for the effective treatment of persons suffering from venereal disease, as enacted by the Ministry of Health Order of 1916."

ABERDEEN, JUNE, 1931.

Humane Slaughter of Animals.

"That the Representative Council of Women, consisting of delegates from Branches and Affiliated Societies in Great Britain, in meeting assembled re-affirms for the third time its unanimous support for the Humane Slaughter of Animals Bill, and urges the Prime Minister to give immediate facilities for the Bill now before Parliament, in order that it may reach the Statute Book this session."

Sexual Offences against Children.

To reaffirm the following resolution, passed by the Council in 1930:-

"That the National Council of Women deplores the delay in the introduction of legislation on the lines of the recommendations contained in the Reports of the Departmental Committees on Offences against Young Persons and on the Treatment of Young Offenders respectively, and urges H.M. Government to introduce such legislation at the earliest possible date."

1. Cinema Licences.

(a) 'In view of the urgent need for some uniform standard in the conditions attached to cinema licences throughout the country, the National

Council of Women appeals to all licensing authorities to adopt and put into operation the model rules recommended by the Home Office in their Circular of 16th December, 1929.

(b) Further, this Council would welcome a decision to establish a Consultative Committee, representative of the Home Office, the Board of Trade Film Advisory Committee, the Local Licensing Authorities, the Board of Film Censors, Film Producers and Social Organisations, whose functions should be to create a more immediate and effective contact between the Censor and public opinion, and to foster and maintain the highest possible moral and artistic standards in the films produced and exhibited in this country."

2. Woman Prison Commissioner.

"That the National Council of Women requests the Home Secretary to appoint a Woman Commissioner of Prisons and Director of Convict Prisons, whose duties should include the inspection of prisons where women are confined, and urges upon the Government the necessity for a revision of the methods of dealing with women prisoners; it further asks the Secretary of State for Scotland to make suitable arrangements of a similar character for Scotland."

3. Women Police.

"This meeting of the National Council of Women, representing women's organisations from all parts of the country, calls upon the Home Secretary and the Secretary of State for Scotland to draft regulations for policewomen for submission to a Police Council, called and selected for that purpose, on which women shall have a fair representation."

4. Nationality of Married Women.

"This Annual Meeting of the National Council of Women welcomes the decision of the Council of the League of Nations to consult women's international organisations on the question of the Nationality of Women, and to authorise the establishment of a Committee representing these organisations for the purpose of preparing a joint report for transmission by the Secretary-General to the 1931 Assembly of the League. It is of the opinion that there should be no distinction based on sex in the laws of nationality, so that a woman, whether married or unmarried, should have the same right as a man to retain or to change her nationality. It therefore urges the said International Women's Committee to support this policy in their report."

5. Disarmament Conference.

"The National Council of Women, realising that all-round reduction of armaments is an essential condition of permanent peace, and that the future of international co-operation through the League of Nations largely depends upon the success of the first World Disarmament Conference convened for February, 1932, urges that a concentrated national effort be made to ensure that the Conference shall result in immediate reductions of the Army, Navy and Air Forces of the world, and that the expenditure on armaments in those countries upon whom reductions were not imposed by the Peace Treaties shall be substantially reduced, and trusts that His Majesty's Government will spare no effort to attain this result."

6. Examination of Juvenile Offenders.

"That in the opinion of the National Council of Women there should be facilities in connection with every Juvenile Court for necessary expert examination (physical and psychological) of all offenders."

7. Remand Homes.

"That this Council is of opinion that provision should be made for the proper housing of all persons up to 21 awaiting trial for alleged offences, without the need of committing them to prison in the absence of sureties, such provision to take account of the results of modern investigation which has shown that there is urgent need for both medical and psychological examination, especially in cases where the accused is a child or young person. It therefore calls upon the Government to give effect to the recommendations contained in the Report of the Departmental Committee on the treatment of Young Offenders, in so far as those recommendations are concerned with the need for the provision of Remand Homes for all persons under 21."

8. Wills and Intestacies Bill.

"That the National Council of Women, recognising that England falls behind Scotland, most European countries and the Dominions, in its lack of legislation requiring a testator to provide for his or her surviving spouse and children, declares its opinion that the time is ripe for legislation on the subject, to give effect to the principle that marriage and parenthood entail permanent obligations not terminable by death."

9. Lodgings for Women.

"In view of the large increase in the floating population due to unemployment, the National Council of Women urges its branches to enquire in their respective areas as to the accommodation open to women other than on premises licensed for the sale of intoxicating liquor, and to consider the desirability of providing suitable lodgings for women."

10. Causation and Prevention of Mental Deficiency.

"That the Government be asked to appoint a Royal Commission to make full enquiries into the causation of Mental Deficiency, into its relationship to other abnormal conditions and social problems, and into any measures, including both segregation and sterilisation, by which it might be prevented."

11. Unemployment and Agriculture.

"This meeting of women electors, members of the National Council of Women of Great Britain, shares with Parliament its deep concern regarding the problems of Unemployment and Agriculture which are menacing the life of the Nation. It realises that party divisions in this national crisis render each party impotent. It therefore asks the Government to disregard, temporarily, party divisions and, in view of the imperative need for effective action, to unite all parties in an attempt to reach, if necessary by compromise, some practicable methods for dealing with these national problems."

12. Compulsory Day Continuation Classes for Unemployed Young Persons.

"That the Government be urged to introduce an immediate measure bringing all unemployed young persons, aged 14 to 16 years, under a system of compulsory Day Continuation Classes, on the lines of the working certificate procedure.

13. Women House Property Managers.

"That in view of the danger of the new housing estates built by Local Authorities as part of their Slum Clearance schemes themselves degenerating into slums, the National Council of Women urges its members to bring pressure to bear on such authorities to employ as managers on these estates women fully trained on Octavia Hill lines; and further, that the N.C.W. recommends that Universities be asked to provide facilities whereby students intending to become Women House Property Managers can receive a more specialised training in the Social and Economic Courses than has hitherto been customary, and thus be prepared to receive shorter practical training than is necessary for non-University candidates."

ORIGIN OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

Like many organisations which fulfil a need, the National Council has sprung from small beginnings. In 1876 Miss Ellice Hopkins, during her strenuous efforts to educate public opinion on questions of morals, began, for the purposes of preventive and rescue work, to found Ladies' Associations for the Care of Friendless Girls. In 1889 a Conference of the Yorkshire Associations was held at Barnsley—the idea having been possibly taken from a very successful Conference, presided over by Lady Aberdeen the year before at Aberdeen. This Conference was arranged by Miss Gray and Miss Janes, until 1914 the organizing Secretary, to whose untiring work and self-devotion the National Council owes in great part its existence. Some Birmingham ladies who were present at Barnsley, among whom were Mrs. Phillip, Mrs Hallowes and Miss E. H. Cadbury, warmly took up the idea of such a meeting, and in 1890 the Birmingham Union of Women Workers, with Miss Stacey as its Secretary, held a well attended and most interesting Conference, when papers on various subjects connected with work amongst women and girls were read.

Meetings of the same sort followed in Liverpool, under Mrs. Alfred Booth, and in Bristol, Glasgow, and Leeds, under the Presidency of Adeline, Duchess of Bedford, which were arranged by the local Unions of Women Workers. At some of these Conferences schemes for a more organised and formal body were suggested, notably by Miss Hubbard whose staunch support did much for the Conferences, and at the Nottingham Conference, held in October, 1895, the National Union of Women Workers (now known as the National Council of Women) was formally constituted, with Mrs. Creighton as its first President.

The object of this work is to find adopters who will take children for love, and give them the normal home life and upbringing that otherwise would be denied them. The aim of the Association is to place one child a day. Approximately 3,000 children have been adopted since the commencement of the work in 1917. Some 1,566 children have been housed at Tower Cressy, the Hostel of the National Children Adoption Association, where babies await adoption. Many of the children who have found good homes through the Association, would have become chargeable to the rates or Institutions maintained by Public Charities.

The branches of the Association in Scotland under the patronage of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York report a steadily increasing stream of adopters, adoptions averaging nearly one per week. Branches also exist in Wales, in Australia (under the aegis of the National Council of Women), and in New Zealand.

As a result of the tour of Miss Andrew in South Africa in 1928, undertaken on the suggestion of Her Royal Highness Princess Alice, Committees have been formed in the principal towns in that country working in co-operation with the South African National Council of Child Welfare. A Director o Adoption has been appointed. Representatives from South Africa will sit on the Executive Committee of the National Children Adoption Association in London. Princess Alice opened an Adoption Hostel in Johannesburg in October.

WHEREVER there is human need, there the "Army of the Helping Hand'' gives its message of Hope, and to the helpless, the starving and the suffering, extends its friendly aid.

Its operations for women and children include:

Receiving and Industrial Homes, Hospitals, Homes for Mothers and Infants, Children's Homes, Hostels, Inebriates' Homes, Eventide Homes, Midnight and Prison Work, etc.

HOSPITAL AND MATERNITY.

In the Mothers' Hospital, maintained by the Salvation Army at Clapton, London, E., 1,549 births took place last year, and the staff also attended 927 births in the Districts associated with the Hospital. Through the Ante-natal and Child Welfare Clinics, which take place nearly every day, both mother and child are helped materially towards a healthy and robust condition.

Attendances during the year, 37,026.

EXTRACTS FROM THE CONSTITUTION AND STANDING ORDERS OF THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

The International Council of Women is a federation of National Councils or Unions of Women formed in various countries for the promotion of unity and mutual understanding between all associations of women working for the common welfare of the community. It was organised in 1888, and has as its motto the Golden Rule.

The following extracts from its Constitution are printed here as bearing on the inter-relations of the N.C.W. and the I.C.W.

ARTICLE II.—General Policy.

I. This International Council of Women is organised in the interests of no one particular propaganda, and excludes from its programme political and religious questions of a controversial nature affecting the inter-relationship of two or more countries.

2. This International Council of Women has no power over its members beyond that of suggestion and sympathy; therefore no National Council of Women voting to become a member of the International Council shall render itself liable to be interfered with in respect to its complete organic unity, independence, or method of work, or shall be committed to any principle or method of any other Council, or to any utterance or act of this International Council, beyond compliance with the terms of this Constitution, and harmonious action therewith. National Councils are at liberty to make any communication as individual Councils one to another, but propaganda to be officially circulated amongst the affiliated National Councils in the name of the International Council shall not deal with the subjects referred to in Paragraph I.

ARTICLE IV.-Members.

I. Any National Council of Women formed of National Societies, of Local Councils, and Unions of representative Societies and Institutions, provided that their Constitution be in harmony with the basis of the Constitution of the International Council, may become a member of the International Council, with the approval of the Executive Committee, and by the payment of 20 dollars (\pounds 4) every year. National Councils whose annual fee has not been paid, shall thereby forfeit their right to vote at meetings of the Council and Executive Committee.*

3. Any person, whose name is accepted by the Executive Committee and approved by the Council of her own nation, where one exists, may become a life patron of this Council, upon the payment of f_{40} (200 dollars); or may become a triennial contributor on the payment of f_3 (15 dollars) within the triennial period.

* At the Council Meeting at Washington in 1925 it was agreed to accept the Finance Committee's estimate of $\pm 2,000$ as the necessary sum required for the working of the Headquarters Office. The National Councils therefore agreed to allow themselves to be assessed in accordance with a scheme to be drawn up by the Finance Committee. This scheme was accepted by the Council at Vienna in 1930. Newly formed National Councils shall, however, be only expected to pay an affiliation fee of ± 4 or 20 dollars a year for the first triennial period after their affiliation.

5. Any person approved by the Council of her own nation, where one exists, may become an Annual Subscriber to this Council on the payment of f.I or upwards.

6. All ordinary members of affiliated National Councils are also members of the International Council of Women, and shall be entitled to be present at the meetings of the International Council, but may not take part in the proceedings without special invitation from the Chair, nor have they a vote.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE COUNCIL. I. MEETINGS.

9. Secretaries of affiliated National Councils are required to send an extract of the minute of Committee or Council appointing the delegates and their alternates (in the event of the inability of the delegates to attend) to the Headquarters Office a full month before the Triennial Council Meeting, supplying the names and addresses of the ladies appointed; also to provide each delegate or alternate with credentials.

10. The responsibility for the appointments and instruction of delegates rests solely with the bodies appointing, and delegates are required to act in strict accordance with the instructions of the affiliated National Councils which they represent, and on points which may incidentally arise, as far as they can judge, in accordance with the spirit of that organisation, and not as individuals.

Affiliated National Councils shall be free to give liberty to their delegates to vote according to their own convictions on any matter on which the National Councils consider they have not sufficient information, and where they feel that discussion might materially alter the point of view.

IV. STANDING ORDERS FOR THE INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEES.

I. The ordinary members of the Standing Committees shall be delegates appointed by the National Councils, each Council has the right to appoint a member to serve on each Standing Committee. These members shall be appointed at the beginning of each electoral period.

4. The Convener of a Standing Committee shall not be eligible to serve on that particular Committee as the member representing her own National Council.

V. STANDING ORDERS FOR INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL PUBLICATIONS.

I. All information regarding the business programme of the International Council, its Executive, its Committees, its Triennial, or other Meetings, shall first appear in official form (in the "Transactions," the "Annual Report," or in official or printed communications from the President's Office) before it is incorporated in the printed matter of any individual National Council.

2. The Secretary of each affiliated National Council shall furnish the Headquarters Office of the International Council with an account, not previously published elsewhere, of the work carried on by the National Council of Women of her country during the foregoing year, such account not to exceed 1, 500 words in length, to be written in any of the three official languages-French, German, or English-and to be in the hands of the Headquarters Office not later than April 30th in each year. All these National Council Reports shall be published together in the Annual Report of the International Council of Women.

STANDING ORDERS FOR BRITISH REPRESENTATIVES ON THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

On the International Council of Women:-

(I) The N.C.W. is represented on the International Council of Women by IO delegates (including its President) and IO proxies. These shall be elected by nomination and ballot at the Annual Meeting of the National Council of Women of Great Britain preceding the Quinquennial Meeting of the I.C.W. It shall be open to all members of Council to enter nomination for the IO delegates and IO proxies to serve on the International Council of Women, and these shall be voted on in Council. If a delegate after appointment be unavoidably prevented from serving, or resign office, the proxy with the highest number of votes shall be invited to replace her; in all cases proxies shall be called upon in order of their recorded votes. The term of office of the delegates is for 5 years. The terms of office of proxies lasts during the time occupied by the Special Meeting which they are appointed to attend. Instructions as to future duties shall be made clear to delegates and proxies on their appointment.

(2) The delegates from the National Council shall give a united vote, and the National Council, whenever possible, shall previously instruct its delegates as to the lines on which they shall vote.

(3) The resolutions and amendments proposed by the National Council for the meeting of the I.C.W. shall be presented to and separately considered by the Executive Committee, and after approval sent to the Secretary of the I.C.W. to be placed upon its agenda.

(4) In the case of unforeseen questions arising at the I.C.W. Council Meetings, the N.C.W. President or her proxy shall call together the delegates of Great Britain in Council, and shall decide with them on the casting of their vote.

On the International Executive Committee :--

(5) The N.C.W. is represented on the Executive Committee of the International Council of Women by its President.

On the International Standing Committees :--

(6) The N.C.W. is represented on each Standing Committee of the I.C.W. by one Representative, appointed by the Executive Committee of the N.C.W. by nomination and ballot.

(7) The Reports prepared by the Representatives for presentation to their several I.C.W. Standing Committees shall consist of statements of fact, not of expressions of personal opinion: they shall be as brief as is possible consistently with lucidity.

The Reports for the meetings of the I.C.W. shall be presented to, and individually considered by, the Executive Committee of the N.C.W.; if necessary a special session shall be called for the purpose, and after approval the reports shall be sent to the Conveners of the I.C.W. Standing Committees.

(8) The nominations of General Officers and Conveners of Standing Committees of the I.C.W. shall be considered by the Executive Committee as a separate item of business and shall be freely open to discussion or, if necessary, to a vote.
