REPORT.

HE Executive Committee have much pleasure in presenting their Report for 1923. The number of patients admitted was 467. These admissions, together with the 24 remaining in the Hospital from 1922, make a total of 491. Of these, 350 were discharged cured, 129 relieved, 7 no result, 5 died, and 31 were still under treatment on January 1, 1924.

There were 397 operations.

Among the patients were 31 trained nurses; 23 teachers; 22 secretaries; 16 governesses; 12 clerks; 9 actresses; 9 manageresses; 8 artists; 8 musicians; 5 typists; 5 masseuses; 4 sisters of religion; 3 companions; 2 gardeners; and 1 dressmaker.

Forty-five were related to soldiers; 35 to ministers of religion; 24 to doctors; 16 to merchants; 14 to clerks; 12 to engineers; 11 to sailors; 9 to agents; 9 to secretaries; 8 to solicitors; 8 to architects; 8 to civil servants; 7 to gentleman farmers; 7 to schoolmasters; 7 to artists; 6 to chartered accountants; 5 to journalists; 5 to musicians.

One was Russian, 1 Norwegian, 5 came from India, 3 from Canada, 1 from Australia, 1 from Sumatra, 1 from South America.

The letters from patients on leaving the Hospital have been so particularly enthusiastic during the last year that the Committee feel they must quote a few sentences from the hundreds of letters received, which repeat these sentiments over and over again. It should be an encouragement to all who work here to read such words as these:

- 'I do not think there can be a more perfect place than this where the highest possible skill is combined with the greatest kindness.'
- 'I had no idea one could receive so much kindness and individual attention in a Hospital, everyone from the maids to the Matron combining to make things easy and nice for one. I was conscious on my first day here of an atmosphere of kindliness and happiness.'

- 'I particularly want the Committee to know how much it has meant to me to have the services of a Lady Doctor so skilful and considerate; it did help so much to have a personal visit from her every day, with a cheery word and an infectious spirit of hope and encouragement.'
- 'How grateful ladies of limited means like myself must feel for the extraordinary goodness and generosity of the Surgeons, who not only give their valuable time and skill for nothing but also show such sympathy and interest after the operation.'
- " 'I must say a word of appreciation to the lady who cooks; meals are so daintily served and everything so beautifully cooked.'
- 'The skill and never-failing kindness of Sisters and Nurses are beyond all praise, and the ability of the Matron shown in the smooth running of this Hospital is as remarkable as her gentle kindness; she is a mother to us all and her visits an inspiration."
- 'During nine weeks here I have witnessed many wonderful cures, which, I daresay, are as much due to the excellent nourishing food as to the kindness and skill shown by every member of the staff and the attentive little maids.'
- 'My Christmas here has been one of the happiest I remember. I don't think the Christmas spirit was anywhere more beautifully expressed than in the untiring devotion and self-sacrifice of the entire Hospital staff.'
- 'I was so glad to receive the Communion in your beautiful Chapel before leaving.'

The Committee deeply regret the death of H.R.H. Princess Christian, who had shown an unfailing interest in this Hospital of which she had been a Patroness for the last six years.

H.R.H. The Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles has kindly consented to become a Patroness of this Hospital in the place of the late Princess Christian.

Mrs. David Hunter Blair has retired from the Executive Committee owing to her absence abroad.

The Lady Evelyn Ward, The Hon. Mrs. Ivan Hay, Miss Bealey, and Miss Dorothy Yorke have joined the Executive Committee.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

This Hospital was founded and is maintained for the gratuitous medical and surgical treatment of ladies of limited means—governesses, artists, hospital nurses, and the wives, daughters, and near relatives of clergymen, naval, military, and professional men—who are quite unable to pay even reduced expenses of a surgical operation.

Special attention is drawn to this fact.

RULES, &c.

PATIENTS

1. Members of the staffs of General London Hospitals, of the Samaritan Hospital for Women, Grosvenor, Soho, Chelsea, Elizabeth Garrett-Anderson, and South London Hospitals may recommend patients, who are eligible, for admission and take charge of them provided that their medical attendance is gratuitous. It is optional for the surgeon to select his own anæsthetist.

2. Patients who are not thus under the care of their own physician or surgeon will be treated by the Visiting Staff.

3. The admission of patients rests with the Committee. No patient can be received suffering from any infectious malady or mental disorder, who is liable to any description of fit, or who requires Weir-Mitchell treatment.

4. Ladies desiring admission must apply for blank forms to the Lady Superintendent. Vacancies are occurring constantly, but none can be promised until the forms sent have been filled in and signed in a manner satisfactory to the Committee.

The papers requisite for admission are—

First. A form of application, including a form of guarantee for weekly payments and contingent expenses.

Secondly. A form of Certificate from ordinary Medical Attendant as to present state and fitness for the Institution.

Thirdly. A letter from some friend or relative of the applicant, stating such particulars concerning the SOCIAL POSITION and means of the applicant as shall show her to be eligible for admission.

If no Lady of the Committee is available, the Lady Superintendent may, in cases of emergency, admit a patient if her medical certificate is passed.

5. The admission granted in the first instance is for a period not exceeding six weeks, which, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer, or at the discretion of the Committee, may be extended for a period not exceeding six weeks more. In special cases a still further extension may from time to time be granted, but always for periods not exceeding six weeks. Further, should a case be

admitted for 'an opinion,' it must be understood that the patient cannot continue in the House unless the Medical Officer considers it necessary, and so reports to the Committee.

Payments should be made on the day of arrival for a week in advance (as well as the Anæsthetic Fee of £1 1s. and Operation Fee 10s. when required), the remainder to be paid at intervals of not more than four weeks, or before leaving. Payments should be made in cash. The patients defray their own personal laundry expenses. In special cases, children are admitted on the same terms.

- 7. Patients are particularly requested to bring as little luggage with them as possible. Boxes cannot be stored in the House.
- 8. Patients have the privilege of being attended by the Chaplain when able to avail themselves of his visits. Ladies of all nationalities and creeds are admissible, and can be visited by their own Clergyman, Minister, or Priest.

HOUSE RULES.

- 1. Every inmate is expected to recognize in every respect the authority of the Lady Superintendent, acting under the Committee.
- 2. Every patient will be required strictly to conform to the directions of the Physician or Surgeon in all matters relating to medical treatment, diet, and regimen; and no patient is permitted to take wine, brandy, or beer, except as prescribed by the Medical Officers. It must be understood that the patient cannot remain in the Home unless she is content to abide by this rule. All presents of food to be deposited with the Lady Superintendent, and purchases of fruit and biscuits, &c., made by patients to be first sanctioned by her.
- 3. Patients are requested not to go out without the know-ledge of the Lady Superintendent.

4. The Lady Superintendent, acting under the Committee, assigns rooms to the patients, and has authority to make such changes as may be necessary.

5. Patients are requested not to visit the rooms of other patients without the sanction of the Lady Superintendent. Visitors are admitted every day, except Thursdays, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. only. Except in the case of very serious illness, no one will be admitted at any other time. Friends must seek special permission through the Lady Superintendent.

N.B.—Visitors are particularly requested not to call in the morning.

6. The Lady Superintendent can be seen on the following days:—

Mondays, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

- 7. No servants belonging to the Establishment may be sent out on errands but by the permission of the Lady Superintendent. Patients are enjoined not to offer gratuities either to the nurses or servants.
- 8. The Lady Superintendent will, if possible, accompany the Medical Attendant on his visit to the patients.
- 9. The Committee do not accept responsibility for any money or valuables unless deposited with the Lady Superintendent, who will give a receipt for the same.
- 10. Every patient is requested to inform the Lady Superintendent of any complaint which she has to make of nurses or servants, and it will be immediately attended to. Patients feeling dissatisfied can communicate with the Lady Superintendent, or write to the Committee, or address themselves personally to any member of the Committee. All complaints should be made during the patient's residence in the House; and each lady before she leaves the House is requested to write to the Committee and express her sense of the treatment which she has received while there. Patients' letters will be forwarded to them for one week after leaving the Institution if they leave their address.

11. The Chapel is open daily to any patient or patient's friends.

Ladies who are admitted and return home cured are earnestly requested to become Subscribers themselves, or to find at least ONE Annual Subscriber of from 2/6 upwards for four or six years. By this means the Hospital may be able to be free, or nearly free, of debt.
