REPORT FOR 1912.

The past year has been a time of strenuous work for all Suffrage organisations. It has been in some respects a time of disappointment; but it has also been a time of great encouragement for the future. The self-sacrificing devotion of so many thousands of women to the cause, and the generous and whole-hearted support of the men who work with us, both in Parliament and outside, cannot long be resisted. We believe that the victory to which we look forward in the near future will be the more valued and valuable because of these years of preparation; for while women are learning more of the duties of citizenship, men are also learning more of their duties to a community which comprises both men and women; and this new knowledge will bear fruit when men and women have full power to work together for the common good.

One of the most hopeful features of the situation is that one of the Parliamentary parties,—the Labour Party,—has definitely made Women's Suffrage a part of its programme. All suffragists must be grateful to them for their generous support.

The increased work which devolved upon the Leicester Society during the year made it necessary to obtain the assistance of a part-time paid Secretary, and most valuable work has been done in this capacity, first by Miss Isabel Ashby, and afterwards by Miss J. O. S. Elgood, B.A., who still retains the office.

In order further to extend the usefulness of the Society, an office was opened at 20, Granby-street, which was held on a six-months tenancy from March 1st to August 31st. A series of informal meetings and At Homes were held at the office, at which short addresses were given by members and friends of the Society, followed by discussions. The office was also

used as a centre for general Suffrage work, such as the visiting of sympathisers in different parts of the town who needed keeping in touch with Suffrage organisation, and the making clear of our position to the local Press, which is constantly liable to misunderstanding of our non-party and non-militant attitude.

At the end of the six months, it was decided, on the ground of expense, that the tenancy should not be renewed, but that the good work begun at the office should be continued elsewhere.

The Annual Meeting of the Society took place at the Foresters' Institute, on May 17th, Miss Gittins took the chair, in the unavoidable absence of the President, Mr. J. M. Gimson, J.P. Mrs. Stanbury, of the National Union Executive, gave an address on the political situation and the new development of the policy of the National Union. Afterwards we were joined by some of the members of the Leicester Branch of the National League for Opposing Women's Suffrage, and a debate took place on the general question of Women's Suffrage, in which Mrs. Stanbury and Miss Sinclair were the leaders on the opposite sides. No vote was taken, but a considerable number of those present took part in the interesting discussion which followed the addresses. Dr. Millard kindly took the chair for the debate.

This Society has taken much interest in the agitation in favour of the Criminal Law Amendment (White Slave Traffic) Bill, which has now passed into law. A resolution in favour of the Bill was passed at our Annual Meeting on May 17th. Shortly afterwards, it appeared from notices in the Press that, through some misunderstanding, the Blaby Union Board of Guardians had been unwilling to follow the example of many other Boards of Guardians, including the Leicester Board, by passing a resolution in favour of the Bill. Representations were at once made by Miss Elgood and other members of this Society, which removed the objections of the Blaby Guardians, and a resolution in favour of the Bill was passed at a later meeting.

On October 31st and November 1st, many members of this Society attended two meetings at the Trade Hall and the Victoria Galleries, organised by another Society. Members of our Society took the chair at both meetings. Very interesting and convincing addresses were given by Mrs. W. A. Webbe, well known as a rescue worker in London, on the connection between the Suffrage question and the protection of young women from moral danger.

On November 21st, Mrs. Robert Pochin was kindly At Home at the Robert Hall Memorial School to a number of Women Teachers in Elementary Schools. An interesting and striking address was given by Miss K. Bathurst, Ex-Inspectress under the Board of Education, on "The Suffrage Question as it Affects Teachers." As the Leicester Branch of the N.U.T. had recently passed a resolution placing Women's Suffrage on the Agenda for the next Annual Conference, the meeting came at a favourable time for stimulating interest which had already been aroused. Seventeen new members joined the Society at the close of the address.

Drawing-room meetings for spreading interest in the Suffrage cause have been given in their own homes by Miss McTurk Alexander and Miss Gittins.

This Society has taken up the work, recommended by the National Union, of enrolling as "Friends of Women's Suffrage" those who are interested in the cause and willing to work for it, but who prefer not to join the Society as subscribing members. A considerable number of new "Friends" have thus been enrolled. After some consideration, it has been thought best to transfer the eighty members of the St. Mark's circles from the category of "Members" to that of "Friends," in order that their subscriptions may be used for their own meetings and propaganda work, instead of being transferred to the funds of the National Union. Although their names no longer appear in our list of members, the transference does not represent any real loss of helpers to the Suffrage cause, for which the St. Mark's Circles will continue to work with all their old loyalty and enthusiasm.

The Society has received generous donations from a number of individual members; but in order to obtain financial help from a larger number, it has embarked in several undertakings intended to combine propaganda work with a certain amount of pecuniary advantage.

On January 18th, a performance of "How the Vote was Won," preceded by "Lady Butterby and Mrs. MacBean," was given by members and friends of the Society at the Victoria Galleries. Though the weather was most unfavourable, the attendance was sufficient to secure a profit to the Society's funds; and all present were grateful to the performers for arousing (or confirming) their Suffragist sympathies in such a very enjoyable manner. The Society is particularly indebted to Mr. H. T. Durrad for acting as Stage Manager, as well as taking the principal part in the play with conspicuous ability and spirit.

On May 23rd, a company of professional actors, selected by the Actresses' Franchise League, gave two performances at the Knighton Public Hall of three plays, "The Apple," "A Change of Tenant," and "A Chat With Mrs. Chicky." In these performances, a powerful appeal for the Suffrage was made through many emotions, both grave and gay.

The Societies comprised in the East Midland Federation held a Bazaar and Fete at the Mechanics' Large Hall, Nottingham, on November 29th and 30th, in aid of the funds of the Societies and of the Federation. The Bazaar was opened on the first day by Princess Catherine Duleep Singh, and on the second day by Lady Markham, wife of Sir Arthur Markham, M.P. Among the public men who took part in the opening ceremonies were Lord Henry Bentinck, M.P., Sir John Rolleston, M.P., and Mr. Richardson, now Liberal Candidate for the Melton Division of Leicestershire. The Leicester Society contributed its share to the Bazaar by providing a stall and by sending helpers to take charge of it. Many of the articles sold at our stall were made at working parties which had been held at the Office, and at the homes of members. The pecuniary result of the Bazaar was advantageous both to the Societies which took part in it, and to the central fund of the Federation, which is used chiefly for propaganda work in districts which have scarcely had the Suffrage question brought before them until recent times. The older Societies have responded generously to the appeals made to them for help in these districts, and liberal grants have been made by the National Union. The success of the work may be estimated by the fact that the number of Societies in the East Midland area, which was only six in the Autumn of 1911, had risen by the end of 1912 to eighteen.

Our Society has constantly been in communication with all the Leicestershire M.P's. on Parliamentary questions interesting to Suffragists. We wish to acknowledge with gratitude the consistent support given by Mr. J. Ramsay MacDonald, M.P., and the Hon. H. D. McLaren, M.P., to all the Suffrage propositions which have been brought before Parliament during the year.

It is with much regret that we report the resignation of our President, Mr. J. M. Gimson, J.P., who no longers finds it possible to take an active part in the work of our Society. He has, however, consented to be one of our Vice-Presidents, and continues to show his interest in our work in many ways. For many years the Society has been greatly helped by his wisdom and experience; and we feel how generous it was for a man with so many duties and interests to spare so much of his time to help the women's cause.


