Dear Mrs. Pawlett

I returned from Egypt the day
 before yesterday, and I found on
 my table a postcard more than
 a month old in which you kindly
 offer me to send me a copy of your
 report on the concentration lamps. As I
 have not received it from anyone else
 I should be very thankful if you
 kindly sent it. I know it only from

extract of a lecture which you gave
on the subject. As it is a document
of great importance, I should like very
much to see it, and if possible to make
use of it on the continent. I believe the
eyes of the people in this country are
beginning to be opened on the question
of these things. The amount of slander
spread broadcast on England is not what
it was three months ago, when it was
supported by the speeches of Sir Campbell

Baltimore.

I cannot help having great hopes
about the negotiations which are carried
on at present. Obviously the Transient
gov^t. would not have you to Public
if there were not serious reasons. But
I am afraid of Krueger's and Legation's
action, who probably will do the utmost
to wreck the negotiations.
