ANNUAL REPORT.

Your Committee are not able to report any progress made in Parliament this Session. They have, however, satisfaction in recording that the attention of the House of Commons has on several occasions been called to the claims of women to the Parliamentary franchise, and that an increased interest has been shown in the movement in the country generally and much successful work has been done.

Before the opening of the Session, Mr. George Wyndham, M.P., announced that, in consequence of his acceptance of office as Under-Secretary for War, he would have to retire from the leadership of the Women's Suffrage movement in Parliament.

In response to a unanimous request from all the Women's Suffrage Societies, Mr. Faithfull Begg, M.P., kindly consented to accept the position of leader on the Conservative side in the House of Commons.

This is the third occasion on which acceptance of office has necessitated a change of leadership in the Women's Suffrage movement, the first occasion being when Mr. Courtney took office in 1881, and the second when Mr. Woodall took office in 1886, Mr. Wyndham himself taking the leadership in 1895 on Lord Wolmer's succeeding to the Earldom of Selborne.

A conference of supporters of the Women's Suffrage Movement was held on Tuesday, February 7th, in Committee Room 12 of the House of Commons, Mr. Faithfull Begg presiding.

Monckton, Mr. Morrell, Captain Norton, Mr. Skewes-Cox, Sir Wm. Wedderburn, Mr. J. Wilson (Govan), Sir James Woodhouse and Capt. Young.

Those attending on behalf of the National Union were:—Lady Frances Balfour, Mrs. Beddoe, Miss Blackburn, Mrs. Russell Cooke, Mrs. Fawcett, LL.D., Mrs. Arthur Francis, Miss E. Gore-Booth, Mrs. Gray Heald and Miss Louisa Stevenson; Mrs. Charles Baxter, Miss Edith Palliser and Miss E. G. Roper, Secretaries to the Union. Dr. Beddoe, Mrs. Fullarton and Mrs. Charles McLaren were also present.

It was agreed that the mode of procedure should be similar to that pursued last Session, namely, to ballot for a day for a Bill, and, failing success in this, to ballot for a resolution.

The result of the ballot showed that of the twenty-five Members of Parliament who had balloted for a Women's Suffrage Bill, Mr. Faithfull Begg had drawn best place and stood thirty-sixth. As only those Members who secure the first ten or twelve places have any prospect of introducing a Bill, it was seen that all hope of bringing in a Women's Suffrage Bill this Session was gone. The claims of women to the Parliamentary Franchise were brought before the House by Mr. Faithfull Begg on March 8th, when Sir J. Blundell Maple introduced his Service Franchise Bill, which proposed to enfranchise a number of men, caretakers, police constables, shop assistants and others living in compartments known as cubicles. Mr. Faithfull Begg, by way of protest, entered the following motion:—

"That the claims of duly qualified women should be granted before any other alteration in the franchise is made,"

Mr. Faithfull Begg stated that he opposed the Bill, not because he had any hostility to its objects, but because he contended that there should be no legislation connected with the franchise until women had been admitted to the vote. The second reading of this Bill was carried by a majority of 100.

A more successful effort was made later to secure a day for a Women's Suffrage Resolution, Mr. Firbank and Mr. Faithfull Begg having drawn first and second places respectively, for March 28th. The following resolution was set down for that date:—

Resolution-

"To call attention to recent legislation in several of our leading Colonies conferring the Parliamentary franchise upon women, and to move that the exclusion in this country of women from the Parliamentary franchise is contrary to public policy."

The day was, however, taken by the Government, and Mr. Faithfull Begg was present on March 27th to protest against the opportunity being taken away by the Government for bringing forward the question of the electoral disabilities of women.

In the afternoon of the same day, Monday, March 27th, a meeting of representative supporters of Women's Suffrage was held at the Women's Institute, 15, Grosvenor Crescent, Hyde Park Corner, under the auspices of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies. Mrs. Henry Fawcett, LL.D., took the chair, and moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Sir William Wedderburn, Bart., M.P., and carried unanimously:—

Resolution-

"That it is contrary to public policy to place the ban of perpetual and total exclusion from the benefits and privileges of Parliamentary representation upon the women of this country. This meeting, therefore, protests against the absorption by the Government of the day on which a Women's Suffrage Resolution was on the paper as first order; and they pray the House of Commons to take an early opportunity of passing a measure which would place women, in respect of Parliamentary representation, in a position similar to that which they already occupy in respect of local franchises."

A form of Memorial to the Government was also adopted. The text is as follows:—

To the Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, M.P., First Lord of the Treasury.

THE MEMORIAL OF WORKERS FOR WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE Respectfully sheweth:—

That your Memorialists are persons who have worked, many of them during a long series of years, to procure the removal of the Electoral Disabilities of Women.

That they see with pain that the claims of women to representation, which were affirmed by the present Parliament on February 3rd, 1897, have been again set aside, and the day for their further consideration absorbed by Government business. They submit that such action increases the sense of injustice already widely felt by women, and that it is contrary to public policy to subject an intelligent and law-abiding section of the population to the stigma of entire exclusion from Parliamentary representation.

Your Memorialists therefore pray that the Government will give facilities to a measure for placing duly qualified women on the Parliamentary register.

On the 29th of June, a large and enthusiastic meeting was held by the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies, in support of the political enfranchisement of women, in the Queen's Hall, Langham Place; Mrs. Henry Fawcett presided. A Report of the Meeting will be published in the Autumn by the National Union.

Your Committee have pleasure in recording the steady progress made by the Local Associate Scheme, of which a detailed account was given in last year's Report. This scheme, as has been there shown, was designed, by means of local agency, to enlist a wider measure of support by diffusing information among a larger class of people.

Local Honorary Secretaries have now been appointed in eight constituencies (see page 30). As a direct result of this special work, 232 Members (i.e., Subscribers) have joined your Society since July 1, 1898, and new annual subscriptions have been received amounting to £35. Much active interest has been aroused, and the total number of supporters (Members and Associates) who have joined through the Local Associate Scheme already amounts to 1,828, showing an increase in this year of 1,061 supporters. Your Committee consider this result highly satisfactory.

The value of the local scheme was shown in the Petition work carried on during the month of March, when in six constituencies 43 petitions with an aggregate of 1,661 signatures were sent up to the House of Commons, the work being carried out by volunteers. These figures show a marked contrast to the solitary petition sent up in favour of the Service Franchise Bill. A great measure of the success of the women's suffrage meeting on June 29th was also due to the local organisation, without which it would not have been possible to secure so large an attendance.

The Local Associate Scheme owes much of its success to the indefatigable exertions of Miss Jenner, Miss Stone, Miss Frances Sterling, Miss Dimock, and of the ladies who are acting as Hon. Secretaries in the constituencies where the scheme has been started. To all of these the Committee tender their very cordial thanks. The Committee have much pleasure in recording their thanks for a very generous gift of £100 from Miss Grove, received since the close of the financial year, for the further

development of the Local Associate Scheme. This is specially welcome as f_{02} has been spent during this year on the work of organising the eight constituencies, and your Committee hope to be able to continue the work on a much larger scale should adequate support be given.

Your Committee wish especially to call the attention of Members, Associates, and of all other sympathisers in the aims of the Society, to the immense value of the work of organising their supporters throughout the Society's area, in order that they may be ready to take action when the press

of work of a General Election comes. As has been stated before, it is at election times that the claims of women to the Parliamentary vote can be most effectually pressed upon the attention of candidates.

Your Committee, therefore, most earnestly beg for your immediate and active support in this work of preparation, which is of far more value than any effort, however great, made at the last moment.

CENTRAL AND EAST OF ENGLAND SOCIETY FOR WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE.

The object of the Society is to obtain the Parliamentary Franchise for Women on the same conditions as it is, or may be, granted to men.

The Society seeks to achieve this object :-

- By acting as a centre for the collection and diffusion of information with regard to the progress of the movement in all parts of the country.
- 2. By holding Public Meetings in support of the repeal of the Electoral Disabilities of Women.
- 3. By the publication of Pamphlets, Leaflets, and other Literature bearing upon the question.

RULES

PASSED AT THE GENERAL MEETING OF THE CENTRAL AND EAST OF ENGLAND SOCIETY AND SUBSCRIBERS TO ITS FUNDS, HELD JULY 17TH, 1872.

- I. The Central and East of England Society shall consist of the present members and such others as the Executive Committee may, from time to time, elect.
- 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of members of the Central and East of England Society, to be elected at the Annual General Meeting, and of single delegates, the same being members of Local Committees, appointed by Local Associations to represent them; the Executive Committee having power to add to the Central and East of England Society, and to its own number, and to appoint the Officers.
- 3. A subscription of any amount constitutes membership of the Central and East of England Society.
- 4. A General Meeting of the Central and East of England Society shall be held once a year to appoint the Executive Committee, to receive the Annual Report and the Financial Statement, and to transact any other business which may arise.
- 5. The Executive Committee shall, at its first meeting, appoint the Officers.
- 6. A Special General Meeting may be called by the Executive Committee at any time; or, at the written request of not less than twenty-five members of the Central and East of England Society, the Secretary or Secretaries shall call a Special General Meeting to discuss such matters only as are mentioned in the notice of such meeting.
- 7. Eight days' public notice shall be given of all General Meetings.
- 8. The above rules shall not be altered except at a General Meeting, after fourteen days' notice of the proposed alteration given to the Executive Committee.
