

ANNUAL REPORT, 1939.

Opening Remarks.

During the past twelve months the work of the Junior Council has been well maintained in spite of the preoccupation of all our members with affairs connected with the critical times through which we have passed and are still passing. The training entailed by one or another form of national service has meant that our members have been more fully occupied than usual, but, nevertheless, meetings have been well attended and the various activities have flourished.

In our last Annual Report we alluded to the disturbing influences in the world around us and the need for renewed vigour and purpose if we were to preserve the freedom of thought and action of which we are so proud. To-day, twelve months later, the times are no less critical. Abroad we see the lights of freedom going out one by one and this year has seen two more countries losing their independence and suppressing their women's organisations, with the subsequent curtailment of individual freedom.

All this makes it clear that our work for the future must be to see that we are prepared to play our part in maintaining the democratic ideals and principles which are the very essence of our civilisation. Realising as we must that the nation's reserve of strength lies in its women, the second thing with which we should vitally concern ourselves is the part to be played by women in the organisation of the nation to meet the dangers which threaten us. In this connection it must be reported that we have worked in close co-operation with the Women's Voluntary Services, which was called into existence by the Home Secretary last May for the purpose of assisting local authorities in recruiting women volunteers. Its scope has now been widened to cover all civil defence, and we are represented on its Advisory Council.

We are taking such part as we can as a body in national activity, but we have nevertheless felt it of vital importance that the primary aim and object of the Junior Council to safeguard and improve the position of women in business and the professions should continue unabated.

Monthly Parties.

Before giving details of the Monthly Parties the Executive Committee wishes to express its grateful thanks to the Group Officers and Committees for their valuable co-operation in the organisation of some of these parties.

The first party to be held after the last Annual Meeting was on June 9th, when Ann Bridge (Mrs. O'Malley) was the guest of the evening, and gave a fascinating address on her experiences in China. We were fortunate on that occasion in having Dame Rachel Crowdy as our Chairman.

In October the Monthly Party was organised by the Law Group, and took the form of an address by Mr. Alexander Paterson, H.M. Commissioner of Prisons, on "Penal Reform." This was of special interest to his large audience in view of the coming Criminal Justice Bill.

At the November party a delightful film entitled *From Abraham* to Allenby was shown by Mr. Aidan Crawley, who gave a running commentary. This film was taken in Palestine in 1937 by School Films Limited. This party was suggested by the Political Group.

The Arts and Letters Group Committee were fortunate in securing Miss M. A. Murray to speak on "The Witch Cult" in January. This was the second occasion on which the Junior Council have had the pleasure of welcoming Miss Murray as their speaker. Her interesting address was made even more realistic by the showing of a number of her unique pictures in the form of lantern slides.

"Why Should Non-Stop Ever Stop?" was the title chosen by Mrs. Laura Henderson, the founder and owner of the Windmill Theatre, for her delightful address on the origin and development of this theatre. Under her unique experiment men and women artistes have what can be described as ideal conditions of work, compared with those prevailing in the theatrical profession as a whole.

Sherry Parties.

At the beginning of last year the Executive Committee decided to try the experiment of having frequent Sherry Parties to which they invited speakers on subjects of interest. The first of these was held on July 14th when Miss Elsie Fogerty gave an inimitable talk on "The National Standard of Speech." Miss Fogerty was bombarded by questions and promised to visit the Junior Council again on some future occasion.

The autumn programme was started by a most inspiring speech by Lady Reading, Chairman of Women's Voluntary Services, on the

work of her organisation and the need for wholehearted co-operation from business and professional women.

On November 1st the Executive Committee invited members to a Sherry Party to meet University Graduates of 1938.

"The Work of Women Housing Managers" was the subject chosen for the December Sherry Party, and the Executive Committee was fortunate in obtaining as their guest Miss M. E. Hurst, the first Housing Estate Manager trained in Octavia Hill methods to be appointed by the South African Government. This party formed part of the Octavia Hill Centenary celebrations.

The success of a woman in colour photography was well demonstrated by the delightful collection of photographs brought by Yevonde (Mrs. Middleton) when she came to speak at the Sherry Party in February. It was clear that success in this sphere depends not only on technical skill, but on the sense of humour and personality of the photographer.

On March 7th Pauline Gower, the well-known woman aviator, gave a lively account of her experiences and filled her audience with a desire to fly.

It was almost impossible to accommodate the audience for the Sherry Party in March when Madame Geneviève Tabouis, Diplomatic Correspondent for *L'Œuvre*, spoke on "The Ups and Downs of a Diplomatic Correspondent." Her exceptional position in the journalistic world gives her a unique knowledge of international affairs, and it was with the greatest reluctance that our members left this Sherry Party.

Arts and Letters Group.

Misfortune attended the spring and summer arrangements of the Group, as Sir Charles Higham was obliged, through illness, to postpone his eagerly awaited lecture on May 3rd, and the Moonlight Picnic and Bathing Party arranged in July by kind invitation of Mrs. Seligman had to be cancelled owing to bad weather.

The Group undertook to be responsible for the decorations for The Mart of London River, to be held in November, and a Sherry Party was held on September 21st to discuss the arrangements for a scheme which was carried out under the direction of Miss Edna Mosely and Mrs. Blackman.

On December 14th a most enjoyable evening was spent when Mr. Lawrence Tanner, Keeper of the Muniment Room at Westminster Abbey, lectured on "Some Recent Discoveries and Work at Westminster Abbey," and showed us a number of his fascinating lantern slides. A delightful sequel was the arrangement of two visits, on February 11th and March 4th, to the Muniment Room, when Mr. Tanner most kindly showed a number of members some of the treasures of the Abbey and also part of Westminster School, including the famous Hall.

On January 25th the Group co-operated with the Executive Committee in arranging a party at which Miss M. A. Murray gave a most interesting lecture on "The Witch Cult," illustrating it with lantern slides.

In order that members of the Group might become better acquainted with each other and with the work and aims of the Society, the Committee decided to hold a Finger and Fork Supper after each monthly Sherry Party, to be followed by an informal talk. Two of these have already taken place, and to each Miss Strachey has been kind enough to come and to talk on any topic suggested by the Society's activities. The opportunity thus afforded for informal discussion has been enjoyed by all present, and it is hoped that this new venture will continue to receive support and prove a helpful feature of the Group.

Law Group.

The only meeting arranged by the Law Group this year was the party on Penal Reform, which they held in conjunction with the Executive Committee.

Political Group.

The April fixture was a debate on Spinsters' Pensions. Mrs. Oliver Strachey led the opposition to pensions for unmarried women at 55 on the grounds that the position of women as wage earners would be weakened thereby. The Group Chairman led those supporting the spinsters' claim and, after a discussion in which many members took part, the motion in favour of pensions was lost.

Miss Anne Godwin, Organising Secretary of the Association of Women Clerks and Secretaries, spoke to the Group in May on "Office Conditions," stressing the need for an Offices Regulation Bill and urging office workers of all kinds, even the best treated, to join their appropriate organisation, and so strengthen the hands of those struggling against bad conditions.

On June 22nd a visit was made to the gardens of Chartwell Manor, the home of the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, M.P. The gardens, which had been open to the public during the day on behalf of the Queen's Nursing Fund, were kept open during the evening for the special benefit of our party by the kindness of Mr. Churchill.

In July the Group was fortunate enough to hear Dame Rachel Crowdy on the question "Should Women be Conscripted in Time of War?" Her experiences as Principal Commandant of the V.A.D.'s in France and Belgium, 1914-19, enabled Dame Rachel to speak with great authority. She took one view that conscription of women would be unnecessary as they could be relied upon to volunteer for service when needed. She emphasised, however, the vital importance of a proper organisation of woman power for the service of the nation, a view which received such support from members that a letter on the subject was sent to the *Daily Telegraph*.

The first meeting in the autumn was a discussion on nursing conditions. Miss Cochrane, Matron of Charing Cross Hospital, supplied us with first-hand information on the advances and improvements in the conditions of the nursing profession. Mrs. Strachey, a member of the Lancet Commission, brought, hot from the press, the reasons given by secondary schoolgirls for not entering the nursing profession, in answer to a questionnaire from the Women's Employment Federation.

The Political Group, in collaboration with the Executive Committee, arranged for the showing of the film entitled *From Abraham* to Allenby, with a running commentary by Mr. Aidan Crawley. The subject was most appropriate in view of the fact that Palestine at the time was "front page" news.

Miss Hilda Matheson was the guest of the evening on March 1st, and she gave a very able address on "A Background to the Colonial Problem." Miss Matheson's work in connection with the African Survey enabled her to give us an idea of the vast problems awaiting solution in that field.

Science Group.

In June Professor Sydney Chapman gave a very interesting talk on the Sun's Magnetism, making special reference to the influence of sunspots on the weather. Professor Chapman showed a large number of slides, illustrating the latest research into this very debatable question.

By special request of those who had not been able to join the previous visits, the Science Group arranged another expedition to the Pool of London in July.

Owing to the crisis it was not found possible to arrange any meetings in the autumn, but in February Mrs. Ruth Bisbee came down from Liverpool University to give a talk on Heredity. Among her audience were those with high technical knowledge and those who knew little or nothing of her subject, but Mrs. Bisbee contrived to hold the interest of everyone in a brilliant discourse that was outstanding in its clarity and humour and which traced the course of the study of heredity right up to the most recent experimental work.

Marsham Street Players.

Last season ended with a most enjoyable party at Ardingly, where members were entertained by the Chairman, Miss Bowie.

In November, two performances of At Mrs. Beams, by C. K. Munro, were produced by Mr. Arthur Ewart, and new scenery was devised by Mr. Osborn Jenkins for this production. On February 12th the players gave an evening of one-act plays, Vindication, by L. J. Hines and F. King, and Villa for Sale, by Sacha Guitry. The former play was entered for the British Drama Festival at the Fortune Theatre on February 16th, and the Marsham Street Players were placed fourth in the London area. This was the best result so far achieved in the Festivals and much credit is due both to the performers and to the producer, who on this occasion was Mr. Frank G. Brockman.

The Committee will be pleased to welcome new members, at a subscription of 5s. per annum. In addition to players, those who are willing to help in other capacities such as stage-managing, décor, etc., are needed. Subscriber-members are also welcome and are entitled to two tickets (value 3s. each) for each production.

Walkers' Club.

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Miss Goodman planned a delightful walk on Sunday, April 24th, over Bookham Common to Downside and Ockham, covering a distance of ten to twelve miles, and ending with tea in the fifteenthcentury hall of the Cedar House, Cobham.

At Whitsun a large party met on Salisbury Plain and split up into groups to explore different parts of the New Forest, and were fortunate in having perfect weather.

A walk through Burnham Beeches was planned in May by Miss Sylvia Brown, who invited the party to tea at her cottage at Jordans.

In July members enjoyed a walk via Newlands Corner to Shere and Albury Park. Miss Ledeboer invited the party to her house at Farley Heath for tea.

Ivinghoe Beacon and Ashridge were the objective when Miss Horsfield took a party over a distance of approximately ten miles on Sunday, October 9th.

More hospitality was enjoyed on November 6th, when Miss Wardlaw invited members to tea after a walk led by Miss Montagu Jones through Richmond Park and Thames Ditton.



Finally, on February 12th, members enjoyed a circular ramble over Epsom Downs to Ashtead.

Our special thanks are due to Miss Hindley, Secretary to the Walkers' Club, for all the trouble she has taken to make this Club such a successful and enjoyable activity of the Junior Council.

Bridge Circle.

The Bridge Circle, which meets every Tuesday at 8.15 p.m. in the Members' Room, has had a successful and enjoyable year, but would be glad of more members, as A.R.P. activities have made inroads on the spare time of some of the players. A special dinner is served beforehand in the Restaurant at 7.30 p.m. to those giving notice of their intention to dine. Will members having friends who are bridge-players bring them to one of these evenings, where they will be warmly welcomed, and, we hope, become members of the Society.

The Bridge Class for the less experienced continues to be held at intervals of about ten days from 6.15 p.m. to 7.45 p.m. Will anyone wishing to join kindly notify Miss Douglas or Miss Douie, who will tell them the date of the next class. The charge made is 15. per lesson, the proceeds being devoted to the needs of the library.

As the Circle's contribution to the funds of the Society, another successful Bridge Party was held on December 13th, 1938, in aid of the Christmas Fair, the profit amounting to f_{12} . In this connection also the Circle and their friends, with Miss Douglas as organiser, held a series of Working Parties which stocked a complete stall with winter decorations, and as a result over f_{10} was made.

Public Work Sub-Committee.

The Public Work Sub-Committee is composed of members of the Senior Society, of the Junior Council and of certain non-voting representatives of the Junior Council Groups. The reports of this sub-committee form the best answer to the question which is frequently asked, "But what does the Senior Society **do**?"

Among the matters of outstanding interest dealt with by the Committee during the year under review were :

Spinsters' Pensions. Family Allowances. Women Housing Estate Managers. Nursing Services. Women's Voluntary Services for A.R.P. and National Service. Co-operation by the Women's Employment Federation with the Ministry of Labour in establishing a National Central Register of persons suited for higher professional and technical posts in time of national emergency. Continuance in employment under the L.C.C. of Married Midwives. Criminal Justice Bill and the extended employment of Women Police. L.C.C. and (Women) Attendance Officers.

The Committee, having in mind the chief object of the Society— Equal Opportunity—has great satisfaction in placing on record the admission of women to administrative posts in the India Office and in the Dominions and Colonial Offices. The principle of equal pay for men and women in their employment has been accepted by the Hammersmith Borough Council, and this is said to be largely due to the campaign by women's societies in that borough. Congratulations were offered to Miss Emmerson Price on her establishment as architect under the Board of Education ; this is believed to be the only instance of a woman architect who is an established Civil Servant.

Staff.

In March the Executive Committee received with the greatest regret the resignation of their Organising Secretary, Mrs. Charles Henderson, who was leaving in order to take up an appointment as Women's Staff Superintendent, Imperial Airways, Ltd. This was an entirely new departure on the part of Imperial Airways, Ltd., and the Committee felt they could not let their deep regret at losing Mrs. Henderson outweigh their satisfaction that someone who so completely represents the ideals for which they stand had been appointed to this new and highly important sphere of women's work. A formal record of the appreciation of the Junior Council will be found in the report of Resolutions passed at the Annual Meeting. It should further be reported that the Committee arranged for a token of the appreciation of the Junior Council to be presented to Mrs. Henderson, on behalf of the Council as a whole, by past and present officers and members of the Executive and Group Committees.

The Committee were fortunate in obtaining, as Mrs. Henderson's successor, Mrs. Douglas Daniels, who has long been associated with the Junior Council, both as a member and as their representative on the Women's Advisory Council of the League of Nations Union.

Final Remarks.

It is impossible to conclude this report without an expression of the grateful thanks of the Executive Committee to the retiring Hon. Secretary, Miss Halpin. The Junior Council owes much to her tireless efforts on their behalf in many directions. Not only has she attended all Committee meetings with unfailing regularity, but she has been instrumental in securing many of the distinguished speakers and has herself on numberless occasions acted as hostess to the many friends, both Senior and Junior, of the Society. This is deserving of special thanks in view of her own increasing professional activities, involving among other things her work for Women's Voluntary Services.

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V. Constitution. Alteration of Rules-

Rule VI. Membership.

Associate Membership.

The Resolution proposed by Miss K. I. Hancock, seconded by Miss H. Mosely and passed at the Junior Council Annual Meeting, May 10th, 1938, was duly ratified at the Annual Meeting of the Society, December 6th, 1938, with a slight amendment of wording. The Resolution now reads as follows :

"Members of the Junior Council who resign after not less than one year's membership on the ground that they are no longer able to take an active part in the work of the Council and whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee of the Junior Council shall be Associate Members at a subscription of 5s. per annum. Such members shall be notified of the Annual Meeting and have the right to attend the meeting and to vote. They shall also be entitled to receive a copy of the Annual Report, but not of any other notices or invitations" and it was

Proposed from the Chair, and carried :

"That the amended wording be adopted and that the paragraphs in Rule VI be renumbered accordingly."

VI. Resolutions. Women's Work in National Emergency.

The Executive Committee having given notice that they reserved to themselves the right to table an emergency resolution on this subject, Miss Lister, on behalf of the Executive, moved

"That the Junior Council, considering that the success of any scheme of national service must to a great extent depend on the use made of the reserve powers of women and that the organisation of women presents special problems, emphasises the need of taking women into consultation in the framing of any such schemes and of allotting to women a due share in their administration. Further, it welcomes the steps already taken to secure the co-operation of women's societies in the Government scheme of National Service, and desires the Executive Committee to promote the participation of suitably qualified women in all forms of national service established on a democratic basis."

The motion was seconded by Mrs. Burton and carried.

JUNIOR COUNCIL ANNUAL MEETING MEMBERS' ROOM, MAY 10th, 1939,

at 8.15 p.m.

Chairman : Miss K. I. Hancock.

I. Appointment of Tellers.

Moved from the Chair and passed that Miss N. Grange and Miss Brandt should act as Tellers for the Resolutions.

II. Appointment of Auditors.

Moved Miss Lange, seconded Miss Dingle and passed that E. Watts & Co. be appointed Hon. Auditors for the ensuing year.

III. Annual Report.

The Annual Report was read by the Hon. Secretary, Miss K. M. Halpin. Moved Miss English, seconded Miss Horsfield and passed that the Report be adopted. Miss English mentioned that the talks and lectures organised by the Junior Council had been most helpful to her in the course of her work, and Miss Strachey asked leave to congratulate the Junior Council on a Report that grew in interest from year to year. She expressed great pleasure at the part played by the Junior Council in furthering the aims and objects of the Society which was especially apparent from the Report of the Public Work Committee.

IV. Treasurer's Report.

The Statement of Accounts was read by the Hon. Treasurer, Miss M. H. Pearson. Moved Miss Gatey, seconded Miss F. Sachse, that the financial statement be adopted. Carried unanimously.

Arising from the Financial Report it was proposed Miss Mosely, seconded Miss Protheroe Jones and carried that the Hon. Treasurer should, with the next notices to members, include a statement setting forth the financial position of the Junior Council and asking the co-operation of members in improving the situation, either by increasing their subscriptions or obtaining new members.

Resignation of the Organising Secretary.

By permission of the meeting the resolution standing in Miss Hancock's name on the Agenda and circulated to members was moved from the Chair, in an amended form, as follows :

"That the Junior Council place on record their deep appreciation of Mrs. Henderson's services to the Junior Council, not only in the highly efficient organisation which led to its rapid expansion and its unique position amongst women's organisations, but also in her unfailing interest in its individual members. The Junior Council further record their regret on losing the help of an official whose personality makes her in many ways irreplaceable; they hope that unofficially her ties with the Junior Council will never be severed and they offer her their heartiest good wishes for success in her new career."

The resolution was carried unanimously and with acclamation.

The meeting then welcomed Mrs. Daniels as the new Junior Council Organising Secretary. Mrs. Daniels has been a member of the Junior Council for many years and has acted as their representative on the Women's Advisory Council of the League of Nations Union.

VII. Speech by Mrs. Oliver Strachey. "The Emergency Register of the Women's Employment Federation and other opportunities for National Service."

Mrs. Strachey explained that the Emergency Register had been set up to enrol women in skilled occupations who might be called upon to fill paid posts, for which they were suited, should war break out. She pointed out that the demand for such workers would probably not arise in the first days of a war, and that it was, therefore, important for everyone, whether ultimately requiring paid work or not, to take part in the voluntary emergency organisation which was designed to prevent panic and enable the country to resist the first attacks from the air. Mrs. Strachey then handed out forms for members to complete, and emphasised the point that only women with definite experience are being enrolled. She went on to say that there was, at present, only one type of paid post for which skilled applicants could be earmarked in advance, and that this was in the Postal Censors' Department. Many more applicants were required for these posts, the necessary qualification being a thorough knowledge of languages, such as French, German, Dutch and Japanese. The work entailed scrutinising of letters, foreign press, etc., and members were urged to make it known to any of their friends who might be eligible.

VIII. Other Business, by Leave.

No ballot was held as the nominations corresponded with the number of vacancies. The names of members serving on the newlyelected Committee will be found on the first page of this report. Miss A. Carroll was returned unopposed as Hon. Secretary and Miss M. H. Pearson was re-elected as Hon. Treasurer.

The Chairman proposed a vote of thanks to Miss Halpin, who was retiring after five years as Hon. Secretary of the Junior Council. This was carried unanimously by the Meeting.

In extending to the new Hon. Secretary, Miss Carroll, a very warm welcome on behalf of the Meeting, Miss Hancock said that Miss Carroll had already given invaluable help to the Junior Council in her capacity as Chairman of the Political Group, which office she had held for five years.

CONSTITUTION

I. Title.

The title of the Council shall be "the Junior Council of the London and National Society for Women's Service."

II. Status.

The Junior Council is an organisation working independently within the London and National Society for Women's Service, whose General Meeting governs the policy of the whole Society. There is no obligation upon the Junior Council as a body to work for any one of the activities of the Society.

III. Object.

The Junior Council supports the aim of the London and National Society for Women's Service for equality of citizenship between men and women, and works specially for equal economic opportunities and freedom for women in the pursuit of their work.

IV. Methods.

- 1. The Council holds regular meetings of a social character, with speakers on topics of common interest and collects information on Trainings and Openings for women.
- 2. The Council enables professional and business women to meet each other, and links up students with women already practising or in business.
- 3. The Council provides opportunities for the development of new enterprise.

V. Governing Body.

The governing body of the Junior Council shall be the general meeting of members, which will elect annually by ballot an Executive Committee, an Hon. Secretary, and an Hon. Treasurer to conduct the current business of the Council.

VI. Membership.

- I. Subject as hereinafter mentioned :
 - The Junior Council shall consist of (a) men and women who have or have had a professional or business qualification; and (b) of students: (i) who support its aims; (ii) whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee; and (iii) who have paid the current annual subscription.

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- 2. The minimum annual subscription shall be 10s. for all members for five years from the date of joining the Junior Council and shall then be raised to f_{I} . This shall apply only to those members who join on or after January 1st, 1935. Members shall have the right to use the Library, Restaurant and other facilities provided by the Society.
- 3. Members of the Junior Council who resign after not less than one year's membership, on the ground that they are no longer able to take an active part in the work of the Council, and whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee of the Junior Council, shall be Associate Members at a subscription of 5s. per annum. Such members shall be notified of the Annual Meeting and have the right to attend the meeting and to vote. They shall also be entitled to receive a copy of the Annual Report, but not of any other notices or invitations.
- 1. Membership of the Junior Council carries with it membership of the Society.
- 5. The Executive Committee shall have the right to terminate any membership without assigning a reason.

VII. Officers.

The Officers of the Council shall be the Chairman, the Hon. Secretary, and the Hon. Treasurer.

VIII. Executive Committee.

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- 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Junior Council, and not less than nine and not more than twelve other members to be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting, and shall have power to co-opt not more than five additional members. A member who has served for five consecutive years shall not be eligible for re-election to the Committee until after the lapse of one year. Officers shall be eligible to serve for five years, as such, regardless of previous service as a private member of Committee.
- 2. At the first meeting after election, it shall elect the Chairman for the ensuing year.
- 3. It may from time to time make Bye-laws, and shall have power to fill by co-option any vacancies which may occur during its term of office.
- 4. It shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees for special purposes.

5. The Minutes of the Executive Committee of the Junior Council shall be open to the Executive Committee of the Society.

IX. Nominations.

- 1. Any member may be proposed for election or re-election as Honorary Officer or Member of the Committee on the nomination of two members of the Council to whom the candidate is personally known.
- 2. Nominations, with the consent in writing of the candidate nominated, shall reach the Secretary at least fourteen clear days before the Annual Meeting.

X. Meetings.

- 1. An Annual General Meeting of the Council, of which not less than twenty-eight clear days' preliminary notice shall be given to each member, shall be held as soon as convenient after April 1st in each year.
- 2. Special General Meetings of the Council (a) may be called at any time by the Executive Committee either of the Junior Council or of the Society, and (b) shall be called by the Secretary within twenty-eight clear days on the requisition of not less than one-tenth of the members of the Council, of not less than three calendar months' standing. A Special General Meeting shall discuss only such matters as are mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice shall be given of General Meetings to all members.
- 3. Joint meetings of the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society shall be held at the request of either Committee.

XI. Resolutions.

Proposed Resolutions to be discussed at the Annual General Meeting with names of proposers and seconders shall reach the Secretary in writing at least fourteen clear days before the meeting, and shall have been published at least seven clear days before that date. Resolutions shall be passed by a majority vote except as hereinafter provided.

XII. Alteration of Constitution.

The Constitution shall not be altered except by resolution passed at a General Meeting of the Council by two-thirds of the

members present and voting, provided always that no rule of the Junior Council shall be at variance with the Constitution of the Society as a whole. The nature of the proposed alteration must be stated in the notices calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice given to all members.
