INFORMATION FOR SUBSCRIBERS.

INCOME TAX AND SUPER-TAX ON ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

Annual subscribers, by filling up the following form of agreement for seven years, enable the Hospital to recover income tax on their subscriptions, and can themselves deduct the amount of the subscription from their super-tax return.

The agreement should be filled up and returned to the Secretary of the Hospital, who will arrange for it to be stamped at Somerset House.

The Hospital will benefit considerably if subscribers will enter into such a covenant.

The subscriber, if liable to super-tax, will benefit since he will be allowed to deduct from his income for super-tax purposes the gross amount of his subscription.

Example: If a contributor who now subscribes ± 100 per annum enters into an agreement in the above form, filling in the figure ± 100 , the result will be, under the Finance Act 1925:

- (a) the subscriber sends a cheque for £100, with a certificate that he has paid income tax on the amount which, after deducting income tax, leaves £100 (i.e., with income tax at 4/- in the £, £25); the Hospital can supply forms of certificate if desired;
- (b) the Hospital recovers the income tax from Somerset House;
- (c) the contributor appears as a subscriber of $\pounds 125$;

(d) the contributor can deduct $\pounds 125$ from his return for super-tax.

The Hospital would be pleased to give further information if desired. It is sometimes possible to furnish alternative forms of agreement to meet special circumstances.

RULES.

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Every donor of $\pounds 21$ is a Governor of the Hospital for life.

Governors are empowered in each year to recommend ten out-patients to the Hospital, free of the entrance fee, provided that such recommendations are given only to persons who are legitimate objects of medical charity.

Annual Subscribers of two guineas and upwards are Annual Governors, and may, subject to the same limitation, recommend ten out-patients, and Subscribers of not less than one guinea may recommend five out-patients, free of the entrance fee, during each year of their subscription.

N.B.—No further recommendation is needed to admit the Bearer of a Hospital Letter as an in-patient provided the nature of the case require that she be treated in the Hospital. Persons who are too ill to attend first as out-patients, or who live at a distance, should apply for admission by post, enclosing a medical certificate, to the SECRETARY at the HOSPITAL.

The letter of recommendation for patient must be renewed every month, and no in-patient can remain in the house longer than two months, except by the sanction of the Managing Committee.

No infectious cases can be admitted as in-patients.

The Hospital is open for the relief of out-patients every day except Sundays, public holidays and certain other days, of which due notice is given beforehand. In-patients are admitted as vacancies occur.

All patients and their friends have the right to lay a complaint before the Managing Committee personally, by deputy, or in writing.

In-patients are required to contribute a small sum weekly towards the cost of their maintenance while in the Hospital. This sum is fixed by the Almoner with reference to the position in life, etc., of each patient, and ranges from 7s. 6d. upwards per week.

It is in the power of the Almoner to admit cases of serious illness without any payment, if, on enquiry, it appear desirable to do so.

There are three small separate wards. The terms of admission to these wards are $\pounds 4$ 4s. per week. A smaller ward at a charge of $\pounds 3$ 3s. per week.

RULES FOR IN-PATIENTS.

Patients coming into the Hospital are required to bring a change of linen, soap, towel, comb and brush for their own use.

They are required to provide themselves with clean linen twice a week.

Every patient is required to pay a weekly sum according to her means, and to provide her own butter and tea. Payments are to be paid in advance on entrance, and on each succeeding Friday during her stay.

Visitors to patients are allowed on Wednesdays and Sundays from 2.30 to 3.30.

No wine or spirit allowed to be brought into the Hospital by patients or their friends.

Patients are admitted by payment of a fee of 1s. per attendance, or by a subscriber's letter, which must be renewed once a month.

FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Queen's Patronage.—The death of Her late Majesty Queen Alexandra at the end of the year, deprived the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital of its deeply revered Patron. The Committee, in regretfully reporting this great loss, have the privilege of informing the Governors and friends of the Hospital, that Her Majesty The Queen, at their earnest petition, has consented to become Patron in place of Her late Majesty. This high honour was communicated through Her Majesty's Private Secretary, in the following gracious message addressed to the Chairman.

" DEAR SIR,

"I have had the honour of submitting to The Queen, "the letter which you were so good as to address to the Lady-"in-Waiting on the 21st of December.

"In reply I am to convey to you Her Majesty's sincere appreciation of the loyal and kind terms of your communication, and to ask you to express to your Committee her grateful thanks.

"The Queen has given careful consideration to the "Committee's request, and I am to assure you that it will "give Her Majesty great pleasure to accede to their suggestion, "that she should become Patroness of the Elizabeth Garrett "Anderson Hospital in the place of Her late Majesty Queen "Alexandra.

This letter has been framed and hung in the Boardroom. It will be noted that the frontispiece of this Report reproduces a photograph by W. & D. Downey of our august Patron.

Dame Louisa Aldrich-Blake, D.B.E., M.S., M.D.—At the close of the year the Hospital sustained a grievous and irreparable loss in the death of its late distinguished and beloved Senior Surgeon, Dame Louisa Aldrich-Blake, D.B.E., M.S., M.D. Dame Louisa had served the Hospital for over thirty years, with an unremitting devotion that cannot be better described than by quoting once more the words of the Resolution, passed by the Board of Management on her retirement at the end of last year:

"During her thirty years tenure of her position on the "Honorary Staff, her brilliant surgery, her judgment and "skill have enhanced the reputation and usefulness of the "Hospital, and contributed greatly to the status of medical "women. Her wise Counsels have been greatly valued, her "work has been an inspiration to all who have come into "contact with her, her influence for good has been profound. "The Board of Management are fully conscious that she has "never spared herself, that she has given freely of her time, "and that she has, with forethought and generosity, realised "the need of the Hospital for enlargement; they wish to "place on record their sense of the inestimable services she "has rendered to the Hospital, and the great loss sustained "in her resignation."

It will be remembered that the property, 134, Euston Road, which provides half the extension site, was purchased, and presented to the Hospital by Dame Louisa.

The Chairman, in speaking at a Board meeting of our loss, said "It would be presumption on my part to attempt "to put into words the thoughts and memories that are in the "hearts of all here present. I will only say, we have lost "a dear, kind, wise and generous friend, devoted to the "Hospital in which she so long and ably worked, and Surgery "has lost a brilliant operator and skilled exponent. The "memory of Louisa Aldrich-Blake will be lovingly cherished "by all her fellow-workers. Her life task is ended and she "has passed beyond. We may say in Lowell's words :

"Thou art not idle : in thy higher sphere, Thy spirit bends itself to loving tasks, And strength to perfect what is dreamed of here Is all the crown and glory that it asks !"

The exact form of the Memorial to Dame Louisa is only now in course of being decided by a Joint Committee composed of chosen representatives of the three Institutions with which she was intimately connected—the London School of Medicine for Women of which she was Dean, the Royal Free and our own Hospital. It is in the meantime, however, definitely agreed that some part of the Extension buildings at the E.G.A. shall bear her name.

Vice-Presidents.—The Committee have the honour to report that the following have consented to become Vice-Presidents of the Hospital, and that their appointment will be brought before the Governors for confirmation at their meeting in March, 1926: The Duchess of Atholl, the Dowager Countess of Antrim, the Countess of Carlisle, the Countess of Selborne, the Viscountess Willingdon, the Lady Sybil Smith, Lady Bower, Dame Margaret Lloyd-George, Dame Millicent Fawcett, Mrs. S. A. Courtauld, Mr. H. Awray Tipping and Mr. George Grossmith.

Changes on the Committee.—The Committee most regretfully report the retirement of Mrs. Sheppard early in the year. Mrs. Sheppard had given thirty-three years of valuable and devoted work in the service of the Hospital, earning the esteem and gratitude of all with whom she came in contact. The Committee are happy to state that, although over 90 years of age, Mrs. Sheppard still visits in the wards and takes a practical and active interest in the welfare of the patients.

The Annual Meeting of the Governors took place on the 16th of March; Lady Bower, then the Lady Mayoress, presided. The speakers included Dame Louisa Aldrich-Blake, Dr. J. Walter Carr and Dr. Maud Chadburn.

Medical Staff Changes.—There were no changes on the Honorary Acting Medical Staff during 1925, but the Consultant Staff, in addition to the irreparable loss of Dame Louisa Aldrich-Blake, sustained also the loss by death of Mrs. Keith, L.R.C.P. & S.Ed. Mrs. Keith was appointed Anæsthetist to the Hospital in 1890 and served until 1902, when she retired. She afterwards consented to become a member of the Consulting Staff at their invitation, and it is with the utmost regret that the Committee have to report her death, which took place at the end of the year. The Committee have also to report with great regret the deaths of Lady Bowden Smith, Miss Tait and Sir George Gibb, life-long and devoted friends of the Hospital and among its staunch supporters.

As we go to Press a great grief has befallen the Hospital in the death of its old and beloved friend and staunch supporter, Dr. Helen Webb. Dr. Webb was a member of the Honorary Medical Staff from 1892 to 1906, when she resigned. After her resignation she joined the Consultant Staff and served also upon the Board of Management. She always took a great interest in the welfare of the Hospital, and at the time of her death she was a member of the Maternity Committee. She will be as greatly missed as she is sincerely and deeply mourned.

Numbers of Patients.—As usual the numbers of both In and Out-Patients shew an increase and the provision of adequate accommodation in both departments becomes proportionately difficult. The In-Patients numbered 1,513 as compared with 1,497 in 1924. Of these 1,009 were surgical, 353 medical, 85 maternity, 47 infants and 19 special cases. Rosa Morison House received 613, as against 588, patients sent down from the Euston Road, for the completion of their treatment. The total number of new Out-Patients was 11,179, of whom 486 were patients attending the Evening Clinics, 236 V.D., 250 Skin and 631 were ante-natal cases. Out-Patient Attendances numbered 65,195 as against 56,564 in 1924. Of these 5,339 were attendances at the Evening Clinics, 3,449 V.D., 1,342 Skin, 548 Dental Departments and 4,756 were visits paid to Maternity Cases on the District.

Maternity Department.-The adaptation of the Double private ward, on the first floor, as a Maternity ward, sanctioned by the Board early in the year, to improve the accommodation available in the Hospital for difficult district cases, evidently did something to remove the bad impression created by the frequent inability of the Department to admit patients booked for admission, as the numbers for 1925 shew a marked increase. The number of patients attended on the District was 385, as against 296 in the previous year. There were 631 patients seen at the Ante-natal Clinics, of whom 246 were consultation cases. Eleven pupil midwives entered for the Examination of the Central Midwives Board, of whom nine gained the Board's Certificate. Mention has been made elsewhere in this report of the progress of the fund for providing an adequate and up-to-date Maternity ward in the Extension buildings, but the consideration of the above numbers should draw attention to the urgency of the necessity for carrying out this part of the proposed work as early as possible.

Accounts.—Owing to the unusually large sum bequeathed to the Hospital during 1925, a very considerable balance of income is shewn on the Income and Expenditure Account. Reference to the Balance Sheet will shew that a proportion of

the residue of the estate of the late Mr. Matthew Whiting, which he bequeathed to the Hospital on the death of his wife, amounting to $\pounds 3,563$ 1s. 8d., has been allocated to "Buildings and Equipment," and forms a substantial addition to the gratifying result achieved by the Extension Appeal Scheme up to the date of the Accounts now issued.

The generous response to the Extension Appeal would not appear to have diminished the ordinary revenue of the Hospital, but the Committee would urge friends to remember that provision for the needs of a growing Hospital is a difficult undertaking, and the problem of maintenance an ever-present anxiety to the Committee.

Subscriptions.—For this reason it is a matter for gratitude and congratulation that it is possible to report an increase in the Subscriptions for this year which amounted to $\pounds 1,667$ 6s. 10d. as against $\pounds 1,296$ 17s. 0d. in 1924. Donations were $\pounds 848$ 7s. 6d. as against $\pounds 770$ 7s. 6d. $\pounds 148$ 16s. 7d. was collected in Hospital Boxes and the Legacies amounted to $\pounds 7,277$ 6s. 3d.

Almoner's Department.—During 1925 the growing demand of the medical staff for after-care in various forms on behalf of their patients, increased the work of the Almoner's Department. This increase can most easily be estimated in terms of money.

In 1923, the year the department was started, £608 was spent on after care; this increased to over £1,500 in 1924 and to £2,065 in 1925. Of the last named sum, £1,313 was contributed by the patients, leaving a balance of £752 to be obtained from outside sources and the Samaritan Fund. It will not be possible to continue to meet this growing need unless a means can be found of augmenting the Samaritan Fund, of which the income, including dividends and donations, was £56 6s. 1d. during the past year. It is very gratefully acknowledged that a sum of £250 has been invested in support of the Samaritan Fund, the bequest of Miss Mary Bennett, received by the Hospital from her niece, Miss Gertrude E. Webb.

It is true that the need of each case, as it arises, can often be met from outside charitable sources, but the growth of the work means that there must be a larger sum on which to draw in case of emergency. Every effort is made to arrange convalescent treatment quickly in order to clear the wards for the urgent cases awaiting admission. It is impossible to do this without delay, and at the same time guarantee that the payment will always be met, either by the patient or from local funds. The necessary correspondence alone would entail a period of writing that would hold up work in the wards. The same thing applies in a lesser degree, to the provision of surgical appliances, not to speak of incidental expenses, such as ambulances, railway fares, etc. It is hoped that in the coming year the friends of the Hospital, who are interested in after care, will respond to the appeal for financial help which is now becoming acute.

The various forms of after care required cannot be enumerated in a short space. The statistical report gives

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these in terms of figures, but personal social service, if it is of any value, must have a side that cannot be measured in any definite form, and to this much time has to be given.

In April, 1925, Miss Neville Rolfe was appointed as assistant Almoner for two days a week. She has taken over the after care work of the Venereal Diseases department, which has to be done in greater detail, with the result that the attendance of patients has been much more regular.

Very grateful thanks are again due to Mrs. Marshall Smith who continues to come every week to write up the accounts, and to Miss Waller, who in the midst of a busy life has found time to visit some of the patients in their homes. (Statistics of Department on page 43.)

Extension of Hospital.—The Extension Appeal Committee, under the able Chairmanship of Lady Plender, has achieved very satisfactory results. £35,269 8s. 8d. has been collected to date, with an expenditure of £5,113 4s. 1d., of which £28,282 16s. 4d. has been already invested in Government Securities. This success was largely due to the publicity given to the Fund through the Ten Thousand Tea Party Scheme. In addition to the above figure the Committee may count upon another £2,000, which has been promised by King Edward's Hospital Fund and will be available directly building operations are started.

Although it is not possible to give a detailed account of all the varied activities and achievements of the Extension Appeal, attention must be drawn to certain aspects of the work, by which it is hoped to raise specified sums in support of the required £75,000.

Maternity Ward.—This Ward for which it will be remembered the Hon. Mrs. Fletcher Moulton undertook to raise £5,000, stood, at the end of the year, at £997 11s. 0d. It has been decided to call the ward after our late revered Patron, *The Queen Alexandra Ward*, and all who would welcome an opportunity of honouring Her late Majesty's memory are invited to send contributions in support of this object direct to Mrs. Moulton or to the Treasurer at the Hospital earmarked for the Maternity Ward.

Memorial Nurses' Home.—For this portion of the Extension buildings, the Committee have the honour to report that the Dowager Marchioness of Dufferin and Ava has most kindly and generously consented to be responsible. This building, designed to accommodate the additional nursing staff which will be required by the enlarged Hospital accommodation to be provided, is to be dedicated to the Nurses of the Empire who fell in the Great War. It is estimated that about £15,000 of the total appealed for should be allocated to this object, and of this sum £1,593 17s. 5d. had been reached by 31st December, nearly £950 of which was raised by the Exhibit at the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley, of a model Operating Theatre.

City Appeal.—Mr. Vivian H. Smith and the Lady Sybil Smith with the help of Lady Bower, then Lady Mayoress, raised over £3,000 for the Extension Fund through an appeal in the City.

The Pollock Ward.—The design to name a Ward in the Extension in honour of the Chairman, which was initiated by Lady Hall, and for which £2,500 would be required, stood at nearly £1,800 at the close of the year. All who wish to be associated with this public appreciation of Mr. Pollock's forty years of work on the Committees of the Hospital, should send their contributions to Lady Hall, or to the Secretary of the Hospital, who is working under her, earmarked for the Pollock Ward.

Mechano-Therapeutic Bed.—Mrs. Kellgren-Cyriax, the Physician-in-Charge of the Mechano-Therapeutic Department,

is to be congratulated upon raising £1,062 for the Appeal. In acknowledgment of this service, the bed for the treatment of cases from this department, to be provided in the Extension, will be called the Kellgren-Cyriax Bed. And here it may be pointed out that any donor, or collector of £1,000 towards the Extension Fund may claim the privilege of "naming" one of the Extension beds.

The Isabella Macdonald Bed.—Early in the year an anonymous donor gave $\pounds 1,000$ to the Appeal, on condition that a bed at the Rosa Morison House of Recovery should be named after our late Senior Physician, Dr. Isabella Macdonald. The Committee were extremely happy to be afforded the opportunity of thus publicly placing on record the universal love and gratitude inspired by Dr. Macdonald among her patients, and gladly allowed a bed in the Patients' League Ward at Rosa Morison House to be so named.

V.A.D. and Suffolk Beds.—Mrs. Salisbury Jones very kindly undertook to raise £1,000 for a V.A.D. Bed and had collected nearly £800 towards this sum by the end of the year, whilst in Suffolk a movement towards a Suffolk Bed had been started in Dr. Elizabeth Garrett Anderson's county.

Pearl Necklace Fund. — Dr. Amy Sheppard most generously gave to the Hospital a pearl necklace to be disposed of in aid of the Appeal. For this a competition, with 2s. tickets, which is still open, has been arranged, and friends of the Hospital are urged to notice this method of raising money, which may be possible to many unable to help the Appeal by giving large sums.

Chairmanship of Council.—Towards the close of the year the Countess of Carlisle very graciously consented to become Chairman of the Council of the Appeal and immediately organised, with the help of Mr. George Grossmith, a Matinée in aid of the Fund. This Matinée, fixed for a date in November, had to be postponed until January, 1926, owing to the death of Queen Alexandra. As we go to press it is announced that it achieved a very great success securing a clear profit of $\pounds 820$.

Thrift Shop.—Another venture of the Extension Appeal Committee, which, it is hoped, will be of great use to the Hospital in the future, was the opening in Euston Market of a little shop, at which old clothes, bric-à-brac, books, jewellery, toys and gift-articles of any description are sold for the benefit of the Appeal Fund. If successful, as its originators hope it will be, the Thrift Shop may possibly absorb the work of the Handicrafts Party, started by Lady Hall and Miss Wigram at the end of 1923, and discontinued temporarily in order to release accommodation for the growing needs of the Extension Appeal Staff.

Five Steps Scheme. — A unique development of the Appeal was originated and initiated by Dame Louisa Aldrich-Blake and Miss Rosamund Spencer Wigram, under the title of the Five Steps Scheme. It was a gigantic undertaking, which aimed at raising a considerable sum of money in shillings, and was designed to touch a section of the public hitherto unapproached. Dame Louisa with characteristic thoroughness devoted hours of ungrudging work and tireless thought to the perfection of her system, adding this further reason for the enduring love and gratitude by which her memory will for ever be honoured. Dame Louisa was most ably supported in the routine work of the scheme by Miss Wigram and Mrs. Kimber. The result was not divulged at the end of December, the total amount raised being the object of a competitive guess on the part of the supporters.

It would be quite impossible to enumerate or to thank adequately, in the limited pages of this Report, the many devoted helpers of the Appeal Scheme, in addition to those already named. The Committee are only able here to offer

their heartfelt and cordial thanks to all concerned, pending the time, when, in an Official Report at the close of the appeal, they will be able to give a detailed statement of all that has been done, and thank, individually, all who will have contributed to the final result. In the meantime they cannot refrain from taking this opportunity of offering their warmest gratitude and appreciation to Lady Plender who, with the able and energetic assistance of Miss Edith Debenham, Hon. Assistant Treasurer, and Miss Adeline Bourne, the Organising Appeal Secretary, has controlled and co-ordinated the multitudinous activities of the enormous band of workers which has achieved, to date, so remarkable a result.

The Committee feel also that they cannot conclude their reference to the Appeal Work without placing on record their keen appreciation of the kindness of Sir Brumwell Thomas, our Honorary Architect, whose skilful plans for the utilisation of the Extension Site, have been invaluable and whose time and advice have been placed so continually and unreservedly at their disposal.

Purchase of Christopher Works.—The disposal of the Extension Buildings has been a matter of much careful consideration and thought, and Sir Brumwell Thomas reported so much difficulty in dovetailing the various buildings required upon the space at our disposal that eventually the Committee, with the approval of the King's Fund Authorities, purchased further land adjoining the Hospital premises at the rear of the Pathological and Mortuary Blocks. This land will afford ample space to set back these two buildings and will provide room for their necessary enlargement. The purchase money required was $\pounds 2,400$, which was realised by the balance of $\pounds 1,000$ of the Lorillard Bequest and the sale of $\pounds 2,000$ 3 per cent. London County Stock. It was unanimously agreed that this sum of money should not be taken

from the Extension Fund, and our friends and well-wishers are asked to note that a useful way of assisting the Hospital would be to make good, or to assist in making good the depletion of the free capital caused by this most necessary purchase.

Endowment of New Beds.—Apart from the response to the Extension Appeal, the Hospital has been fortunate in the endowment of two new beds: The Charlotte Sinclair Cheetham Bed, endowed by Mrs. Robert Cheetham, who, in 1924, named a bed after her husband, and the Catherine Maud Pearse Bed, endowed early in the year by Mr. Bourne Benson, who transferred to the Hospital £1,500 of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Conversion Loan from a Bequest to Charities, to be administered at his discretion under the will of the mother of the lady whose name this bed commemorates. In addition to these beds, Mr. Hugh Reeves proposed to endow another, in memory of his wife, to be called The Dorothy Reeves Bed, and to be used for the treatment of cases suffering from Rheumatoid Arthritis. This endowment will be effected early in 1926.

Memorial Scheme.—No new beds have been completed under this scheme during 1925, but a further £500 has been invested in 5 per cent. War Loan, representing the steady accumulation of small donations towards the completion of the four remaining promised beds, *i.e.*, the Highfield, Burlington and Queen Anne's Caversham School Beds and the Women Workers' Bed. (Particulars of the amount reached will be found on page 77.)

Indian Nurses.—It will be remembered that in the Report for 1923, it was reported that the Hospital had agreed to receive two Indian ladies to train as nurses under the Lady Reading Fund for Indian Women. The Committee are happy to report that the experiment proved eminently satisfactory. Of the two ladies sent over, one, Miss Maula Bahksh, agreed to spend two years in England to complete a three years' course, of which one year had been taken in India. Miss Bahksh completed her second year in December, 1925, and returned to India. She took with her a silver medal and a certificate testifying to the excellence of her work at the E.G.A. and also the Certificate of the Central Midwives Board, for whose Examination she had been trained in the Maternity School of the Hospital. Miss Lavinia Mewa, the second Indian nurse, intends to complete the regulation four years' training. In November she began her year at the Seaman's Hospital and will return for her fourth year at the

Wireless in the Wards.—The Committee gratefully express their indebtedness to the Daily News Wireless for Hospitals Fund and to the Women's Staff of the London Telephone Service, who, under the guidance of their Supervisors, Miss Cox and Miss Nurse, collected a sum of money for the Daily News Fund, sufficient to ensure the equipment of the E.G.A. and South London Hospitals. The installation in the wards was finished in time for Christmas, to the infinite satisfaction and enjoyment of the patients. The installation in the Nurses Home is being proceeded with, and the entire equipment of the Hospital and Home will be completed and handed over before this Report is in print.

E.G.A. next November. Miss Mewa has also been successful

in passing the C.M.B. Examination.

The Guilds.—The valuable work of the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital and Rosa Morison House Guilds has been continued during the year, to the great benefit of the Hospital and House of Recovery. By its Annual Pound Day Sale, on the 28th of October, the former Guild added to its fund for Hospital assistance the sum of £85 11s. 3d. and to Matron's cupboard 804lbs. of stores. In addition to the Grant of £70 for the upkeep of their cot, the Guild provided £80 8s. 0d. £35 to be used to defray part of the cost of linen for the year and the remainder to be used to help with the provision of Christmas fare, Blankets and Cushions, and a grant of £25 to the Samaritan Fund.

At Barnet, The Rosa Morison House Guild, with its large army of devoted local helpers and members, arranged and carried out, with its customary enthusiasm and success, the Garden Sale, which is held every year in June. The Sale realised £185. This substantial addition to their funds enabled the Guild to invest a further £150, to be realised in due course in aid of future extension, and in addition, to the provision of £45 to pay for the renewal of linen for the year, to give assistance with the usual Christmas expenses. (Statements of the Accounts of both Guilds will be found on pages 75 and 76.)

The Patients' League grows and flourishes exceedingly. It is constantly recruited from the ever-increasing number of grateful patients, who are only too glad to avail themselves of the varied opportunities of assisting the Hospital provided by this remarkable Association. The League's Annual Sale, held in November, was enthusiastically supported and attended by the Leaguers and their friends, and over £200 was raised by the effort. When it is remembered that the League continues to subscribe £100 yearly to the funds of the Hospital, and to make a donation of £200 to those of the House of Recovery, the fact that it is also slowly amassing a fund to name a bed in the Extension, seems really wonderful.

Christmas was as usual a time of real enjoyment and happiness both at the Hospital and House of Recovery. In addition to the customary Christmas trees, presents and fare, an entertainment in the wards was provided for the patients by the Residents, the play being written and produced by the

Secretary. The Nursing Staff in London, and the ladies of the Guild at Barnet also provided entertainments. A carol party from the School of Medicine personally conducted by Dr. Phear, Senior Physician of the Royal Free Hospital, visited the E.G.A., and Miss Dorothea Webb resumed her delightful yearly concert. The Committee tender their warm thanks to all whose kind and generous efforts at Christmas, and throughout the year, have so materially added to the happiness of the patients and increased the resources of the Hospital for this end. They would mention particularly both the Guilds, with their able and devoted Committees, the Patients' League, its officers and members, Miss Dorothea Webb and her talented band of fellow artists, Dr. Phear and his Choir, and the many ladies, both in London and Barnet, for their generous gifts and varied activities on behalf of the patients.

Acknowledgments.—Very gratefully also, the Committee would record the kindness of the Vicar of St. Pancras, his curates, and the Clergy who have visited the patients during the year, and that of Bishop Lander and the Clergy of New Barnet, who have ministered to the patients at Rosa Morison House; Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., the Honorary Auditors, the Honorary Librarians, Miss Flemming and her colleague Miss Mellersh, whose resignation has been received with much regret, Miss Dunn, and Miss Ingpen, honorary book-keeper and registrar, and to the kind and generous friends, too numerous to mention by name, a record of whose gifts and assistance is given in the ensuing pages of this Report.

It is announced, while we are preparing for the Press, that H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught and H.R.H. the Princess Arthur of Connaught have graciously consented to become Patrons of the Hospital.

DAME LOUISA ALDRICH-BLAKE, D.B.E., M.S., M.D.

Surgeon to the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital, 1894 to 1924.

MEMOIR BY MISS CHADBURN, M.D., B.S.

IN 1894 the New Hospital for Women (now the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital) was at an important stage of its development.

Mrs. Garrett Anderson had founded the dispensary; it had grown under her hands into the hospital, and the demand for, and appreciation of, the services of Medical Women had been fully proved by this growth and by the still growing condition of the hospital.

The hospital beds had been differentiated into Medical and Surgical, and Mrs. Scharlieb, by her wonderful manipulative skill, had placed its surgery on a high level, and the good reputation of the hospital was growing, in spite of the opposition to medical women at that time. A surgeon was needed to follow on, one upon whom was to fall the responsibility of solidifying the position of the hospital, founding its traditions and worthily developing the pioneer work in surgery done by Mrs. Garrett Anderson, Mrs. Scharlieb and Mrs. Stanley Boyd. Fortunately for this hospital, the right surgeon and the right woman,—each, at this moment, an equally important qualification,—was at hand. Miss Aldrich-Blake was appointed Surgeon to the Out-Patients in 1894.

During her six years as Surgeon to the Out-Patient Department Miss Aldrich-Blake was assisted by a succession of young medical women, to all of whom her character and her work were a source of inspiration. In 1900 she became Surgeon to the In-Patients Department and her great skill in surgery had free scope to develop and manifest itself. As a surgeon she was bold, courageous, thoughtful, level-headed, skilful, successful. The surgical reputation of the hospital

owes much to her. Miss Aldrich-Blake, by her brilliant surgery, her judgment, her scientific mind, her skill, her wise counsels, her impartial, serious and responsible attitude towards all she undertook to do, has contributed greatly to the status of medical women, and has been a profound influence for good on all who came in contact with her. Generations of house surgeons and students owe much to her teaching and example.

In 1914 Miss Aldrich-Blake was appointed Dean to the London School of Medicine for Women.

During the War, as Dean, she assisted in collecting and equipping medical women for various war services and she, herself, during vacation, several times went over to France and relieved the surgeons working there.

In England she filled gaps produced by surgeons who went abroad on active service. She also acted as Visiting Surgeon to the W.A.A.C. Hospital at Isleworth.

Miss Aldrich-Blake foresaw the necessity of enlargement of this Hospital, and her generous gift of the neighbouring site has made the necessary enlargement possible.

In the New Year's Honours of 1925 Miss Aldrich-Blake's professional position was publicly recognised. She was created a Dame of the Order of the British Empire. In 1924 she resigned her position as Senior Surgeon of the hospital on account of failing health. She died on Monday, December 28th, 1925, at the early age of 60, greatly lamented, much loved, having had a life full, useful, interesting, honoured.
