REVISED CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME AND PREAMBLE.

1. This Council shall be called "The National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland."
2. This Council is established in the interests of no one particular social, political or religious organisation. It has no power over the organisations of which it is composed; these incur no responsibility on account of any action taken by it or by any of its constituent bodies.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS.

1. To promote sympathy of thought and purpose among the women of Great Britain and Ireland.
2. To promote the social, civil, moral and religious welfare of the community.
3. To co-ordinate, both nationally and locally, organisations in harmony with these purposes.
4. To promote such conditions of life as will assure to every child an opportunity for full and free development.
5. To work for the removal of all disabilities of women, whether legal, economic or social.
6. To collect and re-distribute information of service to the community.
7. To form a link with the National Councils of Women in other countries through the International Council of Women.

ARTICLE III.

METHODS OF WORK.

The methods of work shall include:—

1. Forming Branches. (See Article IV.).
2. Affiliating all organisations whose work is in harmony with the objects of the National Council. (See Article IV.).
3. Forming standing Sectional Committees, and Special Committees as may be required. (See Articles XVII. and XVIII.).
4. Convening conferences and meetings and conducting enquiries.
5. Submitting to the Government and to Parliament recommendations for the amendment of the law and its administration.
6. Representing the need for national and local reforms to the proper authorities.

ARTICLE IV.

MEMBERSHIP.

The members shall be women who are:—

- (1) Members of the Branches.
- (2) Members of the Affiliated Societies.
- (3) Associate Members of the National Council

(1) BRANCHES.

(a) The Branches consist of affiliated local societies and organisations and of individual members. They promote the work and objects of the National Council as local circumstances enable them to do.

(b) Branches shall pay an annual subscription to the central funds at the rate of 25 per cent. of their ordinary membership subscriptions.

(2) AFFILIATED SOCIETIES.

Affiliated Societies are societies nationally organised or of national importance which are affiliated directly to the National Council; they shall subscribe at least £1 rs. annually to the central funds, and not less than 5/- for each representative to which they are entitled on the Representative Council.

(3) ASSOCIATE MEMBERS.

The Associate Members of the National Council are women who subscribe not less than 5/- annually to the central funds.

ARTICLE V.

THE FINANCIAL YEAR.

The Financial year of the National Council of Women shall date from May 1st to April 30th.

ARTICLE VI.

THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. The Governing Body of the National Council of Women shall be called the Representative Council.
2. The Representative Council shall consist of:—
 - (a) Honorary Officers.
 - (b) The Executive Committee. (Article XII., 3).
 - (c) Representatives of the Branches. (Article XII., 1).
 - (d) Representatives of the Affiliated Societies. (Article XII., 2).
 - (e) Representatives of the Sectional Committees. Article XII., 4).

ARTICLE VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The Executive Committee shall carry out the policy and transact the business of the Council.
2. The Executive Committee shall consist of:—
 - (a) The President and the Honorary Officers.
 - (b) Twenty-four members nominated by members of the Representative Council and elected by ballot at its annual meeting; of these twenty-four at least four shall be resident in Scotland, two in Ireland and two in Wales. Members shall remain in office for two years; twelve shall retire annually, but be eligible for re-election, provided that they shall have attended at least two meetings in each year.
 - (c) One member elected by each Branch having a direct membership of 100 and over, and one member elected by each Standing Committee of the Branches.
 - (d) Sixteen members nominated by the Affiliated Societies, and elected by ballot by their representatives at the Annual Meeting.
 - (e) The Conveners of the Sectional and Special Committees, *ex-officio*.
 - (f) Two members co-opted to represent the local Committee of the place where the Annual Council Meeting is to be held.
3. The new Executive Committee shall come into office at the conclusion of the session of Council at which it is elected.

ARTICLE VIII.

SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Sectional Committees shall be set up to further special branches of work, either by the Executive Committee or at the request of six Affiliated Societies if this be agreed to by the Executive Committee. They shall hold office for one year until their re-appointment by the new Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IX.

HONORARY OFFICERS.

1. The officers of the National Council shall be a President, an Acting Vice-President, a Treasurer, a Parliamentary Secretary and an Editor of the official organ; they shall be elected by ballot by the Representative Council, and shall retire annually but be eligible for re-election.
2. The President, Acting Vice-President, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Parliamentary Secretary, and Hon. Editor shall be *ex-officio* members of all Sectional and other Committees.

3. The President shall preside over the meetings of the Representative Council and the Executive Committee. Should she be unable to attend, the Acting Vice-President shall take her place.

4. The Acting Vice-President shall act on behalf of the President whenever necessary.

5. The Hon. Treasurer, in co-operation with the Finance Committee, shall organise the collection and supervise the expenditure of the funds, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

6. The Hon. Parliamentary Secretary, in co-operation with the Legislation Committee, shall conduct the parliamentary business. She shall not act in a similar capacity for any other organisation.

7. The Hon. Editor shall edit the Official Organ of the Council.

ARTICLE X.

VICE-PRESIDENTS.

The founders of the National Union of Women Workers, the ex-Presidents, the President and ex-Presidents of the International Council of Women, and any other women elected by the Representative Council, shall be Vice-Presidents. These Vice-Presidents must be members of the National Council of Women.

(Note.—The Committee interpret this to mean that they must be members of the National Council of Women at the time of their appointment).

ARTICLE XI.

MEETINGS.

(1) THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

(a) The Representative Council shall hold an Annual Meeting to receive reports, transact business, and elect the Executive Committee at a time and place to be arranged by the Executive Committee.

(b) A Special Meeting of the Representative Council may be summoned by the Executive Committee, and shall be summoned by the President on the requisition of eight Branches and eight Affiliated Societies.

(c) One-third of the members of the Representative Council shall form a quorum.

(2) THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

(a) The Executive Committee shall hold at least four quarterly meetings each year and monthly meetings during the Parliamentary sessions. Additional meetings may be summoned by the President.

(b) Twenty-one shall form a quorum.

(3) SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

The Sectional Committees shall meet at least four times a year, before the meetings of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XII.

BASIS OF REPRESENTATION UPON THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. Branches shall be represented in the proportion of one representative for every five of their local affiliated Societies, and of one representative for the first twenty-five and one representative for every succeeding fifty of their subscribing members.

2. Affiliated Societies shall be represented in proportion to their national importance and membership. Each Affiliated Society is entitled to one representative on the Representative Council, but this number may be increased at the discretion of the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the Representative Council. No Society shall have more than ten representatives.

3. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex-officio* members of the Representative Council.

4. Sectional and Special Committees shall each be represented by two of their members, who shall be subscribing members of the National Council.

The period for which representatives are appointed shall be from one Annual Council Meeting to the next. In the event of any of the representatives resigning during the year, the societies may appoint others in their place, but no representatives can be accepted unless their appointment is notified to the Secretary of the Council not less than a fortnight before the meeting of the Representative Council.

ARTICLE XIII.

RESOLUTIONS.

1. Resolutions for the Representative Council shall be sent to the Secretary not less than seven weeks before its meeting in order that they may be considered by the Executive Committee. In order to be placed upon the Council's agenda a resolution must have obtained the support of two Branches and of two Affiliated Societies. The Executive Committee shall group the resolutions according to subjects and shall select or draw up one resolution from each group. These resolutions as grouped shall be circulated among the Members of the Representative Council.

2. The Executive Committee shall have power to place resolutions upon the agenda.

3. Each Member of the Representative Council, Secretary of a Branch, Affiliated Society or Sectional Committee shall receive, not less than five weeks before a meeting of the Representative Council, a copy of the resolutions which have received the necessary support for being moved at the meeting, provided that in the case of Special Meetings the Executive Committee, if there is urgency, may reduce the notice to not less than ten days.

4. A Branch or Affiliated Society desiring to place in its name on the final Council Agenda any amendment to the resolutions, shall send a copy of such amendment to the Secretary in time to be received by her not less than three weeks before the Council Meeting. The Executive Committee shall have power to place amendments on the Council's agenda.

5. The Final Agenda shall be circulated to each member of the Representative Council, Secretary of a Branch or Affiliated Society, not less than seven days before the meeting of the Representative Council.

6. Urgency business must be sanctioned by the Executive Committee, and must have the support of two-thirds of the members present at the Committee meeting and voting.

7. No matter shall be discussed at any meeting of the Representative Council which has not been included upon the agenda, unless specially sanctioned as urgency business.

8. A resolution or any amendment to a resolution, to be carried by the Representative Council, must be passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting.

9. Resolutions passed by the Representative Council shall decide the policy of the Council until reversed or modified at a further meeting of the Council. Any members of Council shall have the right to require that the voting strength for and against be appended to the resolution for all purposes of publication and use, e.g., in the public press and in communications to public departments and authorities.

10. Branches and Affiliated Societies shall not be considered responsible for the opinions of the Representative Council as expressed by resolutions, unless and until they have themselves affirmed the resolution passed by the Council at a meeting. When resolutions passed by the Representative Council are published, a statement of the non-participation of any Society may be inserted.

ARTICLE XIV.
NOMINATIONS.

1. Members of the Representative Council have the right to nominate candidates for election to the Executive Committee. Nomination forms giving the attendances of the Executive Committee members during the past year shall be sent to the Secretaries of Branches and Affiliated Societies of the Representative Council two months before the Annual Meeting and shall be returned to the Secretary within three weeks of their receipt. The consent of those nominated shall be first obtained by the nominator, and no one shall be eligible who has not been a subscribing member of the National Council of Women for at least one year.

2. The Secretary shall forward to each member of the Representative Council and to each Secretary of a Branch, Affiliated Society, or Sectional Committee for their information, one month prior to the Annual Meeting, a complete list of the names and addresses of all nominees for election to the Executive Committee, with the names of three nominators in the case of new nominees.

ARTICLE XV.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL.

1. The meetings of the Representative Council shall each day open with silent prayer.

2. The Representative Council shall not transact business unless one-third of the members of the Representative Council are present.

3. Members of the Representative Council and Secretaries of Branches, Affiliated Societies and Sectional Committees shall receive notices, agenda and all papers relating to the business of the Representative Council.

4. Meetings of the Representative Council shall be open to the press unless the Council shall otherwise resolve. Copies of the resolutions carried at meetings of the Representative Council shall be sent to the press at the earliest possible moment after their receipt by the authorities to whom they are ordered to be sent.

5. Members desiring to speak shall send up their names, speak from the platform and address the Chair. Short questions may be asked or points of order raised from the body of the meeting.

6. The ruling of the Chair, on a point of order, on the advisability of a personal explanation, or on the time limit, shall be final and shall not be open to discussion.

7. Amendments to resolutions may be moved at the meeting.

8. Every amendment shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chair.

9. No member shall, without permission from the Chair, address the Council more than once on any resolution or amendment; the mover of an original motion may, however, reply, but she shall confine herself to answering the previous speakers and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. After the reply, the question shall be put forthwith. The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment which, having been carried, has become the substantive resolution.

10. Any member, whether she has spoken on the matter or not, may rise to a point of order, to ask a question, or in explanation; such explanation shall be confined to some material part of her former speech, which may not have been understood. A member so rising shall be entitled to be heard forthwith.

11. Any member of the Representative Council shall have power to move at the Council Meeting that the order of the resolutions be altered.

12. A resolution or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the seconder and of the meeting, which shall be signified without debate; and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal unless such permission shall have been refused.

13. A member who has formally seconded an amendment can speak to it at a later stage.

14. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of, but any speaker to the amendment may give notice of a further amendment which she will move when the other shall have been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall become the substantive resolution, upon which any further amendment shall be moved.

15. Tellers shall be appointed at the meeting for the purpose of recording the votes when a count is taken.

16. The vote shall in the first place be taken by a show of hands or by members standing. A minority may demand a count.

17. A resolution for the suspension of a Standing Order shall have a two-thirds majority.

ARTICLE XVI.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The meetings of the Executive Committee shall open with silent prayer.

2. The Chairman shall not vote as a member of the Executive Committee but shall have a casting vote.

3. Minutes of the proceedings of every meeting shall be taken by the Secretary.

4. Members when speaking shall address the Chair.

5. The ruling of the Chair on a point of order, or on the advisability of a personal explanation, shall be final.

6. A resolution or amendment moved at the meeting shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chair.

7. A resolution or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the seconder and of the meeting, which shall be signified without debate; and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.

8. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of, but any speaker to the amendment may give notice of a further amendment which she will move when the other has been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall become the substantive resolution, upon which any further amendment shall be moved.

9. A member wishing to have a subject placed upon the agenda must give at least 18 days' notice to the Secretary.

10. The Executive Committee shall arrange for meetings of the Representative Council. The Committee may arrange for submitting to the Council any Urgency business or resolution, provided that two-thirds of the members of the Executive Committee present and voting support the motion to support such business or resolution as urgent.

11. Notices of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be forwarded to the Hon Secretaries of the Sectional and other Committees, who have the right to attend the meetings and to speak, but not to vote.

12. A resolution agreed to by the Executive Committee shall not be rescinded or altered by them, unless some member of the Executive Committee shall have given notice to the Secretary 18 days before the meeting of the Executive Committee of a motion to rescind or alter such resolution, which notice shall be forthwith entered on the agenda by the Secretary.

13. In taking public action with regard to subjects upon which the Representative Council has not defined its policy and upon which opinion is strongly divided, the Executive Committee shall only take action if notice of the proposal has been placed upon the agenda, which shall be circulated a fortnight before the meeting, and if such action has been approved by

two-thirds of the members present and voting. Provided that in dealing with resolutions which Sectional Committees desire to bring before the Executive Committee, notice of the subjects of the proposed resolutions shall, if possible, be given in a supplementary agenda to be issued to members with the ordinary agenda. Copies in type, giving the actual wording of the proposed resolutions, shall also be given to each member of the Executive Committee at the meeting.

14. A resolution for the suspension of the Standing Orders shall require a two-thirds majority of those present and voting.

15. These Standing Orders can only be amended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a meeting of the Executive Committee, if notice of such amendment has appeared on the circulated agenda.

16. The Executive may make bye-laws for its own guidance.

ARTICLE XVII.

CONSTITUTION OF SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Sectional Committees shall be set up to further special branches of work, either at the decision of the Executive Committee or when requested by six Affiliated Societies and agreed to by the Executive Committee. They shall hold office for one year until their reappointment by the new Executive Committee.

In the formation of a new Sectional Committee the Executive Committee shall appoint its provisional convener.

1. **Constitution.** Each Sectional Committee shall consist of:—

(a) One representative from each nationally organised society affiliated or not affiliated to the National Council of Women, which by reason of its objects is concerned with the subject with which the Sectional Committee deals. The Executive Committee shall be arbiter as to which societies are eligible for this representation and shall decide the degree of representation, having regard to the national importance of the societies concerned.

(b) One representative from each Branch and Standing Committee of the National Council of Women.

(c) One representative from each of such Sectional Committees as desire representation.

(d) The honorary officers of the National Council of Women, in addition to the Convener of the Sectional Committee.

(e) Not more than eight members co-opted by the Committee, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

NOTE.—The **Public Service Sectional Committee** shall in addition consist of women engaged in public work elected by the Committee.

The **International Sectional Committee** shall in addition consist of the ten representatives of the British National Council upon the Standing Committees of the International Council of Women.

2. **Public Action.** A Sectional Committee may take public action in its own name if it has obtained the consent of the Executive Committee. In cases of urgency, where the Sectional Committee has the support of two-thirds of the members present and voting upon a motion of which notice has been given, it may take public action if it has obtained the consent of the President.

ARTICLE XVIII.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Special Committees shall be set up by the Executive Committee as required.

ARTICLE XIX.

ALTERATION OF THE CONSTITUTION.

This constitution shall only be altered at the Annual Meeting of the Representative Council by an amendment to be carried by two-thirds of the members present and voting. Notice of any proposed alteration shall be sent in writing to the Executive Committee at such date previous to the Council Meeting as may be determined by the Executive Committee, and shall be printed and circulated to the members of the Representative Council.

STANDING ORDERS FOR SECTIONAL COMMITTEES.

Reappointment of Sectional Committees.—The members of each Sectional Committee shall be eligible for reappointment by the new Executive Committee. Nominations for each Committee must be sent to its Hon. Secretary.

The Hon. Secretary of the Committee shall forward to the Secretary of the N.C.W. a complete list of the names and addresses of the members standing for re-election and of the new nominees, for submission to the new Executive Committee at its first Meeting.

Election of Officers.—Each Sectional Committee shall elect its Convener from among its own members; she shall act as Chairman, and shall represent the Committee on the Executive.

A Convener who has not attended at least two meetings during the year shall be disqualified for nomination for the ensuing year.

Nominations for the Convener, whose consent to stand must first have been obtained by the nominator, shall be sent to the Hon. Secretary of the Committee not less than fourteen days before the Meeting of the Committee which immediately precedes the first Meeting of the new Executive. The Hon. Secretary shall place the names of the nominees upon the agenda paper, which shall be sent out to the members of the Committee. In the event of there being more than one nominee, the election shall be by ballot.

Each Sectional Committee shall appoint its own Hon. Secretary and other officers, who shall be subscribers to the funds of the N.C.W.

Each Sectional Committee may, at the discretion of the Convener, invite the attendance of experts on any given subject, and of visitors.

Meetings.—Each Sectional Committee shall, if possible, meet four times a year. The Hon. Secretary shall give at least seven days' notice of the Meetings, specifying the business to be transacted thereat.

The Convener and Hon. Secretary of each Sectional Committee shall have power, when necessary, to summon an Urgency Meeting. They shall state the business for which such a meeting is called, and no other business shall be considered at that meeting except by leave of the Committee given by a two-thirds majority.

Procedure.—Each Sectional Committee shall determine its method of procedure and fix its own quorum, which shall not be less than seven.

The Hon. Secretary of each Sectional Committee shall keep the minutes of the meetings.

A Sectional Committee desiring to form a special sub-committee shall obtain the consent of the Executive Committee.

Reports.—Each Sectional Committee shall present a Report of its proceedings to the Executive Committee. A copy of this Report shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the N.C.W. and filed at the office.

Each Sectional Committee shall present an Annual Report to the National Council of Women at its Annual Meeting. A copy of this report shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the N.C.W. for publication in the Annual Report. The reception of such report shall not pledge the National Council to support any policy which may be advocated therein.

Connection with Branches.—A Sectional Committee shall not ask any Branch to take action in regard to any legislative measure without the consent of the Executive Committee.

In communicating with Branches, the Committee shall clearly state that such communication is sent by the Sectional Committee, and not by the Executive Committee.

Representation of Sectional Committees.—Each Sectional Committee shall appoint two representatives, who are subscribers to the Central Fund, to serve upon the Representative Council of Women (see p—).

The Convener of each Sectional Committee is *ex-officio* a Member of the Executive Committee; and the Hon. Secretary may attend the meetings of the Executive Committee and speak, but not vote.

Each Sectional Committee shall appoint a representative to serve upon the Finance Committee of the N.C.W.

Finance.—The ordinary expenses of each Sectional Committee, i.e., postages, stationery, and any necessary printing, shall be defrayed out of the funds of the National Council of Women—£5 being the maximum sum per annum which can be refunded. The Hon. Secretary of the Committee shall forward her statement of accounts to the Office not later than the first week in March.

BRANCHES, THEIR POWERS AND DUTIES.

1. Branches are composed of representatives of local Societies and organisations, the work of which is in harmony with the objects of the Council, and of individual subscribing members. They carry out the work of the Council in their own locality. Each Branch elects its own President, Secretary and other officers.

2. Branches formulate their own rules, but must be prepared to assist the work and objects of the N.C.W. as local circumstances enable them to do.

3. Branches shall pay an annual subscription to the Central Fund at the rate of not less than 25 per cent. of the ordinary membership subscription collected from individuals and societies.

4. Branches of 100 members and upwards, among whom shall be representatives of the various activities and organisations in the locality, shall have the right to elect their President, Secretary, or other member of their Committee, to serve on the Executive Committee of the N.C.W.

5. Branches shall have the right to appoint a representative to serve on each Sectional Committee.

6. Branches shall be represented upon the Representative Council in the proportion of one for every five of their local Societies, and one for the first twenty-five and one for every succeeding fifty of their subscribing members. Should a member elected to serve on the Council resign during the year, another may be elected in her place, but no representative shall be accepted unless her appointment has been notified to the Secretary of the National Council at least a fortnight before the Council Meeting.

7. A Branch may send in to the Executive Committee resolutions for the Representative Council. Such resolutions must be supported by one other Branch and by two Affiliated Societies, and shall be placed upon the Agenda of the Representative Council.

Branches desiring to place in their name on the final Council Agenda any amendments to the resolutions, shall dispatch copies of such amendments to the Secretary of the N.C.W. in time to be received by her not less than three weeks before the Council Meeting.

8. Branches shall not be considered responsible for the opinion of the Council as expressed by resolutions, unless and until they have themselves affirmed the resolution passed by the Council at a meeting of the Branch.

9. Branches shall be notified through their Secretaries of all Meetings of the Representative Council.

10. Branches shall send a report of their work for insertion in "The Occasional Paper," and an annual report to the Secretary of the N.C.W. when issued.

N.B.—Members wishing to form a Branch are asked to communicate in the first instance with the Secretary of the N.C.W.

AFFILIATED SOCIETIES, THEIR RELATION TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

1. Affiliated Societies are entitled to appoint one representative on the Representative Council, but this representation may be increased to a number not exceeding ten at the discretion of the Executive Committee, subject to the approval of the Representative Council.

Should a member elected to serve on the Council resign during the year, another may be elected in her place, but no representative shall be accepted unless her appointment has been notified to the Secretary of the National Council at least a fortnight before the Council Meeting.

2. Affiliated Societies shall pay an annual subscription to the Central Funds of not less than £1 is. Should they be entitled to elect more than four Members of Council, an additional sum of 5s. is due on behalf of each additional member. Any Society which has not paid its subscription before the Annual Meeting of the National Council shall, after due notice, cease to be affiliated.

3. Affiliated Societies may send to the Executive Committee resolutions for the Representative Council. Such resolutions must be supported by one other Affiliated Society, and by two Branches of the N.C.W., and shall be placed upon the Agenda of the Representative Council.

4. Affiliated Societies incur no responsibility on account of any action taken either by the National Council of Women or by any other Affiliated Society, unless they have affirmed a resolution passed by the Council at a Meeting of the Society.

5. Affiliated Societies shall each receive through their Hon. Secretaries notice of all Meetings of the Representative Council and a free copy of the Handbook and Annual Report and of "The Occasional Paper."

6. Affiliated Societies shall be entitled to display and sell their literature on one of the bookstalls at the Annual Meeting.

N.B.—Societies desiring to affiliate shall make application to the Executive Committee on a form to be obtained from the Secretary.

EXTRACTS FROM THE CONSTITUTION OF THE
INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

The International Council of Women is a federation of National Councils or Unions of Women formed in various countries for the promotion of unity and mutual understanding between all associations of women working for the common welfare of the community. It was organised in 1883, and has as its motto the Golden Rule.

The following extracts from its Constitution are printed here as bearing on the inter-relations of the N.C.W. and the I.C.W.

ARTICLE II.—*General Policy.*

1. This International Council is organised in the interests of no one particular propaganda, and excludes from its programme political and religious questions of a controversial nature affecting the inter-relationship of two or more countries.

2. This International Council has no power over its members beyond that of suggestion and sympathy: therefore no National Council voting to become a member of the International Council shall render itself liable to be interfered with in respect to its complete organic unity, independence, or method of work, or to any utterance or act of this International Council, beyond compliance with the terms of this Constitution, and harmonious action therewith. National Councils are at liberty to make any communication as individual Councils one to another, but propaganda to be officially circulated amongst the affiliated National Councils in the name of the International Council shall not deal with the subjects referred to in Paragraph 1.

ARTICLE IV.—*Members.*

1. Any National Council, formed of National Societies, of Local Councils, and Unions of representative Societies and Institutions, provided that their Constitution be in harmony with the basis of the Constitution of the International Council, may become a member of the International Council, with the approval of the Executive, and by the payment of £20 (100 dollars) every five years. This sum shall be paid into the Treasury of the International Council in yearly instalments.*

3. Any person, whose name is accepted by the Executive Committee and approved by the Council of her own nation, where one exists, may become a *life* patron of this Council, upon the payment of £40 (200 dollars); or may become a quinquennial contributor on the payment of £5 (25 dollars) within the quinquennial period.

STANDING ORDERS FOR THE COUNCIL. I. MEETINGS.

8. Secretaries of affiliated National Councils are required to send an extract of the minute of Committee or Council appointing the delegates and their alternates (in the event of the inability of the delegates to attend) to the Corresponding Secretary a full month before the Quinquennial Council Meeting, supplying the names and addresses of the ladies appointed; also to provide each delegate or alternate with credentials.

9. The responsibility for the appointment and instruction of delegates rests solely with the bodies appointing, and delegates are required to act in strict accordance with the instructions of the affiliated National Councils which they represent, and on points which may incidentally arise, as far as they can judge, in accordance with the spirit of that organisation, and not as individuals.

* This is the only liability in regard to the expenditure of the International Council of Women incurred by the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland.

Affiliated National Councils shall be free to give liberty to their delegates to vote according to their own convictions on any matter on which the National Councils consider they have not sufficient information, and where they feel that discussion might materially alter the point of view.

10. All ordinary members of affiliated National Councils are also members of the International Council of Women, and shall be entitled to be present as hearers at the meetings of the International Council, but may not take part in the proceedings without special invitation from the Chair.

IV. STANDING ORDERS FOR THE INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEES.

1. The foregoing Standing Orders shall be observed by all Committees of the International Council, so far as they are applicable.

3. The ordinary members of the Standing Committees shall be delegates appointed by the National Councils, each Council to have one member on each Committee; [any Standing Committee may invite experts (men or women) on the special subject of the Committee to take part in their proceedings].

4. No Convener of a Standing Committee shall be eligible to act at the same time as the member for the National Council of her country in that particular Committee.

STANDING ORDERS FOR INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL PUBLICATIONS.

1. All information regarding the business programme of the International Council, its Executive, its Committees, its Quinquennial, or other Meetings, shall first appear in official form (in the "Transactions," the "Annual Report," or in official or printed communications from the President's Office) before it is incorporated in the printed matter of any individual National Council.

2. The Secretary of each affiliated National Council shall furnish the Corresponding Secretary of the International Council with an account, not previously published elsewhere, of the work carried on by the National Council of Women of her country during the foregoing year, such account not to exceed 2,000—2,500 words in length, to be written in any of the three official languages—French, German, or English—and to be in the hands of the Corresponding Secretary not later than May 15th in each year. All these National Council Reports shall be published together in the Annual Report of the International Council of Women.

STANDING ORDERS FOR BRITISH REPRESENTATIVES ON THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

On the International Council of Women :—

(1) The N.C.W. is represented on the International Council of Women by 10 delegates (including its President) and 10 proxies. These shall be elected by nomination and ballot at the Annual Meeting of the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland preceding the Quinquennial Meeting of the I.C.W. It shall be open to all members of Council to enter nominations for the 10 delegates and 10 proxies to serve on the International Council of Women, and these shall be voted on in Council. If a delegate after appointment be unavoidably prevented from serving, or resign office, the proxy with the highest number of votes shall be invited to replace her; in all cases proxies shall be called upon in order of their recorded votes. The term of office of the delegates is for 5 years. The term of office of proxies lasts during the time occupied by the Special Meeting which they are appointed to attend. Instructions as to future duties shall be made clear to delegates and proxies on their appointment.

(2) The delegates from the National Council shall give a united vote,

and the National Council, whenever possible, shall previously instruct its delegates as to the lines on which they shall vote.

In the case of unforeseen questions arising at the I.C.W. Council Meetings, the N.C.W. President or her proxy shall call together the delegates of Great Britain and Ireland in Council, and shall decide with them on the casting of their vote.

On the International Executive Committee :—

(3) The N.C.W. is represented on the Executive Committee of the International Council of Women by its President.

On the International Standing Committees :—

(4) The N.C.W. is represented on each Standing Committee of the I.C.W. by one Representative, appointed by the Executive Committee of the N.C.W. by nomination and ballot.

(5) The Reports, prepared by the Representatives for presentation to their several I.C.W. Standing Committees, shall consist of statements of fact, not of expressions of personal opinion: they shall be as brief as is possible consistently with lucidity.

The Reports shall be presented to, and approved by, the Executive Committee of the N.C.W., before they are sent to the Conveners of the I.C.W. Standing Committees.

(6) The nominations of General Officers and Conveners of Standing Committees of the I.C.W. shall be submitted by the Executive Committee to the Council, and shall be freely open to discussion, or, if necessary, to a vote.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE NATIONAL
COUNCIL OF WOMEN OF GREAT BRITAIN
AND IRELAND

IN LEICESTER

FROM

24th to 27th, June, 1919.

THE MAYORESS OF LEICESTER, speaking on behalf of the ancient City of Leicester, which, since the King's visit in the previous week they were now privileged once again to call a city, said in her address of welcome, how very glad and proud they were to receive the members of the National Council of Women, and expressed the hope that their stay might be a very pleasant and profitable one.

MISS CLEPHAN, in seconding the Mayoress's welcome, reminded those present that the visit to Leicester had originally been planned for 1915. Since then much had happened, but in spite of the war the work of the Council had grown and expanded in a marvellous way, owing, she thought, to a large extent, to the wonderful zeal and activity of the President, Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon. She was proud also to be linked up through the National Council, with the International Council of Women, and to welcome its President, the Marchioness of Aberdeen and Temair, as well as visitors from Australia, France, Belgium, Denmark, Holland, Serbia, Iceland, and even from Japan. Miss Clephan hoped they would like meeting in the De Montfort Hall, on whose site Simon de Montfort, "the Father of Parliaments," must often have walked.

MRS. OGILVIE GORDON in thanking the previous speakers for their very kind welcome, reminded the members how history repeated itself, and as Simon de Montfort in olden days rode out from Runnymede to sign the Magna Carta of England, so we hoped that within this week a Peace Charter would be signed which would bring new hope and liberty to many nations throughout the world. The President then personally introduced the visitors from overseas to the meeting, and messages of con-

gratulation were sent to the National Councils in countries where women had recently received the Suffrage. A cablegram bearing cordial greetings from the National Council of Women of Canada was read to the meeting, and instructions were given to convey to all the National Councils of Women the greetings of the British Council.

THE MARCHIONESS OF ABERDEEN AND TEMAIR expressed the thanks of the delegates from overseas, whose presence there foretold a gathering together before very long of the International Council of Women. They had met in the preceding week in informal Conference in London, and she hoped that the work of the International Council, which had been interrupted just five years ago after a memorable Conference in Rome, might be resumed next year at a meeting in Norway.

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

ON

THE NEW PATRIOTISM.

MRS. OGILVIE GORDON said:—

In this summer of 1919, we stand on the threshold of a new era which the historian of the future will probably term the Era of Internationalism. It has been brought forth by great human cataclysms of war in which seven million lives have been lost. It is curious how closely analogous the happenings of humanity are with those of the natural world. Evidence has been preserved for us in the rocks of our ancient Mother Earth that, over and over again in the history of the ages, some destructive force has swept over whole groups of existing life and shattered them, and the succeeding age has witnessed new forms, new habits, new grouping in the faunas and floras of the world. Often very beautiful structures were lost and never re-appeared, but in the main the changes were for the better and denoted progress towards higher and more perfected forms.

Let us then take courage when we view with dismay the spoliation and sorrows of the last few years in Europe, and let us set our faces with hope to the new aspects and standards that have been ushered into our midst.

The chief new social structure that has arisen from the world-storm of war is the Covenant of the League of Nations; and surely every gentle-hearted woman in all continents, from

Iceland to New Zealand, and from Japan to California, will bend herself to the welcome task of inculcating the noble ideals and principles of the Covenant. The love of humanity and understanding that oversteps political and geographical boundaries should be able to reveal themselves more easily and unreservedly in women than in men, in virtue of the inborn protective instinct of motherhood in all women. Be that as it may, it is certain that the best advocates for the future Peace of the world will be the women populations of the diverse countries, and that the prospects of success for the League will be vastly enhanced if women are from its commencement made full partners with men in responsibility for its control.

Women have been among the first to organise themselves upon International lines. They have long proclaimed Internationalism as the only sure foundation for the betterment of social conditions, the eradication of social sores, and the elevation of national standards of justice and morality. The formation of the International Council of Women in 1888, was at the time a remarkable step in advance and a great augury for the future.

As another testimony to women's prophetic vision in the international field of politics, we may recall the meeting of that Council held in London in 1899, when the first of its International Committees was founded by the unanimous vote of women representing seventeen countries. That first Committee, was the Peace and Arbitration Committee,—a veritable Women's Commission established twenty years in advance of the League of Nations, for the securing of an authoritative system of arbitration to deal with disputes arising between nations, and to further the cause of Peace. The promoters were at the time called faddists, enthusiasts, visionaries, but in reality they merited the name of International Stateswomen.

Who shall say but that some of the seed sown with such faith and fervour by Mrs. May Wright Sewall, Convener of that Committee, and by other distinguished American women, has borne fruit in the famous fourteen points of President Wilson and in his determination to associate with the Paris Treaty of Peace an agreed Covenant for a League of Nations?

In the same year, in 1899, the Council formed an International Bureau of Information and a Committee on Laws; and an

active interchange of papers and reports was set up between the affiliated National Councils of Women in the different countries. Propagandist work was undertaken in lands where womanhood had not yet found self-expression through organised bodies, and women of the more progressive nations gave themselves voluntarily to the work of spreading knowledge of social reforms among women all over the world.

In succeeding years further Committees were established and there can be no doubt whatsoever that through the manifold activities of this pioneer Council founded on an international basis, women far removed in space from each other were brought into the most intimate communion of spirit, and were led to take a living interest in the wellbeing of nations other than their own and thereby a broader grasp of the problems of their own nation. A new and more open-minded patriotism was developed, in which one's own land was seen in truer perspective alongside others.

One learns much by comparison and clear exposition of difficulties. The members of these International Committees with great enterprise gathered together from time to time, and discussed with sympathy and mutual understanding the conditions of the houses in their respective countries, where children were bred and mothers toiled; the teaching in the schools and its limitations; the lack of adequate playing-spaces for children and adolescents; the unsatisfactory and often deplorable life of the streets, and its temptations for youth; the hours of labour and the wages for boys and girls in factories; the health and morality of the peoples; the conditions of home work among women engaged in sweated industries; the relations of men and women in industry and in the professions; the rights of citizenship for women; marriage and nationality laws.

These and many other features of the social fabric in industrial and highly developed countries, which were then receiving but scant attention from the various legislatures, were being studied widely and intensively under the International Council of Women. Certain of the subjects were also undertaken by other International organisations formed later, *e.g.*, the International Women's Suffrage Alliance, the International Labour organisation, the International Women's League.

It is only now, since the decimation of our populations by

the war, that our own and other National Governments are placing these questions in the front rank of legislation, and are urging local authorities to hasten the putting into operation of many new measures of social reform. We also understand that international commissions are to be established under the control of the League of Nations, to consider these matters internationally. And, seeing that the Covenant of the League accords full eligibility of women for membership in its Assembly and Commissions, we must make it our business to press for the actual appointment of women.

It would be more than unfortunate if at this critical time women who have won both National and International experience and who have co-operated with men in numerous societies for the promotion of these objects, were not to serve by the side of men as members in these new commissions of the League of Nations.

Experience of the working of an international body has taught women some useful lessons—for example,

- (a) that it is the duty and privilege of the more enlightened nations to help forward the less advanced, and that only if they do so can any general progress be obtained.
- (b) that the strength of the whole international bond of nations may be measured by its weakest link ;
- (c) that the strength of the international bond lies in the spirit of its fulfilment, and not in material factors ;
- (d) that the necessity laid upon speakers in an international assemblage to use the simplest possible language is in itself an excellent discipline in international method, since it makes for frankness and directness in dealing ;
- (e) that even if an international discussion should prove that unanimity on certain points cannot be obtained, the personal contact and interchange of views between the representatives eliminates one chief cause of misunderstanding, namely, the lack of apprehension of any other nation's point of view than one's own ;
- (f) that, given favourable conditions, a good patriot soon becomes a good internationalist.

There are still those who think it is unpatriotic to be internationally-minded, yet it seems obvious that the man who understands the needs of his own country and wishes well for his country, must also wish well for others, since to-day the

action and interaction of trading and commercial relations is such that if any group of nations should fail to play their part in the world's economy, all the others must suffer.

It is of no use to try to evade the natural working of great economic laws of supply and demand, production and distribution ; and the international aspects of these laws have been immensely accentuated by the rapid developments in aircraft and the many new and ingenious applications of science to processes of industry and means of transport. The old and narrow sense of patriotism is an anachronism in the world which men and women are striving to re-habilitate to-day. Its place is taken by something finer, more altruistic, and, above all, more in harmony with Christian ideals.

It is true that the new patriotism, as we are learning it in this land, makes far larger demands upon our energies and our purses (if we have any money left at all), and is to that extent disturbing and disquieting ! On the other hand, its trend is to level up and equalise the standards of living and enlightenment among the various sections of the community and to assure justice and equity within the British Commonwealth, and between that Commonwealth and other Nations.

The new patriotism merges imperceptibly into international thought, and opens up a vista in which politics are but the hand-maiden of a revealed humanity. The nearer we come to its ideals and aspirations, the better shall we do homage to the men who in the war sacrificed their lives, their careers, their young strength and vitality, in order that good might endure and nations be brought to live in amity with one another.

Our part as the National Council of Women in our own country is clear. We have to continue to help the men all we possibly can, and in order to help them the most effectively, we must continue to press forward to sit in their counsels and secure equality for men and women in the constitution and customs of our land.

Again, the shadow of the past five years stretches out in front of us and is thrown over the younger generation. We shall have to redouble our efforts to help the young children and the older boys and girls, to brace them in body and mind for the struggle of life, and to guide legislation so that it may afford them every assistance and safeguard.

In this and other public work it will be our greatest

achievement if we can succeed, as a central affiliating body for women's societies, in bringing women together and arriving at agreed plans of campaign in respect of reforms which are universally desired by women. At least a preliminary sounding of views among societies should be taken on any important question. If there is agreement, so much the better, the campaign can be quickly organised and all will help. If there are sharp divisions of opinion, it will clear our minds to hear them, and will compel us to investigate the question more and more closely and form carefully considered judgments.

The essential altruism of the new patriotism may be usefully applied to the working of societies. There ought to be a still keener interest taken in each other's special aims, still more mobility and freemasonry of thought, and closer co-operation and co-ordination in the activities of women's Societies, both throughout the country and in influencing Parliamentary and Government opinion. Nationally regarded, our Council is the centralising and cementing body, and we must never lose sight of this great function entrusted to us.

Internationally regarded as a component part of the International Council of Women, it should be peculiarly the function of this National Council, as it will be the function also of the National Councils of Women in other lands, to give whole-hearted support to the League of Nations. And I suggest that this could best be done by our Council in consultation with the British representatives of other international bodies and leading national Societies of Women. It might be possible to create some central National Committee of Women to act in direct connection with the Secretariat of the League for the dissemination of literature and propagandist work generally. Opportunity will be given for the discussion of this important question during the present meetings. The whole matter concerning the League of Nations and its Commissions is very urgent, and within the next few weeks British Women will have to take decisions that may have far-reaching consequences.

That is why, ladies, I have devoted my opening remarks as President to the subject of the new patriotism and its relation to internationalism, and have ventured to recall to your minds the high responsibility of our Council as the British representative in the pioneer women's international organisation

It almost seems as if under the beneficent influence of the Council idea, our organisation had been got ready for just such a time of strain and trial as this.

The day of our meeting coincides with the first assurance of an agreed Peace. A few days more and the historic document of the Paris Treaty will have been signed. There will dawn a period of recuperation and healing for the war-worn nations. Fellow-members! This is Our Day as Women, the day and time for tact and gentleness, patience, encouragement and faith.

May we prove ourselves worthy of the fine insight into the future that marked the genius of the first International Stateswomen. May the womanhood of the nations, that no less than the manhood, won its spurs before the world in the ordeal of war, be enabled now to assume with calm and dignity its due and proper share in the national and international counsels for re-construction and the betterment of humanity.

MRS. OGILVIE GORDON then asked the Council whether they would wish to despatch to their Majesties, the King and Queen, their hearty congratulations on the signing of the Peace Treaty; and also to the Prime Minister, M. Clémenceau and President Wilson on the successful result of their labours.

This was agreed and the telegrams were forthwith despatched.

The General Secretary, MISS NORAH E. GREEN, then presented the Annual Report, as follows:—

TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

1918-1919.

Owing to the fact that the financial year of the National Council of Women now ends on 30th April, this report covers a period of only seven months. These have, however, been months of very great activity, the Executive Committee having met six times with an average attendance of 59 members, and no fewer than 81 meetings of the Committee have taken place.

Your Committee learnt with very great regret of the death of Miss Clifford, of Bristol, in January last, while in April another sad loss was sustained in the death of Miss Lidgett; both had been honoured members of the National Council of Women since its earliest days, Miss Clifford having served as its beloved President from 1904 to 1905, while Miss Lidgett's name

will always be closely associated with the work of the Rural Housing Association. A Bristol memorial to Miss Clifford is being erected in the shape of a tablet in the cathedral and a portrait in the Bristol Art Gallery.

The Committee also passed a vote expressing its deep sympathy with the President in her most sad and sudden bereavement. Dr. Gordon died on 22nd March after only a few hours' illness. None but members of the N.C.W. can fully appreciate the sacrifices which Mrs. Gordon has made on its behalf, and the foremost place which she has always given to its interests.

As a result of the election, which was this year entrusted by the Council to the Executive Committee, the following additional General Officers have been appointed:—

Mrs. Edwin Gray as Acting Vice-President, and

Mrs. Fabian Ware as Hon. Parliamentary Secretary.

Mrs. Prothero has received the hearty congratulations of the Committee upon her husband's elevation to the peerage as Lord Ernle, and Lady Hulse, Mrs. Alan Gray and Miss Edmonds were congratulated on their election to the Salisbury, Cambridge and Portsmouth Town Councils respectively.

Very kind acknowledgments have been received to the telegrams of congratulation which were sent from Harrogate by the Council to Marshal Foch and to the Army, Navy and Air Force. Marshal Foch telegraphed:—"Très sensible a vos félicitations. Je vous en remercie sincèrement en mon nom et au nom des Armées Alliées," while the following encouraging telegram was received from Sir Douglas Haig:—"All ranks join with me in sending heartiest thanks to the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland, and take this opportunity of expressing their appreciation of their splendid services during the war."

The past seven months have seen the formation of no less than four new Committees.

(1) As the result of the successful meeting on Women in Engineering in Harrogate a Committee for *Women's Work in Engineering and the Allied Trades* has been formed, and sent deputations to the Ministry of Labour on 24th February and to the Amalgamated Society of Engineers on 12th May. The members urged the claims of women, without prejudice to the pledge which was given by the Government to the trade unions to the effect that all men should be re-instated.

(2) A *Committee on the Economic Position of Nurses* has been formed with the President as Convener. This Committee

is the outcome of a Conference of the Societies interested, which was called by the Executive at the request of Dr. Crouch, of Ascot, on 18th February, when Dr. Crouch and Dr. Wallace gave addresses. Mrs. Mundy is acting as Hon. Secretary of the Committee, and Miss Sandon as Secretary, and the financial help given by Dr. Crouch has enabled offices to be taken at 24, Westminster Palace Gardens, S.W. With the co-operation of most of the Affiliated Societies interested, a comprehensive questionnaire on the hours of work, salaries and physical welfare of nurses in training has been issued to the various hospitals, and 170 replies have already been received. Your Committee much regret that, after supporting the resolution proposing the formation of his special Committee, the College of Nursing withdrew on the score that it had not sufficient representation on the Committee, and issued a separate questionnaire.

(3) In response to the request forwarded by the National British Women's Temperance Association and subscribed to by six of the other Affiliated Societies, a Committee has recently been appointed to deal with the important question of *Temperance*, and held its first meeting on 7th May. Miss Agnes Slack has been elected as its Convener.

(4) On the suggestion of the President, a special Committee was formed in November, 1918, to watch the progress of the *Ministry of Health Bill* in its stages through Parliament. This Committee especially welcomed clause IV., sections 1 and 2 of the Bill, establishing Consultative Councils, "such Councils to include persons of both sexes." The Committee was not in favour of the proposal put forward by the Ministry of Health Watching Council under Lady Rhondda for the formation of a Consultative Council composed of women only, since it was of opinion that all aspects of the health of the people were the concern equally of both men and women, and that the true path of national progress lay in the direction of joint consultation on all matters concerning the welfare of the community. A deputation from the Committee was received by Dr. Addison on this subject on 18th March. As the Act now stands, all Committees are to be composed of both sexes. Your Committee also took all possible steps to secure the re-introduction in the House of Lords of the amendment passed in Committee stage and afterwards deleted in the Report stage in the House of Commons, which provided that all official appointments under the Bill should be open to both men and women irrespective of sex.

In view of the co-ordination of the two State Departments of the Local Government Board and the National Health Insurance, the *National Health Insurance Committee* of the Council, under the Convenership of the President, decided to amalgamate with the *Public Health Committee* of the Council, and this was effected in March.

The *Education Sectional Committee* has given much consideration to the organisation of educational courses for boys and girls in receipt of the Unemployment Donation, and at a Conference on this subject on 14th January, Dr. Ingram from the Education Offices of the London Council gave full information with regard to the progress of this work in London. As a result of this meeting a number of voluntary lecturers offered their assistance to Mr. Ingram, and the Branches were asked to urge upon their local education authorities the importance of setting up the necessary machinery for these classes.

The question which has received the special consideration of the *Emigration and Immigration Committee* has been the immigration of foreign girls, the Committee's attention having been called at a Conference of the Y.W.C.A. to the desirability of some further restrictions in this direction. At the invitation of Mrs. Bright, the Countess of Portsmouth, President of the Y.W.C.A., attended a meeting of the Committee and laid their views before it, and it was decided that should any action be taken the two Societies should co-operate. The opinion was expressed that no foreign girl emigrant under 21 years of age should be allowed to come to the United Kingdom unless she were brought by or came on the recommendation of a recognised society, but the Executive Committee, while in agreement with this point, was not in favour of imposing any further restrictions on the immigration of women at the present time.

The *Industrial Committee* has considered the difficult problem of equal pay for equal work, on which Miss Constance Smith gave an interesting address, and also the vexed question of domestic service, 88 replies having been received from the Branches to the draft standard schedule which was circulated at the request of the Ministry of Labour.

The *Women's Indian Study Association* much regrets to report the resignation of its Hon. Secretary, Miss Monica Robins, who is succeeded by Miss Festing. At its meeting in February Miss Sorabji and Mr. Devadhar spoke on the condition of Indian women. The two scholarships given by the Committee at the Ludiana College have been continued, and the

Committee now hopes to start a small library for the wives of officials in India and for residents in the hill stations.

The *Parliamentary and Legislation Committee* has given special attention to the Bill for the State Registration of Trained Nurses, promoted by the Central Committee, and has circularised all members of Parliament asking their support for this important and long-delayed measure. At a meeting of the Committee, Sir Arthur Stanley announced that the College of Nursing would support this Bill, and the Committee learnt with regret that another Bill promoted by the College of Nursing had since been introduced into the House of Lords. The Committee has also supported the Bill for obtaining the opening of the legal profession to women, the Executive Committee being in favour of the removal of all inequalities in the law as between men and women. At the Committee's request a resolution urging the desirability of legislation to enable women also to serve on juries and as magistrates will be brought before the Council.

The desirability of the amendment of the Incest Act, 1908, to prevent these cases—which are unfortunately much more frequent than is generally realised—being heard in camera, is urged by the *Rescue and Preventive Committee* and by the *Public Service Committee*. Copies of a circular issued by the Home Office with regard to the desirability of the attendance of women in county courts and police courts when children are being tried, were supplied by the Home Office for the information of the Branches.

Mrs. James Gow's resignation as Convener of the *Rescue and Preventive Committee*, in which capacity she has served for 12 years, has been received with very great regret, and the Hon. Mrs. Forster has been appointed as her successor.

At the *Peace and Arbitration Committee* meetings interesting addresses have been given by Mr. G. P. Gooch, on "Some Problems of World Settlement," illustrated by a large map of Europe, and by Mr. Carl Heath on "The Uses of International Arbitration."

The *Public Service Committee* has given special consideration to the question of the allowances to dependents under the Ministry of Pensions, and has received a favourable reply from the Ministry to its representations on all points but one. To emphasize this point the President, Convener, and other members of the Committee waited upon Mr. Tomblason, chief official of the Widows' and Dependents' Section, and laid their views

before him. An interesting resumé of the laws in other countries with regard to the adoption of children is being prepared by this Committee, and will appear in the next Occasional Paper. The Committee, which consists entirely of women engaged in some branch of public service, was much gratified at the recent elections, which resulted in the appointment of so many women members to serve upon the local authorities in England and Wales.

The work of the *Organisation Committee* has now been transferred to the room formerly occupied by the Rural Housing Association in the central offices in Parliament Mansions, the term for which Lady Cowan kindly lent the office in Victoria Street having expired. Miss Ridley has been appointed as General Organiser in succession to Miss Preston, who has resigned in order to take up a government appointment. In the interval between Miss Preston's resignation and Miss Ridley's appointment the work of the Committee was carried on by Mrs. Lock. Mrs. Conway Evans has been engaged for half-time work in connection with this Committee and as Secretary of the Publications and Press Committee. No fewer than 91 meetings have been arranged, with the assistance of the Ordnance Committee, during the past eight months, and new Branches have been formed in Barrow, Burnham, Hornsey, Kendal, Newent, Norwood, Rochford, Southend and Wellington. The work of several of the branches is in abeyance till the autumn, owing to local conditions and more especially to the difficulty of finding suitable Secretaries.

The *Work among Girls' Committee* has also at present no Secretary, Miss Gowers' resignation owing to pressure of other work having been received with regret. A suggested scheme for Information Bureaux for voluntary workers was sent out by this Committee to the local Branches, but details are not yet to hand as to where it has been found possible to adopt it.

The time of the *Publications Committee* has been occupied in revising its explanatory leaflets in order to bring them into line with the new constitution, the heavy cost of paper and printing not having allowed of many fresh publications. Miss Eaton continues to edit the official organ, the Occasional Paper, and hopes in future to be able to bring it out more frequently. She has accordingly been compelled to resign her Convenership of the Publications Committee, in which office she has been succeeded by the President.

During the past seven months the following *Societies* have

been granted affiliation: The Women's National Health Association of Ireland, the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society, the Archbishop's Advisory Board for Spiritual and Moral Work, and the Poor Law Infirmity Matron's Association, while the Fabian Society has withdrawn from affiliation. The number of the affiliated societies represented on the Council at the present time is 155.

At the request of the Women's Local Government Society, a Joint Committee of representatives of the National Union of Societies for Equal Citizenship, National Women's Citizens Association, Women's Local Government Society, and the National Council of Women was convened by our office and met for the first time on 4th. February, to consider difficulties of overlapping and to make recommendations. Your representatives on this Committee are the President, Mrs. Fabian Ware, and Lady Cowan.

As a result of the five meetings of this Joint Committee, at which a representative of the W.L.G.S. has presided, the following recommendations are submitted to you:—

“That it be suggested to the local Women Citizens' Associations that they should institute a Local Government Section within their own Association; the membership of this Section would consist of:—

(a) Such members of the Women Citizens' Association as desired to join, and

(b) Individual members from outside the Women Citizens' Association.

“That, where a Women Citizens' Association or members of it desire to work for reforms included in the equality programme of the N.U.S.E.C., without committing the Association as a whole to that programme, it be suggested that they should form a Section for equality, on the lines laid down in the previous resolution, which might affiliate to the N.U.S.E.C.”

“That where a Women Citizens' Association or members of it desire to work for reforms within the scope and programme of the N.C.W., without committing the association as a whole to such work, it be suggested that they should form a Section for such purpose or purposes, on the lines laid down in the previous resolution, which might affiliate to the National Council of Women.”

"That this Committee of the four Societies refer to the constituent societies the consideration of the desirability of (1) issuing a combined list of speakers and literature, or of either, on questions of citizenship and political activities; and (2) co-operating for the supply of information."

"That this Committee recommends that a Standing Joint Committee of the four Societies be formed, and that each Society be invited to nominate three representatives."

The co-operation of your Committee has been invited by the newly-formed *National Council of Social Service*, on the Executive Committee of which our President has agreed to serve and will hold a watching brief for the interests of women. The intention of this new Council is to combine all societies working in any area for social reforms, whether the societies are men's societies, women's societies, or mixed societies.

The *International Committee* has received interesting reports through Miss Orred of the work of the National Councils in other lands and especially of the newly-formed National Council of Women in Uruguay. It has also had the opportunity of hearing from the Marchioness of Aberdeen and Temair, President of the International Council of Women, an account of her recent visits to the United States and to Canada. At a meeting of the Executive, Lady Aberdeen gave a most interesting resumé of the satisfactory results of the deputation from the I.C.W. and Conference of Women Suffragists to the President and members of the League of Nations Commission of the Peace Conference.

Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon has acted in close co-operation with Lady Aberdeen in arranging for the informal conference of representatives from allied and neutral National Councils, which was held last week in London. The proposals were submitted to the Executive, which was glad to be able to undertake all arrangements for hospitality.

On the *Office staff* Miss Paine has succeeded Miss Ridley as Assistant Secretary, and her work is giving entire satisfaction.

I have spoken by invitation of the Branches at Salisbury, Westcliff, Berkhamsted, Croydon, and at an inaugural meeting to form a Branch in Upper Norwood.

The *Book and Pamphlet Department* under Miss Zimmern at 27a, Cavendish Square, W., has met a real need and is being more and more widely used by our Branches.

With regard to our *finances*, the Council must not be misled by the fact that we close our balance sheet with a substantial balance in hand. This is due to the receipt, as the result of our President's appeal, of generous donations of £100 from our Hon. Treasurer, Lady Cowan, £100 from Mrs. Thomas Johnston, of Glasgow, £50 from Miss Marjorie Lees, £25 from Miss Agnes Garrett, and of smaller sums from other kind members, while the Harrogate Branch sent us £80 as the result of the meetings held there. Moreover, in order to meet current expenses our Treasurer was compelled earlier in the year to sell out £200 of our 5 per cent. War Loan Bonds and to withdraw the last £100 from our Deposit Account. But for these facts our accounts, even with the special donations, would show a deficit instead of a balance in hand, as our expenditure for the past eight months exceeds our receipts by over £100.

It is pleasant to be able to report the receipt in May of a legacy of £50 from the late Rev. J. W. Kiddle, of Stretford, near Manchester, which sum will appear in the next year's balance sheet.

On the other hand, the Carnegie Trustees are not prepared to renew their grant for our *Mothercraft and Child Welfare Exhibitions*, since they only initiate but do not maintain such work. The two Scottish Exhibitions have continued on tour with little interruption, while the large demand for the three English Exhibitions still continues, and they were already fully booked up to the month of September. An opportunity for Londoners to view them will be afforded in Baby Week, June 30th to July 1st, when they will be displayed in Marylebone, Islington and Southwark. Ninety-two towns were visited by the Exhibitions in 15 months, and the total maintenance cost per town is estimated at £16, a sum which includes the payment of the two expert demonstrators who accompany each Exhibition. It cannot be that this splendid work, which has met throughout the country with unqualified success and which has led in several cases to permanent infant welfare work, will be allowed by the public to lapse for lack of funds.

The *Women Patrols Committee* is to be heartily congratulated on the result of its labours in the appointment, under the Commissioner of Police, of a force of 110 metropolitan police women patrols, with Mrs. Stanley, our former metropolitan organiser, as their superintendent. Mrs. Carden and Mrs. Stanley have, at the request of the Commissioner, served on the Selection Board for the Women Police, and many of the former women patrols have offered themselves for these new posts. A letter to Mrs. Carden dated 16th November, 1918, notifying the formation of this body runs as follows:—

“The Commissioner wishes to take this opportunity in expressing his thanks for the cordial co-operation and assistance that he and his predecessor have received from the National Union of Women Workers in the matter of the Women Patrols, and particularly to yourself. It is largely due to the excellent work done by the patrols of the Society that it has been thought advisable to make the experiment now to be inaugurated, and he hopes that the cordial relations that have existed between the police and the Society will continue under the new arrangement.”

The long-desired appointment of women police and the formation of over 79 Women Citizens Associations in all parts of the country may certainly be regarded as the two most important pieces of work which have been initiated by the National Council of Women since the outbreak of war.

Our President has given evidence on behalf of the National Council of Women, which evidence has been submitted in writing, to—

(1) The Commission on the Criminal Law Amendment Bill on 24th October, 1918.

(2) The Special Committee of the Ministry of Reconstruction on Agencies for Domestic Servants, in January, 1919.

(3) The Royal Commission on the Income Tax on 21st May, when the point she specially emphasised was the desirability of the separate assessment of the incomes of husband and wife.

On 16th June a Conference was called to consider the representation of women on the League of Nations, when urgency resolutions were drafted for submission to the Council. Certain members of the Conference have since been granted an informal interview with Sir Eric Drummond.

The kind invitation of the Bristol Branch has been accepted for the Council to meet there in 1920.

With the close of the war it was felt that many of the Societies which had been engaged upon war-work, or whose work had otherwise come to an end, would be disbanded. It seems, however, that many are seeking fresh fields, while yet others are springing up to deal with what are termed “problems of reconstruction,” and their promoters do not always take the wise precaution of ascertaining whether the ground may not be already covered by existing organisations. Surely never was there greater need for the prevention of overlapping and for that mutual co-operation and fellowship which the National Council of Women exists to promote. Membership of such a body can do much to keep before us the lessons we should have learnt from this terrible war—or our men have died in vain—of sinking our differences to unite in common service for the good of all, the bridging of class distinctions and the bearing of one another’s burdens.

The President moved that the Report be adopted and this was agreed.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS.

LADY COWAN, Hon. Treasurer, in presenting the Statement of Accounts from 1st September, 1918, to 30th April, 1919, said:

The Financial Statement, covering a period of eight months ending on April 30th last, (see page), may seem to call for some elucidation at my hands. I desire to draw your attention in the first place to the change in our financial year.

Total Receipts of £1,578 for the period of only eight months looks well on paper, but when we come to analyse the figures we realise that the only *real* sources of annual income are the subscriptions of members, Branches and Societies, and that these amount only to £611 19s. 6d. Sundry small items, profits on literature, pamphlets, reports, and occasional papers account for a further sum of £91 18s. 3d. The rental receivable from the Rural Housing Association, amounting to £18 15s., appears in our accounts for the last time, as we have been obliged to resume possession of the room occupied by that organisation, owing to the growing work of our own office. Other items are very small.

You will notice that in order to meet current expenditure during the period under review, we were obliged to realise £200 5 per cent. War Loan, and to withdraw £100 from our Deposit

account. It is, therefore, my duty to point out to you that although the statement shows a total of £1578 os. 3d., no less than £463 8s. 6d. of that amount was derived from special donations, and £289 19s. from the realization of investments; the annual subscriptions of members, Branches, and Affiliated Societies amounting only to £611 19s. 6d. Obviously, we ought not to reckon upon donations, as distinguished from subscriptions, as a reliable source of income, nor could we contemplate without anxiety the application of our small remaining invested funds to current expenditure. It is therefore essential, if our finances are to be placed on a sound permanent basis, that our income from annual subscriptions should be largely augmented.

Looking now to the other side of the account, I need not remind you that the expenditure must increase rather than decrease if we are adequately to discharge the functions of the National Council of Women in these stirring times of transition and reconstruction. Let me therefore take this opportunity of appealing to the representatives of the Branches who are present to-day to use their utmost influence to increase the membership in their several localities, and so contribute more largely to the funds of the Central Organisation. May I also appeal to individual members of the National Council to consider the necessities of our work, and to increase, as far as they can, the subscriptions which they have so generously given in the past.

To those who have already responded to my appeal, I desire to express my gratitude.

Donations, as I have said, are an uncertain and fluctuating source of revenue, but none the less welcome on that account, and I hope that friends will again be found willing to assist in this direction. I think, however, that we should regard these special sources of income as a provision for special activities of the Council, or even for investment, rather than as a contribution to its ordinary expenditure. I should like to take this opportunity of expressing the thanks of the Executive Committee to those generous donors who have given large sums in special donations, without which we would not have been in such a good financial position as we are to-day.

You will find that annexed to the Financial Statement is an analysis of the receipts and expenditure of the *Sectional Committees* for the eight months ending 30th April, in accordance with the Resolution passed at last year's Meeting at Harrogate.

We do a great deal with our money, and one of the reasons why our means go so far is because of the extremely economical

way in which the Office is conducted. We are a "Model Spending Department," and could give many points to some Government Departments and other Organisations. There is no waste, either in time or money at Parliament Mansions, and a warm word of praise and appreciation is due to the Secretary, Miss Green, and her Staff, for the way their work is done, and for the jealous and scrupulous care exercised by all in making the very most of the finances at their disposal.

The Hon. Treasurer's Statement of Accounts was adopted and a hearty vote of thanks to Lady Cowan was carried with acclamation.

A vote of thanks to Miss Eaton, Hon. Editor of "The Occasional Paper" and to the other Hon. Officers was also carried.

Short speeches conveying greetings from other National Councils then followed from Mme. Avril de Ste. Croix (France), Miss Forchhammer (Denmark), Miss Naber, Dr. van Dorp and Dr. Elias (Holland), and Mrs. Steinurm Bjarnason (Iceland).

It was moved from the Chair and carried unanimously, that very hearty congratulations be conveyed to Mme. Siegfried, who had recently been made a Chevalier of the Legion of Honour, and a vote of sincere condolence to the National Council of Women of France in the very sad and sudden loss they had sustained in the death of Mme. Girard Mangin.

RESOLUTIONS.

The following resolutions were *Carried*:—

1. *Women's Emancipation Bill.*

"That this Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland urges the Government to redeem its election pledge to remove all existing inequalities in the law between men and women by adopting and carrying into law the Women's Emancipation Bill, which has already passed unanimously through the Committee of the House of Commons."

2. *Restoration of Pre-War Practices Bill.*

"That this Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland urges the Government and the Members of the House of Commons to see that the Restoration of Pre-War Practices Bill imposes no restrictions upon the employment of women beyond those definitely promised in the Treasury Agreement, and in particular begs that the right of women to work in new trades may not be taken from them."

3. *League of Nations.*

“Recognising the high purposes and supreme promise of the League of Nations and keenly desirous that its aims should be achieved through the full and frank co-operation of men and women, the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland, met in Annual Conference in the City of Leicester, hereby resolves to press for the inclusion of women on the Commissions that may be established under the control of the League, and to urge that one of the three representatives to be appointed by the British Government to serve on the Assembly of Delegates shall be a woman.”

“The National Council of Women further urges that one of the two representatives to be appointed by the British Government to attend the Labour Conference at Washington shall be a woman.”

4. *Income Tax.*

“That the Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland considers that the present system of taxing the joint income of a husband and wife is grossly unjust and unfair, and it urges the Royal Commission on the Income Tax to recommend that each individual should be taxed separately.”

5. *Women on Juries and as Justices of the Peace.*

“That this Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland, realising the desirability of the appointment of Women Magistrates on every Bench and of all Juries being composed of women as well as of men, urges the Government immediately to introduce legislation to ensure in the United Kingdom:—

- (a) That the wives of men qualified to sit on Juries, and women so qualified in their own right, be made eligible to serve on Grand, Special, and Common Juries.
- (b) That women, if otherwise qualified, be made eligible to act as Justices of the Peace and as Magistrates.”

6. *Women as Barristers and Solicitors.*

“That this Meeting of the Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland calls upon the Government to redeem its election pledge to the Women of Great Britain,

by granting in the House of Commons full facilities for the Barristers and Solicitors (Qualification of Women) Bill, and Advocates and Law Agents (Qualification of Women) Scotland Bill, which have already passed through their stages in the House of Lords, so that their provisions may become the law of the land in the course of this session; and, further, that the provisions of the former Bill may be made applicable to Ireland.”

7. *Pure Milk.*

“That the Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland, in view of the necessity for a pure milk supply for the health of the nation, especially of the babies and children, requests His Majesty's Government to empower the Ministry of Health to take such steps as are necessary to ensure that the milk supplied to the public shall be free from infection and free from contamination by dirt; and that the provisions of the Milk and Dairies Act for England and Scotland (1914) giving local authorities larger control over the milk supply be put in force immediately; and, further, that similar legislation be extended to Ireland.”

8. *Equal Pay for Equal Work.*

“That this Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland presses for equal opportunities and equal remuneration for equal work of women with men, and for the recognition of their equal status as employees in Government Departments and in professional, business, and industrial occupations.”

9. *Local Veto.*

“That the Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland is of opinion that the men and women of England and Wales should have the power, which will be granted to Scotland in 1920, to veto the sale of intoxicating drinks in their respective localities; and that as a necessary preliminary to this and all other reforms the existing private interest in the trade should be acquired by the State on a pre-war basis of valuation, as resolved by the National Council of Women at its Annual Meeting held in London in the year 1916.”

10. *Liquor Control.*

“That this Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland is of opinion that the present restrictions

on the output and the hours of sale of intoxicating drinks should be maintained, especially during the forthcoming Peace Celebrations."

11. *Children Act, 1908, and Incest Act (England), 1908.*

"The Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland urges the Government to amend Section 114 of the Children Act, 1918, which runs as follows:—

'The Court may direct that all or any persons be excluded from the Court during the taking of the evidence to read 'The Court may direct that persons under the age of 21, etc.'

Further, that the Incest Act (England) be amended in the same sense; also that where possible the presence of responsible women shall be secured in Court during the hearing of such cases."

12. *Organised Play.*

"That this Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland, recognising that organised play is an essential part of education and a valuable aid to character building, urges local authorities to provide increased facilities for indoor and outdoor recreation for children and young people, and for girls equally with boys."

13. *Housing Bills.*

"That this Representative Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland welcomes the introduction of the Housing Bills, and urges all members of the National Council of Women to exert their influence locally in stimulating and hastening public action."

14. *State Registration of Nurses.*

"That the National Council of Women approves the resolution passed by its Legislation Committee, supporting the Bill for the State Registration of Nurses, and again urges on the Government the importance of the Bill, now before the House of Commons becoming law this session.

In particular it emphasises the importance of duly guarding the following principles:—

- (1) That all organised groups of nurses shall be put in the same position with respect to their right to registration,

and that no body of nurses shall be placed *ipso facto* on the first register.

- (2) That a minimum general training and the passing of a standard examination to be defined by the Council as set up under the Bill shall be required as a condition of the registration of any nurse, except such as are registered within the time of grace, and that no power shall be taken to set up other registers for which such training and examination shall not be required."

Juvenile Delinquency.

The resolution on *Juvenile Delinquency* was referred back to the Public Service Committee, for this Committee to consider and report to the Executive.

Bastardy Laws.

The Resolution dealing with the *Bastardy Laws* was passed in principle, on the understanding that the framing of the resolution should be referred back to the Public Service Committee to consider and report to the Executive.

District Nurses.

The resolution on *District Nurses* was passed by a majority, 117 voting in its favour and 68 against. It failed to secure the necessary two-thirds majority and therefore dropped.
