## Fifth Annual Report.

THE year 1924 has been a definite epoch in the short history of the Beckenham College for Working Women, for it has seen the accomplishment of the Incorporation of the College.

On November 6th, 1924, to be precise, we obtained

Incorporation. our Certificate of Incorporation and became officially known to Somerset House as "The Residential College for Working Women, incorporated." It is chiefly to the patient labour of Mr. E. J. Maude that we owe this successful result of somewhat lengthy negotiations, and the many advantages which we hope our new status will bring us. Certain minor changes in the constitution of the College are involved, relating mainly to the method of election of its Council by the votes of the "Members"—that is, those persons who are ultimately responsible for the support and maintenance of the incorporated Body. For the most part, however, the original constitution, so kindly drawn up by Mr. T. R. Hughes, K.C., at the foundation of the College, remains in force.

The Annual Meeting of 1924 was held on Thursday evening, October 2nd, at the University of London Club. The Chair was taken by Mr. J. L. Stocks, President of the Council, and the principal speaker was Mrs. Fawcett, who delighted her audience by her memories of the early struggles for Annual Meeting. women's education and enfranchisement, and by her stirring hopes for the future. The whole meeting, indeed, was in a mood of hopefulness, not to say elation; for at the outset the President announced the news, received only a few hours before, that the anonymous benefactor who last Autumn had given over £5,000 to the Extension Fund was now about to add a further £5,000 to this gift. The actual position of the Extension Fund up to date will be recorded on a later page; but we hasten to share with the larger circle who will read this Report the same inspiriting news which was first announced to that meeting. No words can express our gratitude to this generous friend and to those others who have added sub-

There is still ample time before us, and it is fortunate that we are able to proceed with deliberation upon what is so important a matter. Meanwhile the work of the College becomes more widely known and needed; the number of its students, past and present, steadily increases; and there seems every hope that, when the longed-for return of prosperity comes to the trade of the country, there will be a great increase

Our musical friends have again been very good to us, so that in addition to the regular course of illustrated lectures given by Miss-Walters there have been several opportunities of hearing and enjoying music. Dr. D. C. Hare provided a delightful evening of songs; the Valentine Orde Trio gave a programme of piano-trios with just enough simple explanation to help us towards complete enjoyment; and the Kendal Quartette invited us to one of their concerts.

Our expeditions to London have included visits to the General Post Office, the London Museum, the Guildhall, the British Museum, Kew Gardens, the Rachel Macmillan Nursery. and the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley. We also went to see the South London Pageant at the Crystal Palace, and we attended the coming-of-age garden party given at Bedford College by the Workers' Educational Association. Some students have attended local lectures of the W.E.A., and also local meetings arranged by the organisation known as C.O.P.E.C. Visits to the galleries of the House of Commons, which are, perhaps, among our greatest delights and privileges, have been made possible by the kindness of Lieut.-Col. the Hon. F. S. Jackson, Sir Douglas Hogg, Sir Francis Lowe, Sir Herbert Austin, Messrs. Greaves Lord, K.C., J. Sutton, Will Thorne, J. M. Hogge, and Vivian Phillips.

One of the most valued helps to the College is the offering of hospitality, both for holidays and for half-term week-ends, specially to students whose homes are at a great distance. We desire to thank for this very welcome kindness Mrs. Chaffey, Miss Cox, Dr. Lloyd Williams, Mrs. Yeaxlee, Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Midgley, Mrs. Thelwell, Mrs. Ovenden, Mrs. A. H. Gray, Mrs. Gatton, Bedford College, Girton College, Royal Holloway College, Somerville College, and Westfield College. Some students have been welcomed also as working visitors at the Princess Mary Village Homes at Addlestone, where they have profited greatly by the experience as well as by the hospitality given to them. We desire to thank also, for another kind of help, Mr. Allcorn and Mr. Clayton, who contrived a temporary wireless installation for us on the nights of the General Election. The special thanks of the Executive Committee are due to Dr. D. C. Hare, who kindly allowed the use of her room for several meetings; and the Secretary of the College desires again to record her very sincere gratitude to Miss K. C. Hare, whose help with office work and accounts is untiring and quite invaluable.

The original curriculum, which was founded upon the expressed wishes of intending students, has been expanded and modified from time to time in consultation with those who have passed through the College course. The plan of work for the year is arranged as follows, and students make their own selection from it with the advice of the Staff. Those who enter in January begin with the work of the Spring Term and take short courses in the Autumn at the end of the year. This is rendered necessary by the fact that students enter twice in the year.

One Essay is written every week, in connection with the subjects studied.

In one year only the beginnings of further education can be made, and the various subjects are therefore necessarily treated in outline, with a view to showing students their relation to each other and to the whole field of knowledge. The work of the College is not directed towards getting through as much as possible, but to teaching students how to read and think for themselves and how to write and speak, so that they can, after leaving College, continue their studies. Students are expected to manage their own time and arrange their own work, but also to co-operate in discussions with their fellow-students and the Staff.

The College is worked on co-operative lines. All its members share in the work of the house and the garden, undertaking certain duties for a short time each day under the direction of the Bursar. The spirit of equal fellowship and responsibility is carried into the whole life of the community; all the College Societies and Committees are managed by the students, and there are no rules except those made by the members themselves for the common good. The whole life and work of the community is founded on the conviction that the basis of all education is spiritual, and attendance at Prayers and Bible Study is entirely voluntary.

It is satisfactory in these times of serious unemployment to record that nearly all the eighteen students who left the College in 1924 are definitely engaged in work or in courses of further training. The table on page 9 will

show their former and present occupations. It will be seen that a considerable number have returned to their former work, while those who are taking further training hope to qualify themselves for such professions as nursing, welfare work, and mission work, for which the College can provide a useful and indeed essential foundation of general education.

The Old Students' Association, which now numbers 78 members, keeps the former students in close touch with the College, and is one of the Bodies which, by the Articles of Association, will take a considerable share in governing the incorporated College. The Honorary Secretary of the O.S.A. is Miss C. Glenister, 97, Albany Street, N.W., who will be glad to answer enquiries.

The financial background and support of all this work is of course a matter of great importance; and, if it were Finance. not for the generosity and enthusiasm of the friends of the College, it might well be a great anxiety. Education that is worthy of the name cannot be carried on without cost, and it seems likely that the annual expenditure of the College will increase rather than diminish as we learn better how to do our work. We shall therefore depend increasingly upon the steady help of those who, as givers of bursaries or as contributors to the general fund, are good enough to send annual subscriptions to the "Working Women's College Fund." The Auditor's statement as to the present position of this Fund will be found on page 10, and the list of subscriptions and donations for the past year on page 12. All those who belong to this large "family," whether they subscribe as individuals or as members of schools, colleges or other bodies, are asked to familiarise themselves with the work which is carried on at Beckenham, and to make it more widely known among their friends.

The Extension Fund, as will be seen on page 16, is also a matter for the greatest thankfulness and encouragement. We have always believed that the extension of the work was necessary, and justified by its progress up to the present time; but we should not have dared to hope, a year ago when our first plans for extension were being made, that by the end of 1924 we should be so nearly in sight of our proposed goal of £15,000.

It is a great pleasure to record that the present total of over £13,000 has been reached not only by the large sums already referred to, and by the interest on investments which these have enabled us to make, but also by the numerous donations, ranging from 2/6 upwards, which represent that width of support and confidence which we so much desire and for which we feel such sincere gratitude. Our hope is that the Extension Fund may be actually completed, within a comparatively short time, by an appeal which is now being carried on, addressed chiefly, as the whole appeal of the College has been from the first, to those who really know the work and who have a real belief in its possibilities. Papers dealing with the Extension Fund Appeal

in greater detail and containing recent photographs of the College, can be obtained from the Secretary, who will be very glad also to send them to the address of anyone likely to be interested. The present Report has been somewhat shortened, and is published without illustrations, in order that we might more easily afford the production of the necessary appeal literature; and we therefore hope that all friends of the College will help us to make the fullest possible use of the little book called "Beckenham College for Working Women," and to accomplish the aim which it has in view.
