

Thirty-Sixth Annual Report for the year 1st January—31st December, 1940.

Membership, Centres and Groups.

On 31st December, 1940, the membership of the Association was 2,174, i.e., 1,969 members, 18 Associates and 187 Student Associates. This total is 60 less than it was on 31st December, 1939.

There are now nineteen Centres and one Group in England and Wales, in addition to the Overseas Group.

and water, in addition to the overseas eroup.

Annual General Meeting and informal Lunch, 1940.

Both these functions took place in London on 2nd March, 1940. Councillor Mrs. Thurtle presided at the Annual Meeting.

Executive Committee.

Three meetings have been held on Saturdays—13th January and 16th March in London and 15th June in the Council Chamber of the Sheffield Town Hall. The average attendance was 19.

Finance, Staff and General Purposes Sub-Committee.

This sub-committee has transacted business normally remitted to the Executive Committee and to the Editorial, Conditions of Service, Co-operation and Propaganda Sub-Committees. It has met nine times: on six Saturday mornings, on one Saturday afternoon and on two Monday evenings. The second ot these, held on the top floor of 7, Victoria Street on 26th August, was immediately followed by a prolonged air-raid warning, so that the committee members did not finally disperse until 3-45 a.m. I should like to place on record our gratitude to the office housekeeper and his wife for the hospitality of their basement flat on that occasion.

Officers' Meetings.

The Association Officers met on the 9th April, 15th April and 25th May to deal with urgent and, sometimes, confidential business.

Centre Officers' Conference.

The officers of all Centres were summoned to a Conference in Sheffield on 15th June. 12 Centre Officers and 4 other members attended, representing 10 centres.

Open Meetings.

Only two open meetings have been held during the year. The first was in Sheffield on June 15th between the meeting of the Executive Committee and the Officers' Conference. The second meeting was in London on June 25th for School Nurses.

Superintendent Health Visitors' Group.

Mrs. Kent Parsons is Chairman of the Group and Miss M. Morrell its Honorary Secretary. It met on January 13th and April 20th.

Duties of Women Public Health Officers in War Time.

All through the year various aspects of this question have occupied the attention of the Executive Committee, of the Finance, Staff and General Purposes Sub-Committee and of the General Secretary.

On June 15th the Executive received with much satisfaction a letter from Dr. Daley, now Medical Officer of Health to the London County Council, reporting the Ministry of Health's decision not to require School Nurses to report for duty in hospitals in the event of air raids if they were already working elsewhere.

Some Health Visitors, who were, in the main, released from first Aid Posts in the early months of the year, were required to serve in them once again in a number of London Boroughs; others concerned themselves voluntarily with the well-being of mothers and young children in large air-raid shelters, while others again visited Rest Centres for the homeless in London. There they found an obvious need for better facilities for the feeding and care of babies and for the care of expectant mothers, and for advice on family problems, including billeting, which they were well able to give. Resulting from reports received after these entirely voluntary visits, the Association was able to secure immediate and direct collaboration between the Public Assistance Department of the London County Council and the Maternity and Child Welfare Departments of the City of Westminster and of certain Metropolitan Boroughs. Similar action was taken in Essex and Middlesex, Health Visitors co-operating actively with the staffs of the Rest Centres. Health Visitors visit the Rest Centres daily whenever they are occupied.

The policy of the Association on all these matters was finally formulated at the meeting of the Finance, Staff and General Purposes Sub-Committee on November 30th, 1940, and reads:

- (i) That subject to the maintenance of adequate health services in the evacuation areas, the most urgent work for Health Visitors to perform is to continue their own duties in the reception areas.
- (ii) That the same principle should apply to the health service as to the education service, i.e., that Health Visitors, School Nurses and Municipal Midwives be transferred from the evacuation to the reception areas, their normal salaries being maintained.
- (iii) That while Health Visitors should co-operate in the work of the Rest Centres by giving advice and help in the care of mothers and young children and with regard to evacuation and billeting, it is not desirable for Health Visitors to be seconded for whole time work at these Centres.
- (iv) That education on food matters should form part of the normal work of Health Visitors.

(v). That while Health Visitors would naturally be interested in securing the best possible air raid shelter conditions in their own areas, it is not practicable nor desirable to use Health Visitors for night duty in these shelters.

(vi). That Health Visitors should not be used for work at First Aid Posts, as minor casualties referred to these Posts can

easily be treated by less well qualified people.

The Ministry of Health in more than one circular has called the attention of Local Authorities in Reception Areas to the need for placing their Health Services at the disposal of the population received from other districts. From the point of view of Health Visitors, both in Reception and Evacuation Areas and from that of the evacuee mothers, the policy of the Association in this matter is abundantly justified. Mothers who are accustomed to the advice and help of Health Visitors at home feel the lack of it when they find themselves in entirely new and unaccustomed surroundings. This lack is undoubtedly one of the factors which has contributed to the trek back to the Evacuation Areas, which we all deplore.

Care of the Pre-School Child.

This matter has occupied as much time and attention as the duties and conditions of service of our own members.

The Association's policy in all these matters was approved by the Executive Committee on June 15th under four headings:

I. Provision for children 3—5 should be made in all evacuation schemes for school children, including

(a) the registration either at local schools or at local Maternity and Child Welfare Centres;

(b) the payment of billeting allowances for them.

- 2. In Reception Areas, the association, through County Councils, of County Medical Officers of Health, and particularly of County Superintendent Health Visitors and their staff of Health Visitors in
 - (a) billeting these children either singly or in groups, and
 - (b) in the organisation of Nursery Centres where these are required.
- 3. Establishment of Day Nurseries by and under the supervision of Local Authorities in all centres of population in which women are industrially employed.
- 4. The same legal protection for the "daily-minded" child as for the child living entirely apart from its parents or guardians.

Relations with Government Departments.

The Association has had more numerous and closer contacts with Government Departments than ever before. The Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Labour and the Ministry of Food have been constantly reminded of our existence and of the policy set out in the foregoing paragraphs. Representatives of the Association

have been invited to serve on the Central Consultative Council of Voluntary Organisations appointed by the Minister of Labour, on the General and Health Groups appointed by this Council, on the Selection Board for Industrial Nurses set up by the Ministry of Labour and on the Advisory Council of the Ministry of Food.

One member of the Association, Miss M. Bryant, was appointed by the Ministry of Health as a Temporary Inspector. Three members of the Association, Miss H. Townsend, Miss C. Grant Glass and Miss Bowman, have been appointed by the Ministry of Labour as Welfare Officers to Local Labour Supply Committees.

Co-operation.

We have continued to co-operate with other organisations, of which the Trades Union Congress is the most directly helpful. As in previous years, its General Council arranged a deputation to the Minister of Health, this time to press for the establishment of "Burnham" Committees as recommended by the Inter-Departmental Committee on Nursing Services.

The Conference of Executives of all organisations affiliated to the Trades Union Congress held on May 25th and addressed by the Minister of Labour was a memorable experience for those of our own Executive who were able to attend.

"Woman Health Officer."

There is evidence that "Woman Health Officer" is widely read by our members—indeed members do not only read it but they largely write it.

Centres enjoying lectures of particular interest can share their good things by reporting these lectures fully. The report of the lecture on "Social Work for Refugees in France," given by Mrs. Crosthwaite at the Joint Meeting of the London Centre and the B.F.S.W. on May 20th, 1940, and of a lecture on "How to Teach," given by Dr. Bartlett to the same Centre on August 19th, illustrate what I mean.

Changes and Chances.

The many changes in the European situation which have taken place during the twelve months of 1940 have been reflected in the history of the Association and of its members. To those whose homes have been damaged or destroyed and whose place of work has been changed as a direct result of enemy action we offer our sympathy and admiration.

Miss Gray and the office staff moved from Littlehampton to London on June 27th, and until October 9th occupied our top floor offices at 7, Victoria Street. After October 9th they worked chiefly in two basement rooms at 11, Victoria Street, one of which suffered from blast in an air raid in November. Much more serious damage was done to Nos. 13 and 15, Victoria Street. We are happy to know that none of our own Staff suffered injury, and congratulate them on their coolness and courage.

What of the Future?

The record of 1940 shows that, in war as in peace, there is plenty for the Association to do: it serves both the interests of its own members and the interests of the country as a whole. There is still widespread ignorance among the educated and well-to-do of what women officers do in the Public Health Service, and of the demands which are made on them. It has even been suggested in some quarters that the money spent on our health and social services has been wasted because a proportion of town children are not perfectly clean. Both in their own professional interests, therefore, and in the wider national interest, it is up to each one of our members to retain her own standing in the Association and to increase its membership.

I realise that in these difficult days members have many and often exhausting calls upon their time and money. Nevertheless, they are giving their lives in the cause of Public Health. If they feel that the Public Health Service can legitimately demand the whole of their working lives, then an Association such as ours can surely claim the smaller sacrifice which its membership entails. To some, at least, membership of the Association does not mean sacrifice, but interest, comradeship and friendship.

REPORT OF GENERAL SECRETARY. VIGILANCE WORK.

Protest letters have been sent in 25 cases in which the minimum salary advertised was below £200 or in which the maximum was below £250. These advertisements were for Health Visitors.

Protest letters have been sent to 6 Local Authorities advertising School Nurses' posts below £200 and to 11 requiring midwives.

(a) Salaries. On account of war-time conditions, fewer requests have been received from members for action with regard to their salaries during 1940. Many local Authorities have adopted a Cost-of-Living bonus for the whole of their staffs, which has made some improvement in the salaries of Women Public Health Officers. The shortage of Health Visitors has also had an effect on salaries, quite a number of Local Authorities having increased their salary scales as a result of receiving few or no applications in response to their advertisements.

The following applications were made during the year:

I Increase of scale from £200-£220 to £220-£290.

I Increase of scale from £200-£220 to £220-£260, and £275-£320 for the Superintendent.

I Increase from fixed salary of £175 to £200-£220.

I School Nurses placed on scale of £202. Ios. od.-£236 instead of £180-£210.

I Midwife transferred to higher grade with scale of £200-£250 in place of £170-£200.

Application for Grade C. of Lancashire and Cheshire Whitley Council Scale. No action.

I Application for London District Whitley Scale.

Application for London District Whitley Scale. Full scale not given but scale increased from £200—£300 to £225—£340 and for Superintendents of Centres to £250—£390.

I Deputation received in 1941—result not yet known.

I Application to L.C.C. for removal of anomaly in applying new scale to School Nursing Sisters on permanent staff. Increase of £12. 10s. od. granted from April 1st, 1939.

1 Application for deputation to be received. Pending.

The results have been more successful, increases having been obtained in seven out of eleven cases compared with four out of thirteen in 1939.

Special action was taken in the case of one Local Authority in the London area, 2 Student Associates nobly agreeing to withdraw their applications for vacancies at the Association's request, in view of the low salary scale.

(b) Uniform Allowances in relation to Superannuation. Two Local Authorities have agreed to incorporate the

uniform allowance previously given to their Health Visitors in the salary scale, to enable this to be counted for superannuation purposes. Another has agreed to give the uniform in kind, in order that the value may be counted for superannuation purposes.

(c) APPOINTMENT OF UNQUALIFIED HEALTH VISITORS. The Ministry of Health has been approached with regard to five Local Authorities who had appointed Health Visitors who were not fully qualified. One of these subsequently obtained her Health Visitor's certificate and her appointment was confirmed. In three cases the Local Authority has been informed by the Ministry that the appointments must be cancelled. The other case is still pending.

(d) HOLIDAYS. One Local Authority which had only allowed all its staff to have one week's holiday in 1940 was approached at the request of members but refused to grant

extra holidays.

(e) Health Visitors no longer required in S.E. Coast Towns. The Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Labour were approached about the position of Health Visitors whose services became redundant owing to the evacuation of large sections of the population. Fortunately the number affected was small and all of them were helped to find new appointments or were transferred temporarily by their own Local Authority to reception areas

Whitley Council.

A deputation from the Association was received by the Staff side of the South Wales Provincial Council on 11th July, 1940, at Cardiff. The Deputation urged that a uniform scale of salary should be recommended by the Whitley Council for Health Visitors, School Nurses and Municipal Midwives throughout South Wales, the suggested scale being £210-£310.

APPOINTMENTS BRANCH.

39 candidates have registered during the year, i.e. 17 less than the previous year. This is due to the smaller number of candidates who trained and qualified during 1940.

29 temporary vacancies, two of these for the duration of the war, and five permanent appointment vacancies were filled. This compares with 65 in 1030.

It was impossible to fill all the vacancies notified through lack of candidates.

ROUTINE OFFICE WORK.

REPORTS OF CENTRES.

Bedfordshire and Northants Centre.

The seventh Annual Meeting of the Centre was held in Northampton on January 4th. Only two meetings were held in 1940 one had to be postponed owing to the Government Evacuation Scheme. The membership of the Centre is now 39.
