Branches of Work.

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Central Fund					25

WESTMINSTER, BELGRAVIA & PIMLICO ASSOCIATION.

Constitution (as revised 1930).

1.—The Association comprises six Branches:—

1.—Outside Rescue Work. (Victoria Station district).

2.—Outside Rescue Work. (Charing Cross neighbourhood).

3.—Emergency Home. (Temporary Shelter).

4.—Home of Compassion. (Maternity). 5.—St. John Baptist's Home (Lying-in).

6.—St. Anne's Maternity Shelter.

2.—Council.

The Council shall be the governing body of the Association, and shall consist of:

President: The Very Rev. the Dean of Westminster.

Vice-Presidents: The Canons of the Abbey. The Incumbents of the parishes, with the addition of Lay-representatives of the Church of England in the City of Westminster, who shall be elected triennially by the Council.

Three (or at least two) Representatives from each Branch

elected annually.

Not more than six Members co-opted annually.

A Central Secretary and Treasurer appointed by the Council.

3.—The Council shall meet at least twice a year. The Annual Meeting of the Council shall be held in MAY, the financial year ending on 31st March.

4.—Committees.

- (I) The Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Council at its Annual Meeting. It shall consist of two representatives from each Branch, who shall be chosen from the representatives on the Council, and shall have power to co-opt not more than 5 additional members.
- The Executive Committee shall elect its own Chairman, and shall meet once a month.
- (II) The Finance Committee shall be appointed by the Council at its Annual Meeting, and shall consist of the Treasurer of each Branch, together with not more than three additional members to be co-opted by the Council, who may or may not be members of the Council.
 - The Finance Committee shall elect its own Chairman, and shall meet at least four times a year.
- 5.—The Central Secretary and Treasurer shall be ex-officio members of all Committees.

ANNUAL REPORT,

1931—1932.

The Association have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for 1931-1932.

The Council met on 13th May and on 20th November, 1931, for the transaction of business and an extra meeting was held on 25th February, 1932, for the consideration of the financial side of the Association, which is giving rise to serious apprehension. The work of the Association goes forward steadily but unless increased financial support can be obtained, it may have to be curtailed.

A Stall was allotted to the Association at the combined Sale of Work for Missions at Home and Abroad held in the Horticultural Hall in November, 1931. The principal object of the Stall was to dispose of the needlework done in the Homes. It was very successful and realised £56 11s. 1d., which was paid into the Central Fund. In February, 1932, a lecture on French Art was given by Mrs. James Harrower, which brought in a sum of £52 11s. 3d. to the funds of the Association.

It was with great regret that the Association accepted the resignation of Miss Warren owing to ill-health. Miss Warren had occupied the position of Central Secretary for nearly 20 years, and to her unremitting work and interest the Association owes much.

Miss F. W. Brooks has been appointed Central Secretary.

Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Reade found that they were unexpectedly obliged to leave London and therefore had to resign their posts of Hon. Treasurers. Miss Matheson has very kindly consented to undertake the work of Hon. Treasurer, and it is particularly requested that all subscriptions should be sent direct to her. In so doing, the subscribers need not feel that the branch of the work in which they are particularly interested will in any way suffer from "centralisation"; each branch continues to be the special care of its own Committee, who give that personal care and interest which, in this work above all others, is so vitally necessary.

The Executive Committee wish to thank Mrs. Storrs for so kindly welcoming the Monthly Meetings at her house, and for acting as Chairman in the absence of the Rev. W. J. B. Scott.

Report for the Year 1931.

During the past year there have been no legislative or other changes—advances or otherwise—to record with regard to the particular work on which the Charing Cross Association is engaged.

The need for co-operation in this work of all forces, social as well as religious, appears increasingly desirable, and the Charing Cross Association is glad to report that, during the past year they have found great advantage in working with the Westminster, Pimlico, and Belgravia Association. The arrangement has been entirely successful, and this important step in the avoidance of overlapping, and in the direction of mutual assistance has everything to recommend it.

The Charing Cross Association, unfortunately, has not yet been assured of sufficient financial support to be able to employ more than one member of the Women's Auxiliary Service, but the zeal and efficiency of Cadet Budd cannot be too highly praised.

On November 18 a meeting was held at St. Anne's, Soho, most kindly arranged by Mrs. Balfour on behalf of the Association, the Rector of St. Anne's, the Rev. Basil Bouchier, was in the chair, and the Rev. P. McCormick, and Inspector Campbell spoke of the work which the Association was doing in St. Anne's Parish. A great deal of interest was shown, and the Rector promised financial help.

The work done on patrol is largely preventive, and may claim to be successful to a considerable extent, in that 220 couples were parted in the street, one may hope permanently in many cases. The number of girls charged with soliciting at the Courts of Marlborough Street and Bow Street were 63 fined, 4 bound over, and 5 remanded.

Seventy women and girls have been helped in various ways; some only needed shelter for a night or two, for many work was found, the lonely have been referred to Clubs for recreation and friendship, the young have been given wise advice, always gratefully received, and in some instances, legal help. Strict watch has been kept on shops which display indecent literature, and in one case a shopkeeper was fined, and post cards, photographs, and books were seized and destroyed. Watch is also kept on Funlands which display slot machines.

The Committee wish to express their most grateful thanks, to the Blue Lamp Shelter, the Hostels at 76, Warwick Street and at 7, Boniface Street, and the Sister Mabel Club for their invaluable provision of night shelter. Without some such homes at the back of her, the Worker would indeed be helpless before the urgent needs of those who would otherwise sink to lower depths.

The improvement that has lately taken place in the neighbourhood has been maintained.

Six houses that were found to be used as brothels were closed and the owners fined. Much still remains to be done, for in one notorious street alone, eight houses are kept under special observation, as known girls are constantly going in and out with their partners. In many other streets watch is kept on houses where known girls have rooms.

The Committee have to report with very great regret the resignation of Mrs. Hyde-Thomson, who acted as Honorary Secretary and Treasurer with so much zeal and ability. The Association has secured the services of Miss E. Lakeman in her place. The Committee has been deprived of a most efficient member by the resignation of Mrs. Mosse due to ill-health; she is still a most generous friend.

The Committee wish to express their warm appreciation to Mr. R. C. Harris, A.C.A., who has very kindly acted as Honorary Auditor.

Report.

In printing the 10 Annual Report of the Outside Work of the Westminster, Belgravia and Pimlico Association, the Committee realise how greatly they are indebted to the two Workers for the thoroughness and conscientious care with which they respond to the many calls made on their time and energies by those unfortunate girls who need their help. This year there have been a greater number of girls sent or taken to Hospitals for medical examination, and it is a matter for thankfulness that three girls have definitely given up their former undesirable life and are now in respectable employment.

The Workers patrol the streets every evening from 9.30 until after midnight and the following summary of 775 cases dealt with gives some idea of the scope of their activities.

98 Maternity cases placed in Hospitals.

4 Placed in Homes.

57 Passed on to other Workers.

68 Foster-mothers found.

7 Marriages promoted.

75 Provided with a night's lodging.

63 Placed in the Emergency Home.

94 Girls for whom work was found.

22 Returned to relations.

47 Affiliation cases arranged out of Court.

15 Affiliation cases through the Court.

22 Reconciliations in domestic life.

203 Women dealt with the worse for drink.

In addition to these numbers there have been many casual conversations with young women in the Station area who have asked advice, which was always readily given.

A new feature in the work this year has been the number of reconciliations successfully effected between husbands and wives, who through unfaithfulness or quarrelling have been living apart, and

needed a mutual friend to draw them together again.

Affiliation cases increase in number yearly. There are now 21 men who pay their maintenance money through the Workers' office, and this entails very careful book-keeping, as well as a great deal of correspondence with foster-mothers. The office is a very busy place. On many evenings between 6 and 9 the small club-room overflows with girls, who will sit on the stairs waiting for an interview.

Preventive.

Among those for whom work has been found are many Preventive cases, but the Workers report that the girls of 16 and 17 years are now more than usually difficult to manage, being independent and defiant. It has been necessary to deal very sternly with them in order to bring them to a better frame of mind. A mother appealed for help over a lazy, idle daughter of 17, who spent the day in bed, and stayed out late at night. After much reasoning and remonstrance she consented to turn over a new leaf, and is now settled in service. A girl of 18, from Scotland, was persuaded to change her situation from a Hotel, where there were many temptations, to a Boarding-house where the mistress took a personal interest in her servants. Another girl from Wales, aged 22, found herself in an undesirable house, and seeing the Workers' notice in the Station called for advice. She eventually became staff-maid in a private club.

Rescue.

Among the Rescue cases recently helped are the following:—

D., aged 16½, had come from Yorkshire to a situation in London. where she only stayed for one week. She was wandering about with undesirable companions when she came under the Workers' care. They placed her in a Hostel and wrote to the parents, who immediately sent the fare with grateful thanks, asking for the girl to be sent home. We have since heard that work has been found for D. as wardmaid in a Hospital.

R., aged 25, a waitress, had been living an immoral life for 2 years, and had been warned several times by the Workers. At last she found she was expecting a baby and had to go into Hospital. From there she wrote to the Workers begging to be given one more chance. On her discharge R. was placed in an Institution whilst arrangements were made for the baby's future. The Hospital granted two week's money for a foster-mother, and an outfit was obtained to start R. in a good situation where she has gone on steadily, keeping quite straight and paying regularly for her baby. She has given up her old associations, and her mistress says she is a splendid worker.

M., aged 22, was expecting a baby. The putative father had lived with the girl until all her money was spent, then he left her. M. had no home or parents, and sought the advice of the Workers, who placed her in Hospital for treatment. On discharge she stayed in a Shelter, and then entered a Day Servants' Hostel with her baby. She is quite happy and getting on well.

V., aged 22, a waitress, was living with a man who had been twice in prison, and eventually left her stranded. When help was sought she was nearly starving.

V. was placed in a Home until after her baby was born, and then a very good situation for mother and child was found in the country. She has been to visit the Workers and is most grateful for all their kindness and help.

The Committee wish to express their hearty thanks to all friends who have helped forward the work with gifts of money, clothing, and practical sympathy. They are especially grateful to Mr. Errington-Smith for again so kindly auditing the accounts.

Report,

It has been in full working order throughout the year except for three weeks in July, when it was closed for very necessary cleaning and painting, and at the same time the opportunity was taken of giving the Staff their holidays.

We are glad to welcome as new members of the Committee, Lady

(Malcolm) Robertson and Mrs. Douglas Hill.

It was with great regret that the Committee heard of the death of Dr. Milsom, our Hon. Medical Officer, who had been such a good friend to the Home, and we are most grateful to his partner, Dr. Leigh Phillips, who has very kindly consented to act in the same capacity.

Our Lady Superintendent, Miss Little, was obliged to resign her post for reasons of health, and Miss Browne was appointed in her place in June last, and the work of the Home is being most ably

carried on under her guidance.

The Welfare Workers, as well as the Police, make constant demands upon our resources, and as it is hoped that many besides

regular subscribers may see this Report. It may be well to mention again that our aim is never to refuse help to any stranded woman or girl who needs it, except those who might be considered dangerous to the other inmates. Many who come cannot pay for themselves, and therefore the need for constant financial help is urgent. It is particularly requested that in future all subscriptions should be sent direct to the Hon. Treasurer of the Association: Miss E. I. Matheson, 21, Morpeth Terrace, S.W.1.

Many Old Girls have continued to visit the Home in 1931, and during the last 12 months the Home has admitted 955 adults, as well as 25 babies and 23 children who came with their mothers.

Report.

On 1st April, 1931, there were 11 girls and 8 babies in the Home, and during the year out of 46 applications there have been 30 admissions, five of whom brought infants with them. For various reasons five of the applicants only stayed for a week or two, and left before the baby's birth. One was a young deserted wife whose parents in Yorkshire eventually took charge of her.

Twenty-seven girls have left, 16 being placed in service, and 10 returned to their own relations. A girl of 16, after staying in the Home for ten months, went with her baby to a Hostel in the country for further training.

One baby was born in the Home, and one in Queen Charlotte's Hospital. The other confinements were all in St. Stephen's Hospital, and included a bonnie pair of twins.

The following is a summary of the girls who left:—

2 went to their own homes, taking baby with them.

- 4 ,, ,, ,, babies were boarded out.
- 2 ,, ,, babies were stillborn.
- 1 ,, ,, her own home, very delicate baby still in Hospital.
- 1 ,, ,, ,, baby was adopted from Hospital.
- 3 went to service, taking baby with them.
- 10 ,, ,, baby boarded out.
- 2 ,, ,, baby to relations.
- 1 ,, ,, baby died in Hospital, 10 days old.

1 aged 16 went to a Mother and Baby Hostel.

On 31st March, 1932, there were 9 girls and 4 babies in the Home.

Eight affiliations have been successfully carried through. One Court case was lost through insufficient evidence.

Three girls have been presented for Confirmation, and seven others restored to Holy Communion after careful preparation.

For economy's sake, and after consultation with the Superintendent, the Committee decided to reduce the number of workers on the Staff, and the management of the Home is now carried on by the Superintendent, Matron and Nurse, who are all loyally doing their best to keep down expenses. As a sign of their goodwill they generously offered to take the "10 per cent. cut" in their salaries, which the Committee accepted for a period of three months.

We are most grateful for many kind gifts during the year, especially for welcome woollies from members of St. Peter's Watch, and for a nice parcel of garments in December from Chaddleworth.

A gift of linen from two members of the Committee was most acceptable, and mention must be made of the re-decoration of the Home from top to bottom by the Winter Distress League, all the labour was given free, and the cost to the Home was only £23 9s. 4d. Other repairs have been rather heavy, but the accounts on Page 16 show how the money has been spent.

Once again we wish to express our thanks to Messrs. Fitzpatrick, Graham & Co. for kindly auditing the accounts free of charge.

Report.

St. John the Baptist's Home was founded in 1891, and was moved from Ebury Street, S.W.1, to 159, Tulse Hill, in 1920.

The Home is licensed by the L.C.C. as a Lying-in Hospital for fifteen girls, and is in charge of a Superintendent holding C.M.B. Certificate, assisted by a Qualified Midwife. A House Matron, Kitchen Matron and a Nursery Assistant, complete the Staff.

Unmarried girls are received who are about to become mothers, and are admitted two months or longer prior to confinement. They must remain in the Home at least four months after the baby is born. Application should be made to the Secretary or the Superintendent at the Home.

Payments:—London Cases, 10/- weekly. Country Cases, 12/- weekly.

On the 1st April, 1931, there were 14 girls and 8 babies in the Home.

Out of 64 applications received during the year, 23 girls have been admitted. There have been 25 babies born.

Of the girls who have left:-

- 2 went to service taking their babies with them.
- 5 to service, babies to foster-mothers.
- 8 to their own homes, taking their babies with them.
- 4 to own homes, babies to foster-mothers.
- 1 to a Mother and Baby Hostel.
- 3 with their babies, to the Church Army to find work.
- 1 to a long Home, baby to the Guardians.
- 1 girl left of her own accord before confinement.

On the 31st March, 1932, there were 13 girls and 9 babies in the Home.

The health of the inmates has been excellent, and we are extremely grateful to Dr. Moon for his unfailing care and attention.

One girl has been baptized, four have been confirmed, and ten restored to Communion.

We were very sorry to lose the services of our Chaplain, the Rev. Philip Browning, when he became Vicar of Emmanuel Church, Camberwell. He has been succeeded as Chaplain by the Rev. Charles Patteson, Vicar of All Saints', West Dulwich, and we are most grateful to them both for their interest and help in the spiritual work of the Home.

Eight affiliation orders and agreements have been made, four with the aid of the Women's and Children's Protection Society.

Four girls who have left are in receipt of grants from Dr. Barnardo's Boarding-out Fund towards the maintenance of their babies.

We have had three Westminster Cases during the year.

L.C.C. Classes for needlework, singing and dancing have been continued.

Through the kindness of Lt.-Col. F. A. Brooks, M.D., Commissioner of St. John Ambulance Association, assisted by Miss Handsley Smith, we were given a course of First Aid lectures which were greatly appreciated. Seven girls sat for examination, of whom five were successful.

The Westminster City Council again made us a grant of £100 for which we are very grateful.

We held our usual Pound Day on the 9th May which brought us gifts of about 140 lbs. of goods, 5 cwts. of coal, £21 5s. in cash, and a wringer for the laundry.

The Founder's prize, which is awarded to girls who remain three years in service in one situation, within five years of leaving the Home, has been given to one girl during the past year.

We are glad we are able to keep in touch with many of our former girls who come to our Christmas Party and also visit the Home on Sunday afternoons. One of our old girls with her baby has recently spent ten days' holiday with us.

Finance.

We should look forward to the work of the coming year with better courage if our finances were not causing us so much anxiety. In this connection we wish to point out how very important Pound Day is to us. We do beg that all our friends and any interested in this work should come on the 9th May and see the Home and bring us contributions.

Report.

During the past year the work at St. Anne's has been very satisfactory. There have not been quite so many girls, which is greatly due to the shortage of funds of the different sources which apply for vacancies.

The object of St. Anne's Home when first started over 30 years ago was to take cases for short periods before and after confinement. When, however, the Ministry of Health began to give grants to the Homes of our Association, they fixed the time that the girls must remain as not less than six weeks before and after confinement, the longer stay being optional. During that time they received antenatal treatment, before entering Hospital, and remain two months in the Home on their return, so as to learn how to look after their babies and ensure breast feeding. During their stay they are trained in all domestic work and needlework. The needlework is always very interesting to them, as beside making their baby clothes, garments are made for our Annual Sale.

This year 29 girls have passed through the Home; 22 have left. On April 1st 7 girls and 2 infants were in the Home

Eleven girls were placed in Homes and Hostels with babies who were breast fed.

Three were placed in situations, two taking their babies with them.

Eight returned to their parents, two took their babies with them.

The health of the babies has been very good and only seven were obliged to be sent to foster-mothers. All the children were baptized before leaving St. Anne's.

The greatest difficulty has been found in tracing some of the men. Only eight affiliation cases have been entered and made to pay from 5/- to 15/6 per week.

There have been three cases of assault of girls only 16 years of age. Two of these were taken to Court; one man was sentenced to 12 months' imprisonmnt. One girl had no evidence and lost her case, and one refused help.

B.S., 17, an epileptic. The father of the child, who was her brother, was sentenced to 12 months' hard labour. The girl was sent to Hospital, where she recovered her health and went to a long Home with her baby.

M.R., 23, had to undergo an operation and the child was stillborn. After being some time in a Convalescent Home, M.R. was able to return home, and made very satisfactory progress.

T.S., 18. A very sad case, as the girl had kept house for her father and 8 children, and he was responsible for her condition. Fortunately, the baby only lived 8 days. The C.T.D. investigated the case, and on the day the man was to appear in Court he attempted suicide. He was tried and sentenced later, and all the young children were sent to different Homes. T.S. was entirely sinned against, and is now in a good situation and never wishes to see her father again.

The Committee are very grateful for the gifts of fruit and vegetables, linen and clothing and babies' garments. We are also grateful to the Corkran Trust for their grant of £15. The Bazaar Stall at the Horticultural Hall for the Association realised £56 11s. 1d., of which £35 5s. 7d. was made out of work done at St. Anne's.

On the score of economy it was decided this year not to have the large Christmas party and entertainment, but merely a treat for the inmates of the Home.

A great many girls have visited St. Anne's, and one regularly for 13 years, as the Superintendent still continues to pay the fostermother. The child is going in for a scholarship at her school, and there is another girl of 13 whose mother keeps in touch with Miss Hyde.

The Superintendent is always glad to welcome anyone who would like to visit the Home and take a personal interest in it. The same staff has carried on the work for 16 years.
