I can well imagine that you
and your mother must be deeply anxious about
your Sister. I can hardly think that they will
dare to forcibly feed your Sister but of course we
must do all we can to prevent their thinking
of such a thing. Will you get your doctor to
write at once to Mr Keema & the Governor, telling
them strongly the state of her health - I think
that you & your brother should also write, I
must tell you that any action that you may
take tells far more strongly than anything we

Can do, for when the W.S.P.U. try to do anything
officially for their prisoners they always
meet with a blank refusal of help or information.

Thouour your sister for her decision, but it will
not be an easy thing to get Mr P to see her
reasons, & we shall not find it easy to get a
question asked, any way I think we must wait
a day or two for that, & see what happens, we should
get no information now & should spoil the chance
of getting another question put, if necessary,
in a day or two.

The doctor's letter is much the most
necessary & useful thing at this moment,
when your sister had paralysis of the throat was
she medically attended, if so get that doctor to
write too, such letters do carry weight with the
H. Office. I will send you Lansbury's address to morrow
